VOLUNTEER TESTIMONIAL

A couple of years back I decided to take voluntary redundancy after working 21 years for a large local distribution company. During this time, I had enjoyed working in commercial business roles. However, with repeated re-organisations and the need to reapply for your own role happening with increased regularity I decided it was time for a change. I also had two young children and wanted a better work life balance.

I planned to try some new things, one of which was to gain experience working for a more community focused organisation. As a local support provider Citizens Advice was top of mind. CA had helped me out in the past when my then bank was threatening me with court over an unpaid student overdraft. My partner Tracy had also previously volunteered at Citizens Advice. Tracy messaged Clare at CA Corby to see if there were any volunteer vacancies and I soon had an application form to complete.

I then had an interview with Vinny and Michelle. This was largely an open informal discussion around what Citizens Advice does, and the rewards and challenges of the volunteer roles. I left feeling very impressed with their straight-talking honesty and looking forward to my start date.

I began volunteering at the Corby office and all the team made me feel welcome. I completed the induction training and started shadowing gateway assessor and specialist advisor sessions. Katie and Ruth were great mentors and I quickly expanded my awareness of the multiple issues clients seek CA help for. After a couple of months, I was ready to conduct my own gateway assessments, and soon began to enjoy the feeling of helping clients on their CA support journey.

In March, almost a year after joining, things frustratingly came to a sudden halt with lockdown. Unfortunately, I was unable to work from home with two young children. Thankfully, I maintained contact with the CA team and was then able to join the Covid-safe working group set up in the summer to plan our safe return to the office. This proved a great opportunity to get back involved again, and also get to know some of the wider Corby & Kettering team. I am now very much looking forward to recommencing my 2nd year with Citizens Advice (in the "new normal"!) and further developing my skills and responsibilities within the organisation. — Mike Burns, Volunteer

RESEARCH & CAMPAIGNS

Nationally, Citizens Advice see two million people every year, and have a closer understanding of the problems that people experience than any other organisation. Your local charity, Citizens Advice Corby & Kettering know which policies are working and spot emerging issues early, in order to influence policy makers and services to bring about change that will positively impact the lives of people both locally and nationally. This work is fundamental in the pursuit of the services' aim to improve the policies and practices that affect peoples' lives.

LOCAL RESEARCH & CAMPAIGNS

Citizens Advice Corby & Kettering have identified an ongoing issue with Anti-social behaviour, this is affecting many tenants from many different Housing Sectors. Anti-social behaviour is made up from neighbour disputes, domestic abuse, threats of violence which have led to actual violence and criminal damage, whereby the tenant feels they are not being support by their Housing Landlord – We are currently collecting evidence for this issue from our clients, in order to help individuals effectively.

We continue to work closely with our partners to ensure accessibility to all services for those clients suffering with mental health issues and understand and overcome those barriers that prevent services' being accessed.

NATIONAL RESEARCH & CAMPAIGNS: Evidence used nationally by Citizens Advice for Research & Campaigns Apr 19-Mar 20 Benefits: Scams:

- Making Ends Meet: Since April 2016, the impact of the benefits freeze on people in debt, showed that from April to August 2019, 40% of people we helped with debt who claim incomerelated benefits had a negative budget.
- Universal Credit: Why are claims being closed? Was this because of something the client did/ didn't do? Or poor administration from the DWP?
- Universal Credit No Recourse to Public Funds: When one member of a couple has no-recourse to public funds (NRPF) Citizens Advice (and CPAG) guidance states Universal Credit claimants should make a single claim but make a clear disclosure that they have a partner who has NRPF. However, we are aware that the DWP/JCP are advising claimants to make a joint claim for UC.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objects

The object of Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering is the promotion of any charitable purpose for the benefit of the communities of Corby and Kettering Borough by the advancement of education, the protection of health and the relief of poverty, sickness and distress. The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Trust's objectives and in planning its future activities.

Aims, Objectives, Strategies and Activities for the Period

Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering aims to provide free, confidential, impartial and independent advice and information for the benefit of the local community, to exercise a responsible influence on the development of social policies and services and to ensure that individuals do not suffer through a lack of knowledge or an inability to express their needs effectively.

In addition to the continuing provision of high quality advisory services to the local community, the primary objective of the period was to ensure that the level of services delivered were maintained at their current level despite a difficult economic climate. Increasing the number of volunteers also remained high priority.

The principal activity of Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering remained the provision of free, confidential, independent and impartial advice, information and counsel for members of the public. This is provided from our town centre offices through face-to-face consultations, telephone advice, home visits and various outreach services within the Borough. In addition, due to project funding, the following services were provided;

- Older persons take-up of benefits
- Money advice casework
- Outreach services in Kettering Borough libraries
- Home visiting
- Financial Capability Courses
- Energy Best Deal appointments
- Employability services

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES (continued)

Charitable Activities

The key achievements in the year for the Charity were increasing the number of Volunteers recruited in both Adviser and Administration roles; continuation of advice services within Burton Latimer, Desborough and Rothwell libraries; attracting further funds to support new employability services; continued delivery on Energy Best Deal information to consumers; securing new funding to deliver outreach services in Corby.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial Position

Total incoming resources in the year were £408.128, of this £373,392 related to project restricted activities.

A surplus of £39,141 was made in the year. At 31st March 2020 total reserves were £307,014 and net current assets totalled \pm 307,014.

Reserves Policy

Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering is required to ensure that free monies are available in each financial year to meet any reasonable foreseeable contingency. Therefore, the financial reserves we have set aside allow for sufficient cash flow to maintain the core service of the Organisation at a level equivalent to at least three (3) months normal operating expenditure. The Trustees have recently reviewed our redundancy liability and in the event that the Charity were to dissolve have ensured that funds are available to meet this.

Principal Funding Sources

The Trustee Board extends their gratitude to Corby Borough Council & Kettering Borough Council who continue to support the core operating of the Charity. Additionally, project specific funding was received from; Citizens Advice, Corby Borough Council Homelessness, CLS Northamptonshire (NCC advice services contract), Big Lottery Awards for All and KHL Big Local.

Corby Borough Council and Kettering Borough Council provide premises to the Charity, further details of this can be seen in Note 12.

FUTURE PLANS

Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering will continue their work to ensure that the necessary funds are secured so that the services people need are in place when our help is needed. Strategic priorities for the next twelve (12) months are to seek new funding streams to support further project delivery and continue to further increase numbers of volunteer advisers. We will continue to ensure that we are fit for purpose and look forward to working with our Councils on their plans to create a new unitary authority.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering is a company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 13th March 2007. It is registered as a Charity with the Charity Commission. Members are elected from the local community and must either reside or work in the Boroughs of Corby or Kettering. However such applications require the approval of the Trustees. There are currently seven members, each of whom agrees to contribute £1 in the event of the Charity winding up.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES (continued)

Appointment of Trustees

As set out in the Articles of Association the first Trustees shall be those persons notified to Companies House as the first directors of the Charity. Trustees are not required to retire by rotation and remain as Trustees until they resign. There shall be a minimum number of three Trustees and a maximum number of fifteen Trustees.

The Trustees have the power to appoint additional Trustees or to fill a vacancy arising amongst the Trustees. The members have the power to nominate additional Trustees, or Trustees to fill a vacancy, at a general meeting.

Trustee induction and training

New Trustees undergo an orientation day to brief them on their legal obligations under Charity and company law, the content of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the decision making processes, the business plan and recent financial performances of the Charity. Trustees are encouraged to attend appropriate external training events where these will facilitate the undertaking of their role.

Organisational Structure

Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering is governed by its Trustee Board which is responsible for setting the strategic direction of the organisation and the policy of the Charity. The Trustees carry the ultimate responsibility for the conduct of Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering and for ensuring that the Charity satisfies its legal and contractual obligations. Trustees meet, as a minimum, quarterly and delegate the day-to-day operation of the organisation to senior management. The Trustee Board is independent from management.

Major Risks

Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering has carried out a risk assessment and a risk strategy has been agreed which is incorporated in the Organisation's Business and Development Plan. The Trustees recognise that any major risks to which the Charity might be exposed need to be reviewed and systems put in place to mitigate those risks.

Included in external risks is that of the loss of funding which is becoming increasingly difficult to replace. The Charity strives to minimize exposure through securing funding from diverse donors

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The trustees (who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's gross income exceeded £250,000 and I am qualified to undertake the examination by being a qualified member of The Institute of Chartered Accountants England and Wales.

- examine the accounts under section 145 of the 2011 Act;
- follow the procedures laid down in the general Directions given by the Charity Commission under section 145(5)(b) of the 2011 Act; and
- state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the general Directions given by the Charity Commission. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from you as trustees concerning any such matters. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2020

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been used consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the Charity's financial statements.

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP FRS 102), Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

ASSETS

Tangible Fixed Assets for use by Charity

Fixed assets are recorded at cost or, in cases where fixed assets have been donated to Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering at the original cost to that Charity.

Depreciation

Depreciation has been provided at the following rates in order to write down cost or valuation, less estimated residual value, of all tangible fixed assets by equal annual instalments over their expected useful lives.

Reducing balance Straight line

INCOMING RESOURCES

Recognition of incoming resources

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when:

- the Charity becomes entitled to the resources;
- the Trustees are virtually certain they will receive the resources; and
- the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Incoming resources with related expenditure

Where incoming resources have related expenditure (as with fundraising or contract income) the incoming resources and related expenditure are reported gross in the SoFA.

Grants and donations

Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the Charity has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

Contractual income and performance related grants

This is only included in the SoFA once the related goods or services have been delivered.

Gifts in kind

Gifts in kind are accounted for at a reasonable estimate of their value to the Charity or the amount actually realised.

Gifts in kind for sale or distribution are included in the accounts as gifts only when sold or distributed by the Charity.

Gifts in kind for use by the Charity are included in the SoFA as incoming resources when receivable.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2020

Donated services and facilities

These are only included in incoming resources (with an equivalent amount in resources expended) where the benefit to the Charity is reasonably quantifiable, measurable and material. The value placed on these resources is the estimated value to the Charity of the service or facility received.

Volunteer help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the Trustees' annual report.

Investment income

This is included in the accounts when receivable

EXPENDITURE AND LIABILITIES

Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the Charity to pay out resources.

Governance costs

Include costs of the preparation and examination of statutory accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and cost of any legal advice to Trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

Grants with performance conditions

Where the Charity gives a grant with conditions for its payment being a specific level of service or output to be provided, such grants are only recognised in the SoFA once the recipient of the grant has provided the specified service or output.

Grants payable without performance conditions

These are only recognised in the accounts when a commitment has been made and there are no conditions to be met relating to the grant which remain in the control of the Charity.

Value Added Tax

As the majority of Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering's activities are classified as exempt or non-business activities for the purposes of value added tax, Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering is unable to reclaim any value added tax which it suffers on its purchases

Taxation

No provision has been made for corporate tax or deferred tax as the charitable organisation is a registered Charity and is, therefore, exempt from taxation.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objects

The object of Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering is the promotion of any charitable purpose for the benefit of the communities of Corby and Kettering Borough by the advancement of education, the protection of health and the relief of poverty, sickness and distress. The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Trust's objectives and in planning its future activities.

Aims, Objectives, Strategies and Activities for the Period

Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering aims to provide free, confidential, impartial and independent advice and information for the benefit of the local community, to exercise a responsible influence on the development of social policies and services and to ensure that individuals do not suffer through a lack of knowledge or an inability to express their needs effectively.

In addition to the continuing provision of high quality advisory services to the local community, the primary objective of the period was to ensure that the level of services delivered were maintained at their current level despite a difficult economic climate. Increasing the number of volunteers also remained high priority.

The principal activity of Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering remained the provision of free, confidential, independent and impartial advice, information and counsel for members of the public. This is provided from our town centre offices through face-to-face consultations, telephone advice, home visits and various outreach services within the Borough. In addition, due to project funding, the following services were provided;

- Older persons take-up of benefits
- Money advice casework
- Outreach services in Kettering Borough libraries
- Home visiting
- Financial Capability Courses
- Energy Best Deal appointments
- Employability services

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES (continued)

Charitable Activities

The key achievements in the year for the Charity were increasing the number of Volunteers recruited in both Adviser and Administration roles; continuation of advice services within Burton Latimer, Desborough and Rothwell libraries; attracting further funds to support new employability services; continued delivery on Energy Best Deal information to consumers; securing new funding to deliver outreach services in Corby.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial Position

Total incoming resources in the year were £408.128, of this £373,392 related to project restricted activities.

A surplus of £39,141 was made in the year. At 31st March 2020 total reserves were £307,014 and net current assets totalled \pm 307,014.

Reserves Policy

Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering is required to ensure that free monies are available in each financial year to meet any reasonable foreseeable contingency. Therefore, the financial reserves we have set aside allow for sufficient cash flow to maintain the core service of the Organisation at a level equivalent to at least three (3) months normal operating expenditure. The Trustees have recently reviewed our redundancy liability and in the event that the Charity were to dissolve have ensured that funds are available to meet this.

Principal Funding Sources

The Trustee Board extends their gratitude to Corby Borough Council & Kettering Borough Council who continue to support the core operating of the Charity. Additionally, project specific funding was received from; Citizens Advice, Corby Borough Council Homelessness, CLS Northamptonshire (NCC advice services contract), Big Lottery Awards for All and KHL Big Local.

Corby Borough Council and Kettering Borough Council provide premises to the Charity, further details of this can be seen in Note 12.

FUTURE PLANS

Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering will continue their work to ensure that the necessary funds are secured so that the services people need are in place when our help is needed. Strategic priorities for the next twelve (12) months are to seek new funding streams to support further project delivery and continue to further increase numbers of volunteer advisers. We will continue to ensure that we are fit for purpose and look forward to working with our Councils on their plans to create a new unitary authority.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering is a company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 13th March 2007. It is registered as a Charity with the Charity Commission. Members are elected from the local community and must either reside or work in the Boroughs of Corby or Kettering. However such applications require the approval of the Trustees. There are currently seven members, each of whom agrees to contribute £1 in the event of the Charity winding up.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES (continued)

Appointment of Trustees

As set out in the Articles of Association the first Trustees shall be those persons notified to Companies House as the first directors of the Charity. Trustees are not required to retire by rotation and remain as Trustees until they resign. There shall be a minimum number of three Trustees and a maximum number of fifteen Trustees.

The Trustees have the power to appoint additional Trustees or to fill a vacancy arising amongst the Trustees. The members have the power to nominate additional Trustees, or Trustees to fill a vacancy, at a general meeting.

Trustee induction and training

New Trustees undergo an orientation day to brief them on their legal obligations under Charity and company law, the content of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the decision making processes, the business plan and recent financial performances of the Charity. Trustees are encouraged to attend appropriate external training events where these will facilitate the undertaking of their role.

Organisational Structure

Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering is governed by its Trustee Board which is responsible for setting the strategic direction of the organisation and the policy of the Charity. The Trustees carry the ultimate responsibility for the conduct of Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering and for ensuring that the Charity satisfies its legal and contractual obligations. Trustees meet, as a minimum, quarterly and delegate the day-to-day operation of the organisation to senior management. The Trustee Board is independent from management.

Major Risks

Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering has carried out a risk assessment and a risk strategy has been agreed which is incorporated in the Organisation's Business and Development Plan. The Trustees recognise that any major risks to which the Charity might be exposed need to be reviewed and systems put in place to mitigate those risks.

Included in external risks is that of the loss of funding which is becoming increasingly difficult to replace. The Charity strives to minimize exposure through securing funding from diverse donors

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2020

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been used consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the Charity's financial statements.

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP FRS 102), Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

ASSETS

Tangible Fixed Assets for use by Charity

Fixed assets are recorded at cost or, in cases where fixed assets have been donated to Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering at the original cost to that Charity.

Depreciation

Depreciation has been provided at the following rates in order to write down cost or valuation, less estimated residual value, of all tangible fixed assets by equal annual instalments over their expected useful lives.

Reducing balance Straight line

INCOMING RESOURCES

Recognition of incoming resources

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when:

- the Charity becomes entitled to the resources;
- the Trustees are virtually certain they will receive the resources; and
- the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Incoming resources with related expenditure

Where incoming resources have related expenditure (as with fundraising or contract income) the incoming resources and related expenditure are reported gross in the SoFA.

Grants and donations

Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the Charity has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

Contractual income and performance related grants

This is only included in the SoFA once the related goods or services have been delivered.

Gifts in kind

Gifts in kind are accounted for at a reasonable estimate of their value to the Charity or the amount actually realised.

Gifts in kind for sale or distribution are included in the accounts as gifts only when sold or distributed by the Charity.

Gifts in kind for use by the Charity are included in the SoFA as incoming resources when receivable.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2020

Donated services and facilities

These are only included in incoming resources (with an equivalent amount in resources expended) where the benefit to the Charity is reasonably quantifiable, measurable and material. The value placed on these resources is the estimated value to the Charity of the service or facility received.

Volunteer help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the Trustees' annual report.

Investment income

This is included in the accounts when receivable

EXPENDITURE AND LIABILITIES

Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the Charity to pay out resources.

Governance costs

Include costs of the preparation and examination of statutory accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and cost of any legal advice to Trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

Grants with performance conditions

Where the Charity gives a grant with conditions for its payment being a specific level of service or output to be provided, such grants are only recognised in the SoFA once the recipient of the grant has provided the specified service or output.

Grants payable without performance conditions

These are only recognised in the accounts when a commitment has been made and there are no conditions to be met relating to the grant which remain in the control of the Charity.

Value Added Tax

As the majority of Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering's activities are classified as exempt or non-business activities for the purposes of value added tax, Citizens Advice Services Corby & Kettering is unable to reclaim any value added tax which it suffers on its purchases

Taxation

No provision has been made for corporate tax or deferred tax as the charitable organisation is a registered Charity and is, therefore, exempt from taxation.

- CLS Northamptonshire sub-contract delivery partner on the Northants Energy Saving Service (NESS) funded by warm homes providing energy advice, debt and benefits included
- Big Local provided funding for outreach worker within the Corby Kingswood and Hazelwood Community Centres
- CBC Homelessness provide funding to support a part-time financial inclusion worker
- Corby Borough Council provide funding to support the core service and also specialist benefits advice
- Kettering Borough Council provide funding to support the core service and also specialist debt advice
- Energy funding relates to providing support for consumers to ensure that energy best deals are being identified
- ESF funds provides the funding to support long term unemployed people by removing the barriers that prevent them from entering employment
- Henry Smith Charity provides funding for debt and benefits caseworker
- Citizen Advice Universal credit, funding for advising on new claims for universal credit

13. DONATED FACILITIES

Corby Borough Council (CBC) provides premises (and associated utilities) to the charity at no charge. Kettering Borough Council (KBC) also provides premises to the charity at no charge. The Trustees recognising this valuable contribution to the charity's activities, but as a donated facility, its commercial value should not be reflected in these accounts.
