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#### LEGAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE INFORMATION

#### Status, Structure and Purpose

The Governing Instrument of the Circuit is contained in the Methodist Church Act 1976 (Schedule 2) and is detailed in volume 2 of the Constitutional Practice and Discipline of the Methodist Church (Part 1 Deed of Union and Part 2 Model Trusts).

The Methodist Church is organized as a Connexion which is divided into Districts which, in turn, are sub-divided into Circuits. Each Circuit is made up of a group of Churches.

The Durham and Deerness Valley Methodist Circuit comprises 14 churches (with 15 buildings and about 600 members). It is responsible for payment of stipends and associated costs to ministers and lay workers and also provision of manses to accommodate 4 ministers. The funding of the Circuit is provided by the churches. Indeed the first charge on the general fund of each church is the sum required to fund the Circuit. In a similar way the Circuit is levied for District and Methodist Church funds. The churches of a Circuit are charities in their own right.

The Circuit is the primary unit in which local churches express and experience their interconnexion in the Body of Christ, for purposes of mission, mutual encouragement and help. It is in the Circuit that ministers, deacons and probationers are stationed and local preachers are trained and admitted and exercise their calling. The purposes of the Circuit include the effective deployment of the resources of ministry, which include people, property and finance, as they relate to the Methodist churches in the Circuit, to churches of other denominations and to participation in the life of the communities served by the Circuit and in ecumenical work in the area including, where appropriate, the support of ecumenical Housing Associations. Since every member in the Circuit is as such a member of the Methodist Missionary Society, the purposes of the Circuit include the promotion of understanding of the work of the Society to the end that every member may share in world mission.

The Circuit is a public benefit entity. The trustees have had regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST AUGUST 2020

#### Part 1 - Financial Matters

#### Statement of Trustees' responsibilities

Under the Trust Deed and legislation relating to Charities in England, the Trustees are required to prepare accounts for each financial year which show a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Trust and of the surplus or deficit for that year and which have been properly prepared from and are in agreement with the accounting records of the Trust and comply with relevant disclosure regulations. For the purpose of this all ex-officio and appointed members of the Circuit Meeting are Trustees.

In preparing those accounts, the Trustees are required to:

- \* select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently
- \* make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- \* follow applicable accounting standards, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the accounts, and
- \* prepare the accounts on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Trust will continue its activities.

The Trustees are required to act in accordance with the Trust Deed of the charity, within the framework of the Trust Law. They are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and so enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with the requirements of the Charities Act 2011. They have general responsibility for taking such steps as are reasonably open to them to safeguard the assets of the charity and to prevent and detect fraud and other irregularities.

#### Risk review

The major risks to which the charity is exposed arise from a reducing membership, increased running costs and heavier workloads falling on fewer and fewer shoulders. We are developing plans to reverse this trend and increase membership. District wide policy is that we work to ensure every church is growing in ten years' time. Our Circuit may have a different shape with a different number of churches in a decade, but we will be working to mitigate the expressed risk and fitting into the District vision.

#### Reserves policy

Reserves should not be allowed to fall below a fixed amount whose value would be reviewed annually. This year the minimum reserve was fixed at £125,000. If funds fall below this figure the shortfall shall be made good by the Churches of the Circuit.

#### Financial Review

The results for the year show a decrease of £3,607 (2019 – decrease of £7,378), in unrestricted funds, which considering the Covid 19 pandemic we consider to be an acceptable result. Thus unrestricted funds closed the year on £121,269. Restricted funds decreased to £216,594 following the purchase of a new manse in Gilesgate Dirham in September for £195k. The Circuit has sufficient cash in its unrestricted fund (£121,269 together with the expected Church assessments of £222,000) to meet the next year's expenditure. It is anticipated that some churches will struggle to produce the expected income. Some churches rely heavily on lettings that can not be gained due to Covid restrictions. We intend to monitor the situation regularly asking churches working together in four separate groupings to develop business plans. In simplest form the groupings need to add up the assessments from each church in the group together and discuss how we might use our resources to achieve collecting that total requirement.

#### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST AUGUST 2020

#### Part 2 - Review of the year's work

#### **Circuit Vision Statement**

The Durham and Deerness Valley Circuit of the Methodist Church seeks to be a close union of its individual Churches. Everyone connected with an individual Church should expect to feel that they are an important part of the Circuit family, and can expect the support of this family. Through our common faith in Christ we seek, in prayerful action, to share and spread the love of Jesus throughout the local and wider community.

#### Significant Developments during the Year

The Circuit leadership team initiated a review of how we best manage our Circuit and align our ministers coming out of Covid 19 restrictions with the aim of improving the systemic difficulties of too many jobs falling on too few shoulders. Four groups have been established: North, South, East and West. Each is responsible for working together to meet our mission objectives and in doing so we hope the group approaches adopting an organic union of the churches working together as one church on different sites.

#### Achievements during the Year

We advanced the way churches shared services together reducing the number of Own Arrangments on the Plan but also electing to share services during Bible Month for that entire period. As we entered lockdown a series of conversations were launched by the CLT to determine how to come out of it well with the Circuit aligning ministers in groupings of churches. This work was accepted as an appropriate way forward by the Circuit meeting the votes for vs against tallying more than 7 to 1.

Work has gone into making sure services are accessable to everyone whether isolating or coming to public worship. In home service sheets have been introduced in churches. A Church Without Walls has formed on our deacon's driveway and this is extending into online services and prayer walks. Services are happening now under Government Guidelines allowing parishoners to congregate in four of our churches. A hybrid offer of online provision at the same time as the physical gathering is held from the South Group. Facebook streaming has emerged from the East group. West and North are seeing the fruit of their physical services and have introduced an online Coffee Morning during lockdown. We habe a regular Zoom service in the afternoon on a Sunday as well. New services are emerging as we speak.

'Open The Book' – the re-telling of Bible stories in schools – takes place in Bearpark by video which can possibly be used in other settings.

During the week before Christmas knitted angels appear outside schools in several localities across the Circuit. This year we will need to see what might be offered safely.

Several schools visit our churches for Harvest, Christmas and Easter services. Again this might be achievable online.

Lunches are served on a weekly basis at Elvet and are very popular whilst the monthly Soup Lunch at Sacriston continues to grow. At lockdown this ceased.

Our churches serve their local communities through coffee mornings, craft groups, activities for older members of society and regular visits to neighbouring care homes. Work continues to grow amongst local Care and Nursing Homes with monthly midweek services held at Lindisfarne, Newton Hall, Melbury Court, Durham, Orchard House, Brandon and Springfield, West Rainton. These services are greatly appreciated by the residents. We will review how these ministries might continue safely.

The churches of the Circuit are unstinting in their support for local, national and international charities – many churches support Foodbanks which serve the local area with a distribution point being created at Elvet. Financial support is extended to projects such as Street Children in Guatemala, local hospices and housing scheme 'Moving On', Christian Aid and Global Care. Churches also respond to 'emergency' appeals from organisations such as All We Can and Christian Aid. A large number of shoebox gifts are sent from churches around the circuit to Eastern Europe through the Samaritans Purse Appeal.

Many church buildings are used on a regular basis for community activities, by outside agencies e.g. probation services, support for refugees and self-help groups. We believe that to keep people Covid safe, in most spaces we are seeking a single user policy.

Ministerial and lay members of the Circuit have continued to under-go the revised Safeguarding training.

#### Significant Changes

We are working as four groups of churches intending to consider becoming four churches working on different sites. This will help us to come in line with Connexional direction setting to trim the number of trustee bodies we offer.

#### Events relating to these changes

Our District Mission enabler will help us review our situation in each of the groups this fall. Each group is asked to form a business plan – projected costs and how we will raise the money to meet these. We are judging by feel, but Church Councils will be asked to vote on formal unity when the time is right.

#### Likely developments in the coming year

We will likely repurpose a few of our buildings, become four churches working on different sites and will have a better sense of what we can afford in terms of ministerial provision for the future We are looking to develop a Pioneering/Church Planting internship in the near future. Work should begin to become clearer in this area..

#### Contributions of volunteers

All the work in the Circuit, apart from that of appointed ministers and lay workers, is on a voluntary basis, and includes that of Circuit and church officers, Commissioned Lay Persons, Local Preachers and Worship Leaders, members and secretaries of all the Circuit committees, and those assisting in the running of children's and young people's work.

#### Relationship with related parties and other charities

There are appointed Circuit secretaries and treasurers for Connexional funds, Methodist Homes and Action for Children. Ecumenical links in youth work are developing in some areas of the Circuit, and several churches ran holiday clubs. Authorised minister status has been granted by Conference to the three clergy of the Durham North Area Team of the Anglican Church. The Chinese Church based at Elvet church has become well established. Many churches are involved in Churches Together, Area Action Partnerships and organising events in the local communities.

#### Conclusion

The mission of the Circuit continues through the leadership of our dedicated ministers and lay appointees. The work of volunteers will continue to become increasingly important as we seek to enhance our varied outreach and service to the local communities of our Circuit.
