Chairman's report

Robert was previously the Assistant Manager The post of Assistant Manager was advertised to the public and had over 30 applicants and following several rounds of interviews and skill analysis we were pleased to appoint Colin Lay who was the strongest candidate for the post. Colin resigned his position as Trustee. We continue to look for people that can bring additional skills.

Objectives and activities

Red Gables has had a successful year prior to the arrival of the global pandemic. 2019 saw a busy summer and autumn with the fundraising events both indoors and outdoors.

Red Gables continues to grow as a Wellbeing Hub with the variety of services available in the main building and also in Redwoods. All of the rooms are currently let, apart from Room 23 which is used for meetings or single day bookings. .We have fourteen organisations accommodated in the 21 rooms in Red Gables. More than 60 organisations and groups, including tenants, are using our meeting and activity space in Redwoods and we also have five wellbeing focused projects that are being well received. The support from trustees and staff has been considerable. The volunteers, who number over 35 now, are a fantastic asset and I thank them all

The profile of Red Gables is being raised in the local area as more people find out about the services and wellbeing support available. Colin L has taken very quickly to his new role and Helen C continue to support our online presence and work with Sue H on the Volunteering Project. Jackie C, our Finance & Admin Officer has also worked tirelessly throughout the year, keeping our administrative and financial records up to date. We have sadly had to say goodbye to Marion M and Keith H after many years of hard work.

The volunteers at Red Gables are essential to the outreach. We are very grateful for their efforts as they have all played a key role in our success. Some are based in the office but the majority support the Garden Project, Redwoods Lunch Club, Alive 'n' Singing, Volunteer Project, Cake Cancer & Coffee Support Group and the Dementia Music Cafe. They have really helped us to offer a friendly and supportive environment that many people benefit from.

What is Red Gables currently doing towards Community Wellbeing?

Our Mission Statement is 'Inspiring communities by enhancing wellbeing through projects and support for charitable organisations, small businesses and partners'. We work hard to achieve this by:

- 1. Providing office accommodation to charitable organisations & small businesses offering a range of wellbeing services.
- 2. The Redwoods Centre is managed to provide a venue for activities and meetings for over 50 groups and organisations. Private hirers also find this a good location for their celebrations.
- 3. Organise events that are fun to attend and help to raise valuable funds towards our core costs and projects. This includes Under The Redwoods, our music and arts mini-festival.
- 4. Manage projects that improve wellbeing by:
- Help people feel less isolated and helping them make new friends through various groups
- Encouraging people into volunteering through the regular drop in sessions and the annual Volunteering Day.
- Empower individuals to get involved
- Encourage healthier lifestyles

We are also pleased to have contributed to the Stowmarket Dementia Action Alliance, that has delivered some very positive projects for those that suffer and their families. We are also supporting the Stowmarket Rickshaw Project, which stores the rickshaw here.

Red Gables Outreach Projects

Redwoods Lunch Club - Every Monday except bank holidays - for the more mature - This comprises of two lunch clubs per month providing a two course meal, the main dish provided by the Cabbage & Kings café at The Mix, and 'Soup and Chat' on the other Mondays with a nutritious soup and cake, made by our volunteers. Over 40 older people regularly attend the lunch club and over 25 attend the Soup & Chat sessions. The 8 volunteers who support the project have a great rapport with the members and always make them feel welcome. In addition to the meals there are regular quizzes, raffles, entertainment and guest speakers. We are very grateful to receive annual funding from Stowmarket Town Council and The Gipping Branch of Oddfellows for this project. There is also a 'Better Balance' session each week which benefits older folk by improving their core strength and balance, which again has been supported by the Gipping Branch of Oddfellows. The lunch club was suspended during the pandemic lockdowns but we continued to support the members with newsletters, phone calls, music etc.

Garden Project — This meets every Thursday and makes a significant difference for anyone who visits Red Gables. The 15 volunteers work exceptionally hard in all weathers and many of them now have their own areas of garden to manage. We are extremely grateful to all of the volunteers and especially to Colin Lay for leading this project and keeping the grounds in good order. The gardens are a constant delight and they have been further improved by lots of planting of bulbs, trees and hedging, plus the Drought Tolerant Garden which was funded by Tesco's 'Bags of Help' fund.

The project also looks after a small piece of woodland adjacent to the fire station, known as the Spinney. The land is owned by Suffolk County Council and has been managed by us for many years trying to encourage wildlife and maintain bark paths around the area. With support from Mid Suffolk District Council and Stowmarket Town Council the land has been registered as an Asset of Community Value and Red Gables is attempting to get a lease on the land as the fire station is due to be relocated.

Alive 'n' Singing is held on the second Wednesday of each month. Developed from the Cake & Craft Club, this new singing group for wellbeing & enjoyment for anybody living with or affected by Parkinson's disease or any other neurological conditions. This project focuses on providing a fun and friendly gatherings for those that attend. We are looking for additional funding to continue this project, possibly combining it with the Dementia Music Café which is on the 4th Wednesday of the month. These projects are run by several of our trustees, Mark Coburn, Sue Vincent and Colin Biginton.

Volunteering Project - Red Gables is working with Stowmarket Town Council to encourage and empower adults into volunteering by matching them with the roles that local charitable organisations have available. The annual Volunteering day remains popular with organisations the public.

Cake, Cancer & Coffee - One Sunday a month. This is run by Susanne Lovell and Stuart & Clare Weston, with assistance from Suzanne Britton and with support from Macmillan Cancer Care. It is a well-run and popular group that provides a much needed service to local people. The volunteers also provide helpful information to others in the local community who do not attend the group.

Cake, Cancer & Coffee funded by Stowmarket Rotary Club, Stowmarket Lions and East of England Co-op with support from MacMillan Cancer Care.

Suffolk Community Foundation funded the Alive 'n' Singing project through its Pargiter Fund.

Volunteer Project funded by Stowmarket Town Council.

We thank them all for their tremendous support. They have helped considerably with the success of Red Gables.

Red Gables Centre

The tenants in Red Gables were stable this year and every available room was taken by tenants or used as a meeting room. We continued to provide a base for ACE Anglia Ltd, The RSVP Trust, Mari Green's Counselling Room, New Heritage Solutions, BSEVC Community Transport service, the Apricot Centre CIC, Vallant Ltd, Gables Therapies, Combs Complimentary Therapy, Synthesis Media, Sammy's Nail & Beauty, Suffolk Axis, Voiceability, the Parents Conciliation Trust (PACT) and Achieving Aspirations CIC. One tenant (NHS) gave notice at the end of the financial year and together with another tenant considering downsizing the charity will needs to continue to keep an eye open for new tenants. We have several leads at present.

Redwoods Centre

Redwoods continues to be popular with regular and occasional hirers from local community groups, individuals and a few private bookings. We continue to plan more improvements along with regular maintenance to keep this both attractive and cost effective for activities and meetings.

Many of our groups and organisations from previous years are continuing to use the facilities, such as Home-Start, Oddfellows Gipping Branch, Enigma, Stowmarket WI, Stowmarket Operatic & Dramatic Society, Gipping Valley LETS, West Suffolk Sight, Stowmarket U3A, Norfolk & Suffolk NHS Trust, Stowmarket Bee Keepers, Stowmarket Strummers and we are pleased to have Suffolk Axis for two days per week. We are grateful for their continued support and commitment to Red Gables.

The needs of local people for Wellbeing projects and community support are likely to grow and Red Gables trustees and staff will respond to these needs.

Aims of the Charity (Extract from the Memorandum of Association)

To promote for the public benefit the urban and rural regeneration in areas of social and economic deprivation and in particular Mid Suffolk District and the County of Suffolk.

To promote the benefit of the inhabitants of the area of benefit without distinction of sex, sexual orientation, age, disability, nationality, race or of political, religious or other opinions, by associating together the said inhabitants and the statutory authorities, voluntary and other organisations in a common effort to advance education and to provide facilities in the interests of social welfare for recreation and leisure-time occupation with the object of improving the conditions of life for the said inhabitants.

To promote and improve the effectiveness of charities which operate in whole or in part in Mid Suffolk in direct pursuit of their objectives by the provision of advice, training and information on efficient and professional management of resources

To promote such other purposes as are charitable according to the laws of England and Wales for the benefit of the public as may from time to time be determined.

Main Activities of the Forum

Promoting and improving the effectiveness of voluntary organisations working in the Mid Suffolk area by the provision of advice, training, practical support and information. Managing the Red Gables Resource Centre which provides permanent office accommodation for voluntary groups as well as facilities for hire such as the Redwoods Centre.

Public Benefit

The Board of Trustees are aware of their duty to ensure the activities of Mid Suffolk Voluntary Organisations Forum pursue its charitable objectives and that such activities are for the purposes of public benefit. Reviews by the Chairman and the Red Gables Manager is included in the Annual Report. The information sets out how the public benefit of Red Gables was delivered in the Mid Suffolk area during the past 12 months.

Achievements and performance

The charity's activities for the year are reported in the Red Gables Manager's Report within these accounts.

Financial review

Unrestricted income for the year has decreased by £3,955 to £89,720 (2019: £93,675) this is mainly due to a decrease in rental income but this was offset by an increase in grants and donations and a reduction in unrestricted expenditure which has decreased by £2,691 to £97,155 (2019: £99,846). This brings the unrestricted funds to £25,481 (2019: £34,151) as at the year end date, with total reserves amounting to £476,853 (2019: £484,079).

Reserves Policy

The Charity's reserves policy is to hold six months unrestricted expenditure as free reserves which would amount to £48,578 (2019: £49,923) based on current expenditure levels. The policy is set to hold enough free reserves to enable the Charity to fulfil statutory and legal obligations and to provide a contingency fund to meet unforeseen falls in income or increases in expenditure.

In setting the reserves policy the Trustees have considered the benefits and security of its ownership of the Red Gables property, which allows the Trustees to properly manage the charity's finances with consistency against unforeseen expense fluctuations in future years.

The Charity's actual free reserves amounted to £25,481 as at the year end (2019: £34,151). The Trustees will endeavour to make up the small deficit over the coming years with the shortfall monitored and reviewed annually.

Plans for future periods

The charity's plans for the future are to promote and undertake its aims and objectives as outlined in the Trustees Report. The Trustees have taken into account and adjusted for the impact of Covid-19 on the delivery of its projects in line with the objectives, tenants and the wider community including those who rely on Red Gables and our work throughout the year

Structure, governance and management

Organisational and Decision-Making Structure

The Mid Suffolk Voluntary Organisations Forum is a registered charity and a company limited by guarantee. A Board of Trustees is responsible for managing the business of the Forum and there are six scheduled meetings of the Board each year.

Appointment or Election of Trustees

Trustees are appointed by the Annual General Meeting or by resolution of the Board of Trustees. The number of Trustees shall not be less than three and the total number is not subject to any maximum unless otherwise determined.

New Trustees will communicate with the Charity and its existing Trustees prior to becoming a member, during which time the individual will obtain an understanding of the objectives and operations of the Charity and the individual's expected role.

Membership of the Forum

Membership is open to any voluntary organisation or community group that has a charitable purpose, or is a registered Charity, and operates wholly or partly in the Mid Suffolk area. Membership is also open to individuals and groups that can demonstrate they have particular skills or interests that can assist the development of the voluntary sector.

Main Restrictions set by Governing Document

The governing documents of the Forum are the Articles of Association and the Memorandum of Association. The overriding restriction is that the income and property of the Forum shall only be used for achieving the aims of the Charity.

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is Red Gables, Ipswich Road, Stowmarket, Suffolk, IP14 1BE.

2. Statement of compliance

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland issued in October 2019, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006 and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

The accounts have been prepared on the ongoing concern basis and the Trustees believe that no material uncertainties exist. The Trustees have considered the level of funds held and the expected income and expenditure for the next 12 months from authorising these financial statement. The budgeted income and expenditure is sufficient with the level of reserves for the Charity to be able to continue as a going concern.

Trustees have taken into account the impact of Covid-19 when assessing going concern

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

Income

All income is included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity, it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Income (continued)

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities
 that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and
 costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

An increase in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of a revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, unless it reverses a charge for impairment that has previously been recognised as expenditure within the statement of financial activities. A decrease in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, except to which it offsets any previous revaluation gain, in which case the loss is shown within other recognised gains and losses on the statement of financial activities.

Depreciation

The Freehold property is being written off over 50 years and included improvements depreciated as noted below. Land is not depreciated.

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

For the purposes of impairment testing, when it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or paable including any related transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Debt instruments are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Defined contribution plans

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

When contributions are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the end of the reporting date in which the employees render the related service, the liability is measured on a discounted present value basis. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as an expense in the period in which it arises.

4. Limited by guarantee

The company is limited by guarantee and does not have a share capital. Every member of the company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the company if it is wound up during the time that he or she is a member, or within one year afterwards, for payment of the debts and liabilities of the company contracted before the time at which he or she ceases to be a member and of the costs, charges and expenses of winding up and for the adjustment of the rights of the contributors among themselves such amount as may be required not exceeding £1.
