The objective of Middlesbrough Foodbank is the prevention or relief of poverty to people in need in Middlesbrough and the surrounding areas.

Middlesbrough Foodbank provides three days of nutritionally balanced emergency food to people in crisis. Vouchers are issued via frontline professionals, including doctors, health visitors, social workers, Citizens Advice Bureau staff, welfare officers, the police and probation officers. Vouchers can then be exchanged for food at various distribution centres across Middlesbrough.

The trustees have regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit. In particular, we are seeking to ensure that our vouchers are available via a suitable range of organisations and that we provide a network of food distribution centres across Middlesbrough so that our services are accessible to the people in need.

Middlesbrough Foodbank relies on the work done by volunteers who help at the warehouse, at distribution points, and during special supermarket collection days. These volunteers are generally members of a variety of churches across Middlesbrough, and we are grateful for the support of the volunteers and our partner churches.

Middlesbrough Foodbank complies with the code of practice for ethical fundraising issued by the Fundraising Regulator. We do not use the services of professional fundraisers.

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Middlesbrough Foodbank was set up in 2012, and became a registered charity on 17th April 2013. In the year from April 2019 to March 2020, we fed 8611 people, including 5263 adults and 3348 children, an increase of over 50% compared to the previous year. Demand has increased even more rapidly since March 2020. We have active voucher holders in around 100 organisations. Around a fifth of the vouchers were issued by Citizens Advice. Other main issuers were MIND, Breckon Hill community centre, Middlesbrough Probation Service, Middlesbrough Council, Thirteen, Salvation Army and My Sister's Place.

All food given out is donated by local people or purchased using monetary donations. We operate food collection points at churches, companies and supermarkets across the local area. We have also taken part in specific collection days at local supermarkets. In the year from April 2018 to March 2019, 73 tonnes of food were distributed (an increase from 54 tonnes the previous year). We are finding that we increasingly need to purchase extra food supplies, especially when food donation points have had to be closed.

We have built up a network of food distribution centres across the town; some are currently closed due to the Coronavirus pandemic, but we ensure we have a centre open on each weekday:

- St Barnabas Church, Linthorpe (Mondays)
- Grove Hill Methodist Church (Tuesdays)
- Coulby Newham Baptist Church (Wednesdays)
- Middlesbrough Community Church, Gresham (Thursdays)
- Berwick Hills Baptist Church (Thursdays, currently closed)
- Holy Trinity Church, North Ormesby (Fridays)
- Trinity Methodist Church, Whinney Banks (Fridays, currently closed)

The centre at St Timothy's Church, Hemlington had to close due to problems with the building, but we hope to find a new location in this part of town.

We employ Soroush Sadeghzadeh for 3 days per week as our project manager. Soroush is part of the leadership at Jubilee church and has previously worked with Hope Foundation and Open Doors. Soroush coordinates food collections and liaises with distribution centres and voucher holders. From June 2019 we have also employed Lee-Anne Southon for 16 hours per week as a depot & warehouse coordinator, using a grant from Asda. A team of over a hundred volunteers work at the warehouse and distribution centres, as well as helping out at food collections. We are very grateful for all they have done.

Large-scale food collections have taken place at Middlesbrough Football Club on match days. Another fund-raising event was held at the St Cuthbert's Centre, Marton, in October. Lee-Anne has led Increased engagement with supporters via social media.

In the next year, a key objective will be to respond to the effects of the Coronavirus pandemic. This has brought a huge increase in demand, but also restricts how we can operate. We also intend to move to more use of e-vouchers, where agencies register a referral online that can then be accessed directly by the distribution centre, reducing the need to handle paper vouchers and the amount of administration needed. We will also be employing a part time volunteer coordinator to oversee the recruitment, training and support of volunteers working in the distribution centres and the depot.

We aim to manage our finances so that we have between 3 and 6 months of reserves in order to meet our financial obligations – primarily the costs of employing a project manager, running a van, and rental of our warehouse space.

Middlesbrough Foodbank has been supported financially by donations from individuals, churches and companies across the region, and by a number of grant-making organisations. Middlesbrough Council donated £3000 of 'Covid 19 assistance'. Thirty-five individuals, three churches and one company make regular donations by standing order, totalling £8,689. Many other people and organisations have made one-off donations, and £10,942 was donated via our web page. The fundraising event with Seasonal Singers raised £580, and collections at Middlesbrough Football Club raised £2086. Andrew Sutton and Mike McCann raised £2064 (plus Gift Aid) in sponsorship by taking part in the Great North Run (this comprises £1841 received online via Stewardship and £223 in cash sponsorship). Asda contributed £7335 to help us employ our depot & warehouse coordinator. We are grateful to all of our donors for their support.
