Structure, Governance and Management

Governing Document

The Gifted is the marketing name of the registered charity The Gifted Organisation Limited, which is governed by its memorandum and articles of association dated 29th January 2013. The charity is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The liability of each member in the event of winding-up is limited to £10. It was registered as a charity on 21st March 2013.

Trustees and Management

The charity's articles of association require the appointment of not less than three trustees. New trustees are appointed for a term of three years by invitation of existing trustees. This is subject to election by existing trustees at a board meeting.

There are currently four trustees; Glenn Stewart, Daniel Gordon, Chetna Murphy and Mark Seguna.

The trustees delegate many day-to-day operational matters including finance, business development, staffing, project management and administration to the Manager and Secretary. However, all major decisions are referred to the trustees by the Manager and Secretary. The Manager and Secretary reports to the board on The Gifted's activities, achievements, financial position and plans at regular board meetings.

Trustee, recruitment, induction and training

Those with relevant skills, experience and expertise are eligible to become trustees, subject to references and approval by the board. Potential trustees are invited to express their interest to the Manager and Secretary who will invite them to meet the board before a decision of recruitment and appointment to the board is made. This is subject to election by existing trustees at a board meeting and subject to election by charity members at the subsequent annual general meeting.

All new trustees are provided with a trustee induction pack to assist them with the role they are to provide.

Vision, Mission and Values

The Gifted's vision is for children, young people and families to lead healthy, happy lives.

Our Mission

Using discovery based interactive workshops and creative projects The Gifted educates and empowers children and young people about health, lifestyle and wellbeing issues so that they are able to take ownership of their health and the choices that they make. These activities engage young people by harnessing their enthusiasm and delivering them real outcomes whilst equipping them with new skills and knowledge.

Our Values

Education – providing access for all children, young people and their families to education about a range of issues

Aspirations – helping to raise aspirations through the projects delivered, encouraging them to fulfil their potential and believe in themselves.

Communication – enabling unheard voices to be heard

Diversity – enabling children and young people to fulfil their potential regardless of their backgrounds, free from prejudice and harm

Our Aims

The Gifted works with children, young people and their families, with focus on those who are disadvantaged and/or vulnerable and those who have been affected by disadvantage to educate and empower them about health and wellbeing.

The Gifted is able to work with participants to improve their resilience, confidence and skills, and to raise aspirations.

The Gifted has three core areas of focus: Improving Skills, Providing Accessible Education on Health Issues; and Raising Aspirations.

1. Improving Skills

- Building participants transferable skills such as project planning, thinking creatively, applying information, communication and team working that can be used in education and employment
- Give participants the opportunity to work towards recognised accreditations
- Provide participants with an experiential learning experience; to enable learning through doing

2. Providing Accessible Education

- Create peer education tools and resources that are relevant and informative for the hardest to reach groups
- Provide participants with positive activities and valuable education, empowering them with knowledge about lifestyle issues to allow positive choices
- Support participant's mental wellbeing, and help to prevent mental ill health
- Provide a safe, confidential and non-judgmental place for participants to express themselves, discuss issues, and have their questions answered

- 3. Raising Aspirations
 - Encourage participants to be more ambitious, determined and conscientious members of their community by involving them in meaningful activities that improves their confidence and skills
 - Enable participants to have their voices and opinions heard, and provide support to help them to address difficulties and overcome barriers

The trustees are satisfied that the company has achieved its objectives in the year under review.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Over the past 12 months The Gifted has worked with 351 children and young people across its programmes. We provided a variety of programmes including; confidence building courses, 1-2-1 mentoring, community drop-ins, media and creative projects, training for young women to train as peer educators and supporting young people with producing podcasts or creating events for other young people. We deliver these unique programmes in community venues, schools, colleges, alternative education settings and anywhere else that needs us! We provide an outreach service that meets young people where they are most comfortable.

62% of the young people we work with have low educational attainment, 38% were not in education, training or employment, 28% had a mental health issue, 27% were known to be involved in substance misuse, 13% had been excluded from school.

The Gifted measures its impact by tracking the number of children and young people that gain an accredited award, take part in/complete our programmes and by using 'The Gifted Star' - a guided self-assessment tool that tracks impact and measures the progress of young people. They report on the impact the project has had on eight key aspects of their lives which include harm, health, relationships, coping with problems, their future, support, engaging, skills and experiences.

Participants are asked for qualitative feedback either through interviews, conversations or forms to understand how the project has impacted them. We stay in contact with young people after they have completed programmes and they are offered the opportunity to volunteer or take part in work experience with us. Last year, after engaging with us 18 young people volunteered their time to support The Gifted, 14 young people gained employment. 94% of young people who took part in our programmes learnt a new a skill and 88% felt more confident as a result of taking part. A large charity must provide an explanation when material investments are held, details of investment performance achieved against objectives set ...

This year, through the Butterfly programme we have worked with 254 young women aged 11-25 who have personal and social complex needs. The Butterfly enables them to learn new skills, grow in confidence and raise their aspirations to support them in overcoming barriers and participate fully in society paving the way for them to become resilient, healthy and capable adults.

Our beneficiaries had experienced disadvantage in terms of poverty, poor health, crime, housing, employment and/or education, as a result they have low aspirations and are likely to have low educational attainment. They lacked the necessary self-esteem, self-confidence, communication skills and drive to get the most out of statutory education and conventional vocational training. Many were emotionally damaged having experienced domestic abuse; they were not living with family or had offended. 46% had 2 or more vulnerability factors, 21% had 4 or and 13% had 6 or more, this shows that the Butterfly was reaching girls and young women with very chaotic and complex lives.

Of the young women we worked with 68% had low educational attainment, 32% had a mental health issue, 28% were young offenders, 28% known to be involved in substance misuse, 16% are in care or are leaving care, 11% had experienced domestic abuse and 8% have been excluded from school.

"I hated talking in front of people I didn't feel confident and I thought people would laugh at me but by working with mentor and then going to the group sessions I built up the confidence to present my work to the group, I'm going to train as a peer educator next because I really want to help other girls"

"The Butterfly has made me realise that I'm not to blame for the things that I did or happened in the past, I may not get my son back and that breaks my heart but I can only change my future. I am in charge of my destiny and the choices I make from now."

The outcomes of the project were, 83% reported feeling more confident, 72% reported improved resilience, 82% felt more excited about their futures, 78% felt that they have a plan for their life 76% said they were less likely to engage in risky behaviour and 69% felt a sense of belonging/community.

Building on the success of the Butterfly we were awarded funding from the Heritage Lottery to run a 1-year project called 'Clothmakers Wings' to engage vulnerable and disadvantaged girls the provision of workshops, activities and learning to enable girls to learn about the history of textile production in Hertfordshire. In doing so, we unveiled the rich history that existed in the early and late18th century, across Hertfordshire, which has been almost forgotten in historical terms, whilst giving a voice to the many girls and women who were pivotal in these industries and skills at the time.

35 girls have participated on the project, learning skills in embroidery, silk work, felt making, lace cutting, crochet, straw plaiting and smock dress design and making over 24 weeks out of hours and 16 weeks during curriculum time. 4 girls acquired key emotional and communication skills, who were referred onto the project due to additional needs, including ASD and ADHD, completing 50 hours of participation. 11 girls completed the Arts Award Explore Accreditation, 93% of girls recorded a significant difference to their social, personal and wider communication skills and ability to articulate their needs and female identity in a more positive way and 89% of girls stated an 'increased sense of self and the role of women in our society as a result of the project.'

A total of 80 hours of contact time was delivered, in partnership with 2 lead artists, the Lowewood and Epping Forest District Museums and 3 external textiles groups and artists and 14 volunteers. The work will culminated in a 4-month exhibition in May 2019 and ran until August 30th 2019 at the Lowewood Museum and a learning resource to be distributed and shared county wide, with primary and secondary schools.

At an organizational level The Gifted has developed and secured 2 new major partnerships and support from 8 external organisations with whom it has not previously worked. Staff and volunteers acquired new professional development and networks as a result of the project, widening our staffs' skills sets and pool of professional leaders. The project has seeded a definite interest in the textile history of the county and the outcomes it can achieve for young women, enabling us to develop 3 new funding applications for its wider continuation and development.

Future Plans

The Gifted will focus on our core objective 'supporting children and young people to create bright futures for themselves' through the delivery of our programmes.

Funded work

The Gifted will continue to make applications to trusts and foundations and grant funders.

Partnership work

In the forthcoming year The Gifted will focus on developing partnerships with schools and other social enterprises.

Notes to the Accounts

for the year ended 31 March 2020

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Change in basis of accounting or to previous accounts

There has been no change to the accounting policies (valuation rules and method of accounting) since last year and no changes have been made to accounts for previous years.

Fund accounting	
Unrestricted funds	These are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objects of the charity.
Designated funds	These are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes.

Restricted funds	These are available for use subject to restrictions imposed by the donor or through terms of an appeal.
Income	
Recognition of income	Income is included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the charity becomes entitled to, and virtually certain to receive, the income and the amount of the income can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Donations and legacies	Voluntary income received by way of grants, donations and gifts is included in the the SoFA when receivable and only when the Charity has unconditional entitlement to the income.
Tax reclaims on donations and gifts	Income from tax reclaims is included in the SoFA at the same time as the gift/donation to which it relates.
Donated services and facilities	These are only included in income (with an equivalent amount in expenditure) where the benefit to the Charity is reasonably quantifiable, measurable and material.
Volunteer help	The value of any volunteer help received is not included in the accounts.

Recognition of Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis. Expenditure includes any VAT expenditure which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to

which it relates.

Expenditure on These comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income, fundraising

Expenditure on These comprise the costs incurred by the Charity in the delivery of its activities charitable activities and services in the furtherance of its objects, including the making of grants and

governance costs.

Grants payable All grant expenditure is accounted for on an actual paid basis plus an accrual for

grants that have been approved by the trustees at the end of the year but not yet

paid.

Governance costs
These include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and

statutory requirements of the Charity, including any audit/independent examination fees, costs linked to the strategic management of the Charity,

together with a share of other administration costs.

Other expenditure These are support costs not allocated to a particular activity.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Trade and other debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and on hand, demand deposits with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less and bank overdrafts. In the statement of financial position, bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings or current liabilities. In the Statement of Cash Flows, cash and cash equivalents are shown net of bank overdrafts that are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the company's cash management.

Trade and other creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

The company is a private company limited by guarantee and consequently does not have share capital.
