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TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

The trustees have pleasure in submitting the Report and Accounts for the year. In the previous year the charity prepared its accounts using the accruals basis however, this year, the charity has taken advantage of the option to prepare simpler receipts and payments accounts. The results for the previous year, which are the comparatives shown in these accounts, have been restated so that they are presented on the same basis. Information regarding the restatement is provided in the notes to the accounts (see note 5 'Reconciliation with previously reported funds').

Objects of the charity

During the year the charity changed its name from Christian Resource Centre Pentecostal Church to Beacon Church. The charity is a Trust and is governed by its Trust Deed. The objects of the charity, as set out in the governing document are:

- a) to advance the Christian faith
- b) to relieve sickness and financial hardship and to promote good health
- c) to advane education

Summary of the charity's main activities and achievements

To further the above objects, the charity's main activities were the running of a Christian church and a day nursery.

We are very grateful to God for all that has been accomplished this year. The main focus for this year has been the re-branding, repurposing, and launching of Beacon Church from what used to be the Christian Resource Centre Pentecostal Church.

Meetings were held throughout the year with leaders and volunteers for a time of vision sharing, praying and dreaming about the future of the Church. After much deliberation, input, feedback and prayer Beacon Church was launched.

Our vision: To be a beacon in this world.

Our mission: To reveal Jesus to all.

Everything from children's work to youth work; website to interior decor; leadership to values underwent transformation and change.

We are grateful that all of the things mentioned above have gone from strength to strength. All of it, of course, continues to change and evolve as we work out our mission to reveal Jesus to all and accomplish our vision to be a beacon in this world.

We had planned a 'launch Sunday' for 31st March 2020 but this was postponed indefinitely due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Due to the sudden nature of the pandemic and the lockdown restrictions that came with it, we had to quickly evolve and adapt to move all of our prayer services, youth work, children's work and Sunday services online. This has meant a fresh focus on media and production work for Beacon Church - we are pleased with the impact this has had on communities both locally and far-off.

The Trustees are monitoring income and expenditure and, if it becomes necessary, will take measures to mitigate the impact of COVID-19 on the charity's free reserves.

Summary of the charity's main activities and achievements continued

The lockdown also meant that we quickly established a ministry called 'Beacon Cares'. The goal of the team was to look after the vulnerable and elderly during the pandemic. We are grateful for all the volunteers who stepped up to serve during this important and crucial time.

In serving the wider community, we continue to give to various overseas and UK missions. Also, the work of Little Acorns Childcare continued to provide a wonderful resource to our community.

We look forward to 'Launch Sunday' soon and the opportunity to implement the vision and mission of Beacon Church.

Many of the charity's activities are undertaken by volunteers and the charity could not operate effectively without their efforts.

In planning the activities the Trustees have applied the guidance on public benefit issued by the Charity Commission.

Structure, Governance and Management

Responsibility for setting policy and for determining the parameters within which the charity should operate rests with the trustees who meet regularly to monitor the activities of the charity. Responsibility for the day to day operation of the charity has been delegated to a leadership team led by Pastor Sujith Alex. New trustees are recruited and appointed by the existing trustees, by a majority vote.

Financial review

During the year income fell by £16,019 to £225,098, and expenditure decreased by £20,643 to £232,412. As a result the deficit for this year is £7,315 (2019: £11,938). The cash held by the charity fell £7,315 to £39,831, which comprised unrestricted cash of £27,429 and restricted cash of £12,402.

Reserves policy

The trustees have determined that the charity should aim to hold a combined cash balance of no less than £35,000 in unrestricted funds and in the Childcare Centre fund so that the charity could continue its activities should income and / or expenditure vary adversely. At the year end, the charity combined cash balance held in these funds amounted to just over £27,000. Whilst this falls short of the target set, the trustees do not believe there is any immediate cause for concern nonetheless the trustees are seeking to increase amount of cash held in these funds.

Key risks and uncertainties

The charity is exposed to various risks - be they operational, financial or reputational. The trustees review the charity's activities regularly to identify significant risks and, where possible, they take appropriate measures to mitigate those risks.

Responsibilities of trustees under charity law

Charity law requires us as Trustees to prepare financial statements for each accounting year which record the receipts and payments of the charity for the year.

We are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable us to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011.

We also have a responsibility to safeguard the assets of the charity and to take reasonable steps to prevent fraud or any other irregularities.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

1 Accounting policies

The accounts have been prepared on a receipts and payments basis and comprise a statement that shows the charity's receipts and payments, a statement that summarises the charity's assets and liabilities and related notes. The accountancy profession have determined that only accounts prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards present a 'true and fair' view and, as these receipts and payments accounts have not (and cannot) be prepared in accordance with accounting standards, these accounts do not present (and are not intended to present) a 'true and fair' view of the charity's financial activities and state of affairs.

In the previous year the charity prepared its accounts using the accruals basis however this year, as the charity's gross income is less than £250,000, the charity has taken advantage of the option to prepare simpler receipts and payments accounts. The results for the previous year, which are the comparatives shown in these accounts, have been restated so that they are presented on the same basis. Information regarding the restatement is provided in note 5 'Reconciliation with previously reported funds'.

Unrestricted funds are funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity. Restricted funds are donations which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors; they include donations received from appeals for specific activities or projects.

The **Childcare Centr**e fund was created from fees, local authority fund and donations received to help meet the day to day running costs of the childcare centre.

The **Childcare Centre Development** fund was created from grants received from the National Lottery and the local council to help pay for improvements to the Childcare Centre.

The **Special Offering**s fund was created from donations received for a variety of purposes. This year it included donations for (a) gifts to visiting speakers (b) to help those in hardship (c) the re-branding of the church and (d) help meet expenditure on charity governance and finance.

As explained in note 1 'Accounting Policies', in the previous year the charity prepared its accounts using the accruals basis.
