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Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 March 2020

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2020. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Executive Summary 19/20

Introduction and Highlights

The year April 2019 to March 2020 saw HighTide continue its charitable mission to develop new and emerging playwrights through commissioning and producing their work on tour and in festivals. Following a 10-year tenure, Steven Atkinson stepped down as Artistic Director and CEO. Steven is succeeded by Suba Das, whose first HighTide season will take place in 2021.

HighTide produced two theatre co-productions, five associate productions and one festival.

HighTide's core co-productions were RUST by Kenny Emson, co-produced with The Bush Theatre London, and LIT by Sophie Ellerby co-produced by Nottingham Playhouse. Both productions were part of the Aldeburgh Festival 2019.

In addition to these two productions, HighTide served as associate producer on four more productions: Collapsible by Margaret Perry, POPS by Charlotte Josephine and a double bill with Queer House, Since U Been Gone by Teddy Lamb and Pink Lemonade by Mika Johnson. These productions premiered at the 2019 Edinburgh Fringe as part of the 'Disruption' season, a collaboration with the major Edinburgh producer and venue Assembly. 'Disruption' showed HighTide's continued commitment to supporting exciting theatre makers and providing them with the very best platform to be heard. 5600 audience members saw a performance as part of the season, and all four plays transferred to the HighTide Aldeburgh Festival. Collapsible, Since U Been Gone and Pink Lemonade had subsequent London runs.

In Aldeburgh, HighTide continued to provide Summer Connect, an enrichment programme for young people running throughout the Summer school term. This culminated in a performance at the Aldeburgh Festival launch. The charity also subsidised 250 tickets for local primary school children and 30 Vulnerable Young Adults to attend the festival.

HighTide partnered with BBC Radio 3 on two new commissions by alumni HighTide writers Tallulah Brown and Vinay Patel. The plays were directed by Jessica Dromgoole and were recorded at Aldeburgh Festival and broadcast on BBC in November 2019.

Following a proposed reduction in the level of funding support offered by Waltham Forest Borough Council, the company chose not to pursue a 2019 Walthamstow Festival in London; instead showcasing its main commissions in London and reaching over 4000 audience members, at the Bush Theatre (RUST); and Clapham Omnibus (LIT); together with MOUTHPIECE by Kieran Hurley transferring to Soho Theatre following its premiere at Edinburgh's Traverse Theatre in December 2018.

The decision to suspend the Walthamstow Festival further allowed a reallocation of resources to work in the East of England, creating new working partnerships with Suffolk County Council, Britten Pears Arts and Dance East; alongside presentation of new work at Suffolk's major arts festival Latitude; and the inaugural edition of Arts Council-supported First Light Festival (Lowestoft). The success of the presentations at these festivals resulted in an invitation to fully take over theatre programming at these festivals in their planned 2020 editions.

HighTide continued to benefit from the support of major corporate supporter, Lansons. Lansons sponsored productions across the year and continued their generous support of office space in central. London. Additional major supports in the year were: Backstage Trust, Foyle Foundation and Arts Council England.

HighTide was supported by Backstage Trust to launch an artist development programme designed to help new independent playwrights, directors and producers to maximise the opportunities of performing at the 2019 Edinburgh Festival Fringe, creating the 'Disruption' season in partnership with Assembly. The experience proved to be a huge success for the participants and HighTide.

HighTide selected four productions to co-produce at the 2019 Edinburgh Fringe drawn from an open-to-all application scheme. The selected productions were diverse in their content and culturally diverse in the artists making them.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES Resilience

2019/20 saw HighTide maintain its track-record of fundraising which included continuing support from Backstage Trust, The Foyle Foundation, The Sumner Wilson Charitable Trust and The Parham Trust as well as new supporters including D'Oyly Carte and The Lord Belstead Charitable Foundation and Fenton Arts. HighTide enjoyed the continued corporate sponsorship of Lansons, and The Agency, and have increased our support from local East of England supports including The Suffolk Community Foundation and Aldeburgh Town Council. HighTide have also been successful in developing sponsorship with local Aldeburgh businesses.

HighTide ended the year with net expenditure of £68,730 and a closing reserves of £34,953.

During 2019-20, £30,000 was used from reserves to support the transition of Artistic Directors as an approved use of funds. Further unforeseen changes in allocated expenditure and income, including a significantly reduced Theatre Tax Claim due to the cancellation of HighTide's Walthamstow Festival, saw further demands on the company's reserves. Overall the reserves reduced from £103,683 to £34,953. While the closing reserves position is satisfactory to the company's major funder, Arts Council England, a reserves recovery plan is in place for the following financial years, which will see incremental increases to the position.

As always, HighTide is exceptionally grateful to its investors, including Arts Council England through National Portfolio funding, Backstage Trust, Lansons and the many trusts and foundations, businesses and individuals who contribute their energy and investment to the charity. The trustees extend their sincere thanks and gratitude for this support.

STRATEGIC REPORT

Achievement and performance

Strategic Summary

This year HighTide met its goals to develop as a progressive and inclusive charity, such as achieving gender parity in playwright commissions and directors by producing minimum 50% work by female artists. HighTide also quadrupled its touring audience targets and tripled the press coverage for work.

HighTide continued its work to support Arts Council England's Creative Case for Diversity with one of the three commissioned plays written by a writer of colour.

Under new artistic leadership, a refreshed Business Plan has now been created for the organisation, for implementation and delivery from 2020/2021 onwards with refocused KPIs intended to realign the company's delivery towards greater impact for audiences and artists in the East of England, in line with the principal funder Arts Council's new Ten Year Strategy, 'Let's Create', which was launched in January 2020.

Future plans 2020/2021 Commissions

Ben Weatherill - Ben Weatherill is one of the UK's most exciting new voices, with his second play Jellyfish recently transferring from the Bush to the National Theatre. For HighTide and as part of artistically growing our links to the East of England, Ben will adapt for the stage the diaries of Suffolk's greatest artist of the 20th Century, the composer Benjamin Britten.

OTHER

The new Business Plan was developed to re-focus activity in the East of England throughout the 2020/21 year, including artist development and participatory programmes, building towards a refreshed Festival format in Spring 2021, with HighTide productions and activities taking place in multiple locations across the East of England. The Covid-19 pandemic began at the end of the 19/20 year, resulting in the further realignment of these plans to create the company's "Lighthouse Programme", a package of emergency measures designed to support writers nationally and provide creative opportunities in the East of England. At time of writing, this programme has been a great success, with the company remaining financially stable throughout the period.

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of HighTide Festival Productions Limited (the 'charitable company') for the year ended 31 March 2020 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Statement of Financial Position, the Statement of Cash Flows and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 March 2020

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charitable company has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

• the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Government Grants

The Charity is an Arts Council England national portfolio organisation. As a result of this status they received £191,654 (2018: £191,654 in grants from this governmental funded organisation.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

In accordance with the charity SORP, HighTide allocates costs incurred directly from undertaking activities that contribute towards our charitable objectives to charitable activity expenditure.

The support costs of the charity are allocated to each charitable activity based on the amount of time spent on each activity.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
