We were delighted to support new initiatives in the realm of education and the alleviation of poverty this past year.

We have supported the Amos Bursary which aims to provide bursaries to talented young women of African and Caribbean heritage in the UK, to help fulfil their academic potential.

In addition, we have made grants to Children on the Edge, a programme which assists Congolese refugee children with early childhood development in Uganda.

Amidst the uncertainty and volatility, we are proud to have maintained our partnerships and that our approach to giving, based on trust and the ethical leadership of our partners, has shown much resilience.

Notwithstanding this, like most charities, resources have been curtailed. As a result, the Foundation has found a renewed focus with a common long-term vision to empower change, which has enabled us to ensure that our partnerships have kept thriving. We are determined to honour our commitment to charity.

As part of our plans for the future, we complemented the 2019 grants making cycle with "in kind" services and carried out pro bono work during the first quarter of 2020. As soon as it was deemed feasible by the trustees, the Foundation offered financial support to our partners who have courageously continued throughout the pandemic to help those in need, providing food, medical services and education.

We thank our partners for their heroic efforts and as a family we look forward to the year ahead. We hope to build on and develop our partnerships to ensure that we progress towards fulfilling our long-term vision of helping with education, health and the alleviation of poverty worldwide. We are determined to keep empowering those who are changing the world through one act of kindness at a time.

TRUSTEES' REPORT for the year ended 5th April 2020

The trustees present their report and audited financial statements for the year ended 5th April 2020.

Structure, governance and management

The JMCMRJ Sorrell Foundation is a registered charity constituted by trust deed, dated 13th March 2007.

The charity is managed by its trustees, whose number must be at least three and those who served during the year were Sir Martin Sorrell, Cristiana Falcone Lady Sorrell, M.R.A. Sorrell, R.A. Sorrell and J.E.H Sorrell.

Appointment of trustees is governed by the trust deed and any new trustee must be appointed by a resolution at a special meeting. In selecting individuals for appointment, the trustees must have regard to the skills, knowledge and experience needed for the effective administration of the charity.

The trustees communicate regularly and meet as relevant to review the progress and policies of the charity and to determine the allocation of grants.

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed and feel that the principal risk is a fall in value of its listed investments. Those risks related to governance and the operations and finance of the charity are considered to be low, yet the trustees, acknowledging the increasing giving capabilities of the charity, are constantly striving to proactively improve the processes and systems in place to mitigate risk while ensuring operational impact. The Chief Executive Officer has regular meetings with the bankers to explore best sustainable investment strategies and the quest for efficiencies in managing the foundation is a top priority.

Objectives and activities

The objectives of the charity, as detailed in the trust deed, are to apply its income to such legally charitable trusts, companies, associations or institutions or for such legally charitable purpose or purposes as the trustees shall from time to time in their absolute discretion determine.

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

Financial review

The Charity's total holding in WPP plc, at the balance sheet date was 5,475,936 shares with a market value of £26,487,102. The charity does not seek donations from the general public.

Dividend income of £3,285,561 and interest of £6,226 was received during the year.

TRUSTEES' REPORT for the year ended 5th April 2020 (continued)

Under the terms of the trust deed, the charity has the power to make any investment which the trustees in their discretion see fit. Currently, the charity holds UK listed investments with a view to producing dividend income which can be applied for charitable purposes. The charity has also invested £64,439 (US\$100,000) in the common stock of a New York benefit corporation which has developed a low cost renewable energy lighting product which it markets in underdeveloped countries.

Achievements, performance and future plans

The JMCMRJ Foundation supports projects which uphold the Foundation's vision and mission of empowering communities and improving humanity through innovative inter-disciplinary interventions by supporting pioneering initiatives in health, inter-faith dialogue, education and poverty alleviation worldwide.

During the year the charity made grants of £2,629,934 (see note 4.1) primarily for the advancement of education, the improvement of health standards, the alleviation of poverty worldwide and the promotion of inter-religious dialogue and understanding. In accordance with the charity's objectives and the trustees plan to make similar grants in the forthcoming years.

Significant grants made during the year include the following:-

Grants for the advancement of education:

The Paley Center

The Paley Center for Media in the United States leads the discussion about the cultural, creative and social significance of television, radio and emerging platforms for the professional community and media-interested public. Donations are used to offer on-site classes, videoconferencing classes and workshops for educators as well as summer camps and classes for students.

Carnegie Hall

Carnegie Hall is based in New York. Its mission is to present extraordinary music and musicians on the three stages of this legendary hall, to bring the transformative power of music to the widest possible audience, to provide visionary education programs, and to foster the future of music through the cultivation of new works, artists and audiences.

Amos Bursary

The Amos Bursary exists to ensure that talented men of Afro-Caribbean descent have the opportunity to excel in education and beyond

Burning Man Project

Burning Man Project are a learning and teaching organisation. The donation is to support important initiatives such as cultural leadership curriculum and volunteer training modules.

The Royal Foundation

The programmes currently revolve around main themes of work, mental health, early years, wildlife conservation and emergency responders. The grant will be applied towards redevelopment of the schools facilities, including a new science building.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the year ended 5th April 2020

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities; Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepare under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are included at market value as modified by the revaluation of certain assets.

1.2 Incoming resources

Donations and any associated Gift Aid claimed, dividends and bank interest are accounted for on a receivable basis. Donated investments are recorded as income at market value on the date of receipt. Services donated by the trustees are not accounted for unless the benefit to the charity is reasonably quantifiable and measurable.

1.3 Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and allocated directly to the appropriate activity cost. Grants payable, which represent donations to charitable causes in furtherance of the charity's objectives, are accounted for when they are paid or when future grants have been committed in writing by the trustees.

1.4 Fixed asset Investments

Listed investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date and any unrealised gains and losses are included in the statement of financial activities. Programme related investments, which represent equity interests, are stated at cost less provision for permanent diminution in value.

1.5 Expendable endowment fund

The expendable endowment fund comprises shares gifted to the Charity over several years by Sir Martin Sorrell, with a market value at the 5th April 2020 of £26,487,102.

1.6 General unrestricted income fund

The charity maintains an unrestricted income fund at a level which provides sufficient funds to cover management and administration and direct charitable expenditure. The income from the investments held in the expendable endowment fund is not restricted and, accordingly, is credited to the unrestricted income fund.

1.7 Foreign currencies

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are translated at the rate of exchange ruling at the date of the transaction. All exchange differences are dealt with in the statement of financial activities
