GOVERNING DOCUMENTS AND OBJECTS

Governing Document

The Looe Development Trust was incorporated by the Registrar of Companies for England and Wales as a Private Limited Company on 31st October 2001. It is a Company Limited by Guarantee and not having a Share Capital. The Company is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association, and these are set out in accordance with the Companies Acts 1985 and 1989. The Memorandum of Association was signed and sealed on 5th July 2001, and the Articles of Association were signed and sealed on 19th October 2001.

Area of Benefit

The Charity is for the benefit of those living and / or working in the parish of Looe and contiguous parishes (hereinafter called "the Area of Benefit")

Objects of the Charity

- 1 To advance education and learning, including training in skills relevant to securing employment to relieve financial need, hardship, distress and sickness among those living within the Area of Benefit.
- 2 To preserve, protect and enhance in any way for the benefit of the public, amenities including the buildings or features of historic, architectural or natural interest within the Area of Benefit.
- 3 To provide facilities for public recreation or other leisure time occupation in the interests of social welfare, with the object of improving the conditions of life for those living or working in the Area of Benefit.
- 4 To advance any other charitable purpose or purposes for the benefit of those living or working in the Area of Benefit.

Statement of Intention

The Charity will be non-party in politics, non-sectarian in religion and will not discriminate on the grounds of race, colour, nationality, ethnic or racial origin, sex, marital status, age, religion, political belief, or other opinion.

Activities of the Charity

The Charity may do anything lawful that may be necessary in order to promote its Objects including the use of the following powers:

- Subject to any consent required by law, to raise funds and borrow monies, invite and receive contributions from anyone through donations or subscriptions, or the running of a lottery or in any other way.
- Subject to compliance with any statutory regulations, to undertake trading activities only in so far as the activities are exercised in the course of the actual carrying out of a primary Object of the Charity.
- 3 Subject to any consents by law,
 - To purchase take on lease or in exchange or hire or otherwise acquire any land or property of any sort.
 - To erect construct lay down enlarge alter maintain improve change and manage or contribute to or subsidise the erection construction and maintenance of any land property ways plant and machinery.

GOVERNING DOCUMENTS AND OBJECTS (CONTINUED)

- To undertake any charitable trust or other charitable agency business, which may promote any or all of the Objectives of the Charity.
- To establish, co-operate with support, or join with other charities, voluntary bodies and statutory authorities operating in furtherance of the Objects of similar charitable purposes and to exchange advice and information with them.
- To purchase or otherwise acquire any of the property assets and liabilities of any of the charities voluntary bodies or statutory authorities with which the Charity is authorised to join and perform any of their engagements.
- 7 To transfer any of the Charity's property, assets, liabilities and engagements to any of the charities voluntary bodies or statutory authorities with which the Charity is authorised to join.
- To establish, promote, and otherwise assist any limited company or companies for the purpose of acquiring any property, or of furthering in any way the Objects of the Charity through trading, and to establish the same either as wholly owned subsidiaries of the Charity or jointly with other persons, companies and government departments or local authorities, and to finance the same if the Trustees see fit by way of secured loan or share subscription on commercial terms provided that the Charity shall seek professional advice before financing such companies.
- To provide educational training, advisory counselling, consultancy, administrative, professional and technological support services in furtherance of the Objects of the Charity.
- To promote, encourage or undertake research and disseminate the results of such.
- To produce, print, publish, supply, sell or deal in anything in written, oral or visual media.
- To open and operate bank accounts and other banking facilities and to draw, make, accept, endorse, negotiate, discount and execute promissory notes, bills of exchange, cheques and other negotiable instruments.
- Subject to the provisions of clauses 6 and 7 hereof, to employ and pay employees, officers, servants and professional or other advisers, and to make all reasonable and necessary provision for the payment of pensions and superannuation to or on behalf of employees, officers and servants and their wives, husbands and other dependants.
- To pay out of the funds of the Charity, all the expenses, costs and charges of and incidental to the formation and registration of the Charity.

Use of Income and Property

The income of the Charity whencesoever derived, shall be applied solely towards the promotion of the Objects of the Charity and no part shall be paid or transferred directly or indirectly by way of dividend, bonus or otherwise by way of profit to any member of the Charity, and no Trustee appointed to any office of the Charity shall be paid by salary or fees, or receive any remuneration or other benefit in money or money's worth from the Charity, PROVIDED THAT nothing in this document shall prevent reasonable and proper payments made in good faith.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

The Trustees, who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act, submit their annual report and the financial statements for the year ended on 31st March 2020. The Trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice SORP (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) which was published on 16 July 2014, "Accounting and Reporting By Charities", in accordance with the Charities Act 2011 and the elements of the 2016 Act introduced in Autumn 2016, in preparing the annual report and financial statements of the charity.

The charity was incorporated on 31st October 2001, and the relevant Memorandum and Articles of Association of the charity are set out on pages 3 and 4 of the report.

Review of activities and future developments

The Financial Statements for the year ended 31st March 2020, which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, Balance Sheet and related notes, are set out on pages 10 to 20. A summary of the financial results and the work of the charity are set out below.

Trust publications (Supporting Object 2 of the Trust as detailed above)

The Trust publishes "Community News". 1,000 copies of this bi-monthly magazine are distributed to the local communities in Looe, Pelynt and Duloe as a 32-page publication, containing Looe Town Council News. It also carries advertisements, which enables the magazine to be largely self-financing. New design, production and accounting staff are now taking the publication forward. The publication continues to be well received, with the deadline for copy being 2 weeks prior to the beginning of the publication months.

Nelson The Seal.

A booklet (ISBN 978-0-9559645-1-0) and brochure on sea life and the life-sized bronze sculpture of Nelson the one-eyed Grey Seal erected by the Trust, which was unveiled by Sir Robin Knox-Johnston MBE on 28 May 2008, was published by the Trust in 2009 and is sold as an income generator; although sales this trading year have been minimal. The Looe Harbour Commissioners care for and are still to provide the sculpture's lighting, as previously undertaken.

HMS Looe Booklet.

A booklet (ISBN 987-0-9559645-0-3) and leaflet on the history of the eight HMS Looe warships from 1696 to 1943 are published by the Trust on behalf of The HMS Looe Foundation in 2008. The books are on sale in Looe but now raise limited funds for the Trust.

Trust Activities

Looe Development Trust has undertaken the following projects in the last year in support of its objectives in facilitation, fund holding and provision for:

- Millpool Centre
- The Looe Christmas Festive Lights
- The Skate Board Park at Looe (Planning)
- Enterprise House
- Looe Coastal Communities Team
- Looe Valley Trails

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES (CONTINUED)

Millpool Centre (Supporting Objects 1 & 3 of the Trust as detailed above)

The Centre is a quality community space for all age groups of the community and has been open since 10 June 2013. Cornwall Council Youth Services stopped its outreach budget in March 2014; as such the Trust was providing the use of the Centre from its own funds. The Youth Project ceased in December 2019, with the retirement of the last qualified (ex-Cornwall Council) youth worker and funding had been exhausted. The Trust negotiated the continuation and re-opening in Spring 2020, as the Looe Youth Club, through the Rusty Bucket (Christian) charity, in a new designated youth club space. Unfortunately these plans were put on hold due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Centre has had a good sixth year of operation, with the Manager nearly meeting the year's financial forecast. The challenge remains to make the Centre self-sustaining whilst delivering its core benefits to the community. It continued to secure a good range of local clubs and activities. The COVID-19 pandemic has led to the closure of the building and furlough of the Manager. The business has changed with IT services and delivery largely no longer required, although a computer learning club remains. Several open days and special events have also been held at the Centre. The Centre is now known as a venue to hold local events; including by Cornwall Council and the local education and health authorities. The Centre was made available for the Town Council and other organisations to help deal with the pandemic. Financial modelling of the impact of the pandemic on the future of the Centre and the Trust has been undertaken, and the Trust can afford to operate the Centre at a higher loss from reserves for financial year 2020-21. Most user groups are keen to return from September 2020 in the COVID safe environment that has been established.

The hourly rate for training fees is £5.00, internet access fees per half hour at £2.00.

The Looe Christmas Festive Lights (Supporting Object 3 of the Trust as detailed above)

The Trust continued as the fund holder for this, held during the December and January festive season. The Festive lights are a well-established event supported by many local organisations and adds to the ambiance and enjoyment of Looe by both locals and visitors alike.

The Skateboard Park at Looe (Planning) (Supporting Object 3 of the Trust as detailed above)

At the request of the defunct Looe Youth Action Group Looe Development Trust had undertaken, where possible, to establish a skateboard park at Looe for the youth of the local area. In cooperation with Looe Town Council, the site on church land at St Martin's church has been provisionally agreed by the Glebe. Following the successful noise survey, a full planning application was being submitted through and paid for by Looe Town Council in 2018, however that application was withdrawn due restrictions on use of the land and the project. It was hoped to submit a revised application in 2020/21. Funding sources have yet to be sourced. The project fund was £8,850 which was made up of the money originally raised by the Youth Action Group and donations from East Looe Town Trust and the Town Council, together with collections and interest accrued. The West Looe Town Trust had pledged a further £2,000.

Enterprise House (Supporting Object 1 of the Trust as detailed above)

The Looe Enterprise Centre was based at Enterprise House, Higher Market Street, East Looe until May 2013. Enterprise House is owned by the Trust. There was a gap in tenants from May 2018 to July 2019, when new tenants started with a dog grooming parlour. It should be noted that the Trust is in dispute with the Freeholder's management agents; who were appointed in contravention of our lease; without 'consultation'. They are further demanding maintenance payments for the flats for which the 999-year commercial lease has no liability (only for the arcade). A rental holiday was given during 3-months of the pandemic to the Trust's tenants.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES (CONTINUED)

Looe Coastal Communities Team (Supporting Object 1, 2, 3 & 4 of the Trust as detailed above)

The Trust has joined in partnership with Looe Town Council, Looe Harbour Commissioners, Looe Community Forum, East Looe Town Trust, West Looe Town Trust, SECTA and Cornwall Council and formed the Looe Coastal Community Team to attract funding. Following the initial successful funding, the team continue to bid for funds and look for opportunities for the benefit of Looe.

Looe Valley Trails Studies (Supporting Object 1, 2, 3 & 4 of the Trust as detailed above)

The Trust is leading the development of local cycle tails, to link into the national network, to create economic development and prosperity.

East Looe Trail. The Trust supported this project proposed by Dr Sue Brownlow, for the construction of a walking and cycle trail from Liskeard to Looe. The trail has the potential to eventually link into the National Cycle network in Cornwall at Lanhydrock. The final report was published in April 2017.

West Looe Trail. Further to the Trust's West Looe trails' feasibility study report in August 2017, including provisional work to link the trail from Saltash (Plymouth) to Bodmin via Looe and linking these National cycle trails via South East Cornwall, more detailed investigation is required, to fully work up the plan to gain funding for this missing link and to benefit SE Cornwall and Looe in particular. Additional meetings to progress the next planning stage have been and continue to be supported by the Trust.

Moor To Sea. This is a heritage project that has emerged from the trails' studies, to document and engage with the local community to publicise the heritage of the East Looe valley; with an aim to establish a community group to further the cycle trails. This project was due to start in April 2020, but due to the pandemic some funding was not confirmed, along with the lack of ability to engage with the public has meant a redesign of the project and re-submission of new and revised funding bids, which were confirmed as successful in late August 2020. The project should begin, after tender selection, from September 2020 to December 2022.

The trust through participation of its trustees continues to be involved in a variety of activities, programmes and funding streams to the benefit of the area:

Trustees continue to provide much needed assistance and considerable volunteer time through membership of the partnership boards of the leader program (South and East Cornwall LAG) and South East Community Led Local Development (CLLD). Both EU Funding programmes and others such as the coastal communities program. These programmes bring much needed of EU and UK investment, (several million pounds over 4-years) into the SE Cornwall area to help the regeneration of the local economy. In addition to these activities the Trust has been involved over the year with the Town Council and Cornwall Council. The trust has been actively involved in the establishment of and as a fund holder of a COVID-19 emergency community fund. The Trust has also provided help and assistance to many local organisations with help in finding funding for young people and various projects.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES (CONTINUED)

FUTURE DEVELOPENTS AND COMMITMENTS

Other projects have been considered by Looe Development Trust during this reporting period; some have not gained support, others have been given assistance and for others their feasibility was to be further investigated. The Trust's principal monetary concern is that of the commercial sustainability development of the Millpool Centre, and the longer term letting of Enterprise House to provide Trust income.

During the reporting year the now established Millpool Manager has recruited retained volunteer staff who have made considerable efforts to make the Millpool Centre attractive to users within the community. New advertising drives and courses of instruction to meet the community's needs were undertaken. It is to the Manager's and volunteers' credit that the Centre continues to provide support to meeting the objectives of the Trust. The Millpool Centre is an accessible and bespoke design located next to the town library and new Town Council offices (from November 2019). It offers great opportunity to engage and meet the needs of the wider population.

The Trustees and Officers have continually reviewed the Trust's immediate, medium and long-term sustainability and commitments. The COVID-19 pandemic has reduced the Trust's reserves, which are being regularly reviewed as pandemic restrictions are eased, although they may well be reintroduced, limiting the Millpool Centre to generate income and further reducing the Trust's reserves. The Trust has a (Chartered Accountant) volunteer bookkeeper and has moved its main accounts to online computer-based accounts in anticipation of Making Tax Digital.

STATEMENT OF BENEFIT

During the reporting year the Trust received no income from central or local government to deliver services. Minor local Town Council grants have been received in financial year 2019/20. The Trust has a policy of not paying its volunteer staff, apart from legitimate expenses when incurred. The Trust has one employee, the Millpool Centre Manager. The Trust has an ongoing review of its operating procedures, business plan and financial controls.

Looe Development Trust continued to provide benefit, in accordance with its objectives, during the 2019/20 reporting year. The Trustees, its Officers and volunteers have provided a substantial tangible improvement to the local community of Looe and its contiguous parishes, with the provision of continuing services to the wider community through the Millpool Centre. The Trust have plans and facilities in place to continue this into 2020/21 and beyond.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of Accounting:

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of certain fixed assets and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (FRS 102) effective 1st January 2015 and the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015).

The company has availed itself of Paragraph 3(3) of schedule 4 of the Companies Act and adapted the Companies Act formats to reflect the special nature of the company's activities.

(b) Legal Status of the Company:

The Trust is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The members of the company pay an annual fee of £1. In the event of the company being wound up the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member.

(c) Fund accounting:

General funds are unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity, and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors, or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Investment income and gains are allocated to the appropriate fund.

(d) Incoming resources:

All incoming resources are included in the SOFA when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. For legacies, entitlement is the earlier of the charity being notified of an impending distribution, or the legacy being received.

Gifts in kind are accounted for at a reasonable estimate of their value to the charity and the amount actually realised.

(e) Resources expended:

Expenditure is recognised when a liability is incurred.

Expenditure has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

Direct costs of generating funds are those incurred directly in carrying out the income generating activities of the charity, and do not include the costs of disseminating information in support of the charitable activities. Support costs are those incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity. Management and administration costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

(f) Taxation:

The charity's activities are exempt from Value Added Tax. Irrecoverable VAT is not separately analysed and is charged against the category of resources expended for which it was incurred.

(g) Operating leases:

The charity classifies the lease of equipment as operating leases, title to the equipment remains with the lessor and leasing costs are charged on a straight line basis over the term of the lease.

(h) Tangible fixed assets:

Tangible fixed assets costing more than £100 are capitalised and included at cost, including any incidental expenses of acquisition.

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Leasehold buildings Nil

Fixtures, fittings and equipment 33.33% on cost Computer equipment 33.33% on cost

No depreciation is charged on the Enterprise House building, which is held on a 999 year lease. The trustees consider that both the annual depreciation charge and the accumulated depreciation are not material in view of the asset's very long useful life and have invoked the true and fair override provisions of the Companies Act accordingly.

The Millpool Centre is held on a 50 year lease from Looe Town Council from June 2013.

(i) Donated assets:

These are capitalised at reasonable value on receipts and depreciated over their useful economic lives.

(j) Investments:

Investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. The SOFA includes the net gains and losses arising on re-valuations and disposals throughout the year.

(k) VAT:

HMRC have agreed to zero rate the build costs of the Millpool Centre, as long as the building is used no more than 5% of the time for non charitable purposes. The potential liability reduces each year by 10% over 10 years. (Now standing at 30%). A record of this usage is kept, to ensure the conditions are met.

2. TRUSTEE'S EXPENSES:

Trustees received no remuneration during the year.
