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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2020

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2020, under the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

St Peter's Church (grade 2* listed) is situated in Church Street, St Peter's, Broadstairs. It is part of the Diocese of Canterbury within the Church of England.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Our Mission (from Parish Profile 2015)

- To continue to be good witnesses to the Christian faith while actively reaching out to the local community.
- To build on our positive working relationships with all the churches in the Broadstairs Group so that we make the best use of gifts, talents and clergy, available to us.
- We have a desire to deepen our spirituality that will also empower us to reach out to others.
- We look to strengthen and to continue to build up links with younger members of our Parish community including pre-schools, St George's Primary and Secondary C of E Foundation School, St Peter's Junior School and all schools in the Parish as well as the local uniformed organisations.
- We wish to secure our historic buildings for the next generation and improve the facilities to enable wider use,
- While seeking to preserve and value the best from both the present and the past we acknowledge the need to be open to change.

Broadstairs Group Ministry

- The Group, consisting of Holy Trinity, St Andrews and St Peter's was established nine years ago.
- Incumbents are licensed to minister across the whole Group, with permission of the incumbent.
- When a vacancy arises incumbents in the Group are consulted about a successor.
- The clergy are required to meet regularly in chapter.
- Each PCC has agreed to establish the Group and have committed to working together.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Review of the year

This report is once again an opportunity for me to say thank you, on behalf of the PCC, to the many volunteers for the tremendous amount of hard work and effort which they put in, giving of their time and expertise to help maintain this beautiful, ancient church and ensuring that the mission, worship, pastoral care and outreach continues.

Although we have been severely restricted in what we have been permitted to do, I would still like to express my personal thanks to the following people for all that they have done both before lockdown, and the months during and after: The Churchwardens (Pauline Osborne and Sylvia Mills) the assistant Churchwarden (Mary Saffery), Simon Perry in the office, the chairpersons of the various committees, Patrick Dunn and the choir, the Bell ringers, Gill Horne and the servers, David Gale in the halls, the sides people, intercessors, lesson readers, chalice assistants, tea/coffee makers, the cleaning team, Monday Lunch Club, Andrea and her SPRATS team, the flower arrangers, the social committee, the churchyard working parties, and all those who serve on any of the various committees.

I ended 2019 unwell (along with many others from the congregation). This lasted through to the middle of January, so my thanks go to the retired priests who covered the services whilst I was off sick, especially Rev'd David Tate, who has also assisted me in presiding and preaching at least once a month at the 8am and 9:30 services, (and the occasional evening service). My thanks also go to Rev'd Michael Cooke who has taken the Wednesday 10am service once a month, and to Rev'd Brian Sharp for his help and support, and for speaking at our Lent lunch in February.

2020 was a year like no other, as on March 24th we were plunged into lockdown as the Coronavirus pandemic took hold. The Government and The Church of England declared that all church buildings should be closed (even for private prayer) and they remained so until 15th June, when we were allowed to open for private prayer. Public worship was finally permitted on the 5th July. This meant that there were no services held in Holy Week, nor on Easter Day, Ascension Day, Pentecost, VE Day, or for our Patronal Festival at the end of June. Ever changing rules and regulations during this time did not make things easy and I am grateful to my Churchwardens and to Gill Horne who helped me navigate this difficult and trying period. As it was not possible to hold a service at 8am and then again at 9.30, because of the rigid cleaning protocols, and because I felt it important not to exclude those members of our congregation who enjoy the BCP service, we introduced a new pattern of worship on a Sunday morning, alternating weekly between The Book of Common Prayer and Common Worship.

This pattern continued until the 5th November, when we were again put into a second lockdown until the 2nd December. This meant that we could not hold our Service of Remembrance on the 8th November. We did not resume public worship until the 13th December, but again with very restrictive measures in place. Although we were able to hold a service on Christmas Day, many of the traditional and popular Christmas services simply couldn't take place. We were also not able to hold our annual Christmas tree festival.

Our church and community halls were also required to close throughout the year, only opening briefly in the summer for a few keen groups and organisations. I would like to express my thanks to Gill Page, John Reid and Roger Waddell who worked tirelessly with me in getting the halls complex 'covid secure', again not made easy by the enormous volume of conflicting guidance. Our hard work paid off however as it enabled the Mockett's Wood and other doctors' surgeries to be confident enough to hire them as a vaccination centre towards the end of the year, bringing in some much-needed income.

Our finances have inevitably taken a hit; with the halls and church closed, and fund-raising activities put on hold. Our Treasurer and I have been amazed however by the ingenuity and generosity of so many. Jam, marmalade, chutney have all been made, and sold, in church, along with face coverings and some beautifully made lavender bags and Christmas cards. Jim French also very generously provided us with several weeks' worth of plants, fruit and veg, which were gratefully received and sold. Thank you to Roy Brown and the Fund-raising team for all they did before lockdown, raising £4,728 before we were forced to cease all activities.

Review of the year

People have been very generous in their personal giving to the church, and it has been this generosity which has enabled us to pay our full parish share for 2020. Thank you all. There is no doubt that this has been a very difficult year financially, and I am sincerely grateful to Robin Page as Treasurer, and to the Finance Committee, for the tremendous work he (and they) has done, with regard to the finances of the church. Despite the severe financial issues, as a church we continue to give very generously to various charitable organisations including the Thanet Food Bank, and the Winter Shelter.

In 2020, the Baptist Church (under the leadership of Kate Grant), set up an off shoot of the Thanet Food Bank, working out of their premises in St Peter's. This has been very well supported by all of the churches in Broadstairs and the local community. Thank you to all of you who give so generously and to those who help with it, especially Sylvia Mills who delivers the bags of food each week.

With the church and halls closed, and the directive to stay at home, my thanks also go to all of you who have been keeping in touch with friends, neighbours and those members of the church community unable to get out. I know this has been a great source of comfort to many people. I would also like to express my thanks to Robin Page for his work in collating and editing the magazine each month, and the willing group of volunteers who have been delivering it to the wider community.

The two home groups continued to support those in their group, with Michael and Elspeth Cooke meeting online throughout the year. We have all had to get used to using Zoom as a means of communication, with varied success!

Before we closed, our Children's church was going from strength to strength, attended regularly by 9 children (and their carers), who also came along to the Sunday Praise service the following week. Thanks go to Toni Lawrence and her team of volunteers helping with Children's Church, and to Patrick Dunn, David Tate and Christine Denton for their input with Sunday Praise.

All our other services were being well attended, although attendance at Evensong continued to be poor. We had baptisms and weddings booked throughout the year, many of which were postponed and/or cancelled.

The ongoing maintenance and upkeep of the church has continued (where permitted) throughout lockdown.

Richard Baker stepped down as Chair of the Fabric Committee at the October APCM, where he was thanked for the enormous amount of work he has done since taking over this role in 2018.

Andy Parkins has already proved to be an excellent replacement and I look forward to working with him, as he continues the very important task of keeping our church building fit for purpose.

Our APCM was held in church in October, and it was a delight to appoint several new members to the PCC. I also gave thanks to Andrea Jones, who, for personal reasons, and after many years gave up the running of SPRATS. Thanks also went to Val Weatherly, Joan Fuller and Daniel Monaghan who have also been involved for many years. With the halls closed we have not yet been able to decide what will replace this.

Don Bumpstead continues his work in the Garden of Remembrance of planting, weeding and tidying. Thanks also go to Heather Wood who (when allowed) spends many hours removing the dead flowers and generally keeping the garden tidy. We are now in a position to begin the process of furthering our plans for a much-needed extension to the Garden of Remembrance before we run out of existing space.

My thanks go to David Tate and the members of the Eco Committee for the work they have continued to do in highlighting the importance of Climate Change, and seeing how we as a church can engage with this.

As a governor on the Governing Body of St George's School, and, as Chair of the Christian Ethos Monitoring Group, I have continued to work very closely with the staff and fellow governors in trying to ensure that the school maintains its distinctively Christian Ethos in all areas of school life. This past year has also been extremely difficult for them, with many staff being affected by covid19.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

At the end of July, we welcomed Alice Bates to our church and community. She was originally licensed as a lay worker and subsequently ordained in Canterbury Cathedral in September, as an Assistant Curate. She will be with us for the next three years, working two days a week, plus Sundays. With the church closed and the country in lockdown it has not been an easy start for Alice, but she has already made a positive contribution to the church, and I look forward to working with her for the next three years.

2020 has been a very challenging year, and sadly we lost many valued members of the parish. These include, Jan Gee, Kath Moore, Robert Powers, Sybil Warner and Brian Cocking, all of whom contributed so much to the life and worship of this church and community over many years. They will all be greatly missed.

Despite all that has occurred throughout 2020, I have enjoyed serving as your vicar throughout the year. I am enormously grateful for the love, support and encouragement you have given me though these difficult times, and I look forward to doing so in 2021, when I hope we will be able to resume to a more normal way of doing things.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Investment and reserve policy

The PCC uses specialist unit trusts and deposit accounts designed for the charity sector. It is currently our policy to invest surplus funds in CBF Church of England unit trust funds, CBF and Lloyds deposit accounts. The interest rate paid on the CBF deposit accounts has again remained very low during the year.

A full year's dividend income was received from the unchanged holdings of unit trusts and at the year end, the 939.80 (2019 912.47) CBF investment fund units relative to the churchyard increased in value by £1,764.

Restricted funds are held for specific purposes, or as directed by the relative donors. Unrestricted funds are held to pay for the day to day expenditure, and we aim to generate sufficient annual income to meet this.

It is PCC policy to try to maintain a balance of net current assets as free reserves which equates to at least three months' unrestricted payments. This would be approximately £30,000 for the general unrestricted fund.

Governing document

The charity is controlled by the Parochial Church Councils (Powers) Measure 1956 and the Church Representation Rules.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Recruitment and appointment of PCC members

The method of appointment of the PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. All Church attendees are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and stand for election to the PCC. The elected membership of the PCC is currently 9, 2 ex officio Deanery Synod representatives with clergy and 2 churchwardens also being ex officio.

The PCC members are responsible for making decisions on all matters of general concern and importance to the parish including deciding on how the funds of the PCC are to be spent. New members receive initial training into the workings of the PCC.

The full PCC met six times during the year. The PCC has a number of committees dealing with mission and worship, halls, fabric, finance, fundraising, eco church and social which are all responsible to the PCC and report back to the full PCC for discussion as necessary.

The PCC members have had due regard to the guidance published by the Charity Commission on public benefit, and recognise their duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2020

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are included at market value, as modified by the revaluation of certain assets.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

General unrestricted funds represent the funds of the PCC that are not subject to any restrictions regarding their use and are available for application to the general purposes of the PCC. Funds designated for a particular purpose by the PCC are also unrestricted.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the PCCcharity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Endowment funds represent those assets which must be held permanently by the PCC, principally investments. Income arising on the endowment funds can be used in accordance with the objects of the PCC and is included as unrestricted income. Any capital gains or losses arising on the investments form part of the fund.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

The financial statements include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the PCC is responsible by law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their main affiliation to another body or those that are informal gatherings of church members.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2020

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Fixed assets

Consecrated property and movable church furnishings

Consecrated and beneficed property of any kind is excluded from the accounts by s.96(2)(a) of the Charities Act 1993.

Moveable church furnishings held by the vicar/priest in charge and churchwardens on special trust for the PCC, and which require a faculty for disposal, are accounted as inalienable property unless consecrated. They are listed in the church's inventory which can be inspected (at any reasonable time).

All expenditure incurred during the year on consecrated or beneficed buildings, individual items under £2,000 or on the repair of moveable church furnishings acquired before 1 January 2002, is written off.

Other fixtures, fittings and office equipment

Equipment used within the church premises is depreciated on a straight line basis over 4 years. Individual items of equipment with a cost of £2,000 or less are written off when the asset is acquired.
