COMMENCEMENT OF ACTIVITIES

The company was incorporated on 31 July 2008 and commenced its activities on 1 August 2008 when assets and liabilities of Birkbeck College Students' Union, an unincorporated entity, were transferred in.

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE TO DATE

Overview

The Union received a subvention from the College of £345,000 towards the costs of staff and 'core activities' agreed between the Trustees and the College management in line with the Memorandum of Understanding. The Union generated additional income of £28,177, which was mainly formed from the sale of membership discount cards.

The Trustees are grateful for the continued support that the College governors, management and staff provide. In 2019/20, the Union's financial target was to end the year with a surplus of £20,000. we have exceeded our target, ending the year with our surplus above this target. This was largely as a result of planned budgeted activities not taking place, or taking place in another format, due to coronavirus. This includes the recruitment of a second part-time Advisor post, which will now be recruited during the 2020/21 academic year instead.

Reserves and Restricted Funds

Reserves are classified as restricted or unrestricted. Within Unrestricted Funds are Designated funds where the trustees have committed the union to future expenditure, such as on projects that have received match-funding. Restricted reserves comprise of balances on Grants and on Clubs & Societies where funds have been received for a specific purpose and the union is restricted in its use of these funds.

The Trustees encourage students running clubs and societies, to ensure there is financial activity within their remits, and where possible to develop plans to apply these restricted funds for student benefit within the constitutional objects and mission of their club or society and engaging their membership widely in its application.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The Union is controlled by its governing documents; a Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 31 July 2008 (amended 1 August 2009), and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Appointment of Trustees

The Board of Trustees consists of no more than fourteen persons and is made up as follows: Not more than seven Officer Trustees elected annually by secret ballot of the Union membership for a 12-month term; Not more than two Student Trustees appointed for a term of one year; Not more than five Lay Trustees appointed for a term of three years.

Risk management

The Trustees have assessed the Union's activities and believe that the Union is adequately insured and, with new financial management, monitoring and control process now agreed with the College, and considers it has an appropriate risk management policy in place.

During the year, the insurance policies and schedules were reviewed fully by both the Union's management, the insurance broker and underwriters and this work considered and approved by the Trustees. The Trustees have considered and noted the implications of the organisational duties of safeguarding, the appropriateness and needs of checks on individuals hold elected or paid office or posts in the charity in relation to the information held by the Disclosure & Barring Service and wider corporate duties under the provisions of the Bribery Act 2011 and the Lobbying, Non-Party Campaigning & Trade Union Administration Act 2014.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Constitutional Aims and Objects

The objects of the Union are the advancement of education of Students at Birkbeck, University of London for the public benefit by:

- 1. promoting the interests and welfare of Students at Birkbeck, University of London during their course of study and representing, supporting and advising Students;
- 2. being the recognised representative channel between Students and Birkbeck, University of London and any other external bodies; and
- 3. providing social, cultural, sporting and recreational activities and forums for discussions and debate for the personal development of its Students.

The Trustees have considered the effect of the Charity Commission's statement on public benefit on the operations and constitution of the Union.

IMPACT REPORT 2019/20

STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATE

2019-20 saw the conclusion of the Union's 'Getting out of neutral' strategic plan', which was first adopted by the Union in 2017. The focus was on turning around the Union to be one of a better fit for purpose for Birkbeck students.

As the previous strategic plan has now come to an end, this last year we have started to look to the Union's future by focusing on putting together our new plan. At the end of the first term we conducted research with over 1,000 of our members to identify what our priorities should be for the next three years and they told us that they want the Union to work on:

- 1. Supporting student wellbeing
- 2. Supporting students' employability
- 3. Enhancing students' social experience
- 4. Representing the views of students
- 5. Representing academic interests

So that's what we're going to do. We're still finalising our exact plans to deliver in each of these areas and were aiming to have the new strategic plan complete by the start of 2021, but due to the pandemic, we delayed the completion for a year. It is now due to be finished by the end of this academic year.

OFFICERS & BOARD

After a number of years of students telling us they wanted our Trans Officer post to be a paid Liberation Officer position, this year we held our election for the first ever paid Trans Officer post in the Union. In addition, the Union has put more resources into increasing the Liberation Officers' hours so they now work 9 hours per week, up from 7.5. This now brings the number of paid officers up to seven.

In addition, the Trans Officer is now a Trustee and Director for the Union, joining the other six student officers, two Student Trustees and a number of Lay Trustees. We have increased the number of Lay Trustees on the Board from four to five, to help balance out the increased number of elected students on the Board.

DEMOCRACY & REPRESENTATION

SABBATICAL OFFICERS

The seven Elected Officers are the leaders of the Students' Union who represent the students to the College and sit on both the Trustee Board and Executive committee, directing the Union and lead on the work it does each year. They are elected each Spring; therefore, students are encouraged vote.

STUDENT COUNCIL

Student Council is an elected group of representatives who pass policy, debate student issues and hold the Student Leaders to account. There are over 30 positions that sit on Council, which are elected in the Autumn Elections – Birkbeck students can run for a position, and all students are encouraged to vote.

SCHOOL & COURSE REPRESENTATIVES

School and Course Representatives are an essential part in helping elevate the student voice and keep the College and Union informed with student feedback.

School Representatives are a paid position that we hire over the summer - you can find out who your School Representatives is by visiting the Student Voice tab on our website.

Course Representatives are elected in classroom at the start of each term, students can nominate themselves.

OFFICER PROJECTS & CAMPAIGNS

Our Student Officers lead on liberation networks and campaigns to make changes that have a positive impact on students' studies and overall experience while at Birkbeck. Here's the highlights from Officer Projects & Campaigns in 2019.

STUDENT LEADERS

Alexander Holmes

Alex delivered a verbal officer report. He feels like it has been a really good and positive year. Essentially everything, except panopto which is nearly there, that he got elected on has been completed/achieved. He highlighted some of his successes with introducing a paid trans officer, introducing microwaves, lobbying the college to make exams more accessible, work with the library around 24 hour opening and some other exciting news to come. His big win since the last meeting was his work on the support during COVID – he ensured that the no detriment policy was fair for students, running a survey for students with 700 responses and he has lobbied the college to support students during this time

Barney O'Connor

Barney delivered a verbal report on his work since the last Council meeting – where he has worked closely with Alex on the COVID response. His big wins throughout the year were Council tax exemption for part time students, he has enjoyed working with officers and the staff team throughout the year.

Jayden Solitro

Jayden delivered a verbal report. He highlighted that throughout the year he has run an LGBTQ+ History month, which included a lot of fun events and informative workshops, he worked closely with Alex to create a trans students' policy and worked with Gabriella for a sexual health campaign. He had planned lots of events for Pride, including a fundraising event for 56 Dean Street, but COVID hit and he was unable to run them the way he wanted but still ran some events online. Is looking forward to working with the Union to make change throughout next year.

Gabriella Gasparini

Gabriella introduced Free Period Products (although Union funded/donated) to Women's toilets in Malet Street. She also got the College to look into introducing Sanitary Product dispenser things into the women's toilets.

COMMUNICATIONS

NEWSLETTER

We've seen another increase in the responses to our newsletters this year. The open rate has increased to between 42% - 65%, averaging at around 55%. This is an improvement from the 40% - 50% we received steadily last year.

This standard was exceeded during the Coronavirus outbreak, with COVID-19 based update emails regularly reaching a 75% open rate.

Click throughs stay around 3%, with the odd peaks of 5%.

INSTAGRAM

Our Instagram following has risen from 504 (Sept 2019) to 738 followers (August 2020.) This is a decent increase from last year, and we gain new followers each time we post, so we should continue to see an increase in this audience.

Impressions from posts has been steadily climbing since it's previous peak of 330 per post (July 2019). We are consistently reaching beyond 400 per post since March, now averaging 450 per post for every post! Engagement and likes on these posts have also increased. We're getting more engagement from Clubs & Societies, the College and student officers in terms of Instagram stories, something that we will continue to utilise in the coming year.

TWITTER

2020: After decreasing in followers last year, we have increased again to 4033 Followers (August 2020), which is higher than the followers before the decrease last year (3908 in 2018, and 3678 in 2019.)

We are averaging around 22.7K impressions (Aug 2020) a month, which is a slight increase from last year's 22.1K (June 2019.) However, our tweet impressions reached over 30K in Sept, Dec, April and June, and a whopping 48.2K in March! These higher numbers are becoming more frequent and we hope to continue this growth in the next year.

FACEBOOK

2430 likes, 2584 follow this as of Aug 2020 – our audience is growing slower than we would like, however it is an increase from 2200 like (June 2019.)

Unfortunately, our post reach has barely improved, going up only slightly from a 1134 reach (Aug 2019) – 1175 reach (Aug 2020.)

Facebook is our platform with the lowest audience, but we aim to increase it's engagement with students in the following year by improving accessibility and crossover via existing and new platforms, such as Moodle and a more streamlined website.

WEBSITE

We had 725 users (Aug 2020) across 937 sessions on our website. This is a slight increase in student engaging with our website from the previous year's 645 users across 845 sessions (Aug 2019.)

Overall, website usage is down across the Students' Union website, as you can see by the User numbers for 2019 - 2020 compared with 2018 - 2019.

The Students' Union is currently undertaking a website review, with the intent to restructure and redesign the website to create a more informative, engaging and accessible hub of information.

We can see from the numbers and page visits that we need to keep Users on our website for longer sessions, reduce the page bounce rate and improve student engagement overall.

CORONAVIRUS

When coronavirus caused the College to move entirely online, we took up the role of being central communicators to students. We dedicated additional time to making sure students were informed of the changes to their studies and within the College and Students' Union.

We received lots of positive feedback from students to thank us for our excellent communications during the outbreak, as we were determined to keep students informed of the changes to their studies and invited feedback – which students engaged with – to lobby for the right protections for students.

We ran a survey for students to take a look at how they were being affected by the pandemic, both in their studies and their wellbeing, and brought the results to the College to lobby for outcomes that supported students during the pandemic and the consequent online teaching. 770 current Birkbeck students spent a total of 6184 minutes completing it, and had a direct impact on the creation and implementation of the No-detriment policy and changes to Mitigating Circumstances.

NEW PLATFORMS FOR 2020

Moodle

We are launching a new Students' Union module on Moodle, which we hope will increase our engagement from students. By having information on all Students' Union services available on Moodle, a central hub for online student traffic, we predict that we will see an increase in students understanding what services we offer and how to get involved.

ADVICE

Birkbeck, University of London Student Union (BBKSU) Advice dealt with 144 cases and counting within the academic year of 2019/20. 72% of students that accessed the Advice service declared they have disability.38% of clients were BAME (it's a small percentage, so I do not know if this will be seen as an impact). It's a low percentage as students also did not want to mention their ethnicity. BBKSU completed over 600 tasks on clients overall, we closed 81 cases and had 13 closed enquiries.

Case subjects were made up of 30% appeals, 29% of complaints and 24% of mitigating circumstances. All evenly split and some intertwined.

Report of the Independent Auditors to the Members of Birkbeck College Students' Union

Opinion

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charity has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemption in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

The requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

Support costs have been allocated to Charitable Activities on the following basis:

Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where there is a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party, and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees. Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes. Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The company participates in the Universities Superannuation Scheme (USS) and the Superannuation Arrangements of the University of London (SAUL), which are funded, defined benefit schemes. The schemes are contracted out of the State Second Pension (S2P). The schemes are valued formally every three years by professionally qualified independent actuaries using the projected unit method. Informal reviews of the schemes' position are carried out in the period between formal valuations.

Under the terms of FRS 102, where an employer participates in a multi-employer defined benefit pension scheme that is in deficit and the employer has entered into an agreement to fund the deficit, the entity must recognise a liability for the contributions payable that arise from the agreement. The charge to the income and expenditure account is the contributions payable to the schemes for the accounting period, which is the same as it would be if these were defined contribution schemes.

Going Concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future, as disclosed in note 17. For this reason they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

18 GOING CONCERN & FUTURE OF BIRKBECK COLLEGE STUDENTS' UNION

Due to the deficit made in the year 2011-12, and the level of monies owed to Birkbeck College at the year end, the trustees of the Union entered into discussions with Birkbeck College regarding the long-term future of the Union.

As a result of these discussions, Birkbeck College agreed to continue to support the Union for the foreseeable future.

Based on the above agreement, these accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis.

19 RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Birkbeck College

The Union's relationship with Birkbeck College is defined in the Report of the Trustees. Various grants were received by the Union from Birkbeck College as detailed in Note 2 to the Accounts.

20 PENSION SCHEMES

a) Universities Superannuation Scheme (USS)

The charity participates in the Universities Superannuation Scheme, a defined benefit scheme. The assets of the scheme are held in a separate trustee-administrated fund.

The latest triennial actuarial valuation of the scheme was at 31 March 2018. This was the fifth valuation for USS under the new scheme-specific funding regime introduced by the Pensions Act 2004, which requires schemes to adopt a statutory funding objective, which is to have sufficient and appropriate assets to cover their technical provisions. A valuation as at 31 March 2020 is underway with a completion date of 30 June 2021

At the valuation date, the value of the assets of the scheme was £63.7 billion and the value of the scheme's technical provisions was £67.3 billion indicating a shortfall of £3.6 billion. The assets therefore were sufficient to cover 95% of the benefits, which had accrued to members after allowing for expected future increases in earnings.

Following UK government legislation, from 2011 statutory pensions increases or revaluations are based on the Consumer Prices Index measure of price inflation. Historically these increases had been based on the Retail Prices Index measure of price inflation.

The charity participates in the salary sacrifice pension scheme. The staff costs (note 9) shows the pensionable salary which includes the employee salary sacrifice element. The charity contribution rate payable was 18% of pensionable salaries until 31 March 2019. On 1 April 2019 the contribution rate payable rose to 19.5%, and increased to 21.1% from October 2019.

As at 31 July 2020 the charity had 1 active member participating in the scheme. The total pension cost (excluding the salary sacrifice pension element) for the company was £9,152 (2019: £7,770).

20 PENSION SCHEMES (continued)

b) Superannuation Arrangements of the University of London (SAUL)

The charity participates in the Superannuation Arrangements of the University of London ("SAUL"), which is a centralised defined benefit scheme within the United Kingdom and was contracted out of the Second State Pension (prior to April 2016).

SAUL is an independently-managed pension scheme for the non-academic staff of over 50 colleges and institutions with links to higher education.

Pension benefits accrued within SAUL currently build up on a Career Average Revalued Earnings ("CARE") basis.

The charity is not expected to be liable to SAUL for any other current participating employer's obligations under the Rules of SAUL, but in the event of an insolvency of any participating employer within SAUL, an amount of any pension shortfall (which cannot otherwise be recovered) in respect of that employer, may be spread across the remaining participating employers and reflected in the next actuarial valuation.

Funding Policy

SAUL's statutory funding objective is to have sufficient and appropriate assets to meet the costs incurred by the Trustee in paying SAUL's benefits as they fall due (the "Technical Provisions"). The Trustee adopts assumptions which, taken as a whole, are intended to be sufficiently prudent for pensions and benefits already in payment to continue to be paid and for the commitments which arise from Members' accrued pension rights to be met.

The Technical Provisions assumptions include appropriate margins to allow for the possibility of events turning out worse than expected. However, the funding method and assumptions do not completely remove the risk that the Technical Provisions could be insufficient to provide benefits in the future.

A formal actuarial valuation of SAUL is carried out every three years by a professionally qualified and independent actuary. The last actuarial valuation was carried out with an effective date of 31 March 2017. Informal reviews of SAUL's position, reflecting changes in market conditions, cash flow information and new accrual of benefits, are carried out between formal valuations.

The funding principles were agreed by the Trustee and employers in June 2018 and are due to bereviewed at SAUL's next formal valuation in 2020.

At the 31 March 2017 valuation SAUL was fully funded on its Technical Provisions basis so no deficit contributions were required. The most recent review of the scheme as at 31 March 2019 also indicated an improvement in the scheme's funding position compared to 31 March 2017, showing a surplus. Therefore, the Trustee and the Employers have agreed that the ongoing Employers' contributions will continue at a rate of 16% of CARE Salaries.

The 2020 valuation is underway with the final outcomes to be agreed by 30 June 2021. Details of the scheme and the 2017 valuation can be found at www.saul.org.uk

The total pension cost for the charity (excluding the salary sacrifice element) was £13,442 (2019: £19,088).

21 POST BALANCE SHEET EVENT

During the COVID-19 pandemic, the Union's finances have been affected in regards to significant amounts of both income and expenditure. Not being on-site has limited much of our income-generating activities, such as a Welcome Fair which would normally include commercial stalls that pay to be in attendance.

In addition, our expenditure has reduced as many of our more costly activities were moved online or have not taken place. For example, many of our sports clubs have not been able to meet, meaning we have not had to pay for the of hire external venues to third parties.

The Board does not consider that there will be any material impact on its financial position.

Any loss of revenue caused by the cancellation of physical events hosted by the Union will be offset by savings in hire of external venues and travel costs.

Therefore, the Union is confident of continuing as a going concern under existing arrangements with Birkbeck College (see Note 18).
