Message from Lorna McGinty, the Chair of Chol

It is with great pride that I introduce Chol's annual report 2019 - 2020. This year we have created art with communities locally, nationally and internationally; continuing to grow as an organisation that is both deeply rooted in the communities in which we work, and that plays an increasingly important and influential role in our broader sector. Local priorities combine with innovative, world-class practice to make Chol what it is.

In a year in which we have seen much fracture across the United Kingdom and beyond, the team at Chol have worked tirelessly to counter that narrative by bringing people together to find commonality and create shared experiences that enhance community life. On behalf of my fellow trustees, I want to express my deep gratitude to, and admiration for our team of staff. If ever there was evidence that Chol truly is a place "where everything is possible", the depth and breadth of work the team of five extraordinarily dedicated staff has delivered across this year must be it.

I would also like to take a moment to thank Susan Burns for all she has brought to Chol across the 20 years she has dedicated to the organisation. As she retires, we will proudly carry her legacy forward and continue to build on the values-rich and strong foundation Susan has so carefully built.

Artistic Programme Highlights

Chol, whose strapline is "where everything is possible" brings live story-making to people in their everyday local communities. Chol's work is inspired by the world around us, comprising real and imagined stories from local people, using their experiences and ideas to drive our programme rooted in the communities we work in.

This year, we created work with people that was inspiring, entertaining, provocative and authentic for participants and audiences. We engaged with those who have direct, personal experience of social problems in Britain through our theatre projects and amplified voices of those who have not found a platform previously. Our work reached over 3000 people through workshops, performances and residencies.

Our cultural learning work continued with a series of Imaginary Communities residencies in schools and colleges as part of our long-term programme funded by Paul Hamlyn. Imaginary Communities is our unique dramatic approach to story-making, whereby children build new worlds together. Vicky Storey delivered a Drama Education module to BA students at Manchester university to share our approaches.

We had an emphasis on co-creating new pieces of work with young people for public performance. We developed a series of Story Clubs and toured a professional piece of theatre 'The Internet Genie' as part of 'Click' to libraries, schools and community venues, supported by West Yorkshire Police and the National Lottery Community Fund. The project was directed by Jessica Woodhead and Olivia Race and grew from a partnership with the Asian Mums' Network and focused on internet safety.

Following a successful bid to Arts Council England, we began a new large-scale youth arts project in Sheffield 'Tall Shadows' which combines our commitment to children and families in local communities with a programme of creative youth leadership. Directed by Lauren Ash, Tall Shadows will support eight young producers interns aged 16-21 to create and present a series of Story Clubs for other children and young people in the city.

In Huddersfield and Bradford, Jessica worked with Nuzhat Ali, Emma Williams, Mandeep Samra and Olivia Race to create short plays on community themes including Shaadi Masala at Bradford Literature Festival. We

began a new relationship with Woven Festival in Kirklees creating young ambassadors for textiles and worked with Ignite to research and create a young people's performance in Colne Valley Museum called 'Run of the Mill'. The YARN company was a diverse group of young people from Kirklees who worked with us on a number of projects.

Following a research trip to New York City in May 2019, the team began a transatlantic video project with Educational Video Centre. In 'Our Story' young people in Sheffield College and in Pathways College, Brooklyn worked together and shared live and recorded performances and documentaries in both cities.

We completed our 'Equal Players' project with the creation of resources for teachers and families and began a new relationship with Woven Festival in Kirklees and Ignite Yorkshire. We continued to develop our relationship with Kirklees libraries delivering a project around empathy and supporting Shakespeare Week. In a busy year for Vicky Storey she was appointed to the national Teacher Development Fund Advisory Group at Paul Hamlyn Foundation and also completed her PhD.

In March, the Covid-19 emergency began to affect the delivery of our work and we had to stall programmes in mid-March, just after a fantastic launch event of Tall Shadows at the Crucible.

Places and Spaces

This was a fantastic year for creative collaborations around place, particularly in Kirklees and Sheffield. We continue to contribute to the work of the Local Cultural Education Partnerships in Sheffield and Kirklees, as well as developing new relationships through Barnsley's LCEP, Fusion. In Kirklees, we worked in partnership with the library service and with the council's Creative Economy team. We were delighted to join forces with The Children's Art School, Woven Festival and Evoke to open Maker World, a brand-new making space for children and young people in Huddersfield Town Centre. This is based in an empty shop unit and will form a new Huddersfield base for Chol. This was made possible through support from local town councillors and officers. The Lawrence Batley Theatre continues to be our registered office in Huddersfield and we work closely with them. In Sheffield, we worked in a couple of co-working spaces and enjoyed new partnerships with the Montgomery Theatre and several libraries, Walkley in particular. The Covid-19 crisis has meant we had to end co-working there temporarily.

The Chol-Operative

In July 2019, the company artists and trustees attended an awayday which explored the company structure following the resignation of Susan Burns as CEO. The awayday was hosted by Walkley Library and facilitated by Chloe Osborne. The company decided to move to a new more democratic structure, which we call the Chol-Operative, bringing in equal pay at the national average wage and a shared accountability for company policy, artistic programme and administration. The charity structure remains and the new 'Chol-Operative will begin from April 2020.

Finance and Fundraising

It was a successful year for attracting funds to carry out our charitable work. The charity relies on project grants, fees, ticket sales, commissions and donations from individuals. We completed work on Equal Players and achieved a new project grant from Arts Council England Grants for the Arts (£49,000 over 18 months) and Paul Hamlyn Foundation (£60,000 over 12 months) to run the majority of our artistic programme. In addition, we raised 4 smaller grants from Local Giving's Magic Little Grants (£500); Safer Communities Fund (£5878); National Lottery Awards for All (£9775) and Kirklees Council (£3000). This was supplemented by income from individual donations of £2,699. In addition, we earned fees of just under £31,000 through workshop delivery, partnerships and consultancy. We transferred £6198 reserves to match fund our programme and to develop the ideas of The Chol-Operative. The company ended the year with unrestricted reserves of £19,405
