Para 1.20	Early in 2019, ALAG's trustees approved plans for an autism conference to celebrate ALAG's fifth year as an independent charity. Scheduled to take place in October 2019, the aim of the conference was to improve attendees understanding of what it feels like to be autistic, how autistic people may present, issues that may arise in their lives and how to move towards successfully overcoming them. It was agreed to invite professionals as well as autistic people, local councillors and local businesses to the conference to broaden our reach and ensure the benefits could be spread across society as a whole. The Conference took place on Thursday 17 October 2019 and was entitled 'Overcoming Barriers: Neurodiversity in Autism'. Over 70 people attended and the event was extremely well received. ALAG brought together as speakers both autistic people and professionals working in clinical or research settings to share their insights on different facets of the condition and life with it. These are just a few of the feedback comments from the day highlighting the overall positive impression: 'Thank you for the wonderful event yesterday! I had such a lovely day, we met some really interesting and inspiring people.' 'A very big thank you to you and all your colleagues for your very hard work in setting up the conference yesterday. I found the papers very relevant to my experience as a person with Asperger Syndrome.' 'It was truly refreshing and I really learnt something new.'.

	Throughout 2019 ALAG's Autism Hub - a user led initiative by and for adults with High- Functioning Autism and Asperger's syndrome – continued to go from strength to strength as another main achievement. The Autism Hub provides specialist counselling, information, support, sign-posting and host events delivered through peer support & mentoring. The Hub is a central point of access to autism services in Islington and Camden linking in and connecting with other agencies in the community to make them more autism aware & accessible. In September 2019, the Autism Hub partnered with the Islington & Camden Diagnostic Service to form the Partners for Health Project, funded be the London Catalyst, offering direct support to people who are newly diagnosed with autism.
