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Chair's Report

for the year ended 31 March 2020

As I mentioned in last year's report, we continued our work with Thirsk Community Care and I'm pleased to say that the merger was concluded in February and we are now one organisation called Community Works. Both sets of staff and Trustees worked extremely hard to make sure we completed a robust due diligence process in which we received great support, both expertise and resources from North Yorkshire County Council's Stronger Communities Team:

Community Works will be managed by a board of 12 active and committed trustees who live or work locally. They bring a wide range of professional and management experience, local intelligence and knowledge of its vulnerable users. Much of the business is managed by the sub-groups. The Board directly line manages and accepts reports from the Charity's CEO, who in turn line manages the management team staff.

Our Enterprises continue to go from strength to strength. The Community Reuse store has become one of the most popular shops in town and the feedback we get from customers is very positive. Residents are really pleased that we are able to make use of their unwanted furniture and that profits from sales are supporting some of our essential but unfunded services. We have opened a second shop this year; our Pop Up sliop provides new or small businesses with a market place presence as they can hire a table for a day to sell their goods. Our Enterprises are so popular that we have taken on a lease on a warehouse to provide us with more space.

The staff working on our Support and Learning programmes have delivered excellent work this year with some amazing results. Our Access Towards Inclusion (ATI) programme which provides support for those furthest away from employment has been extended for a further three years. Our Improving Lives programme provides support and training to young people and adults who want help to address the barriers in their lives which are preventing them reaching their full potential.

Our social activities are as popular as always and this year we have added to summer activities, youth clubs and Time for Time with several new projects including Men in Sheds and Four Quarters; a support group for females.

Hopefully this provides a flavour of our amazing work support the communities of Thirsk and I would like to say a massive thank you to the staff team and Abigail for all their hard work and support in what was a challenging year. Bring two organisations together is never easy!

Finally, I would like to say a huge thank you to all our supports, trustees and members without who Community Works would not be the exceptional organisation it is today.

Report of the trustees for the year ended 31 March 2020

The trustees present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2020. The trustees who served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 2.

Structure, governance and management

Governing document

The organisation during the year converted to a charitable incorporated organisation (CIO) from a charitable company limited by guarantee on 30 September 2019. The charity was registered at the Charities Commission on 14 March 2003.

The CIO was established under a constitution dated 27 November 2019.

Appointment of trustees

Under the constitution, a trustee must be appointed by the charity's members. Also the constitution requires at the annual general meetings one third of the trustees shall retire by rotation.

Trustee induction and training

Most trustees are already familiar with the practical work of the charity. New trustees are invited to meet with the chair in order to familiarise themselves with the charity, in areas such as:

- The obligation of the board of trustees
- The main documents which set out the operational framework for the charity
- Resourcing and financial position
- Future plans and objectives.

Trustees are encouraged to attend external training events where these will facilitate the undertaking of their role.

Organisation

The charity's constitution states that there can be a minimum of 3 trustees and a maximum of 12 trustees.

Sub groups of the board of trustees cover specific issues such as human resources, events and health and safety.

Volunteers:

The charity values the help and support the volunteers provide. Volunteers are encouraged to participate in internal and external training programmes.

Risk review

The trustees have conducted a review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed, particularly those related to the operations and finances of the charity. They are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Report of the trustees for the year ended 31 March 2020

Objectives and activities

Our Mission

We will facilitate partnerships to support people in North Yorkshire, particularly from Thirsk to connect with and contribute to their community by providing opportunities for them to improve their economic, health and social wellbeing. In particular, our work will help make the following differences:

Increase Social Inclusion Increase Community Resilience Improve Well-being Increase Economic Prosperity

The trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity's Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities. In particular the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

Achievements and performance

The achievements and performance of the charity are explained in detail in the chair's report on page 1.

Financial review

The charity depends almost entirely on grants and donations for its incoming resources. Excluding the gifts in kind mentioned below, these resources have increased during the year by £95,693. Resources expended during the year were £448,806. The charity has £501,850 of funds at the year end.

During the year the Charity amalgamated with Thirsk Community Care ClO whose assets and funds transferred amounted to £257,234 while last year it amalgamated with Thirsk 8 Park Limited whose assets and funds transferred amounted to £113,254.

Investment powers and policy

The trustees have the power to invest in such assets as they see fit.

Reserves policy

The trustees have established a policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets are held as general funds at such a level that there are free reserves to provide financial flexibility over the next financial period.

New funding streams are continually being identified for this purpose.

Statement of trustees' responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the charity for that year. In preparing these financial statements the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;

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- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is mappropriate to presume that the charity will
 continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with responsible accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with the Charities Act 2011 the Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Notes to financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2020

1. Accounting policies

The charity is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (Company number CE020578) having solely charitable objectives, and registered as a charity (number 1096518). The registered office is Church Hall, St James Green, Thirsk, North Yorkshire, YO71AQ.

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year and the preceding year.

1.1. Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) and the Charities Act 2011.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

1.2. Income

All income is included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income, any performance related conditions attached have been met or are fully within the control of the charity, the income is considered probable and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- Donations and legacy income is received by way of donations, legacies, grants and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant. Gifts in kind are recorded at fair value of the items.
- Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity, being the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.
- Grants, including grants for the purchase of fixed assets, are recognised in full in the statement of financial activities in the year in which they are receivable.
- Investment income is included when receivable.

1.3. Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity and include project management:

1.4. Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Leasehold property improvements - Straight line over the life of the lease

Fixtures, fittings and equipment - 33% straight line
Office equipment - 33% straight line
Motor vehicles - 25% reducing balance
Skate Park - 5% straight line
