Report of the Trustees and Unaudited Financial Statements for the Year Ended 29 February 2020 <u>for</u> Cumbria Action for Sustainability

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The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 29 February 2020. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

## CHAIR'S REPORT

A Year of Hope and Challenge

Our financial year got under way in March 2019 to a backdrop of unprecedented momentum in the fight to stop the climate crisis. Public concern about climate change reached new highs amidst youth strikes, Extinction Rebellion protests and the high-profile voices of Greta Thunberg and David Attenborough, culminating in climate emergencies being declared in Cumbria, as across the UK.

After more than two decades of pushing for climate action, we suddenly found ourselves being pulled. Our small team had the new challenge of keeping up with requests for our advice and support, while continuing to deliver a demanding volume of projects and services. It was a good problem to have. We responded by expanding and realigning our staff team, enabling our chief executive Hazel Graham to move into a new role at CAfS to develop crucial networks and projects, with Karen Mitchell joining us as our new leader.

We stretched our capacity to organise a summit to help councils and community groups turn climate emergency declarations into action, bringing in expert speakers from across the UK. We also gave young people the chance to voice their concerns to Cumbria's MPs and other politicians at a youth climate question time event, along with supporting the county's first-ever youth climate summit.

We delivered a wide range of initiatives during this exceptional year, which have made a positive difference to people in Cumbria while driving towards our ultimate vision of a zero-carbon Cumbria. None would have been possible without the many communities, partners and funders who've worked alongside us to forge a more sustainable and resilient future, and I extend my thanks to them.

As our financial year drew to a close at the end of February 2020, the world was beginning to look very different. Brexit eclipsed climate in the general election, the UN COP25 climate summit ended in a disappointing deal, and the Coronavirus pandemic was about to change our lives in ways we had yet to imagine. These challenges also bring opportunities, and we plan to embrace these to help Cumbria build back better - more critical now than ever.

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# **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

## Our Objectives and aims

Cumbria Action for Sustainability (CAfS) is Cumbria's leading climate change and sustainability organisation. Our mission is to empower and enable people, communities and businesses to live and work more sustainably by sharing our knowledge, practice, skills, networks and practical experience.

We have a vision for a zero carbon Cumbria - bringing about a better way of life in balance with our environment. Our mission and vision reflect the original objects that our charity was set up in 2008 to deliver.

These are:.

i) To promote the benefit of the inhabitants of Cumbria, by the advancement of education, relief of poverty, sickness or distress or to undertake such other charitable purposes as the trustees shall in their absolute discretion determine.

ii) The protection and enhancement of the environment; (including the built environment for the benefit of the public by the maintenance, repair or restoration of any building or structure which is of public amenity, historic or architectural interest.)

In furtherance of the above objects the charity has the power to engage in activities in furtherance of sustainable development and to engage in activities in furtherance of the principles set out in Agenda 21.\*

\*In this sub-clause the phrase 'sustainable development' means development that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs; the phrase 'Agenda 21' refers to the action programme of that name adopted by the United Nations conference on Environment and Development in 1992.

We achieve our mission through developing and delivering effective projects and services which support communities in Cumbria to drive a shift towards a Zero Carbon Cumbria. Our activities include events and training; practical projects; specialist consultancy services; and advice and support to individuals, businesses, and local community action groups. We also use our experience to shape local policy.

Our work is delivered in partnership with local community groups, national and local government, associated agencies, other environmental charities, green businesses, and the public. We have around 20 projects underway at any one time, and a network of 4000+ people who support us by subscribing to our newsletter.

Our business plan identifies our key focus areas of activity for each year, based on the needs of the community and the skills and capacity of the staff team. Our website www.cafs.org.uk provides fuller details of our work and access to our resources and publications.

## Public benefit

CAfS has complied with the duty in Section 17(5) of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charities Commission

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable activities Uniting Cumbria to fight climate change

One of our biggest successes of 2019 was helping to bring together nearly 70 of the most influential organisations and people in Cumbria in a partnership to decarbonise our county, co-chaired by CAfS.

The Zero Carbon Cumbria Partnership will be instrumental in making changes happen at the pace and scale required by climate science and ensuring that our county benefits from the opportunities this brings. The group will plan and oversee a radical programme of action that will enable Cumbria to become a carbon-neutral county and to mitigate the likely impacts of existing climate change.

### Inspiring greener homes & lifestyles

Our Green Build & Sustainable Living Festival in September 2019 helped more people than ever to gain the knowledge, skills and inspiration to cut their carbon footprint in their homes, businesses and communities.

More than 1100 people took part in our open home visits, training courses, workshops, talks, bus tours and film screenings.

Building on our traditional focus on retrofitting for energy efficiency and low-energy new-builds, our diverse programme of more than 50 events also offered attendees the chance to explore co-housing, food growing and foraging, community energy, climate emergency action for communities, climate science and even sustainable floristry.

### **Empowering Cumbrians to drive change**

Forty Cumbrians are better equipped to share knowledge among their networks and act on climate change in their own lives after attending our Carbon & Climate Literacy courses, launched in 2019-20.

The course, accredited by the Carbon Literacy Trust, takes attendees on an interactive journey through climate science and what we can do about it at home and in our workplaces.

Building on our two pilot courses in Carlisle and Kendal in September 2019, we were successful in gaining a grant from the Emergence Foundation to roll out the training more widely within Cumbrian communities.

### Making cold homes cosy

More than 300 households benefited from our energy advice and draughtproofing service, Cold to Cosy Homes Cumbria, in 2019-20.

Residents will save an estimated £245,000 on their bills over 10 years through reducing their energy use, thanks to the advice and equipment we provided - from radiator reflectors to draught strips.

A further 15 vulnerable households in Eden now have better loft and wall insulation or new boilers thanks to the Warm Homes Eden service, which we delivered in partnership with Eden District Council. Many more residents took up our free advice at 8 Warm Homes Eden energy events around the district.

### Helping Ambleside to act for the future

The community group Ambleside Action for a Future has an exciting vision for their town to be carbon neutral. We've been able to support them, thanks to funding from South Lakeland District Council.

"We helped the community to plan actions for their place as a whole.

" A carbon footprinting study showed sources of emissions, informing future actions.

"We worked with Lancaster University to develop a groundbreaking new methodology for mapping the PV potential of roofs and applied it in Ambleside, and started exploring options for community renewable energy.

" The community picked up ideas through events, and a new film spread the word about the project.

### Drawing up a sustainable greenprint for Alston Moor

Communities on Alston Moor have lain the groundwork for a more sustainable future, supported by our three-year Greenprint programme, which drew towards a successful close this year.

Our creative consultation events and activities helped the community to articulate how they want their area to be, with their sustainable vision now a golden thread running through the new community plan.

We're particularly pleased to have sown the seed for community food growing, helped get a new repair cafe up and running, and supported the new solar PV array at Alston Primary and Samuel Kings' schools, crowdfunded by Alston Moor Community Energy (AMCE).

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable activities Leading the charge for electric vehicles

Switching to an electric vehicle will soon be an option for many more Cumbrians who don't have their own driveways to charge in, thanks to a new programme to install community chargepoints.

CAfS is helping to install more than 100 chargepoints in Cumbria and Lancashire, in a programme led by the community-benefit society Charge My Street.

We supported Charge My Street with its successful bid for government funding for the project, and started work as a partner in November 2019.

We'll be using our expertise and networks to help promote community share offers to raise funds for the chargepoints, and to identify premises to host them.

## **Rebuilding after Storm Desmond**

Since October 2016, CAfS has been helping Cumbrians adapt to the challenges of flooding and extreme weather, which are made more likely by climate change.

As a partner in the Rebuilding Together programme, by the end of our financial year 2019-20 we'd helped nearly 1000 people to make their homes more resilient and to work within their communities on projects to reduce their carbon emissions, the main cause of climate change.

This year, we gave Cumbrians the chance to learn from renovation works at a terraced property in Appleby to make it more resilient to flooding, with video diaries and on-site visits.

## FINANCIAL REVIEW

These accounts cover the 12 month period from March 2019 to February 2020. In this period, we have continued to have great success in attracting funding from a wide range of sources and have also built up our levels of non-grant income (donations and trading), giving us increased financial resilience.

At the end of 18/19, our total unrestricted funds (reserves) had increased by £8,350 bringing them to our highest ever levels of £134,274 (28.2.19). The Trustees committed £34,000 of these funds to a development fund for the charity, investing in new staff roles to drive forward partnerships to deliver our vision. This has been a great success, with our turnover increasing by 15% in 19/20 to £361,340 (from £314,136, 2018-19); our staff team increasing from ten to twelve part time staff (equivalent to seven full time employees); and our unrestricted funds only reducing by £1,964 (compared to the planned reduction of £34,000). This significant increase in turnover and relatively stable reserves levels reflects our success in developing new partnerships and income streams, as well as our continued sound management of our overhead costs.

As detailed on the Balance Sheet, at the end of the year, our reserves (total unrestricted funds) stand at £132,310 (29.2.2020). The remainder of our funds (£64,109) are restricted and are committed to ongoing projects. Any negative balances are live projects with funding paid in arrears, and due in the next financial year.

Of these unrestricted reserves the trustees have designated a further  $\pounds 11,050$  as part of their ongoing strategy to develop and grow the charity so that we are better able to meet our aim of Cumbria transitioning to zero carbon society. This provides us with a comfortable buffer above our minimum Reserves target for unexpected situations or for further investment (see Reserves Policy).

### Risk management

The Board of Trustees has assessed the major risks to which CAfS is exposed and systems and procedures have been put in place to manage those risks. This include the risks to ongoing funding - mitigated by a comprehensive funding plan and pipeline; and the capacity of CAfS to deliver what is required to meet a zero carbon Cumbria and the pressing climate emergency. The latter is being mitigated by continuing to designate funds from our reserves to fund a new role of 'Zero Carbon Development Manager' to drive forward the vision of a zero Carbo Cumbria through the development of strategic networks and partnerships and new multi-partner funding bids.

### Investment policy

The majority of the charity's funds are to be spent in the short term and are held in a current account with Unity Trust. If cashflow is sufficient, additional funds are held in a 30-day access savings account to maxmise income, and longer-term investments such as share purchases are made. All investments are considered in line with expected demands on funds, assessment of any potential associated risks, and our ethical approach to investment.

### Reserves policy

The Trustees examine the charity's requirement for reserves during the annual budget setting process. This is to ensure that the risks associated with the Charity's external operating environment; its' income streams; its' planned activities and organisational commitments are all considered when determining the amount that should be set aside. The Trustees have established a 'irreducible reserves' policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets held by the Charity are sufficient to i) meet all liabilities of the Charity in the event that it winds up its activities; ii) include a general reserve of £5k for unforeseen items.

At the start of 19/20, our irreducible reserves were set at £65,000. In addition, £30,250 of the charities' reserves were invested in shares with Community Energy Cumbria and Burneside Community Energy, and further £34,000 of reserves had been designated at the end of 18/19 for development funding. Total £129,250. The remainder (£5,024) of the unrestricted funds carried forward were required as a buffer to help cashflow grant funding that is paid in arrears.

During the 20/21 budget setting process, the Trustees set the irreducible reserves figure to £30,784, plus a £28,000 buffer for the deficit in our cash from grants in arrears. They also designated a new development fund of £11,050 and agreed that £38,826 of funds would be available to cover the deficit budget for 20/21. This brings the total reserves target to £108,660. At the start of 20/21, our total unrestricted funds were more than this combined figure, standing at £132,310. Of this, £78,201 is held as cash in a 30-day access account with Cumberland Building Society and our share investments stand at £28,750 to attract interest.

## FINANCIAL REVIEW

### Future plans

20/21 was planned to be a period of continued growth and impact for the charity, buoyed by the sustained interest in climate emergency in the County. We are in the process of applying for significant (£2.5 million) funding to deliver the objectives of the 70 organisation strong Zero Carbon Cumbria Partnership, which has been developed and coordinated by CAfS during 2019/20. However, Covid-19 is starting to impact the UK, and poses a significant risk to the organisation and the delivery of its aims and vision. We do not yet fully understand how the threats posed by coronavirus will impact on our income streams and future funding, but we are committed to doing our utmost to protect the health of our staff and our organisation so that we can quickly bounce back after what we hope is a short period of 'hibernation'.

### Funders and clients

In 2019-20 CAfS secured £361,340 for its activities from a wide range of sources. These include charitable trusts and foundations, national and local grant givers, local government and associated agencies, businesses and of course, individuals who may have taken up our services or attended one of our events and training. We also secured funding through third parties by developing several projects in partnership with others. All our activities are aligned to our charitable purposes, irrespective of funding source. # STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### Structure, Governance, Management And Administrative Details.

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

### Constitution

Cumbria Action for Sustainability (CAfS) is a registered charity and company limited by guarantee, having no share capital. It was incorporated on 4th February 2008 and registered with the Charity Commission on 11th March 2008. CAfS' Memorandum and Articles of Association are the primary governing documents of the charity.

### Structure

The charity operates with a Board of Directors, who are also Trustees for the purposes of charitable law. The Board meet quarterly as a minimum. Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association the Board of Directors 'step down' en masse at each AGM though they can then be re-elected individually, or en masse, as voted by the charity's members. The Board seeks to ensure that the diversity of Cumbria, both in people and geography, as well as a range of technical skills are represented on the committee. Trustees are provided with an induction covering the work of the charity as well as training in governance skills. They are encouraged to meet with staff and other Trustees, and a sum of monies is set aside each year so that they can attend seminars, training and events to assist them in their role. The Chair, Secretary and Treasurer roles are elected by the Board after the AGM.

CAfS' constitution allows for a Board of up to 10 persons. In 19/20 the Board had seven members and their biographies can be found at www.cafs.org.uk/about-cafs/cafs-trustees . New members are recruited through a structured process based on the skills needed. All members of the Board give their time voluntarily and receive no benefit from their charity for their work as a Trustee. Any expenses reclaimed from the charity are set out in the accounts.

The Trustees have overall responsibility for financial management, organisational strategy and compliance with the charitable purposes of the organisation. Financial management and general management responsibilities are devolved within our policies and procedure frameworks to the Chief Executive and senior members of staff. At end February 2020 the charity had 12 staff (7 FTE) with responsibility for specific projects and activities delegated across the staff team. The Chief Executive reports to the Trustees at each quarterly meeting, along with relevant staff members if required.

Pay policy& life work balance

All staff at CAfS are paid according to a graded salary scale which reflects the differences in responsibility, skills and capabilities required in various roles. The scale has been established in line with market rates for similar roles in similar organisations. The ratio between the salaries of the highest and lowest paid members of staff is less than 2:1. All of the staff in the organisation are part time and, whilst this has partly evolved due to funding availability, there is a strong belief in the benefits of this improved work life balance to employee welfare.

All staff are enrolled in the company's personal pension scheme (6% employer contribution) which has also been adopted as our auto enrolment scheme since November 2016.

As the organisation continues to expand, the Trustees plan to review the renumeration policies and practices and formalise the part time working principles. A sum has been designated from our reserves to do this during 2020-21.

# **STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT** TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES IN RELATION TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The trustees (who are also directors of Cumbria Action for Sustainability for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the trustees have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). Under company law the trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the net movement in funds for the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;

- state whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and

- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charitable company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

## 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are included at market value.

### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

### Allocation and apportionment of costs

### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Fixtures and fittings - 25% on reducing balance

### Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
