# TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2020. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

The Charity is constituted under a Memorandum of Association and is a registered charity number 1058694.

### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

### Objectives and aims

The objects of the charity are the provision of a Youth Club and Community Centre in the Everton area of Liverpool, known locally as 'The Shewsy'. The Charity owns and maintains a purpose built and fully equipped club property, at which it provides a full programme of After School and Senior Club activities for the education and socialisation of children and young people.

Objectives for the year

The organisation's aims and objectives for 2019 - 20 have remained as follows:

#### To provide:

- Adult and peer support that is welcoming, understanding and encouraging;
- A safe, warm, clean, friendly, fun and stimulating environment;
- Information, guidance and opportunities to access training, learning, healthy lifestyles and work;
- An expectation of high standards of behaviour, respect and achievement and a challenge where these are ignored;
- Opportunities to experience and learn different activities, interests and skills;
- Opportunities to develop relationships across classes, cultures, races and generations;
- A platform for developing character through discussion and debate; and
- Opportunities to be part of working teams and to practice organisational and leadership skills.

In addition, we have continued our Early Intervention work due to extended funding from the Home Office. This has enabled us to provide additional support for those young people who are at the very highest risk of serious violent crime because of their family circumstances, drug use, school exclusion and dislocation from the mainstream. This is targeted, intensive work with small groups and is enabled by the "Early Intervention Youth Fund", funds from the Home Office under their Serious Violent Crime strategy.

We deliver these aims and objectives by producing an annual action plan and monitoring its' delivery at bi-monthly meetings of the Board of Management, receiving written reports from the Team Leader, the Warden and the Treasurer. Each report is examined and discussed and ideas and plans for improvement, where required, are put in place and monitored by the Board. In 2018 - 2019 we instituted a template data report into which is input monthly monitoring data such as attendance and petty cash as well as fire and safety compliance information.

In furtherance of these aims the Trustees have complied with the duty in the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's revised published guidance concerning the operation of Public Benefit requirement under that Act.

# TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### **Public benefit**

Shrewsbury House is a Youth Club in Everton, Liverpool, founded in 1903, and known locally as the Shewsy. The area we serve remains one of the most disadvantaged wards in the UK. This is despite great strides being made in the quality of housing and the development of local greenspace in the form of Everton Park. We are an open-access, full-time centre and run a full programme of activities each week of the year.

Our core business is working with children and young people. Through informal education, we aim to meet the social, recreational, emotional and spiritual needs of our young people. We do this through the relationships and self-confidence we build and the activity and learning programme we offer.

Our vision is to draw out the talent and potential of all our young people so that each one will discover a positive purpose and direction for their life. We believe in and seek to promote the values of service, honesty, forgiveness, kindness, generosity, humility, selflessness and care and consideration for others.

We are a community based organisation delivering informal education and we actively promote equality. We provide the voice and platform for the participation of young people in club, community and city and encourage the empowerment of young people that can lead to full citizenship, action and change. We aim to encourage a view of life that includes learning on all levels: mental, physical, emotional, social and spiritual.

We work closely with many primary and secondary schools and are also part of several youth work networks, including the local authority's Children's services, the Liverpool Council for Voluntary Service, the Merseyside Youth Association and the national Frontier Youth Trust. We are connected to and work in an increasingly close partnership with Shrewsbury School and share a site with St Peter's, a local church with whom we have a good, working relationship.

# TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

#### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

At the very end of the financial year, on Friday March 20th, the gathering Covid 19 storm arrived in the form of a Lockdown and our club building was closed until we were permitted to reopen on 27th July.

However prior to that, 2019 - 2020 has seen us:

- Focus a lot of effort into the start of our refurbishment of the building. Our plan has been to use some of our own resources in order to do the most urgent work and at the same time, seek the funds that can support further work as we make progress. All of this has had to be done without any threat to the normal running costs of the youth club.

By May 2019, we had agreed this way forward and were seeking contractors for the substantial roof replacement work that was required. By September we had contractors on site and by early February 2020 we had completed the first three phases of roof work. We had also made applications to several funds and were awaiting feedback. We had also been encouraged by the Government announcing a major fund for the rebuilding of Youth service infrastructure in its budget announcement of September 2019.

At the time of writing this has yet to be released but we are assured of that intention in due course. Our refurbishment plan is entirely dependent on securing additional resources and this we plan to do by applying for those funds over a period of time.

However, we have also had some most extraordinary help in the form of donated goods and labour secured by the enterprise and persistent hard lobbying work of Jon France, a retired local business man who has offered this effort free of charge. As a consequence, several additional pieces of refurbishment have indeed progressed. This has included two kitchen areas, 5 UPVC windows, decorating and carpet work and more.

- "Undergo several key changes in our staff team. Following Roy McGaw's retirement in September, bringing to an end 55 years of involvement with the club, we were able to appoint Lorraine Mangan to the full time post of Site Manager. Frank Kenny also retired just prior to Christmas. We offer both Roy and Frank our heartfelt thanks for their service. We were also able to appoint Nicola Coker to a full time youth work position with the funds from the Home Office. This has been invaluable and we are targeting the raising of additional funds to enable us to make this a permanent position. We have also been able to carefully expand the part time youth work team as well.
- Run our second annual Away Day for the whole staff and Management team. This was again invaluable and we resolved at this years' event that we must invest in a fund raiser for the organisation. We are trialling this as we speak.
- Enter into the Big Give fundraising enterprise for the first time. This initiative focusses fund raising via pledged funds, matched funding from charitable trusts and public giving compressed into a week just prior to Christmas each year. Our efforts in year one were worthy and raised a total of £13,000. However we know we can improve on that and have received excellent advice and guidance from Jonathon Crown as we have planned for 2020.
- Continue to lobby in order to tell our story of the influence we have on many young lives. This produces immense (though difficult to quantify) savings to the public purse. Without any doubt in our long experience, this includes savings from:

Those deterred from habitual drug use

Those retained in school

Those prevented from entering the Youth Justice and prison system

Those who avoid the very common experience of family breakdown and violence.

If any service is worthy of the badge of "Invest to Save" it is (or can be) the Youth Service and Shrewsbury House is proud to fly the flag for that service within one of the poorest neighbourhoods in the country.

- Continue with our "Case Studies" as a method of evidencing our work to those agencies and funders who may be able to support us. In times when serious knife and gun crime is still far too high, the case for retrieving and rebuilding an effective Youth Service must get a hearing. It is not just Policing that will make change.

# TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

- Repeat, again through the good auspices of the O.S club, a 3 month placement at the club for a school leaver from Shrewsbury School.

We have continued to deliver a full programme as follows:

- Providing our core after school and senior club activities on four afternoons and evenings each week.
- Delivering the programme of five, 3 day Social Studies visits from the Shrewsbury School sixth form pupils, aligning the subjects with the national curriculum. School pupils not only gain invaluable out of classroom education on core curriculum subjects but also stay at the club and engage in learning and joint activity programmes with club members. This past year has seen additional exchange visits take place between the school and the club and relations at a confident and excellent level.
- Maintaining and supporting a small team of volunteers and adding to their number.
- Running the usual programme of out of school Easter and Summer holiday activity.
- Running occasional residential weeks and weekends.
- Operating a membership of 200 children in our Junior Club and 303 young people in our Senior Club, averaging a daily attendances of about 40 in Junior clubs and 50 in Senior club..
- Linking effectively with all our 6 local schools
- Working in partnership with the Friends of Everton Park and West Everton Community Council.
- Organising and hosting a lunch club 3 times each year to profile and discuss local issues.
- Contributing to the local community newspaper 3 times a year.
- Continually seeking funding opportunities and submitting applications to grant- making trusts in order to secure funds to match our substantial voluntary giving for which we are most grateful. We have received some excellent support from friends and visitors over the course of the past year and it makes us all the more determined to do all we can to diversify our funding base, strengthen the breadth of the voluntary support we receive already and reduce our costs without compromising our vital services.

### TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

#### COVID 19

The Covid 19 pandemic and lockdown has seen Shrewsbury House close its building for the longest period in its 117 year history. We closed on 20th March and reopened (with some limits on numbers) on 27th July. This has not been easy for paid and voluntary staff and management, but it has been harder still for the families, children and young people across Everton and further afield who have come to rely on the services that we provide.

All but three of our staff have been furloughed for most of that period and we are grateful to Government for that support. The three remaining staff and some volunteers immediately set out to maintain contact with as many members and their families as possible. Between April and early July, this produced lots of excellent pieces of remote learning, coaching, support and interest and has been much appreciated by the young people and their families.

The Board of Management has kept up meetings via Zoom and have conducted 5 such meetings between April and September. In addition, a great deal of work has been delivered by Trustees in bilateral calls and individual efforts. This includes substantial fund raising efforts, remote support of the refurbishment work in the youth club premises, the production of an Impact report and the production of a refreshed business strategy and business plan.

Much progress has also been made in the building with various elements of our interrupted refurbishment plan being progressed. This includes all the electrical installations, kitchen areas renewed and substantial decorating and carpeting work.

On reopening the building on 27th July, we have been operating with some restrictions on numbers and in "bubbles" of 15 and have organised the club into three, rather than just two, separate age groups. This has proved popular and we have experienced an increase in the average age of our senior club as well as a demand beyond that we are able to accommodate under Covid restrictions.

The overall impact of Covid is clearly not at an end. It seems at least possible that this area is in some imminent danger of further restrictions and this, along with other threats, may have knock on effects over the coming unknown number of months. The impact on our fundraising is also uncertain, although our current position suggests we have some cause for cautious optimism.

The Board of Trustees will continue to meet regularly in responding to the situation.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT **Governing document**

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

#### Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The management of the Charity is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Articles of Association.

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

### Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charitable company has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### **Expenditure**

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

### **Tangible fixed assets**

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Office equipment - Straight line method, 33% annually Refurbishments costs - Straight line method, 10% annually

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
