#### OLDHAM INTERFAITH FORUM TRUSTEES ANNUAL REPORT

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST MARCH 2020

The trustees present their annual report and the unaudited financial statements of the charity for the year to 31 March 2020.

#### **Objects**

The Forum operated informally within the Oldham Metropolitan Borough for a number of years before becoming a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) with a constitution dated 7th January 2014 and registration with the Charity Commission on 18th September 2014. Its objects are:

"the promotion of religious harmony for the public benefit by:

- (a) educating the public in different religious beliefs including an awareness of their distinctive features and their common ground to promote good relations between persons of different faiths;
- (b) promoting knowledge and mutual understanding and respect of the beliefs and practices of different religious faiths".

#### **Structure**

Membership is open to each localised faith community in Oldham, whose representatives are entitled to attend general meetings of the Forum. Operational management is undertaken by a Steering Group, consisting of the Trustees and a small number of other members. The work of the Forum is carried out by the two members of staff with the assistance of volunteers.

#### **Funding and Reserves Policy**

The Forum has always depended largely on grant funding, provided (up to 31<sup>st</sup> March 2018) equally by Oldham MBC and the Stoller Charitable Trust. Reserves vary according to the timing of grant receipts, but the aim is to have reserves at least equal to three months' expenditure.

#### **Activities**

Covid-19 began to have a major impact on the country, and on us as a charity, only during the final quarter of the year being reported. It, therefore, had little impact on our ability to continue to achieve the targets set for us. We had been set a target of delivering workshops on interfaith matters to 1260 pupils; we delivered them to 2,701 pupils. We also facilitated visits to places of worship for 1,602 pupils when the target set for the year was 240. We provided 4 very successful "Any Questions on faith" events, one in Oldham Sixth Form College for over 150 pupils.

Our largest event of the year continues to be the Festival of Light. Last December's event was again a great success, with over 400 people attending.

We've held three more discussion events this year, one organised by 'Women Growing together' taking the theme of "Inspirational women. Another was on the 'Dignity of life' and its importance to the different faith communities. The final one was on 'Music in faith'. These were all very effective in developing understanding between different faith communities.

During the year, the world was rocked by terrorist incidents in Sri Lanka, New Zealand and in the US. The Forum organised, with the Local Authority, an event to show that people of the different faiths of the Borough stood together in peace and committed themselves to continue to work for that peace. Debbie Abrahams represented the local MP's and councillors from each of the local political parties spoke at the event, along with representatives of the different faith communities.

We continue to receive funding from the Lottery (Reaching Communities Fund), which requires us, in addition to our usual work, to form meaningful partnerships between places of worship. Six of these partnerships were formed before the beginning of lockdown in March and three more were in the pipeline. Clearly, lockdown has made it extremely difficult to achieve this target.

The work we'd begun in the previous year around the development of the Sex and Relationships Education policy continued and the Forum's involvement was very much appreciated by the Local Authority.

The Covid-19 Lock-down started on the 21st of March 2020, and the Forum worked closely, with the Council to get the appropriate messages out to the different faith communities and to gain their cooperation. There were many attempts made by mischief-makers, at this time, to suggests falsely that people were attending mosques or churches in great numbers. We were able to work with the Council quickly to dispel these myths and to avoid any significant rise in tension.

All in all, we've managed another very successful year and adapted ourselves to address the challenges brought on by Covid-19.
