## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEESFOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MAY 2020

The Board of Trustees presents its report and the accounts of the Federation for the year ended 31 May 2020 which is also prepared to meet the requirements of a director's report and accounts for Companies Act purposes.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in notes to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities published on 16 July 2014.

In preparing this annual report the Trustees confirm that due regard has been paid to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission.

### **Objectives of the Federation**

The objectives of the Federation are to further the purpose of the Women's Institute Movement in Dorset and elsewhere; to offer opportunities for women to enjoy friendship, learn new skills, to widen their horizons and to influence local, national and international affairs for the public benefit.

The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Federation's aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

## **Financial Review**

The Federation has this year achieved a net surplus of £5,419 (2019 - £297.00).

Total unrestricted funds at 31 May 2020 were £429450. The Trustees are confident that sufficient funds are held to enable the Federation to continue in operation for the foreseeable future.

#### Structure, governance and management

The Federation was incorporated on 12 June 1992 as a company limited by guarantee (number 2722759) and is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission (number 1041714). Its memorandum and articles of association govern the affairs of the Federation. The liability of the members, in the event of the Federation being wound up, is limited to a sum not exceeding £1.

Members of the Board of Trustees are the directors of the charitable company and its trustees for the purposes of charity law, and are elected in accordance with the Federation articles of association.

The Board of Trustees is responsible for the management of the business and the exercise of all powers of the Federation. It consists of not less than eight and not more than fifteen persons elected bi annually either by nomination by a Committee Member or a Dorset Women's Institute and election at an annual meeting, or by co-option by the Board of Trustees (up to a maximum of one-third of the number of elected Board Members). Induction and training is provided as required.

The honorary officers of the Federation are the Chairman, Treasurer, and between one and three Vice-Chairmen, elected by the Board of Trustees from among their number to hold office until the next annual meeting. The officers of the Federation are ex-officio members of all sub-committees.

The Federation Secretary is appointed by the Board of Trustees, who determines remuneration and term of office, but is not a member of the Board.

The Federation is a member of the National Federation of Women's Institutes of England, Wales, Jersey, Guernsey and the Isle of Man.

## **Chairman's Report**

The Board met nine times during the year. This number was restricted owing to the country going into lockdown as a result of the Covid 19 pandemic. Marilyn Holehouse remained as Federation Chair until October 2019 when Jenny Preston was elected to the role. Kath Burt remained as Treasurer and Linda Barber remained as Vice Chairman. Jenny Preston remained as Vice Chairman until October 2019. Jackie Brown was elected Vice Chairman in October 2019 also acting as Digital Representative and Chairman of the Public Affairs sub-committee before stepping down. Linda Barber represented the Board on the Membership and Support Sub-committee and heads up Speakers' Audition days. Jenny Preston continued as Chair of the Events Sub-committee and Denman Ambassador until October2019.

Nine Board of Trustees members were elected into office in October 2019. The Board consisted of the four Officers, with Liz Beeson, Editor of Dorset WI News, Tess Burt Assistant Treasurer, Esme Isaacs, ACWW Representative and Carol Brown, Resolutions Representative and Climate Ambassador and Marilyn Holehouse, Denman Ambassador and Federation Archivist. Jan Watson was appointed to the Board of Trustees in November 2019. Yvonne Marsh, Chairman of the Membership and Support sub-committee and Margaret Bunch, Chairman of the Events subcommittee were co-opted in November 2019. Other Federation roles were held by Elaine Knight, member of the Events Sub-committee, Major Fund Raising Co-ordinator (Camp Bestival), Jane Doughty, WI member, Web Editor for the Board and Kim Cowling, WI member, Digital Co-ordinator. In December 2019 Isabell van Millingen was appointed the new editor of Dorset WI News.

During the year Jenny Preston and Kath Burt represented Dorset Federation at the NFWI Annual Council Meeting in October 2019. Carol Brown attended the short listing of the NFWI Resolutions in October 2019. The Annual Meeting was held in October 2019 with James Cossins, The Armed Forces Diversity Engagement Team and Tom Heap as the speakers.

The staff continued in their positions, Diane Towndrow, Federation Secretary and also the Company Secretary, Sara Wood Financial Manager and Linda Bastian, Receptionist/Administration Assistant. Diane Towndrow oversaw the arrangements for the Federation, the NFWI Annual Meeting and the DFWI Annual Meeting. The staff worked effectively throughout the year to deal with all enquiries, and the different requests that came into the office. Owing to Covid 19 and lockdown one member of staff was furloughed and the other two worked from home.

Our new office was opened officially on 26<sup>th</sup> September 2019 by the Lord Lieutenant of Dorset and was attended by the Mayor of Dorchester and invited guests.

At the 31st May 2020 there were 3,439 members in 85 WIs in Dorset. During the year 6 WIs closed, Bridport, Gillingham Afternoon, Halstock, Pimms and Needles, Walditch Morning and West Parley and one new WI opened in Swanage. Membership was down on the previous year which reflected the change of population patterns and the age profile of the county.

The Membership and Support Sub-committee continued to support the Dorset membership in the setting up, running and suspensions of WIs in the county. They again ran successful training days for Presidents, Secretaries and Treasurers. Also, along with the Resolution Representative and the Public Affairs sub-committee, briefing meetings where held on the selected NFWI Resolutions for delegates voting at the 2020 NFWI Annual Meeting which was, of course, later cancelled.

One new WI Adviser, Jackie McIntyre, was appointed during the year.

The Events Sub-committee continued to provide craft, sport and educational activities for members to enjoy. Craft workshops, themed lunches, skittles, golf croquet and kurling competitions with trips to interesting places and events were held during the year. Two successful Carol Festivals were held in November and December 2019. All of our Events activities since lockdown began in March 2020 have been cancelled resulting in a severe blow to our finances. Future plans are tentative depending on Government guidelines.

The Federation again ran a very popular WI Tea Tent at Camp Bestival at Lulworth Castle, selling a variety of light refreshments including cakes made by members and which helped to bring in much needed funds for the Dorset Federation.

The disruption to our planned activities and meetings both at Federation and Institute level have caused great concern and the introduction of Zoom meetings has helped, to some degree, to alleviate this.

The Public Affairs Sub-committee was disbanded in November 2019 as insufficient members made it no longer viable.

The Board of Trustees and staff will be working towards minimizing the impact of the pandemic on our finances in 2020 – 2021. They will continue to support WIs by delivering a varied programme of learning opportunities, information and social events, making use of the improved meeting room facilities of the Poundbury premises in accordance with Government guidelines. The Microsoft Office 365 facility has been taken up by Federation volunteers and many WIs. Our Facebook page continues to thrive under the direction of Kim Cowling and the Comms Goup.

## ACCOUNTING POLICIES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MAY 2020

#### Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the company for the year ended 31 May 2020 have been prepared in accordance with the provisions of FRS 102 and the Companies Act 2006.

#### **Basis of preparation**

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the FRS 102 and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for certain properties and financial instruments that are measured at revalued amounts or fair values, as explained in the accounting policies below. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for assets. The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the company's financial statements.

### **Cash flow statement**

The Company has availed of the exemption in FRS 102 Section 7 from the requirement to prepare a Cash Flow Statement because it is classified as a small company.

### Income

All income is recognised when the Federation has entitlement to the income, there is sufficient certainty of receipt and so it is probably that the income will be received, and the amount receivable can be measured reliably.

Subscriptions, donations and member's insurance receipts for when received by the Federation.

The Federation receives the benefit of work carried out by volunteers, the value of which is not included in the accounts.

#### Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure, it is probable that settlement will required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered.

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the statement of financial activities as they are incurred.

## Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost or at valuation, less accumulated depreciation. The charge to depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost of valuation of tangible fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows:

Freehold Buildings	2% straight line
Fixtures, fittings and equipment	15% reducing balance
Computer and IT equipment	25% straight line

The carrying values of tangible assets are review annually for impairment in periods if events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying value may not be recoverable.

### ACCOUNTING POLICIES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MAY 2020

### Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower cost and net realisable value. Stocks are determined on a first-in, first out basis. Cost comprises expenditure incurred in the normal course of business in bringing stocks to their present location and condition. Full provision is made for obsolete and slow moving items. Net realisable value comprises of actual or estimated selling price (net of discounts) less all further costs to completion or to be incurred in marketing and selling.

### **Debtors and creditors**

Debtors and creditors are initially recognised at fair value and thereafter stated at amortised cost using the effective interest method less impairment, unless the effect of discounting would be immaterial, in which case they are stated at cost.

Debtors and creditors are stated with no interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price.

#### Funds

Unrestricted income funds are general funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects of the Federation at the discretion of the Board of Trustees.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds that are set aside at the Board's discretion for particular purposes. Restricted income funds are subject to restrictions on their expenditure having been received for a specific restricted project or purpose.

#### Purposes of unrestricted funds:

The **designate headquarter fund** has been designated by the Board to cover headquarter expenses.

The **per Capita fund** has been designated by the Board to cover expenses re AGM attendance.

#### Purposes of restricted funds:

The **National Federation subscriptions** fund represents affiliation fees collected from individual WIs and paid over to the National Federation.

**Suspended WI** funds are received on the suspension of individual WIs and held by the Dorset Federation until the WI is revived or for three years, after which funds are transferred to the County Federation.

**The Denman Room** fund represents funds received, restricted by the donors and by the terms of appeal, for the specific purpose of furnishing and maintaining the Dorset Room at Denman College. Transfers have been made to unrestricted funds to reimburse Denman Room payments made out of general funds.

**ACWW** donations are collected the individual WIs and paid over to the Associated Country Women of the World. Affiliation fees are paid out of restricted funds.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MAY 2020

The Board of Trustees considers that the Federation holds sufficient resources to enable each fund to be applied in accordance with any restrictions.

## **12.** Related parties and control

There were no related party transactions in either year.

The Federation is constituted as a charitable company limited by guarantee and with no share capital. Control of the company is therefore vested in the Board of Trustees.
