Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 December 2019

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Seeds of Peace is a non-profit organisation that inspires and cultivates new generations of global leaders in communities divided by conflict. We equip them with the skills and relationships they need to accelerate social, economic, and political changes essential to peace.

Seeds of Peace UK objectives:

- promote awareness through events
- develop a Seeds of Peace UK alumni network
- build an active volunteer community
- provide educational programmes for schools
- establish partnerships with other NGOs
- generate support and funding

Seeds of Peace general programming objectives:

- provide exceptional young people and educators from regions of conflict with an otherwise impossible opportunity to meet their historic enemies face-to-face at our Camp in Maine.
- build on their relationships and understanding through year-round local programs that focus on the core leadership capacities needed to advance peace.
- empower alumni to leverage their personal and professional capacities, individually and collectively, to help shift the landscape from conflict to peace.

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 December 2019

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Significant activities

Seeds of Peace Camp - to date, nearly 7,500 young people and educators from 27 countries around the world have taken part in the conflict transformation program at the Seeds of Peace Camp in Maine, USA. Applicants are chosen on the basis of their leadership potential and spend three weeks with their supposed 'enemy' participating in a range of camp activities including daily dialogue sessions, sports, arts and drama to help them see their common humanity and to replace stereotypes and age old bitterness and fear with mutual respect, tolerance and understanding. Once campers return to their home countries, they are again brought together in smaller cross border programs.

Junior Seed Programs - The three-year Junior Leadership Program builds on the Seeds of Peace Camp in Maine through year-round activities at home, all of which focus on building four of the capacities that leaders need to effectively advance peace: relationships, understanding, skills, and action. Programming activities are structured as uni-nationals, where delegations meet within their local communities to address issues specific to their country; bi-nationals, which involves two delegations coming together across borders; and multi-nationals that enable delegations to come together on a regional level.

Senior Seed Programs - While geographic and time constraints often limit involvement in Seeds of Peace following high school graduation, Seeds continue to express interest in programs that suit their new networks and environments. 'Senior Seeds' offers targeted opportunities for Seeds to sustain their connections to each other, develop advanced leadership skills, and engage their communities as they enter their university and military years.

Alumni Programs - Seeds of Peace Alumni are a life-long membership group of Seeds, aged 22 and older, who graduated from the Seeds of Peace Camp. Our goal, particularly through the GATHER program, is to help alumni develop and leverage their professional and personal capacities, individually and collectively, to effect change.

Educator Programs - Seeds of Peace Educator Programs inspire, connect, and equip a unique cross-border network of educators to transform institutions and contribute to cultures of peace. Through four key program streams, educators promote the values of respect, critical thinking, cross-cultural understanding, and civic engagement. They form a local base of support for Seeds of Peace alumni and multiply the overall impact of the organization many fold. Thematic clusters move across the various program streams: peaceful learning environments (core skills); history and narratives; the arts; civic engagement; and educational leadership. These thematic clusters weave into Camp and the different educator programs in the regions where Seeds of Peace operates.

Public benefit

The trustees have fulfilled their statutory duties of public benefit in accordance with the guidance issued by the Charity Commission.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable achievements and performance

The main achievements of the charity can be summarised below:

- A staff member in London did extensive outreach to schools and organizations throughout the UK.
- Numerous outreach events were held during the year focusing on peacebuilding and building dialogue across borders, including lectures, theatre events, and salon conversations, attended by hundreds of people.
- A cohort of teenagers from the UK attended the Seeds of Peace Camp program in Maine, and others attended programs in Israel.
- We worked with British schools to educate students on conflict transformation through sharing our Seeds' experiences at Camp, and we collaborated with Solutions Not Sides to hold dozens of school sessions where we brought our Seeds from difference conflict areas into classrooms.
- A multiday facilitation workshop led by Seeds of Peace staff was held outside of London engaging a dozen young people in dialogue based work.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

A surplus of \$19,778 (2018: deficit of \$1,583,430) was recorded in the year, increasing the charity's funds built up in previous years so that the charity's objectives can be met and its financial stability ensured.

In 2018 the charity's deficit of \$9,214 was restated to \$1,583,430 following a prior year adjustment, the details of which are set out in note 9 to the financial statements.

At the balance sheet date, unrestricted reserves of \$97,000 (2018: \$77,222) were held.

Reserves policy

The level of reserves is regularly monitored by the Trustees and is currently considered to be reasonable given the nature and scale of the Charity's activities. The Trustees try to maintain reserves sufficient to cover six months of expenditure and for the purposes of financing future charitable objectives.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

The Charity is a private company limited by guarantee and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Incorporation

Seeds of Peace UK was incorporated on 16 March 2007. It received charitable status on 24 September 2009.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Trustees are appointed by the board.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The presentation currency of the financial statements is the US Dollar (\$).

Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charitable company has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

- the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows;
- the requirement of paragraph 3.17(d).

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Foreign currencies

Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated into US Dollars at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into US Dollars at the rate of exchange ruling at the date of transaction. Exchange differences are taken into account in arriving at the operating result.

Going concern

The trustees have assessed whether the going concern basis of preparation continues to be appropriate, based on whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the company to continue as a going concern. This assessment has been required in the light of the significant uncertainty around the short to medium term impact of the spread of the Covid-19 virus.

At the time of approving the financial statements the trustees believe that all appropriate measures have been or will be taken to ensure that the charitable company will be able to continue its operations for at least the next 12 months and thus conclude that the going concern basis remains appropriate.
