REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2020

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 April 2020. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The main object of the charity is to raise awareness of pulmonary hypertension. Raising awareness is difficult to measure quantitatively making it difficult to accurately assess the performance of the charity. Detailed below is a synopsis of the year's activities and achievements which aim to demonstrate qualitatively how the charity goes about meeting its objectives of raising awareness and providing financial assistance in cases of need.

Awareness is raised through the provision of information and educational resources for sufferers of the said condition, their families, carers and members of the medical profession.

In addition the charity also provides relief of need of sufferers of the said condition, their families and carers through the provision of financial assistance towards, but not exclusively, respite care, travel grants and equipment grants at the discretion of the Executive committee, as and when resources allow.

Public benefit

We review our aims, objectives and activities each year. This review looks at what we achieved and the outcomes of our work in the previous 12 months. The review looks at the success of each key activity and the benefits they have brought to those groups of people we are set up to help. The review also helps us to ensure our aim, objectives and activities remained focused on our stated purposes. We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities. In particular, the management committee consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives have set.

Grantmaking

Requests of £500 or under require an administrator signature, and from £500 to £2,000 need to be agreed by the administrator and a trustee. Grants are only paid to an individual and not an institution,

A monthly grant limited to £5,000 is set. If this is to be surpassed it must be agreed by 2 trustees plus the treasurer.

Requests for in-flight oxygen will be covered on request if resources allow. Only 1 claim allowed per patient per year. These grants will not be included in the £5,000 monthly limit calculation.

Travel insurance claims will be treated as normal grant requests.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

The last 12 months have seen a significant amount of activity, culminating in the unprecedented task of supporting our members through the early (and most challenging) stages of the Covid-19 pandemic.

This document details the work we have undertaken between 1st May 2019 and 30th April 2020.

PATIENT SERVICES AND SUPPORT

The year kicked off with a member conference at Heythrop Park Resort in Oxfordshire, to tie in with the 20th anniversary of the charity. Attended by over 150 people, it provided a unique opportunity for people affected by PH to meet others and learn more about the condition. The event enabled us to gather written and video content to use across our media channels and inform member resources.

In the last quarter of 2019, to help improve quality of life and wellbeing for patients, we began funding the post of a physiotherapist within the specialist PH service at the Royal Brompton Hospital. This follows the successful funding of a physiotherapist post in the Sheffield service and allows more patients to benefit from this specialism. The post is a funded part time post for 24 months.

Our ongoing partnerships with Anxiety UK and Turn2Us have enabled members to continue accessing advice and support around emotional health and money-related matters, and our online forum has provided ongoing peer-to-peer support.

We have continued to work with the DVLA to ensure that drivers with pulmonary hypertension are treated fairly, following the discovery last year that the guidance around the condition had changed. We successfully lobbied for collaboration, which resulted in Professor David Kiely, director of the Sheffield Pulmonary Vascular Disease Unit, being invited to sit on the panel that decides the medical criteria for eligibility to drive.

Following the results of the research we carried out into the financial impact of PH, we pro-actively sought a meeting with Maximus, who carry out benefits assessments, and took them to task on what members told us are 'unfair' assessment processes. The conversations are now ongoing and we have been invited to further meetings.

Covid-19 support

The period between March and May 2020 saw concentrated activity where we committed all our resource to supporting members through the early stages of the pandemic. We:

- Set up a dedicated 'microsite' containing information from central government which we tailored to people with PH. This site was reviewed and updated daily and became the 'go-to' area for timely news and developments for both PH patients and professionals
- Produced a direct mail pack containing information, advice and a shielding door poster and mailed it to each of our members, meaning we were able to reach those who don't use the internet
- Extended our office hours into weekends so that members could contact us with concerns seven days a week
- Launched a series of 'infocasts' recorded interviews with PH professionals to give important information to members 'from the horses mouth'
- Produced downloadable wellbeing resources to help members manage their mental health during lockdown
- Provided 24/7 advice and information via our social media accounts

PUBLICATIONS

In late 2019 we published 'PH and Children', a new resource to help the families of those attending Great Ormond Street Children's Hospital for treatment. Then in early 2020 we published 'PH and intimacy', a revamped version of 'It Matters To Me'. The resources look in detail at the effect of PH on intimate relationships and we conducted interviews with real couples and single people to provide the patient perspective.

We also produced an updated version of 'A guide for people with suspected pulmonary hypertension' and published 'Contraception and PH', a specialist guide to contraception for people with PH. This resource was accompanied by a video featuring interviews with medical professionals.

All of these resources were made available to order for free from our website, and shipments were made to all of the specialist centres.

Between May 2019 and May 2020, four issues of Emphasis, our quarterly member magazine, were produced. £2,000 of advertising revenue was generated during this time and in November 2019, Emphasis was awarded 'gold' for 'Best Publication' at the Chartered Institute of Public Relations (PRide) awards. This follows a previous win in 2017.

In November 2019 we produced a publication highlighting the findings of our research into the emotional impact of pulmonary hypertension. This 16-page report contained statistics brought to life with case studies and was the culmination of a major piece of research - the first of its kind - into the true emotional impact of PH.

This research was conducted during the summer of 2019 and to accompany the report, we filmed interviews with patients and their families around the country. The resulting videos have been used online, in the media and at conferences.

We supported the Sheffield Pulmonary Vascular Disease Unit by producing a 12-page review into its activity during 2018-19. The report was published in June 2019.

Work has continued on a 'pregnancy and PH' resource, and during this time period we have conducted a wide range of interviews with women and their partners to enhance the publication with real experiences. The resource will be published before the end of 2020.

ONLINE

Our online activity has continued at pace. We have continued to manage and update our suite of three websites, including the ongoing development of phocusonlifetsyle.org.

We have produced a number of e-newsletters to keep in touch with members in-between Emphasis issues and a large number of videos have been produced throughout the year which have been used across our websites and social media channels, as well as at conferences and events.

Social media activity and engagement continues to increase. Facebook now has almost 4,000 followers and during this time period we launched a new Instagram profile to reach a younger audience. This continues to be successful, with almost 500 followers gained in a short time period. Our YouTube channel now has 250 subscribers and Twitter is up to over 1,300 followers.

AWARENESS

In July and August 2019, we partnered with the British Transplant Games and World Transplant Games to raise awareness of both PH and transplant.

July saw us sponsor the darts event at the British games and our branding at the venue included banners, signs and beer mats. We attended in person to speak to people about PH and it was also an opportunity to bring members together in person.

In August we sponsored the Petanque event at the World Games, held in Newcastle. Our flags and banners engaged competitors and spectators from across the globe and our special guests, a young boy who had a transplant following PH and his family, helped us raise awareness during the event.

We gained widespread media coverage about the partnership and produced video content from both events that was shared widely online.

November saw our fourth annual PH Awareness Week, where we focused on raising awareness of the emotional impact of pulmonary hypertension.

We shared multiple video case studies, launched a 'darts and drinks' initiative to encourage people to come together and talk about PH and secured media coverage across the UK, including on TV.

Our online 'pledge wall' saw MPs and members of the pledge to support people affected by PH and we dedicated a day to raising awareness of PH in children.

We saw 645 new users across the websites, secured 36 pieces of media coverage and received almost 1000 likes for one Facebook post alone.

Ongoing awareness has also been created throughout the year via our social media channels, with consistently high engagement rates.

RESEARCH

In the summer of 2019, we conducted a major piece of research into the emotional impact of pulmonary hypertension, receiving almost 500 responses. The findings were disseminated via a printed report, video case studies and social media and underpinned our activity during PH Awareness Week.

We facilitated research around Breelib and AI in the clinic, which included focus groups.

We sponsored the National PH Research Forum in November, providing a presentation prize and producing video interviews with researchers.

In the early part of 2020, we partnered with researchers at the University of Sheffield to plan a study into the effectiveness of an intervention to help people with PH who struggle with anxiety. We will be supporting this study when it takes place later this year.

POLITICAL ENGAGEMENT

Our political engagement work has continued, underpinned by our PHocus2021 strategy.

Activity has included attending All Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) meetings at Westminster to advocate for members and PH and working with partner organisations including the Specialised Healthcare Alliance and Genetic Alliance to increase our political voice.

SUPPORT AND EDUCATION FOR MEDICAL PROFESSIONALS

We supported specialist centres throughout the year by offering access to our onsite meeting facilities and breathlessness training days have taken place for non-PH professionals at our resource centre too.

We have facilitated multi-centre meetings to discuss service specification, with NHS England in attendance, and supported the Sheffield centre with the production of an activity report.

We have provided 65 bursaries for healthcare professionals to complete our medical education programme, 'Pulmonary Hypertension - diagnosis and management' to help them understand more about the condition.

We have continued to provide ongoing support and secretarial input for the PH Professionals group - including hosting meetings - and have continued to offer educational and travel grants to clinical staff working within the field of PH.

CHARITY DEVELOPMENT

In October 2019 we employed a new member of staff to strengthen the team. Paul Sephton joined us as a part time employee, bringing with him vital clinical experience as a former PH nurse specialist.

We have continued to explore links and foster relationships with other charities, and to outsource comms, design and event support to enable our core staff team to focus on membership services.

Our resource centre continues to offer a valuable source of income due to the ability to rent out the meeting room.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Investment policy and objectives

The charity has invested in a portfolio of investments held in Fidelity Investments, managed by R T Williams Ltd (Independent Financial Advisers). The investments are valued at market value at the year end in the accounts.

Financial review and reserves policy

The financial position of the charity as at 30 April 2020 was showing:-

At 30 April 2020, Pulmonary Hypertension Association UK had free reserves of £162,369 and £900,000 of designated funds as follows:

- Up to £250,000 towards the cost of academic/clinical research.
- Up to £60,000 for the funding of an annual conference. Due to the changes caused by the pandemic the trustees don't think this fund will be required going forward.
- Up to £80,000 towards the funding of awareness activities including setting up an All Parliamentary Group.
- Up to £350,000 towards the production of educational literature and Online content including, completion of ImPAHct survey and production of newsletters with the results for medical professionals and members, Listening to me, Listening to you publication, Provision of educational resources for patients with learning disabilities, PH Medical Education Programme, Educational needs of patients and caregivers in relation to end of life care, practical aspects of daily living with PH, welfare benefit advice and the like.
- Up to £50,000 towards fundraising activities.
- Up to £45,000 towards the preparation and cost of the family weekend. Due to the pandemic it was not possible to arrange a family weekend in 2020 and the trustees consider this provision no-longer required.
- Up to £65,000 as a contingency reserve.
- Up to £105,000 towards arranging patient & peer educational and support events that can be undertaken within the constraints arising from the pandemic.

Where funds set aside for research are subsequently spent the expenditure is inclusive of both the charity's own unrestricted funds and contributions from third party partners including industry

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

FUTURE PLANS

It is envisaged that future developments would include: -

- The provision of funding directed towards medical research.
- The research and development of further educational literature relating to pulmonary hypertension for patients, carers, nurses, and others. We have and continue to fund research meeting and conferences for health care professionals working in the field of PH, these are both national and international in their makeup.
- The provision of funding to the specialist PH centres for research and nursing staff and other support staff.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Pulmonary Hypertension Association UK is a company limited by guarantee, governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association (company number 06268494) and registered with the charity commission (charity number 1120756).

Members of the company guarantee £1 in the event of the company being wound up. There are currently 4 members being the Charity Trustees

The Charitable Company's powers ("the powers") are:

In furtherance of the objects but not otherwise the Management Committee may exercise the following powers:

- (i) power to raise funds and to invite and receive contributions provided that in raising funds the Management Committee shall not undertake any substantial permanent trading activities and shall conform to any relevant requirements of the law;
- (ii) power to buy, take on lease or in exchange any property necessary for the achievement of the objects and to maintain and equip it for use;
- (iii) power subject to any consents required by law to sell, lease or dispose of all or any part of the property of the Charitable Company;
- (iv) power subject to any consents required by law to borrow money and to charge all or any part of the property of the Charitable Company with repayment of the money so borrowed;
- (v) power to employ such staff (who shall not be members of the Management Committee) as are necessary for the proper pursuit of the objects and to make all reasonable and necessary provision for the payment of pensions and superannuation for staff and their dependants;
- (vi) power to co-operate with other charities, voluntary bodies and statutory authorities operating in furtherance of the objects or of similar charitable purposes and to exchange information and advice with them;
- (vii) power to establish or support any charitable trusts, associations or institutions formed for all or any of the objects;
- (viii) power to appoint and constitute such advisory committees as the Management Committee may think fit;
- (ix) power to do all such other lawful things as are necessary for the achievement of the objects;
- (x) power to provide financial assistance towards research activities for members of the medical profession.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Appointment of the management committee is governed by the charitable company's memorandum and articles.

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law and are known as members of the Management Committee. Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association at each annual general meeting one third of the trustees are subject to retirement by rotation and may be re-elected.

All members of the Management committee give their time voluntarily and received no benefits from the charity. Any expenses reclaimed from the charity are set out in note 9 to the accounts.

Training of charity trustees is in accordance with advice published by the charity commission.

Decision making is carried out democratically during regular trustee meetings, held at least annually. Major decisions are documented in meeting minutes which are held by the secretary. Minutes are circulated to trustees before being signed off.

Organisational structure

Shaun Clayton (Director of Membership Support) is delegated to deal with the day to day management of the charity after discussions with the trustees.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Related parties

Due to the nature of the charity's operations and the composition of the Board of Trustees being drawn from local and national public and private sector organisations, it is inevitable that transactions will take place with organisations in which a member of the board of trustees may have an interest. Any such transactions are conducted at arm's length and in accordance with the charity's financial regulations and normal procurement procedures.

On 31 July 2010 the net assets and operations of Pulmonary Hypertension Association (UK), a unincorporated registered charity (charity number 1082613) were transferred to the charity at net book value.

The trustees of Pulmonary Hypertension Association UK are also trustees of Pulmonary Hypertension Association (UK).

Donations totalling £232,489 were made to the charity by Pulmonary Hypertension Association (UK) (2019 -£252,180).

At 30th April 2020, £26,061 was due from Pulmonary Hypertension Association (UK) (2019 - £93,574).

Details of Trustee's interests are summarised below;

In order to provide clarity and to comply with advice from the Charity Commission on dealing with potential conflicts of interest the Pulmonary Hypertension Association UK wishes to make public a register of trustee's interest.

Dr Tom Siddons, Treasurer and Executive trustee resigned in February 2020. He is employed by Janssen Ltd. Pulmonary Hypertension Association UK has put in place practices to avoid any conflict of interest on matters involving drug companies or relevant issues relating to drugs.

Mr Iain Armstrong, Chairman and Executive trustee is employed by Sheffield Teaching Hospitals NHS Trust.

Mr Iain Armstrong receives remuneration from Pulmonary Hypertension Association UK for consultancy. Pulmonary Hypertension UK pays Sheffield Teaching Hospitals NHS Trust for Mr Armstrong's services other than those as a trustee.

Mrs Susan Townsley is a Patient Trustee, and is entitled to claim up to £200 per year as reimbursement for the cost of oxygen during airline travel. This policy is open to all members of the Pulmonary Hypertension Association UK.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

The trustees (who are also the directors of Pulmonary Hypertension Association Uk for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Report of the Trustees and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charity SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Opinion

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2020

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value, as modified by the revaluation of certain assets.

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the Charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In the process of applying the entity's accounting policies management have not made any judgements—that would have a significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements. No estimations have been made that would have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets—and liabilities within the next financial year.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

The costs are allocated between each relevant fund as directed by the trustees. Costs are apportioned to match the correct period to which they relate.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful

Fixtures and fittings

- 15% on reducing balance

Office equipment

- 25% on reducing balance

At each balance sheet date, the Charity reviews the carrying amounts of its property, plant and equipment to determine whether there is any indication that any items of property, plant and equipment have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of an asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss, if any. Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of the assets, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

If the recoverable amount of an asset is estimated to be less that its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset is reduced to its recoverable amount. Impairment loss is recognised as an expense immediately.

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - continued FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2020

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Tangible fixed assets

Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount and would have been determined (net of depreciation) had no impairment loss be recognised for the asset in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised as income immediately.

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Financial instruments

Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the company has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Financial Instruments

The company only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Details of designated funds

At 30 April 2020, Pulmonary Hypertension Association UK had £900,000 of unrestricted funds currently designated as follows:

- Up to £250,000 towards the cost of academic/clinical research.
- Up to £60,000 for the funding of an annual conference. Due to the changes caused by the pandemic the trustees don't think this fund will be required going forward.
- Up to £80,000 towards the funding of awareness activities including setting up an All Parliamentary Group.
- Up to £350,000 towards the production of educational literature and Online content including, completion of ImPAHct survey and production of newsletters with the results for medical professionals and members, Listening to me, Listening to you publication, Provision of educational resources for patients with learning disabilities, PH Medical Education Programme, Educational needs of patients and caregivers in relation to end of life care, practical aspects of daily living with PH, welfare benefit advice and the like.
- Up to £50,000 towards fundraising activities.
- Up to £45,000 towards the preparation and cost of the family weekend. Due to the pandemic it was not possible to arrange a family weekend in 2020 and the trustees consider this provision no-longer required.
- Up to £65,000 as a contingency reserve.
- Up to £105,000 towards arranging patient & peer educational and support events that can be undertaken within the constraints arising from the pandemic.

Where funds set aside for research are subsequently spent the expenditure is inclusive of both the charity's own unrestricted funds and contributions from third party partners including industry

19. OTHER FINANCIAL COMMITMENTS

Pulmonary Hypertension Association UK has committed to provide funding for a physiotherapist post within the specialised PH service at the Royal Brompton Hospital. This is funding for a part time post for a period of 24 months for a cost of £35,478. The funding should have commenced in the last quarter of 2019, but due to the Covid pandemic it was delayed to start in 2020/2021.

20. RELATED PARTY DISCLOSURES

Due to the nature of the charity's operations and the composition of the Board of Trustees being drawn from local and national public and private sector organisations, it is inevitable that transactions will take place with organisations in which a member of the board of trustees may have an interest. Any such transactions are conducted at arm's length and in accordance with the charity's financial regulations and normal procurement procedures.

Details of trustee's interests are contained within the trustees report, and note 9.

On 31 July 2010 the net assets and operations of Pulmonary Hypertension Association (UK), an unincorporated charity (charity number 1082613) were transferred to the charity at net book value.

The trustees of Pulmonary Hypertension Association UK are also trustees of Pulmonary Hypertension Association (UK).

Donations totalling £232,489 were made to the charity by Pulmonary Hypertension Association (UK) (2019 - £252,180).

At 30 April 2020, £26,061 was due from Pulmonary Hypertension Association (UK) (2019 - £93,574).

21. RESTRICTED FUNDS

PH Professional Secretariat

As secretariat for the PH professionals group, PHA UK are tasked with co-ordinating all the meetings, logistics and administrative support. Money is acquired by the chairman of this group from industry to be spent solely on these meetings.

Living with PH

Actelion Pharmaceutical provided a grant of £65,000 in 2017 and a further £42,500 in 2018 towards this survey/research project called "Living better with PH". Bayer also provided a grant of £50,000 towards this project in 2018. This is a long term project which will run over a number of years.

PHocus 2021

Actelion Pharmaceutical provided a grant of £30,000 towards this long term project focusing on the political and strategic arm of PHA UK.

Actelion Physio Project

This is a two year project for a physiotherapist to provide a physical activity programme to all newly diagnosed pulmonary arterial hypertension patients. The funding agreement in place is for PHA to provide 51% of the funding, and Actelion to provide the additional 49%.
