2019 continued to bring concerted ministry in the parish. We express our thanks to our churchwardens Irene and William and to all who run our children's groups, young church, luncheon club, Guild, Players, MCC and all our organisations and activities. We continue to be grateful to all who worship with us and those who contribute of their time, talents, fundraising and finances.

We were delighted that 4 children were admitted to Holy Communion in November after attending a short course at which 3 children from St Margaret's were also prepared.

CHURCHWARDENS REPORT ON THE FABRIC, GOODS AND ORNAMENTS OF THE CHURCH AND CHURCH PROPERTIES

CHURCH BUILDINGS AND CONTENTS

Whilst the church and church centre buildings remain in a relatively good state of repair, the programme of suggested repairs, upgrades or enhancements from the 2018 Quinquennial Report have not yet progressed beyond the more urgently required action. We are looking at refurbishing or re-roofing the choir vestry roof as there appear to be a number of leaks.

VICARAGE

The vicarage did not require any major repairs that were the responsibility of the PCC.

CHURCH PROPERTIES

We have tenants in the two properties.

The work on the scout hut lease and arrangements continues to make progress, but is not as yet finalised. The scout association remains an important and key part of the outreach and mission of the church.

CHURCH GROUNDS

As you are all aware, the land to the rear of the car park continues to be developed. The PCC intend to erect a border fence along the north and east sides of the car park when the development work is completed.

CHURCH CENTRE

Unfortunately we have been unable to fill the vacancy of centre manager therefore we have had to combine the efforts of the wardens, PCC members, and volunteers. We thank all the people who have helped to keep the centre functioning. We would like to thank Jocelyn Walsh for her work in coordinating the business of the centre and working with us on the all matters related to the church and centre business.

FAIR TRADE

Throughout 2019, supplies of foodstuffs and gifts for our Sunday Fairtrade stall were provided by Justicia.

Our regular Sunday stall continued to be held on the second Sunday of the month for the first half of 2019 and continued to be well supported. Sadly Pam Hodson was unable to staff the stall during the second half of the year and gave notice of her intention to stand down from the position of Fairtrade Organiser from the end of the year. It is hoped that someone will feel able to step into this role in 2020 to continue to provide a Fairtrade presence in our Church.

Fairtrade Fortnight in 2019 focused on a campaign to ensure that cocoa farmers are paid fairly for their work and are able to live a dignified life. We were encouraged to buy Fairtrade chocolate and cocoa, particularly during this week, as, while this selfless gesture on our part (!?!) doesn't immediately solve all the issues for the cocoa farmers, keeping up the demand for their products allows the farmers to sell more of their cocoa on Fairtrade terms, thus increasing their income.

We remain grateful to those who organise the goods for sale, those who help to staff the stalls and clear away afterwards, and especially those who purchase Fairtrade goods both here in Christ Church and elsewhere. Our small but significant contribution directly benefits more than 1.66 million people (farmers, workers and their families) in over 73 developing countries. Thank you.

CHRISTIAN AID

Christian Aid Week in 2019 focused on pre and postnatal care of the mother and child in Sierra Leone, a country where 10 mothers die every day during childbirth.

The funds raised from collections/activities during Christian Aid Week were therefore being used to help fund clinics, and provide medical and nursing care to the mother and child.

We circulated envelopes with our May edition of the Church magazine, carried out a small (5 collectors in 8 streets in the Parish) house to house collection, and distributed envelopes with hymn books at our Church services on the Sundays at the beginning and end of the week. Junior Church held a 'bucket' collection after the 9.30 service at the end of the week and we held a Christian Aid breakfast between the 8.00am and 9.30am services on that final Sunday.

Including our gift-aided donations, we raised £1205.15.

We are hugely grateful to all involved in the collections, those who helped to count the takings, those who donated, those who helped cook and serve at the breakfast, those who attended the breakfast and those who prayed for the work of Christian Aid during this month.

MAGAZINE

DEANERY SYNOD

The year opened in January with 'United in Christ' - a service at St. Luke's to celebrate the Deanery. The Area Dean, Vinny Whitworth, led the worship and described the Deanery as a place where people shared the same priorities and supported one another. We should encourage one another and continuously review our Mission Action Plan which has three priorities. - Growing Younger - engaging more effectively with younger generations through local schools; Growing Younger - engaging with young adults; Going Further - engaging our wider community.

He said that two issues face the Deanery - how to adapt to the reduction in stipendiary clergy and what to do about Church buildings. This was Vinny's last meeting as Area Dean. The new Area Dean is Rev Dr. Chris Bracegirdle.

For the second meeting in June we went to Bolton Hospice where John Hall, the Spiritual Care and Bereavement Support Lead talked about the work of the Hospice and his role there. He said that his role was to listen, not to tell people what to do.

Rachel Eden, Manager of the Children Changing Places Project was the speaker at the September meeting at St. Matthew's, Little Lever. The project began in January and will last five years. Its aim is to work with children, young people and families to make the Church accessible and appealing at all stages of life and particularly at points of transition.

At the November meeting Gill Smart spoke about her work as Chaplain to the University of Bolton. She said that her role was pastoral rather than religious and, as at all universities, she is not allowed to evangelize. She also spoke about the fire which had destroyed the Cube, a

building of student accommodation, the previous Friday. No-one was hurt, everyone had a bed that night and people all over the country had been very generous with donations.

It was lovely to use all the children and this year I had an unusual problem in that I had a lot of small boys but, in the end, just two girls. As always, I never know just what will happen, as we do not a rehearsal in the church and with the delight of the smallest of the Creche joining with us it was a special occasion. I am always very grateful to the parents who, at such a busy time, provide such fantastic costumes. I would like to thank the older children who come out to the Vestry to help. I equally would like to thank Kate Hodgkiss who covers for me. I would also thank the parents who come out with the children and help especially Alison Perry and Catherine Walmsley who has been a major support to me for many years.

YOUNG CHURCH - CENTRE GROUP

It has been a busy year for the Young Church members, who meet in the Centre. Joanna Steele joined our leadership team fully in September 2019 and brought new, refreshing and modern ideas and approaches to our meetings. She has suggested themes for wall displays and art work, which the children have completed with enthusiasm. For example, at Easter, we created individual colourful crosses and assembled them to form one large cross. In September, as part of our theme "Helping Hands", the children drew around their hands and created designs on them, which when cut out were arranged around an outline of the world, (which was created by one of our Young Church families) with the title "Helping Hands around the World."

In the Summer term of 2019, we took part in "Party in the Park," which was organised by St. Peter's (Halliwell). Little buns were made and donated along with tubes of icing and cake decorations and supporters of the event were invited to decorate them. It was a fine, sunny day and 6,000 people attended. Our stall was very busy and hugely popular and raised £100 in donations for Urban Outreach. The stall was decorated by triangular banners designed by children from all the Young Church groups, who joined together to create them. Thank you to all the leaders and helpers!

In the Autumn term of 2019, we concentrated on the theme of "Helping Others," linking our theme to the examples of the help that Jesus gave to the outcasts in His society and we also discussed the problems of homelessness and need in Bolton. Thus, we have encouraged the children to support "Urban Outreach" each week by bringing a small item of food. It was particularly poignant to hear the Archbishop of Canterbury's 2020 New Year message since it reflected our theme. Indeed, in an early January meeting, we covered the story of the Flight to

Egypt and compared the fact the Holy Family were asylum seekers in Egypt and in the same need as many people in Bolton find themselves in today. We encouraged the children to remember to bring clothes and household items for the ongoing appeal for the Destitution Project, which our church supports. It is good that our children realise how fortunate they are and how just a small contribution each week can make a difference to people's lives.

The run up to Christmas was particularly busy. We were invited to decorate a tree at Barrow Bridge Mission Church's bi-annual Christmas Tree Festival. The theme was "Carols" and we chose "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing." Once again, all the Young Church groups, including the crèche, joined together and created "Angels", comprising of: a body created using the music of the carol, which was concertina folded; wings, which were cut out from paper doilies; a face, which was made from circles of pink paper with features created with felt tips; hair, which was created with curled paper and ribbon, and halos, which were made out of pipe cleaners. Eventually, nearly 100 angels were created and we were joined by the Vicar on the first Sunday. Some of the angels went to Barrow Bridge Mission Church; some decorated the Christmas tree and the pillars in church; some were displayed on the wall in the centre, and some were photographed and featured on the Parish Christmas Card. We received many favourable comments and were delighted to learn that two visitors to Bolton took photos of them and intended to use the idea with children in Ireland and Sheffield. One Young Church member declared, "We have had such fun making the angels!" We extended the "angel" theme in our contribution at the Christingle service, singing the lively song "Faster than a Rocket". We also sang "Love Shine a Light", which linked to our "Helping Hands" theme. The children also delivered both the prayers and the readings.

Furthermore, our Autumn appeals demanded new targets. We were so delighted that our congregations and the local community provided 260 packets of chocolate biscuits and 260 bottles of Shloer for Urban Outreach's "Christmas Dinner on Jesus" as well as many toys for the Bolton Lions' "Caring Christmas" appeal.

In the Spring term of 2020, we have explored the story of the healing of the man at the pool of Bethesda (John 5 verse 1-15) and approached it slightly differently by asking if they had ever been asked a silly question. The children first talked about this with their partner and then shared their ideas with the whole group. We then discussed the idea that when Jesus asked the man "Do you want to be healed?" it could have been regarded as a silly question. The children soon deduced that perhaps the man might have been nervous of facing the world alone having been given food and been looked after for 38 years. We also scrutinised why Jesus told him to take up his mat as he could have left it for someone else and agreed that the mat held memories of the last 38 years for the man. Remembering, we suggested, is very important and we reminded the children that we remember all those who have perished or been injured in conflicts around the world on Remembrance Day each year and, as we introduced this story only a few days before World Holocaust Day, we also discussed the importance of remembering the suffering of the Jews in World War II. The following week, the children made their own mats and decorated them with memories that were important to them. These were displayed in the Centre.

We remain committed to ensuring that all the children continue to uphold our Christian Values throughout their journey as a Christian through varied, interesting and thought-provoking activities and discussions and we make sure that each child recognises that they are a valuable member of our Church family.

CHRIST CHURCH ABC GROUP (ADULTS BABIES AND CHILDREN)

Christ Church ABC Group runs on Wednesday afternoons during school term time from 1.30pm until 3pm and welcomes parents and carers with children under school age.

The ABC team consists of Jane Chapman, Heather Lowe, Lesley Youngman & Janet Balshaw. Each week we encourage parents & carers to chat and make new friends while the children play and participate in craft activities. Everybody joins in the singing to end the session.

We remain extremely grateful to our volunteer coffee bar helpers who allow us time to interact with the parents/carers and to help new parents/carers settle in and make friends. Since September we have 4 new volunteer helpers who have become a great addition to the team. 3 of them are ABC parents/carers whose children started school and they wanted to retain a link with the group.

The number of families attending ABC group remains consistent; there are 43 families on the register, with between 8 -12 families attending the group each week. The families tell us that they enjoy the intimate, friendly nature of the group. Many families have come back to the group with their second and third children.

For the first time in many years we have increased the small weekly financial contributions from the families. We felt this was necessary as we are now serving fruit at snack time which has increased our spending. We also need to be able to to purchase craft materials, replace toys and equipment, and to make charity donations and contribute to church purchases when possible. Our funds remain very low but our spending is covered and the group is accessible to all families.

The highlight of our year, enjoyed by all Adults, Babies and Children, was the Christmas Party. Sadly this year Bernard Lewis was unable to make his much loved appearance as Father Christmas. We are extremely grateful to him for all the years he has undertaken the role. The families always appreciate the opportunity to go into church with the vicar to hear the Nativity story. The cost of the Christmas party and children's gifts was covered by the weekly takings and a small contribution from the families.

Several ABC group families attended the Crib service, after which ABC group provided and served over 60 cups of coffee, juice and refreshments in the Church centre.

We feel privileged to continue to provide a link between the local community and the church and to maintain the tradition of having a group for Adults, Babies and Children at Christ Church. Jane Chapman

The MCC again manned the kitchen for the Pancake Party on Shrove Tuesday but it had a disappointing attendance and thought needs to be given to re-invigorating the event. Any suggestions from any member of CCH's congregation would be warmly welcomed. The timing of this year's event has been brought forward, resulting in an early start and, as a result, the MCC have been unable to organise it on this occasion but I do hope it is a success.

As usual, the MCC ran the Coffee Bar on Mothering Sunday on 31st March, without managing to poison anyone and with no H&S incidents! We look forward to doing the same again this year.

The MCC AGM was held on the 9th April, at which I was appointed Chairman. Adam Syddall was re-elected as MCC Honorary Secretary and Neville Beech was re-elected Honorary Treasurer. Andrew Minors and Peter Hodson were re-elected as members of the Committee and Geoffrey Pearson was elected to serve on it.

Four committee meetings were held during the year with the principal goal being to reintroduce some of the traditional MCC activities and social events. I believe we have achieved some success but I hope we can build on that in the current and future years.

In November, we hosted the joint annual meeting with the Mothers' Union and Don Astley & Stewart Cartwright of the Bolton branch of the Samaritans treated us to an excellent presentation of their work. Again, the event was well attended and my thanks, in particular, are due to Adam Syddall for arranging the accompanying pasty and pea supper. Don & Stewart gave the presentation for no financial reward so the MCC & MU made a small donation to Samaritans for their services.

As always, the MCC committee would appreciate any offers from anyone who would like to contribute to the work of the MCC to help maintain and organise our programme of events. At the same time, I would like to offer my thanks, and those of the committee, to everyone quietly fulfilling the many duties and roles without which CCH would not be able to thrive.

MOTHERS UNION

The Mothers` Union theme for 2019 was "Listen, Observe, Act - In Step with God". During our Global Listening process MULOA (Mothers` Union Listens, Observes and Acts) the voices of over 200,000 members worldwide were heard. This enabled Worldwide Council to draw together key emerging elements, and thus shape the way forward for us as a movement made up of over 4 million members. Since 1876 when Mary Sumner listened to God and acted upon his call by founding the MU, we have been working in the UK and worldwide tackling poverty and social injustice to improve family life.

We help families through Parenting groups, Prison ministry, Literacy and Financial education, providing "Away From It All" holiday schemes, emergency relief in times of crisis and promoting peace and reconciliation. Some members joined marches to protest against gender based violence. We are driven by our faith, working with people of all faiths and none. We are embedded in the Church and community with an unprecedented reach that gives a voice to the stigmatised and vulnerable around the world. Our members are anchored in their local communities - a rich diversity of cultures. They all share the common purpose of serving Christ by using their own time and resources to help people around them transform their lives. In addition, centrally raised funds from members and donors enable training and support for larger scale projects around the world, benefitting over 100,000 people each year.

Mothers` Union`s work is carried out by members, each in their unique way. It is fueled by people passionate about their faith.

Here at Christ Church we began 2019 with 56 members, including one member of the "Indoor Members' Prayer Circle". Very sadly we lost Sylvia Latham in July and Jeanne Lonnen moved away from the area.

Much of our work is centred on prayer, many of our members regularly attending the Corporate Communion Service on the first Wednesday of the month and each member having a "Families Worldwide" Prayer Diary. Our Branch hosted the Bolton Deanery Quiet Evening in February when Rev Alan Pierce led a very thoughtful service of prayer and reflection on the theme of "Listening". A number of our members attended the Deanery Festival Service held at St Catherine's in Farnworth in May and a few members attended the Diocesan Festival and Advent Carol Services held at St Ann's Church, Manchester in September and December.

This was a very popular venture and raised £200 in donations. This was

used to purchase Baptism books. Our Joint meeting with the Men of Christ Church was held in November when we had speakers from the "Samaritans" and enjoyed a Pasty Supper.

Socially we enjoyed a lunch in April at the Tavern Fayre and our Christmas meal once again at Ridgmont House. Our thanks to Margaret who kindly organised the lunch and to Alan who organised the Summer Supper and the Christmas meal.

Our Coffee Morning in March raised £493.09p of which we were able to send a donation of £450 to the "Make a Mother's Day" appeal.

With the proceeds from the Summer Supper we were able to send £200 to the MU Harvest Appeal and £200 to the MU Manchester projects. With the £200 for Baptism books we were able to make donations totaling £1,050.

Our Branch collected Easter Eggs and Christmas gifts for Fortalice which are always gratefully received.

The Knitting Group which continues to meet once a month (with growing numbers) gave many knitted items to Fortalice and the hospital.

Many of our members help with Church activities including ABC, Luncheon Club, Coffee bar, Church cleaning and flower arranging.

Our members help at the Baptism services. We are very grateful to Clare King for organising the rota and sending out the Baptism Anniversary cards.

Once again we organised the bunching of daffodils for Mothering Sunday; sharing the cost of the flowers with Women's Guild.

We also chose the hymns for the Mothering Sunday service.

We have been running the Branch with a very small committee and no Branch Leader since May 2015. I was most grateful - particularly last year - for all the help and support given by a most enthusiastic, loyal and hard working committee which was made up of Rev Alan Pierce, Margaret Goudge, Heather Wilkinson, Jan Pierce (as Treasurer up to March) and Ruth Syddall who took over as Treasurer. I did officially retire as Secretary last March as did the other committee members apart from Ruth. June Catterall joined the committee in March to give support.

I must give special mention and thanks to Heather and Peter Wilkinson for their production of event tickets and wonderful posters throughout the year. They also organised some amazing raffles for us.

We all continued as a committee until the end of the year. We are now grateful that Janet our Vicar and Ruth Syddall are endeavouring to keep the Branch running and providing a programme for 2020.

We all much appreciated the support of all our members who give so generously of their time, talents and Christian fellowship and love.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the Charities Act 2011 and in accordance with the Church Accounting Regulations 2006, together with applicable accounting standards and the Charities SORP.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for the valuation of investment assets, which are shown at market value.

The financial statements include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the PCC is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their main affiliation to another body nor those that are informal gatherings of Church members.

Funds

General Funds

These represent the funds of the PCC that are not subject to any restrictions regarding their use and are available for application on the general purposes of the PCC.

Designated Funds

These are Funds designated for particular purposes by the PCC and are also unrestricted as the PCC can reassign those monies if it so desires.

Restricted Funds

These can only be used for their stated purpose(s).

The Church has the following specific funds -

Church Buildings and Grounds Maintenance Funds

To provide funds for the maintenance of the Church and its environs without recourse to realising fixed assets and to enable such maintenance to be undertaken at short notice.

Organ and Choir Funds

To provide funds for the maintenance of the Organ and support of the Choir.

A transfer from the General Fund is made in lieu of the organists Honorarium.

PCC Property Funds

To provide funds for the maintenance of the properties at Welbeck Rd and Markland Hill.

Youth Work Fund

To provide funds for employment of a Youth Worker and associated costs

Special Projects Fund

To provide funds for such individual projects as PCC decides

Incoming Resources

Voluntary income and capital sources

Collections are recognised when received by or on behalf of the PCC.

Planned giving receivable under Gift Aid is recognised only when received.

Income tax recoverable on gift aided donations is recognised when the donation is recognised.

Grants and legacies to the PCC are accounted for as soon as the PCC is notified of its legal entitlement and the amount due.

Income from investments

Dividends and interest are accounted for when receivable. Tax recoverable on such income is recognised in the same accounting year.

Rental income from the letting of church premises is recognised when the rental is due.

Gains and losses on investments

Realised gains or losses are recognised when investments are sold.

Unrealised gains or losses are accounted for on revaluation of investments at 31 December.

Resources used

Grants

Grants and donations are accounted for when paid over, or when awarded, if that award creates a binding obligation of the PCC.

Activities directly relating to the work of the Church

The parish share or diocesan quota is accounted for when paid. Any share unpaid is not accrued at the year end (unless a balance payment has been committed by the PCC) as no legal liability exists.

Fixed assets

Consecrated land and buildings and moveable church furnishings

Consecrated and beneficed property is excluded from the accounts by s.96(2)(a) of the Charities Act 1993

No value is placed on moveable church furnishings held by the churchwardens on special trust for the PCC and which require a faculty for disposal since the PCC considers this to be inalienable property. All expenditure incurred during the year on consecrated or benefice buildings and moveable church furnishings, whether maintenance or improvement, is written off as expenditure on purchase.

Other fixtures, fittings and office equipment

Equipment used within the church premises is depreciated on a straight line basis over 4 years. Individual items of equipment with a purchase price of £4,000 or less are written off when the asset is acquired.

Investments

Investments are valued at market value at 31 December.

Current assets

Amounts owing to the PCC at 31 December in respect of fees, rents or other income are shown as debtors less provision.

Short-term deposits include cash held on deposit either with the CBF Church of England Funds or at the bank.

This was renewed with effect from 25 December 1988 for a further 25 years then by counterpart lease dated 21st December 1994. As disposal of this asset is not possible for the foreseeable future, and income is effectively NIL, no value has been assigned to this property in the accounts accounts. The Scout Hut itself is not owned by the Church

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the Charities Act 2011 and in accordance with the Church Accounting Regulations 2006, together with applicable accounting standards and the Charities SORP.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for the valuation of investment assets, which are shown at market value.

The financial statements include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the PCC is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their main affiliation to another body nor those that are informal gatherings of Church members.

Funds

General Funds

These represent the funds of the PCC that are not subject to any restrictions regarding their use and are available for application on the general purposes of the PCC.

Designated Funds

These are Funds designated for particular purposes by the PCC and are also unrestricted as the PCC can reassign those monies if it so desires.

Restricted Funds

These can only be used for their stated purpose(s).

The Church has the following specific funds -

Church Buildings and Grounds Maintenance Funds

To provide funds for the maintenance of the Church and its environs without recourse to realising fixed assets and to enable such maintenance to be undertaken at short notice.

Organ and Choir Funds

To provide funds for the maintenance of the Organ and support of the Choir.

A transfer from the General Fund is made in lieu of the organists Honorarium.

PCC Property Funds

To provide funds for the maintenance of the properties at Welbeck Rd and Markland Hill.

Youth Work Fund

To provide funds for employment of a Youth Worker and associated costs

Special Projects Fund

To provide funds for such individual projects as PCC decides

Incoming Resources

Voluntary income and capital sources

Collections are recognised when received by or on behalf of the PCC.

Planned giving receivable under Gift Aid is recognised only when received.

Income tax recoverable on gift aided donations is recognised when the donation is recognised.

Grants and legacies to the PCC are accounted for as soon as the PCC is notified of its legal entitlement and the amount due.

Income from investments

Dividends and interest are accounted for when receivable. Tax recoverable on such income is recognised in the same accounting year.

Rental income from the letting of church premises is recognised when the rental is due.

Gains and losses on investments

Realised gains or losses are recognised when investments are sold.

Unrealised gains or losses are accounted for on revaluation of investments at 31 December.

Resources used

Grants

Grants and donations are accounted for when paid over, or when awarded, if that award creates a binding obligation of the PCC.

Activities directly relating to the work of the Church

The parish share or diocesan quota is accounted for when paid. Any share unpaid is not accrued at the year end (unless a balance payment has been committed by the PCC) as no legal liability exists.

Fixed assets

Consecrated land and buildings and moveable church furnishings

Consecrated and beneficed property is excluded from the accounts by s.96(2)(a) of the Charities Act 1993

No value is placed on moveable church furnishings held by the churchwardens on special trust for the PCC and which require a faculty for disposal since the PCC considers this to be inalienable property. All expenditure incurred during the year on consecrated or benefice buildings and moveable church furnishings, whether maintenance or improvement, is written off as expenditure on purchase.

Other fixtures, fittings and office equipment

Equipment used within the church premises is depreciated on a straight line basis over 4 years. Individual items of equipment with a purchase price of £4,000 or less are written off when the asset is acquired.

Investments

Investments are valued at market value at 31 December.

Current assets

Amounts owing to the PCC at 31 December in respect of fees, rents or other income are shown as debtors less provision.

Short-term deposits include cash held on deposit either with the CBF Church of England Funds or at the bank.

Land at Scout Hut, Markland Hill, Bolton

The land on which the Scout Hut was built was leased to the 17th Bolton (Christ Church Heaton) Scout group on 31 December 1963 for 25 years at a rent of One Shilling per Annum. This was renewed with effect from 25 December 1988 for a further 25 years then by counterpart lease dated 21st December 1994. As disposal of this asset is not possible for the foreseeable future, and income is effectively NIL, no value has been assigned to this property in the accounts accounts. The Scout Hut itself is not owned by the Church
