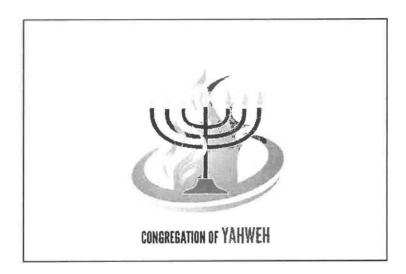

Governance Report

General information about the charity is set out on pages 3 & 4.

The Beginnings

The Congregation was founded in 1960 and was registered with the Charity Commission as a charity on 14 April 1964 and subsequently registered with HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC) for the purpose of Gift Aid.

Peter Warsop, an ardent young preacher who was tireless in his pursuit of truth, and others of like mind rented a small, upper room in the bustling market town of Loughborough, Leics., and The Congregation's work as it is today, began.

A time of unfolding revelation followed as this minister taught about the Body of Christ, the function of the ministerial gifts as laid out in Ephesians 4 and freedom to use the gifts of the Holy Spirit. Little, if anything, was being taught about these things in the church world at that time.

In the late 1950's he took up the pastorate of a church group in Nottingham. In a relatively short period of time the group grew through an intense programme of evangelism which saw hundreds of people come to faith and receive water baptism!

The first great change happened when the leadership began to baptise the believers in the Name of Jesus as declared in the scriptures. This was an unheard of departure from the tradition of baptising in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Hundreds of people benefited from this, however, and Water Baptism services were a regular part of the life of the Church.

1966 brought a revelation about Covenant and the fact that it was possible for men and women to have an acknowledged covenant relationship with Yahweh in this day and age. Understanding about the place of the Nation of Israel in Yahweh's ongoing purposes, the truth of the Olive Tree (Romans 11), and a growing awareness of the Hebraic roots of our faith was being established in people's lives.

Following this The Congregation was launched into a decade of restoration - the use of God's personal name (Yahweh), and the real name of His Son (Yahshua), the seventh day Sabbath and the Feasts of Yahweh as outlined in Leviticus 23. This was quickly followed by holiness and sanctification.

With a desire to propagate the full Gospel of the Kingdom, The Congregation set up a small printing works from which it began to produce a variety of literature which was distributed across the world. This laid a foundation for all the future printing and publishing needs of The Congregation.

The Congregation has always been keen to share the message with people from all walks of life at home and abroad. This has resulted in establishing congregations in Jamaica Malawi and Kenya, and creating ties of fellowship with brethren in Norway, Denmark, the USA, Canada, Rwanda, Myanmar, South Africa, Puerto Rico and India.

Main Objective:

The primary objective of The Congregation, in response to Yahshua's commission (Matthew 28:19-20), is to proclaim the Gospel; win souls and build the Kingdom wherever Yahweh's Spirit leads, and the three parts of the Leadership Team work together to achieve this.

Review of 2020

2020 was the 60th year following the founding of The Congregation of Yahweh in the UK, and from the previous year, we had planned various events to celebrate this landmark. However the new about Covid-19 from China, soon became an issue not just for China and some other countries but a reality for the UK too.

Before the pandemic started to have a profound impact in the UK, the Holy Spirit impressed upon us that Yahweh wanted the national Congregation to wait for Him, and that is what we did, and in some cases are still doing.

Following the lockdown restrictions in March we were unable to meet in person for church services, fellowship and our planned programme of Feast meetings. Instead we organised we online services (streamed services using YouTube and live gatherings using Zoom and Skype) enabling local congregations across the country to participate in worship; to receive news about what was happening in different places; to access words of encouragement; to be fed and nourished by the ministry of the Word. These online services have been a lifeline to members over the year as well as many people around the world who have connected with us for the first time, despite the time zone differences.

As a congregation, we were challenged to find new ways of communicating and sharing fellowship. Members of The Congregation, who serve on our media team, stepped up and provided some outstanding resources to support The Congregation's national and international ministry.

As the country went into lockdown, many lost their jobs and scores of people found themselves unable to provide food for their families and other household essentials.

Older people, having to self-isolate, unable to pick up basic commodities also found themselves in need. Through these difficult times, The Congregation, from our newly acquired and refurbished building. The Ark, was able to run a food bank. The foodbank has been providing much-needed supplies to needy people in our communities. Those working with the food bank have offered food, etc. to people in need, and the Gospel message through leaflets, a caring smile, and prayer. There are more details about the Ark -Food Bank later in this report.

Halfway through the year, the heavenly Father revealed some plans He had for us. At the core of the plan was to shift our weekly meetings from large congregational settings to small house church fellowships. These house fellowships spread across towns and cities. Through this venture, people can develop and grow more effectively and influence their communities with the Gospel of the Kingdom. This has already been implemented in the Nottingham area, although with Covid-19 restrictions groups have been meeting virtually. These times of fellowship have been a source of blessing and enrichment. People are enjoying this new way of doing 'church'.

As we only have our own church buildings in three places, local fellowships have been meeting together using Zoom and Skype. This has enabled many people, who had been previously unable to join services regularly due to the distance they live from meeting places to participate in the fellowship, teaching, worship, bible study and encouragement. Some new believers have also joined for the first time.

During the latter part of the year, work was being done to create an online platform for Mosaic – The Congregation's discipleship and ministry training programme. The intention of going digital is to give people across the world access to these resources.

Although a significant amount has been done towards achieving this, it will be April/ May of 2021 before these materials become available.

Although the pandemic has been devastating and disruptive, we have had some wonderful blessings, not least in the continued faithfulness of members in giving, which has meant that we have maintained almost the same level of donations in 2020 as we achieved in 2019.

The Ark (and Food Bank)

Just before the start of the Covid-19 pandemic we were getting The Ark ready to run community projects and activities but then came the national lockdown. Approximately a month later a call came from someone who was on furlough and didn't know where to turn as the family was struggling to make ends meet. At this point we had nothing in so we got a few people to rally around and get some things together for the family. Thus the food-bank came into being. This was the start of a service to the community meeting the needs of local people in Nottingham.

As a result of a grant we received from *Tesco* we were able to feed approximately 100 senior citizens within the community, which was greatly appreciated by all who received a delicious wholesome meal with desert and a drink.

With the food we received from *Fareshare* we have been able to cook another meal for the same people as well as supply families and children's lunches with fresh and packet food to feed their families during this difficult time.

A new venture we have just started is supplying a bag of 'goodies', and some necessary clothing for the homeless. These bags have been lovingly made up so anyone wishing to, can take at least a couple and put them into their car boot to hand out to the homeless, wherever they may be.

We have been able to work in partnership with other organisations as well to supply food parcels for their clients and have been blessed by the notes of appreciation and thanks we have received from various individuals.

We have been overwhelmed and blessed by the generosity of so many who have donated food, toiletries, household items, and financial donations. Many people have been referred to the food-bank from organisations as well as self-referring from the local and surrounding areas in Nottinghamshire. This has kept us serving the community and given us opportunity to speak with people in a meaningful way. The surprise and happiness we see on people's faces when we receive their food package is priceless. This has been such a valuable service we are planning to continue reaching and supporting the community in this way long after the pandemic is over.

To date we have supported approximately 500 families with a food parcel. We could not have supported so many people without our donors to keep the food-bank going.

Risk Management:

The Trustees have ensured that a suitable system of internal control and risk management processes and procedures are in place to mitigate the major risks that The Congregation faces. This includes issuing guidance on the counting and banking of any cash donations, including ensuring that two independent people perform this task and that all monies are banked as soon as is practicable. A system of budgetary control is in place and this is reviewed by Trustees and the National Overseer on a monthly basis. There is a monthly fraud review and examination of accumulated large financial donations. In line with HMRC and Charity Commission guidance the Trustees have paid particular attention to any support it gives to overseas churches, retaining evidence of how funds have been expended and ensuring it is only used for charitable and the purposes intended.

Reserves Policy:

The level of normal reserves held is to be sufficient to continue to pay all staff for three months and three times the average monthly spend on budgets. Cash not needed for immediate discharge of liabilities is retained either in short term bank deposit accounts or an account that it fixed for 12 months. Any funds in excess of this can be added to our investment portfolio on the advice of our advisers.

Financial Review:

Work has continued on the 10-Year Vision for The Congregation 'Building a Better Future'.

The Vision seeks to build on The Congregation's core ambition:

- reaching new people with the Good News of Yahshua
- · nurturing new believers in the lifestyle of the Kingdom
- · equipping people to be real disciples in the world and
- proclaiming the 'Hebrew roots' of the Faith.

Regular donations, which also includes trading, rental and investment income (£172,234) were almost identical to the amounts received in 2019 (£172,248) and The Congregation spent £30,463 less during the year than it received on unrestricted spending. It spent £14,214 more than it received during the year on restricted projects and this was expected as most of this relates to the refurbishment of 'The Ark' and funds were mainly donated in 2018 for this purpose.

General spending was more than £27k lower than in 2019.

The Trustees are aware that the value of investments will always fluctuate and are mindful that these have to be viewed over an extended period of time. In the 2020 the value of the investments decreased by £4,173.

Prayer Lab

Towards the end of 2019 we launched a phone line to enable anyone in the church or community to make contact and either speak to someone, leave a message or text their prayer request. Teams have been set up to pray for these requests. There has been positive feedback from one person from the community who has particularly appreciated the fact that there is someone willing to pray with and for them. Many church members appreciate support in prayer for various reasons and situations and the team are encouraged when they receive testimonies of answered prayer.

Appreciation:

We value and are extremely grateful for the unceasing support of the members of The Congregation of Yahweh, as volunteers, who give so much of their time, energy, finances and help. Without this input, The Congregation would not be able to function.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 December 2020

1. Accounting Policies

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 2011, Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" and applicable accounting standards.

- a) Branches which are non autonomous are included in the full accounts. Branches in England are regarded as autonomous and are considered to be connected charities.
- b) All voluntary income is accounted for gross when receivable, as long as it is capable of financial measurement. This includes gifts in kind, included at estimated valuation. Trading income is included net of value added tax.
- c) Resources expended, including grants, are accounted for gross when payable. Resources expended includes costs of the activities and depreciation on related assets. Where such costs relate to more than one functional cost category they have been split on either an estimated time or floor space basis, as appropriate.
- d) Tangible fixed assets are included at cost or valuation, valuation being cost plus the estimated cost of improvements: there are no uncapitalised tangible fixed assets.
- e) Depreciation is provided to write off the cost or valuation of all fixed assets over their expected useful lives. It is calculated at the following rates:

Freehold land and buildings	2% per annum on cost
Plant and machinery	10% per annum on cost
Fixtures and fittings	10% per annum on cost
Computers	20% per annum on cost
Website	Over a period of 3 years

- f) Investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. The Statement of Financial Activities includes the net gains and losses on revaluations and disposals throughout the year.
- g) All trading stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. All other stocks have been estimated at their net realisable value.
- h) Designated funds are funds set aside for specific purposes by the Trustees. Restricted funds are funds subject to specific trusts declared by the donor or created through legal process.
- i) Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged against resources expended as incurred.

The Feast Tithe fund consists of one tenth of the voluntary donations at feasts and is set aside to be donated ad hoc to charities/causes outside the Congregation of Yahweh at the discretion of the National Leadership.

The Legacy Fund consists of a legacy left to the charity in the will of a longstanding member primarily (but not exclusively) to be used for professionally recording the Songs of the Congregation and getting them into the public domain.

The International Development Fund aims to provide financial support for those asked to visit churches or mission projects overseas; to provide resources and literature to train members of likeminded overseas congregations; to supply bibles, food, water and medicine to countries currently in fellowship with CoY UK.

The Building Fund consists of donations towards the refurbishment of the Charity's properties on Carlton Road, Nottingham.
