FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2020

The trustees, for the purpose of company law, are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company Law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that year.

In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;

- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;

- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;

- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and

- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2020

The trustees present their report and financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2020.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016).

Vision

York City Football Club Foundation was established in 2014 with the vision : "to support the local community by providing sport and physical activity; educational; social and healthy lifestyle opportunities, and ensuring that our contributions have a realistic opportunity of making a positive impact".

The fundamental aim of the Scheme has been to find ways of supporting the local community by providing opportunities for physical activity, social elements and enjoyment, as well as creating a pathway for development, talent and competition for all ages.

Origins

In 2007 York City in the Community (YCITC) was created by York City Football Club with a small team of coaches employed to embrace delivering football in the community, predominantly working within schools in the York area. The Football Club support for the programme has always been vital although over the years, the programme has grown immensely and developed a much wider focus by achieving charitable status as York City FC Foundation.

Impact

The impactful work of the Foundation is aimed at improving community cohesion; reducing social isolation and loneliness; addressing holiday hunger and young people's health; promoting social prescribing models and partnership working in numerous guises with national, regional and local organisations and services across the City.

The Foundation also works hard to use their standing in the Community to raise awareness for relevant national campaigns including in recent years: Suicide Safer York; Cancer Champions and the homeless community and services in York.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2020

Achievements and performance

The Charity had been heading for a record year in terms of financial performance and activity levels until the Covid-19 pandemic struck. From that point on the word "unprecedented" applied to the charity as much as it did to the World's population.

Despite the effects of the pandemic, the Charity continued to progress and evolve, and its ongoing good work supporting parts of the community that are under-privileged and in need of support has been maintained including during the Covid-19 lockdown. It has still carried out work for the purpose it was created, to help tackle some of the key social issues such as loneliness, mental health, lack of physical activity and specific health issues.

Sports Participation

The girls Regional Talent Club which has the highest Tier 1 status has continued to perform well. The Club is now managed by Jill Stacey as Technical Director, who picked up the reins with great enthusiasm from March and remained firmly at the helm during the lockdown period. She, Rosie Todd, as the new Club Manager, and the staff team have worked incredibly hard to maintain standards and improve performance and her efforts during the lockdown were exemplary keeping contact with the players and setting up events to maintain the spirit within the club. This section of the Foundation fits well with the work already undertaken around female football engagement and development.

Activities with schools continued and flourished, including the Premier League Primary Stars programme, until this had to stop during lockdown and it will be some time before all of the schools the Foundation work with will look to restart.

The schools outreach programme aimed at Physical and Mental Health and wellbeing of primary school age students, moved into its 7th year in 2019, with the Active Every Day project encouraging building activity into daily lives with diaries and incentives. 1,970 young people took part with nearly 241,000 minutes of activity achieved. We have connected with thousands of children across the years where we believe our work has helped shape their lifestyle to be healthier and more active.

We thank our project sponsors Benenden Health for their financial and active support for this programme. Their involvement is invaluable helping us to tackle health issues across the community. We also thank our other sponsors and funders, too many to list for their continued support.

The annual local junior clubs tournament in June had to be cancelled due to the lock-down. It is hoped to resurrect this again in 2021.

Health

Walking Football for both men and women continued to grow with even more sessions being added to the weekly offer prior to March. Up to that point the activity continued to flourish and is ever more popular providing activity and social interaction and for those who want it, so a virtual project offer and support for the 400 people on the Foundation's records was created from June to provide vital connection between the players and the charity, and to promote an active lifestyle and maintain good health throughout the extended pandemic period.

The Sporting Memories activities for those seeking fellowship and companionship continues to thrive and again the work of the staff during the pandemic has been outstanding finding new ways from phone, whatsapp and Zoom meetings and support to keep the all-important contact between members from early April onwards, who rely so heavily on this. Groups were previously held at Bootham Crescent and Wigginton with over 50 people who might otherwise be isolated taking part.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2020

Social Inclusion

Regular activities including Kick about sessions which encourage activity amongst youngsters in a safe but relaxed environment have been maintained as much as possible with the nightly sessions being cut short due to the Pandemic in March, with alternative offers sought from social media including new Instagram channels.

Healthy Holidays which has become a popular theme across the country continued locally with support from the Joseph Rowntree Foundation and other partners, and we have taken the lead locally providing activities and food for children who otherwise would have nothing to do and also have nothing to eat during school holidays, and continued to develop and sustain connections with the network of food share projects across the City and the Local Authority to ensure the families who need this most are targeted.

The Strensall Youth Club which takes place every Friday evening for 10-17 year olds was reporting it's highest number of participants at the start of 2020, with numerous activities arranged and managed by Inclusion staff to give attendees something different to be involved with and to keep them off the streets, but again had to stop during lockdown. Various online and virtual activities were offered, and the Foundation continued to engage the young people and their families as much as possible. Our close partnership with the Strensall Ward Council is a reflection of the Councillors who have shown great foresight to consider Youth Voice in their area, as they recognise the value this can bring to their area.

Social Media Engagement

With the pandemic, brought many challenges, but also opportunities. A positive from the lockdown period was the manner the Foundation continued to engage with the "football family", participants/members and the local community through their social media channels.

The campaign Stay Safe At Home with Team York, was intended to engage and inspire people at a time when they may find themselves at home, with a very different daily life and the key aims were to continue to embody the organisation's objectives for promoting physical and mental health by encouraging people to #StayActive, #StayConnected, #StayPositive, and StayEngaged. The coverage was well received and increased the engagement through this channel, which has a positive affect on the future of the organisation as it responds to the next step of the national situation.

Financial review

There was a total deficit of £15,808 during 19/20, which inevitably effected reserves, in comparison to the surplus generated of £2,704 in 18/19.

It is the policy of the charity that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to three month's expenditure. The trustees considers that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. The trustees have implemented policies aimed to maintain an acceptable level of reserves which have had to be used to an extent this year. We will work to replace those reserves as quickly as feasible.

This financial year, the Foundation has had to draw on some of those free reserves. The Trustees also felt it appropriate to defer income which was received for activities that had not been able to be provided at the point of the year end, with the aim to provide those to the individuals or provide refunds as necessary if this could not be achieved.

Equally, funding for a number of projects has been carried forward as designated funds to reflect the time that this funding will be spent on the delivery of these projects.

The accounts also reflect a credit for funds from Sport England received after the year end, but sourced as Emergency Funding towards general running costs from April-July, so the period April to June has been covered in this financial year accounts.

Despite having to draw upon the reserves of the organisation, the Trustees feel that the organisation has fought well to remain within a reasonable financial position at a time that many services had to stop face to face, and the organisation was receiving no income streams.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2020

Strategic Direction

Plans for the future in 2020-21 and beyond are not easy to predict a least until the pandemic is under control and things return to some kind of normality. However, the charity will continue to deliver the activities as agreed through existing and new funding contracts wherever possible, even if this means in a new manner of virtual or hybrid delivery, building on the success, knowledge and expertise of the past 14 years.

The Foundation's endeavours will continue to reflect key agendas in the area of sport, inclusion, education and health and works closely with the sports development units, the local County F.A's, Active Partnerships, County Sports Networks, Funders, relevant networks and local authorities in order to complement not only their relevant sports and active recreation strategies, but also the work of other providers.

The Foundation's direction continues to reflect the needs of the community and at this time of uncertainty will aim to support those needs, which are expected to mean further increases in health and inclusion related projects.

We offer particular thanks to Paula Stainton our Foundation Manager who has been outstanding in managing the staff and programmes under such difficult conditions, often working from home, liaising with various organisations as the Covid-19 rules were changing and supporting staff. Phil Smith our Operations Manager and the remaining staff have all been terrific in terms of their flexibility as things have moved so quickly as the pandemic progresses. They have also managed to attract funding streams to ensure that our activities can not only continue but develop at this difficult time.

YCFC Foundation will continue to focus on safeguarding it's future for it's beneficiaries and those who rely upon it's essential role in the Community, to ensure a lasting and positive impact.

Structure, governance and management

The charity is constitued as a company limited by guarantee and is therefore governed by its memorandum and articles of association. The company was incorporated on 18 July 2014 and obtained charitable status on 24 November 2014.

The trustees who served during the year and up to the date of signature of the financial statements were:

All directors of the company are also trustees and S Kilmartin is a trustee but not a director. The Board has the power to appoint additional trustees as it considers fit to do so.

None of the trustees has any beneficial interest in the company. All of the trustees are members of the company and guarantee to contribute £1 in the event of a winding up.

Normally one third of the trustees retire by rotation.

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

York City Football Club Foundation is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office and pricipal place of business is Bootham Crescent, York, North Yorkshire, YO30 7AQ.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's memorandum and articles, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include the revaluation of freehold properties and to include investment properties and certain financial instruments at fair value. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

1 Accounting policies

Government grants are recognised at the fair value of the asset receive d or receivable when there is reasonable assurance that the grant conditions will be met and the grants will be received.

A grant that specifies performance conditions is recognised in income when the performance conditions are met . Where a grant does not specify performance conditions it is recognised in income when the proceeds are received or receivable . A grant received before the recognition criteria are satisfied is recognised as a liability.

1.5 Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

1.6 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.7 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are measured at transaction price including transaction costs.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are recognised at transaction price.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities.

1.8 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

1.9 Retirement benefits

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.

1 Accounting policies

1.10 Leases

Rentals payable under operating leases, including any lease incentives received, are charged as an expense on a straight line basis over the term of the relevant lease.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
