#### The Heaton Woods Trust Chairman's Report 2020

The Heaton Woods Trust is a registered charity and like many charities at the moment we struggle to keep going at times so I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of our members for all your help and aid. If it wasn't for our generous members the Trust would not be one of the most beautiful, well managed and well maintained woodlands in the country.

The past twelve months have had its ups and downs for the Trust. As well as the usual vandalisms, we seem to have had a large number of fires in the woods resulting in the fire brigade being called. Some were the result of hot BBQ coals being left in the grass, and some were deliberate acts such as a burnt out motor bike (that the police swiftly removed) and the large tunnel that was located on the play area. The tunnel was a created by hollowing out a large tree trunk so it could be used on the play area; unfortunately the tunnel was no longer safe after the fire was extinguished however we are hoping to replace it as soon as we have another large tree trunk.

#### Covid-19

When the Covid-19 pandemic struck the government introduced the "lock down". Part of the governments measures/guidelines were that social gatherings were not permitted. Regrettably, the Trust were experiencing issues with some people not abiding by these restrictions, hence after consulting with the Charities Commission and Public Health England we were advised to close the woods. The Committee were faced with a difficult decision, but we concluded that the safest option was to close the sections of land where the groups has been congregating. This was a very difficult decision to make and was not made lightly. We were only closed for a little over 2 weeks which is when the government started to relax the guidelines. When the Trust was able to reopen we received an increase in new members, many of the new members live near the woods but had never ventured into the woods before the lockdown. Thankfully, the majority of our membership base understood why had to close and I would like to thank them for their patience's in this matter.

#### **Land Sale**

Over the past several years the Trust has been struggling financially. The vast majority of work done on Trust land is on a voluntary basis, however it still cost the Trust between £6,000 - £9,000 per year to maintain and run the Trust. This meant we only had enough funds to last a year or two. However, one of our land neighbours approached the Trust offering to purchase a small, narrow strip of land which was approximately 80yrd long and 6yrd wide. The strip of land was virtually inaccessible from Trust land due to the elevation of the ground and the severity of the overgrown vegetation hence was of no use to the Trust. The Trust eventually received an offer of £54,000.00. After much consultation with the Charities Commission, solicitors, estate agents and solicitors all the factors were taken into account. It was decided that this was a very good offer and would secure the financial future of the Trust for many years to come hence the Trust accepted the offer. After the solicitor fee's were taken into account the Trust received £53,035.00 which has enabled the Trust to purchase some much needed equipment including a small ride on mower that is used to keep the overhanging grass away from the path edge.

#### **Conservational Work**

The Trust was informed that an organisation called BASC were providing bat boxes and bird boxes for organisations involved in conservation work. The Trust contacting this organisation to see if they would be willing to donate some to the Trust. After informing BASC about the work of the Trust and what we try to achieve they agreed to provide the boxes and asked if we would require any further assistance because they have a large conservation department and would be happy to help the Trust

with various projects. The plan that we are entering into with BASC is that there will be various ecological surveys carried out to ascertain the current biodiversity of the Trust and to find out what species of flora and fauna are on Trust land. We will then be starting joint working parties, with an aim to teach other people conservation management techniques and hopefully build a regular volunteer group for the Trust. The various tasks that we will be looking to do with the volunteers will range from installing bird boxes, to creating duck nesting tubes, to creating wild flower meadows. Needless to say, the tasks will be wide ranging in the hope of further increasing the biodiversity of The Heaton Woods Trust. The arrangement will be beneficial to both organisations, BASC will have somewhere to teach conservation management techniques and the Trust will be able to carry out more conservation work within the woodland through the help of additional volunteers. An invitation will be sent out to all members about volunteering, anyone will be welcome regardless if they are a member or not.

Again, I would just like to thank all of our members for their continued support and all the hard work people have put into the Trust over the years, if it wasn't for the past and present volunteers The Heaton Woods Trust would not be the beautiful place that it is.
