### SUPPORT AND ACTION FOR WOMEN'S NETWORK (SAWN) REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2020

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31st March 2020. The trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' issued in March 2005.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### **Governing document**

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a CIO, and constitutes an incorporated charity.

### Risk management

The Board of Trustees is ultimately responsible for the system of internal control and for reviewing its effectiveness. However, such a system is designed to manage rather than eliminate the risk of failure to achieve business objectives, and can only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance against material misstatement of loss.

The Board has reviewed the effectiveness of the system of internal control. In particular, it has reviewed and updated the process for identifying and evaluating the major risks affecting the business and the policies and procedures by which these risks are managed.

### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

### **Objectives and Aims**

The Charity's objects are, for the benefit of the public:-

- 1) To promote social inclusion; by working with women and families in and around Greater Manchester through the provision of workshops, one-to-one support and advice.
- 2) The relief of financial hardship amongst families in Greater Manchester.

### **Significant Activities**

During the year, the Charity has been compliant in the execution of its public benefit responsibilities by promoting the welfare of Black/African women in Oldham and Great Manchester. SAWN helped to realise the full potential of women by engaging them in activities, providing opportunities and events to make women independent, self-sustaining and key players in matters that concern them

In the planning of activities for the year, and having given due consideration to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit, the Charity has been committed in its efforts of supporting the BME women in general and in providing workshops on Anti FGM Awareness, offering Interpreting Services, a friend in need (AFIN) projects and the likes.

### **RESERVE POLICY**

The Trustees aim to retain sufficient free reserves at a level which equate to a minimum of three months of unrestricted expenditure. These reserves are held in case of any sudden decline in income and to ensure that we can meet our commitments to providing our services and activities. Specifically, these commitments include our obligations in relation to our support and outreach work.

### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

The Trustees have implemented robust budgetary controls to monitor costs in an effort to continue to deliver its service in the future. Income - the total income for the twelve months under review was £47.402

Expenditure - total expenditure in the year was £34,975. The Charity recorded an operating surplus for the year of £12,427; and carries forward Unrestricted funds of £2,127 and restricted funds of £16,253.

During the year the Trustees continued to place emphasis on financial management to ensure that the funds within the organisation are properly managed.

### STATEMENT OF TRUSTEE RESPONSIBILITIES

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

Support and Action for Women's Network (SAWN) meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

### Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Donations and other incoming resources - Income from grants and other activities for generating funds such as the charity shop.

### Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

### Charitable activities

Costs of charitable activities are those costs relating to the activities carried out to meet the objectives of the charity. These include both directly attributable costs and apportioned support costs.

### **Governance costs**

Governance costs are the costs associated with the strategic direction of the organisation and with meeting regulatory responsibilities including apportioned support cost.

### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

### **Fund Accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees. Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes. Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life where applicable.

# Support and Action Women's Network (SAWN) Annual Report April 2019 to March 2020



Support and Action Women's Network (SAWN) is based in Oldham, one of the most deprived towns in the country was set up in 2007 by Rose Ssali - after an African woman from Zimbabwe who was seeking asylum with a cancerous tumour died in Oldham, alone at home, with no support, because she was unaware that she was entitled to NHS treatment. SAWN is a registered charity- CIO No 1184501 and was established to promote the welfare of Black/African women in Oldham and Greater Manchester. We thank God for what we have been able to achieve at SAWN this year. We have made significant progress in our support and empowering women. We would like to thank our dedicated staff and volunteers, funders, local community, and all well-wishers who have enabled us to do what we have done this year.

This year we have run several small-scale projects aimed at helping women settle in new communities/neighbourhoods, deal with barriers to participation and helping women realise their full potential.

### SAWN delivered the following activities and services:

 FGM awareness and support – provided training to professional and community members; offered one-to-one support to victims.

- Money Matters trained community champions who have reached others in the community to address the new benefits system, Universal credit, living on a budget, work and welfare and debt management.
- Community drop-ins dealing with Immigration matters and financial issues.
- African food bank and provided food parcels to anyone in need.
- Community Upcycling project and friendship group.
- Community coffee morning, encouraging those who are alone and isolated to join in, make new friends and connections in the community.
- SAWN runs a furniture bank from Stockfield Mill, Oldham, which sells pre-loved furniture at very affordable costs, this enables us to gift furniture, where possible to people faced with financial hardship. Our unique offer means that many of the clients supplied with furniture are also offered to become members of our other projects and we have a continuous relationship with them.

These projects have enriched SAWN's understanding of the needs of African women and their families and the best approach to alleviating them, designed with contributions and ideas from the women themselves. This has had a huge impact on helping people living in poverty and depravation, to improve their physical and mental health and wellbeing, increase their social circle of friends, not just mixing with other black African families, but with other nationalities in the wider community, helping them to build lasting relationships and friendships, improving isolation and social cohesion.

SAWN works in partnership with Oldham Borough Council, Action Together, Inspire Women, Women Resource Centre, Positive Steps, Great Places Housing Group and First Choice Homes, the biggest housing provider in Oldham, as well as many other smaller organisations. The projects cover mainly Oldham residents, but are open to residents in Greater Manchester and to date we have worked with over 1160 women and their families.

SAWN works closely with and plays a lead role, working in partnership with the Mama Health & Poverty Partnership (MHaPP) a collective of individual organisations that work with Black African Women, throughout the 10 Boroughs of Greater Manchester. SAWN and MHaPP offer specialist services working within an Afrocentric perspective.

Organisations within the partnership speak around 20 of the major African languages and cover the majority of the African communities settled in Greater Manchester including: Swahili, Lingala, Luganda, Kikuyu, Lugisu Arabic, Igbo, Yoruba, Pidgin, Edo, Portuguese, Zulu, Shona, Ndebele, Benin, Rwandese, Kirundi, Kakwa.

There is excellent collaborative working and support between partnership members and SAWN make good use of this vital resource and links mainstream services provide general services for example health (NHS services), welfare benefits (Job centre support) and education (ESOL, Life skills available) providing culturally appropriate support to enable African women to understand the system, language barriers, and accessibility.

SAWN staff and volunteers have expertise in a broad range of specialties, e.g., talking and listening activities for survivors of female genital mutilation (FGM), child marriage, prostitution, information and support after incarceration and immigration detention, integration advice & guidance for refugees fleeing their war-torn, civil conflict, or famine countries and budgetary/money matters.

Regardless of whether women are qualified or skilled, they all experience to some extent immigration control, lack of childcare and isolation, from having no family members or people from a similar background, responsibility, and commitment to look after families left behind in Africa - parents, children, and siblings.

Consultations carried out by SAWN has shown that the marginalised group of Black & African women are often more affected by, a lack of the information, money, and access to health services that help prevent and treat disease.

The cultural and social barriers faced by marginalised groups, can mean they use health services less, with serious consequences for their health which contributes to the levels of poverty and that service users often face impossible choices which is the basis of our future projects to enable and empower women.

This year as well as the previous year we are happy and proud to say we are an organisation that actually changes people's lives; this is evident to the many women and their families who still attend and volunteer in our service. We care deeply about the women and their families, which includes men, who come through our door.

There is no deadline on the support people receive, and are always welcome, and we have an open-door policy and will support people for however long it takes.
