## Boston United Football Club Community Foundation Report of the Trustees for the year ended 30 June 2020

The Trustees present their report and financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 June 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (FRS 102) in preparing the annual report and financial statements of the charity.

#### **Objectives and principal activities**

Boston United Football Club Community Foundation is a Registered Charity, the objectives of which are:

- 1 To promote community participation in healthy recreation by providing facilities for the playing of Association football and other sports capable of improving health.
- 2 To provide and assist in providing facilities for sport, recreation or other leisure time occupation of such persons who have need for such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disablement, poverty or social and economic circumstances or for the public at large in the interest of social welfare and with the object of improving their conditions of life.
- 3 To relieve sickness and to preserve and promote physical and mental health through such charitable means as the trustees think fit.
- 4 To advance the education of children and other persons including academic, social and physical education through such charitable means as the trustees think ft.
- 5 For the general purposes of such charitable bodies or for such other exclusively charitable purposes in each case as the trustees may from time to time decide.

The principal activity of the company is the promotion and organisation of sport in the community.

#### Trustees

The Trustees who served during the year and since the year end were as follows:

The members of the Board of Trustees are elected at the Annual General Meeting by the members of the charity, and usually serve for a three year term.

The company is limited by guarantee therefore none of the trustees have an interest in share capital.

#### **Governing document**

The charity is governed by its memorandum and articles of association incorporated 21 November 2007 and amended by special resolution on 30 June 2017. The company became a registered charity on 7 September 2017.

#### **Corporate status**

The company is incorporated as a private company limited by guarantee without share capital.

#### Statement of the Trustees' responsibilities

The trustees (who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP 2015 (FRS102);
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue to operate.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

In so far as the trustees are aware:

- there is no relevant audit information of which the charitable company's auditor is unaware; and.
- the trustees have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any
  relevant audit information and to establish that the auditor is aware of that information

#### **Financial Review**

The Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) shows that at the end of the financial year we had positive reserves to carry forward of £10,031, compared with negative reserves of £20,392 at 30 June 2019.

The Trustees are continuing to obtain sponsorship and income from donations is increasing whilst also focusing on the core activities of increasing community participation in sport. We are confident therefore that our activities are sustainable and that we are on course to create a surplus on unrestricted reserves.

#### Statement for public benefit test for charities

In setting our objectives and planning our activities the trustees have given careful consideration to the charity commission general guidance on public benefit.

#### Achievements and performance

The year has been over-shadowed to a certain extent by the Covid19 restrictions that were put in place in March 2020. However, the charity has still been very busy engaging with the community, encouraging sports participation, delivering education and facilitating healthy lifestyles, both physical and mental.

The charity took part in the National School Sports week in June 2020, by sharing a variety of activities and games that people can take part in at home. Since the beginning of lockdown, the charity has been sharing regular digital content to help children and their families stay active, including P.E. from Home, virtual football sessions, cheer and dance routine ideas, various challenges and afterschool activities.

During the periods of lockdown, some of the charity's staff have been busy posting on social media every day, helping everyone to keep fit and improve skills, together with encouraging interaction with the community to help overcome some of the feelings of isolation that occurred during that period.

In December 2019, over 70 Boston United junior players took part in a foundation phase Futsal Day. Teams ranging from Under 7 to Under 11 within the club's Foundation Phase participated in a series of in-house games.

In November 2019, 25 young people attended our FA Junior Leaders Award with FA Tutor Matt Evans, as part of our Grassroots Funding project – helping these young people gain lifelong skills and volunteer experience. The day consisted of classroom based workshops and practicals that focused on leadership qualities and skills. This was a great opportunity to gain valuable experience in sport and give them important life and leadership skills that they can use in the future. The young people will also gain voluntary work experience with our sports charity.

Boston United and Boston United Community Foundation were shortlisted once again for The National Game Community Award alongside five other clubs. This was the second year the FSA (previously known as the Football Supporters' Federation) have run the National Game Community Award, which highlight the variety of excellent community outreach work undertaken by non-league football clubs. Those who are shortlisted are clubs whose innovation involves supporters and local partners in making a positive impact in their local communities – so we are very proud to be shortlisted for this award for a second year and it pays tribute to the amazing work we do with local communities and local partnerships, including Fans for Diversity.

Our walking football programmes were established to create general fitness regardless of age. Boston United's Over 65s won the Asha Healthcare Midlands League Cup at Nottingham Powerleague in September 2019. This was a great way to bring down the curtain on their first season playing together, where they finished as League Runners-Up as well.

Boston United Academy offers an opportunity to develop young football players to excel on the pitch. It also offers an education package in conjunction with Boston United Sports College which provides a range of study options and enrichment opportunities. In June 2020, academy football player Josh Burkitt accepted a two year football and education scholarship with English Football League Two side Bradford City, alongside a season long loan deal with Newark Football Club.

The Pilgrim Cup is an annual tournament which celebrated its 10th year in 2019, but could not take place in 2020 due to the Covid19 restrictions. In a normal year it is a very successful weekend with over 140 teams entering from U7-U16, with a representation of teams from the Premier League, EFL and National League.

Despite incredibly difficult circumstances, the trustees consider the charity has had a successful year, supporting the community wherever possible and providing opportunities for the community to take part in sporting activities where Covid19 restrictions have allowed. It has promoted healthy lifestyles and increased physical activity together with providing opportunities for the local community to develop skills and access training.

#### 1 Summary of significant accounting policies

#### (a) General information and basis of preparation

Boston United Football Club Community Foundation is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity. The address of the registered office is given in the charity information on page 1 of these financial statements. The nature of the charity's operations and principal activities are described on page 3.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued in October 2019, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006 and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest  $\pounds$ .

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

#### (b) Income recognition

Grants received of a revenue nature are credited to Incoming Resources in the Statement of Financial Activities when the company is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Services provided, sponsorship and rents are accounted for on the accruals basis. Other income is accounted for when received. All income is shown gross with associated costs included in expenditure.

#### (c) Expenditure recognition

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### (d) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life.

# (e) Funds

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in the furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.
