

Trustees' Annual Report for 2020

Serving LGBT+ People and the wider community in Bournemouth, Christchurch, Poole, and Dorset since 1979

1. At last year's Annual General Meeting in November 2019 who could have imagined all that 2020 has been? Most everything in our lives has changed due to the Covid-19 pandemic and lockdowns which have prevented us meeting together for worship and fellowship in our Church building. But while we haven't been able to worship and have fellowship in our traditional ways, as a Church community we have risen to the occasion and done our best to continue to join together virtually by internet every week, with our Sunday worship services and times of fellowship being broadcast online from our Church building to our members and friends throughout the lockdown.

Objectives

- 2. Our Church's primary object is to promote the Gospel of Jesus Christ in Bournemouth, Christchurch, Poole in Dorset and neighbouring areas. For over four decades we have been celebrating God's love for all people, and in particular addressing the needs of the lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender, plus (LGBT+) community.
- 3. Inclusive Community Church is part of the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches (UFMCC) whose churches play a vital role worldwide in addressing the spiritual needs of LGBT+ folk and their friends.

- 4. Because of our commitment to inclusivity, we keenly support equal marriage. As a sign of God's unconditional love, we have held wedding services for same-sex couples since our church's foundation. We rejoice that our church was the first place of worship in this country to legally conduct same-sex weddings when the law was changed in 2014.
- 5. While not all of our members identify as LGBT+, Inclusive Community Church seeks to reach out to those who may feel disenfranchised by Christianity. We believe that all sexual orientations and gender identities are loved by God and should be welcomed completely into the Church. Whilst our face to face meetings in church have been limited by the lockdown, we continue to offer our services and activities to all. Both at the church and online we offer a safe and welcoming Christian space for LGBT+ people and their friends, some of whom may have experienced negative attitudes from other religious organisations.
- 6. During the year, we continued to keep our church's objectives and activities under review, having regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit. We are committed to maintaining the church as a safe space for all. During the year we have kept our policy and procedures under review and update for the protection of everyone involved in our church's activities.

Structure and governance

- 7. Our church is a registered charity and an unincorporated association. It is governed by a constitution approved the church members and last revised in 2009.
- 8. The charity is under the overall supervision of a Board of Trustees, composed of the Pastor (ex-officio Chair of the Board) and volunteers elected by, and from, the church membership. The Pastor is the charity's only salaried employee, and is responsible for managing its day-to-day activities. The church land and buildings are vested in the Official Custodian for Charities.
- 9. Rev Dwayne Morgan (Pastor), Kev Bales, Peter Dowrick, and Lesley Wilkes served as the Charity's trustees in 2019-20. We welcomed Theresa Dickson as a trustee from November 2019 when Lesley stepped down.

Activities and achievements

- 10. The highlight of Inclusive Community Church happens every Sunday when we gather as a church family to worship and fellowship. While our gathering this year has mostly been virtual, we have still marked this Church year with special services for Advent, World AIDS Day, Christmas, Epiphany, Ash Wednesday, Holy Week, Easter, Pentecost, Harvest Festival, All Saints Day, Remembrance Day, Transgender Day of Remembrance, and Reign of Christ.
- 11. Our activities enable us to provide public benefit by ministering to the spiritual wellbeing of LGBT+ persons, their friends, and anyone seeking a closer relationship with God.
- 12. This year we again held a Season of Pridetide when we celebrated not only the LGBT+ members of our community but also what it means to be a diverse, inclusive, and welcoming church for all. Through this, our other activities, our website, our online broadcasts, and our social media presence we joyfully proclaim God's inclusive love for all, regardless of gender identity or sexual orientation. Through the internet our services reach beyond Bournemouth, Christchurch, and Poole, to friends following us elsewhere in the UK and around the World.
- 13. Through the year, we offered a space for people to join us and pray for the needs of our church and our community on Tuesdays. Faithful prayer warriors gathered, first in person and then virtually, for this most important part of our church and we have seen God's faithfulness in hearing and answering our prayers.
- 14. Initially in 2019, we offered our monthly Midweek Morning Worship and Connect Coffee Morning to provide another opportunity for worship as well as an opportunity for fellowship. Our fellowship migrated to Zoom with our after-worship fellowship on Sundays and our weekly Coffee Morning after our weekly Light & Gentle Exercise Class. Our twice-monthly Small Group continued and then migrated into our first ever virtual Bible study.

15. In this past year we:

- · received replacement desks for our church office from the RSPB charity
- hosted Space Youth Project's Trans Family Day in December 2019
- celebrated the Christmas season together with our annual church family dinner at the Cumberland Hotel in Bournemouth in December 2019
- began Lent with our annual Pancakes and Ash evening on Ash Wednesday

- collected Easter eggs for the families at the local Women's Refuge
- held our first virtual Holy Week that included Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter Sunday, and a daily devotion offered online each morning during Holy Week
- marked Transgender Day of Remembrance in November, with an online community candlelight memorial
- joined with Body Positive Dorset to have a virtual World AIDS Day event in December broadcast from our Sanctuary.
- 16. Many members of our church volunteered in new ways this year. We thank each of our members for all they are doing to ensure that ministry takes place amongst us. A big 'thank you' to those members of our congregation who video recorded themselves for our Sunday readings and prayers, to those who have regularly helped with our weekly service broadcasts and special services such as a wedding, Transgender Day of Remembrance, and World AIDS Day, and to our volunteers for their gardening work and other efforts in helping to keep the church's premises looking good. In addition, special thanks to our trustees for their faithful leadership, sometimes through yet another Zoom meeting!

Financial review

- 17. We encourage our members to be faithful stewards of all the gifts that God has given them. We thank all members and friends who contributed to our church's funds during the year and who thereby enabled our Christian ministry and outreach to continue.
- 18. In the year ending August 2020, our church's total income was £52,300 compared to £45,100 in the previous year. Donations received totalled £48,000 and we received Income totalling £4,300 from fund raising and renting our hall to local groups.
- 19. Our expenditure was £42,100 in the year ending August 2020 compared to £41,100 in the previous year. We spent £26,600 on the pastor's salary, pension contributions and training and retreat costs. Our expenditure on the church building and equipment was £9,800 and we spent £5,700 on other costs. Also, we repaid £3,300 off of our outstanding mortgage bank loan.
- 20. We seek, where possible, to hold enough income in available reserves to meet at least one month's average routine spending. The net result in the year ending August 2020 was that we produced a surplus of £10,200, largely as the result of special donations

- received for our building and equipment fund. Our net current assets at 31st August 2020 were £7,500.
- 21. In view of the very extraordinary circumstances of the year, this is a very good result. The bulk of the extra income was from donations for current and future spending on the building. A big 'thank you' to everyone whose prayers, faithful support, and generosity helped achieve these good results in a most difficult year.

Conclusion

22. We give thanks for all that God has accomplished amongst us, and we look forward to the year ahead in the hope of Jesus Christ as we remember the words of the apostle Paul:

Let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up. So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all, and especially for those of the family of faith.

Note 1 - ACCOUNTING POLICIES

- Liabilities and expenditure are included in the financial statements at their cash value when the liability arises. ပ
- Restricted Funds are income funds that must be spent on restricted purposes for which the income was given 0
- Unrestricted Funds represent the remaining income funds of the Charity that are available for spending on the Charity's general purposes, including the General Fund and other Funds designated by the Charity's trustees for its own use or for spending on a future project. ø.

The church building and its land are shown in the Balance Sheet as a fixed asset at a value of £150,000 a General Fund capital reserve. Equipment, furnishings and other purchases are included in expenditure in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year they are acquired and do not appear as fixed assets in the Balance Sheet.

Note 5 - TRUSTEES TRANSACTIONS

- (a) The Pastor is ex-offico Chair of Trustees and is paid for duties as Pastor. He is the Charity's only employee. In the year ending August 2020 the Charity spent £24,000 on salary and £1,440 on pension contributions (compared to £22,460 and £1,086 respectively in the previous year).
- (b) The Pastor was reimbursed travel, retreat and telecoms costs of £1,535 (compared to £619 in the previous year). No similar payments were made to other Trustees in either year.
- (c) The Charity's income in the year includes £5,843 identified donations from current Trustees, including gift aid.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT ON THE ACCOUNTS

Report to the trustees of Inclusive Community Church

On accounts for the year ended 31st August 2020 Charity number: 801108

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner
