Trustees' Report For the year ended 31 March 2020

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of the Halo Children's Foundation for the 1 April 2019 to 31 March 2020.

Halo Children's Foundation was formed on 3 May 2016 as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO).

Objectives and activities

a. Policies and objectives

The objects of the Charity are:

- 1) to promote and protect the physical and mental health of people living in Greater London, in particular children and young adults, who have experienced the loss of a family member or someone close to them by providing and assisting in the provision of services related to be reavement care such as the rapeutic play and counselling.
- 2) to advance the education of the general public in all areas relating to bereavement.

In setting objectives and planning for activities, the Trustees have given due consideration to general guidance published by the Charity Commission relating to public benefit, including the guidance 'Public benefit: running a charity (PB2)'.

b. Strategies for achieving objectives

Halo Children's Foundation is a charity supporting children and their families with bereavement when a loved one sadly dies. Many of the children we support have lost a parent but this can be a sibling, grandparent or any loved one.

HALO's aim is to allow families opportunities to hold onto memories of their loved one whilst creating new memories along the way in rebuilding their lives after their loss. We aim to reduce isolation and offer hope to families and a place so they do not grieve alone.

HALO support is offered 7 days a week with weekly provision available as a drop-in service and a bereavement book library available 5 days a week at our HQ. Our monthly peer support and meet up allows families to meet others going through similar grief where they do not feel alone. Professionals on hand for families means they can positively tackle issues which arise along their journey.

c. Activities undertaken to achieve objectives

- 1) provide a monthly expressive arts and play session, a place where children can express themselves in a safe and stimulating environment;
- 2) provide a bereavement book library of books for loan;
- 3) offer a drop-in service of bereavement support;
- 4) peer support for both children and adults;
- 5) funded trips to create new memories;
- 6) a website for information on bereavement support at developmental levels;
- 7) offer training to individuals of grief and loss;
- 8) weekly drop-in service of support in an after school club.

Objectives and activities (continued)

d. Main activities undertaken to further the Charity's purposes for the public benefit

- 1) work in partnership with schools and local services;
- 2) provide training opportunities for professionals and vounteers;
- 3) personalise memory boxes for children to keep loved ones items in;
- 4) offer a cushion making service to keep loved ones close;
- 5) provide a long term support system throughout the grief process;
- 6) offer 1 to 1 and group counselling sessions;
- 7) offer emotional support;
- 8) links with community groups for referral such as Hillingdon Carers, Harlington Hospice, links with local leisure facilities and hairdressing for wellbeing support;

e. Volunteers

The Charity is grateful for the unstinting efforts of its volunteers who are involved in service provision, partnerships and fundraising.

It is estimated that over 2,700 volunteer hours carried out by 20 main volunteers were provided during the year. If this is conservatively valued at £7.50 an hour (the minimum living wage) the volunteer effort amounts to over £20,250.

The Charity has recently appointed a volunteer lead to ensure that best value is derived from the sterling efforts of our volunteers. Volunteers hold a range of skills in accounting, teaching, safeguarding, gardening, DIY and yoga teaching so HALO are very lucky to have the support offered.

Achievements and performance

a. Review of activities

Over the past 12 months we have:

- continued to fund personalised memory boxes free of charge to children to keep loved one's items in;
- we secured funding from London Borough of Hillingdon to support core costs;
- recruited more volunteers, working with Brunel University and retailers in Intu, Uxbridge volunteer teams;
- offered a Safeguarding Training Course to all volunteers and two completed training in Grief and loss;
- funded day out trips for families to create new memories together:
- built long term partnerships with local Football Clubs, Leisure Centre's and businesses;
- offered monthly Expressive Arts and Play sessions with peer support for adults;
- accessed Uxbridge College Children's Centre's garden and continued to run Garden Club and Dance Club based at the College
- HALO offered bereavement support in local schools and encouraged Bereavement Policy's in Hillingdon;
- Continued to run a bereavement book library of over 50 books to borrow;
- HALO were recognised on BBC Children In need as they fund a Project Coordinator role;
- Provided families with a Cushion of Love made out of a loved one's piece of clothing;
- HALO continued to run an annual walk to raise awareness and funds, over 40 participants this year and a dove release;
- HALO received £2000 from the FA Community Shield with support from Woking FC;
- HALO ran Back to School workshops with Brunel University;
- Worked with local Funeral Directors sharing HALO support;
- HALO founder received a Points of Light Award by PM Boris Johnson;
- HALO secured funding from the Postcode Lottery to fund a Family Support Worker role;
- Received a large donation of £12,000 from the MCKS Foundation towards a bereavement play café project;

Achievements and performance (continued)

- HALO created a workbook to support children with grief and loss.

HALO continue to fund an office space and garden based at Uxbridge College, making use of a refectory area and dance studio where required. HALO run groups and sessions regularly within the office and meeting room offering families consistent support. HALO aim to open a bereavement play café a place to encourage families out of the home, reducing isolation so they do not grieve alone. HALO continue to grow with experience in bid writing and aim to develop this area to be able to fund qualified counselling and psychotherapy support to families in-house.

The year ahead we plan to:

- update charity website;
- create a booklet to be shared in local hospitals and schools on HALO services;
- continue to build partnerships with local businesses;
- apply for funding for a counsellor/psychotherapist;
- open bereavement play café in Hillingdon;
- explore possibility of opening a charity shop;
- secure funding to ensure Charity has a strong foundation.

Financial review

a. Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the Charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the accounting policies.

b. Reserves policy

The Trustees recognise the need to hold reserves to allow protection of all core activities in the event of income shortfall and any cashflow problems as well as to promote a balanced long-term strategic plan. We continue to execute our action plan to promote for this.

b. Methods of appointment or election of Trustees

The management of the Charity is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Charitable Incorporated Organisation Constitution.

Statement of Trustees' responsibilities

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England & Wales requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Charity and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure, for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles of the Charities SORP (FRS 102);
- make judgements and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards (FRS 102) have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements:
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Charity will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the Charity's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the provisions of the Charity Commission Scheme. Notes to the Financial Statements For the year ended 31 March 2020

1. General information

Halo Children's Foundation is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO), charity number 116663.

2. Accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) - Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

The financial statements have been prepared to give a 'true and fair' view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair' view. This departure has involved following the Charities SORP (FRS 102) published on 16 July 2014 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has since been withdrawn.

Halo Children's Foundation meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

2.2 Income

All income is recognised once the Charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Grants are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the Balance Sheet. Where income is received in advance of entitlement of receipt, its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

2.3 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Expenditure on raising funds includes all expenditure incurred by the Charity to raise funds for its charitable purposes and includes costs of all fundraising activities events and non-charitable trading.

Expenditure on charitable activities is incurred on directly undertaking the activities which further the Charity's objectives, as well as any associated support costs.

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.3 Expenditure (continued)

All expenditure is inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

2.4 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

2.5 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short-term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

2.6 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance Sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably.

Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the Charity anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities as a finance cost.

2.7 Financial instruments

The Charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

2.8 Pensions

The Charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the Charity to the fund in respect of the year.

2.9 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the Charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the Charity for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.
