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Chair Person's Report for the Year Ended 31 March 2021

Once again, the Covid pandemic has affected the working practices of Footsteps. Despite lockdown and social distancing difficulties, staff have nevertheless worked hard to continue our usual dedicated, effective and professional service, communicating with service users both virtually and more recently, face to face.

From 1st April 2021, Footsteps is planning to strengthen its support services by becoming the first subsidiary of Making Space Group, a national health and social care charity. The benefits to Footsteps are that Making Space will provide backroom support eg HR, IT, payroll processing, training, marketing, fundraising and management accounts for the Board of Trustees. I am confident that our relationship with Making Space will ensure security nad growth for the future of our Charity.

Footsteps 2000 Limited will continue delivering our services under its current title from offices in Warrington and St Helens.

In November 2020, Stacey Goulding resigned as Service Manager. However earlier this year, Jane Reeves, an experienced Service Manager from Making Space was seconded to the post on a temporary basis.

Two new Trustee/Directors will shortly be joining the Board, one of whom is the Director of Finance, Making Space.

After a temporary suspension of Board meetings due to lockdown restrictions, Board meetings were reinstated on 14th October 2020. The 8th Footsteps AGM was also held on this date.

The Footsteps team continues to work hard to secure funding nad deliver its unique and valuable service to clients.

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2021

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2021. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The charity's objects are specifically restricted to the following:

Advancement of the education of the public, particularly among the parents of young persons who are, or may be, drug abusers and the relief of sickness and preservation of good mental health, in particular by the provision of a service of counselling and advice for such parents.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Significant activities

Review of Progress - our missions, achievements, aims and objectives

Footsteps have been working tirelessly over the past 12 months to provide support to families affected by a loved one's substance misuse. The service provides support to Children and Young People aged 4-19 years old and adults. Our mission is to reduce the stigma associated with substance misuse and ensure that we provide a relevant and effective service by delivering accurate, understandable and up-to-date information to our clients.

The services we provide:

- Support to children and young people in the Warrington area and to adults throughout the Warrington and St Helens area
- Telephone help including out of hours' service
- 1-1 appointments
- Counselling for adults
- Home visits
- Professional advice and support
- Education and awareness sessions about drugs and alcohol use
- Training courses
- Peer support groups
- Emotional support
- Advocacy, mediation and support at formal and informal meetings
- Respite activities and opportunities
- Empowerment of clients to achieve and maintain change to improve their mental and physical wellbeing
- Support within schools and colleges for children affected by parental substance misuse
- M-PACT Programme

The Footsteps Team

Over the past year we have seen some staff changes within Footsteps due to changes within our contracts. Footsteps now has a total of:

- 5 employed staff members
- 2 student counsellors
- 8 active volunteers
- 5 volunteer board members

Fundraising

Footsteps have been supported by clients over the past year. Clients have raised money in various ways including a marathon swim and a bag packing in St Helens. Footsteps will continue to be a part of the community raising funds.

FUNDING

Tudor Trust - Tudor Trust is a bespoke service to grandparents and kinship carers across Warrington and St Helens. Unfortunately, the Tudor Trust Grant came to an end in March 2020. The 3 years with Tudor Trust has been very successful; we have exceeded our target numbers and have been able to look at the older generation and produce documents around how important it is that grandparents and kinship carers are supported fully.

We hope to look for further funding to allow this role to continue.

BBC Children in Need - This grant, supporting 11 -18 year olds came to an end in August 2019. The Children in Need project thrived as we were able to support young people affected by parental substance misuse whilst offering respite, advocacy, and support groups. The target for CIN was to support 100 children and young people over the 3 year period. Footsteps supported 359 young people within this programme. We have seen the mental health and wellbeing of our young people become much more positive; they are now thriving for a progressive future. The project has enabled us to conduct our own research and provide reports and data to Warrington Borough Council, enabling them to understand the need for this specific service across Warrington.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

BBC Children in need under 11's - Footsteps have had a very successful year with the under 11's grant in the first year. The post, providing 8 working hours per week, supported 93 children in the first year. This has been a challenge for Footsteps as it has seen a new cohort in need of support which has now been recognised and fundamentally needed within our project area. Footsteps have been able to support the whole family with the BBC Children in Need funding, ensuring no one is left behind. This is a 3-year grant which started in June 2019 and ends in May 2022.

Coalfields Regeneration Trust - Coalfields' funding was for a specific amount of time, meaning that it came to an end in 2019. The funding allowed us to provide counselling to 50 of our clients in the most deprived areas across Warrington and St Helens. The project has been very successful with every client having improved their wellbeing scores and some seeking voluntary work with a view to securing employment in the near future. Footsteps have since applied for additional funding with Coalfields in 2020/21.

Steven Morgan Foundation - Footsteps have secured a 3-year post with the Steven Morgan Foundation, working with 11 -18 year olds. This has enabled us to fill a gap in provision provided to young people across Warrington since existing funding has come to an end. We look forward to our new working partnership and are confident this will be a success.

Rotary Club St Helens - Footsteps has taken part in various fundraising events with the Rotary Club in St Helens and have received generous donations over many years.

Commissioned/Grant-Funded Services -

Warrington - In Warrington Footsteps were commissioned by Warrington Borough Council to provide support to family members who are affected by a loved-one's substance misuse. Footsteps provide a family service within Risley Prison and Thorn Cross prison. This work is commissioned through NHS England and Public Health, subcontracted through CGL.

Despite the Covid-19 pandemic, our Groups continue to run successfully, some via Zoom meetings with additional respite days and craft/art workshops.

CGL Pathways Warrington - Footsteps were sub-contracted by CGL at Pathways to Recovery through Warrington Borough Council to provide support to family members who are affected by a loved-one's substance misuse. The contract also allows us to support families who have a loved one abusing substances with HMP Risley and HMP Thorn Cross prison.

In September 2020, our contract of five years came to and end with CGL as they feel they no longer require our service. The partnership working has been effective and has allowed us to work together with families to enable a whole family approach with full family support. Over the five years we have supported many families who have benefited from both services working jointly together.

In addition to our main funders Footsteps were successful in obtaining extra special funding to support our clients in various, additional ways during the Covid 19- pandemic. Here is the list of funders we would like to say a big thank you to for their support during this most difficult time:

National Lottery for M pact Programme, National Lottery/Awards for All , CCFF/Cheshire Community Support Fund, Steve Morgan Foundation ,BBC Children in Need, Cheshire Community Foundation, Assura Community Fund, One Stop Carriers, Groundwork ,Torus, and Masons.

St Helens Council Grant - Performance Meetings have been positive. St Helens continues to thrive and remain busy. Groups continue to run well, and volunteers have been engaging now more than ever before, supporting us in networking with the community and building relationships with partnering agencies. Footsteps have welcomed ideas from beneficiaries throughout the year which has resulted in more respite days for our adult clients and craft workshops. To date we have run 6 craft workshops which have been well attended and thoroughly enjoyed by all.

After a conversation with St Helens Council it was agreed that they would fund Footsteps for a further 12 months from 1st April 2021. St Helens Council have agreed that the data we produce is superior. We are hoping to continue working in partnership with them for many years to come.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Website, Social Media, Promotion and Marketing

Our Website has been updated with a simpler more likable format. www.footstepsforfamilies.org.uk
This change has been successful in the increased number of referrals we received.

Quality Assurance

Footsteps policies, procedures and protocols have been reviewed and are now up to date. Footsteps will continue to follow the Charities Governance Code and ensure that all protocols are followed. The code sets the principles and recommended practice for good governance and practice. Footsteps will use the tool for continuous improvement towards the highest standards.

Training

All staff are trained according to the DANOS guidelines and undertake a Level 3 training course in Drugs and Alcohol each year.

Safeguarding training continues to be updated as well as all other relevant training. The focus has been on safeguarding, mental health main (primarily self-harming) and substance misuse.

Volunteer Counselling Service

Clients can access 1-1 counselling sessions alongside their family support sessions. The counselling service is always well received by clients. We currently have 2 volunteer counsellors and 2 paid counsellor who attend our Warrington and St Helens office on a weekly basis.

The counselling service is an additional support service that provides clients with a smooth exit from the service. Counselling is usually offered in blocks of six sessions but in most cases is extended when required.

In Conclusion

As a team, we have faced many challenges over the past year but have overcome them and thrived within our work. Clients remain supported, especially adult clients, as it has not been possible to secure funding for this client group. The team have worked to a high standard, ensuring no disruption to clients.

Footsteps has come to the end of some contracts this year but have also been successful in securing new funding - and hope that our new partnerships can only bring a more sustainable future for Footsteps.

The Footsteps Board of Directors, together with the Service Manager, staff and volunteers continue to work hard to implement positive changes to ensure the continued provision of our service within the Warrington and St Helens communities.

There are many planned changes going forward, which will benefit Footsteps and make working in partnership with other agencies more successful.

Public benefit

We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities.

Volunteers

In St Helens, our team of 5 volunteers have attended a range of awareness raising events across the community. This included leaflet drops and monthly attendance at Whiston Hospital.

Footsteps Warrington also has 3 volunteers who continue to be a great support to our service.

Footsteps provides an enhanced DBS for all volunteers and supports relevant training and workshops.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Footsteps is a local charity that provides a listening, information and support service to those families in the Warrington and St Helens areas that find it difficult to cope with a loved one's drug or alcohol misuse. Founded in 2000 as a grass roots organisation by parents concerned with their own children's drug use, each year we help partners, siblings, children, parents and grandparents to cope with the emotional, psychological and physical impact of living with another's substance misuse.

The work undertaken by Footsteps 2000 Ltd is to provide tailored support to those individuals who are adversely affected by a significant other's drug or alcohol misuse. This support encompasses structured interventions following completion of Assessment, Care Planning and Goal Setting.

Ensuring our Work Delivers our Aims

We review our aims, objectives and activities each year. This review looks at what we achieved and the outcomes of our work in the previous 12 months. The review looks at the success of each key activity and the benefits they have brought to those groups of people we are set up to help. The review also helps us ensure our aims, objectives and activities remained focused on our stated purposes. Our Trustees and Service Manager consider how planned and structured activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

Mission

The mission statement articulates the organisation's operation in the following way:

To provide listening, information and support to families affected by substance misuse in a sensitive, non-judgemental and confidential manner.

The organisation aims to recognise the devastation caused to families and to reduce the fear, shame and stigma felt by those people affected by someone else's substance misuse. Families and carers require support in their own right to prevent secondary social breakdown but also to secure their significant contribution to the recovery journey of their family members.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Investment policy and objectives

The Board maintain a deposit bank account which provides an income in the form of interest. As the funds held in the deposit account are required at short notice to meet the needs of the charity, the Board feels that this is the best current investment option for the Charity.

Reserves policy

The Trustees have decided, because of the dependence on external donors, to set the level of reserves at an amount equivalent to three months running costs. The Board of Trustees, staff and 'Friends of Footsteps' are actively exploring avenues towards increasing the level of unrestricted general reserves.

Going concern

The Trustees are continually reviewing the operations of the charity and its ability to deliver its objects during the Covid 19 pandemic. The Trustees have followed Government Guidance and are seeking financial assistance where appropriate and making cost savings where possible. In the opinion of the Trustees significant financial pressure will be placed on the Charity as a result of the Covid 19 pandemic but the Trustees believe they have the structure and resources to ensure the Charity remains a going concern.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The organisation is a charitable company, limited by guarantee as defined by the Companies Act 2006, incorporated on 29 February 2012 and registered at the Charity Commission on 15 May 2012. The charitable company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The charity may by ordinary resolution, at a general meeting, appoint a person who is willing to act to be a director/trustee and determine the rotation in which any additional directors/trustees are to retire.

The directors/trustees may appoint a person who is willing to be a director/trustee, however, that director/trustee must retire at the next annual general meeting and, if wishing to continue as a director/trustee, be formally appointed by resolution at that meeting.

The minimum number of directors/trustees is three, with no maximum number.

Induction and training of new trustees

All trustees are offered an induction package, including information about the charity, meetings with staff and Charity Commission trustee's leaflets. All trustees are invited to participate in relevant training.

Wider network

Partnership Working and New Developments

Footsteps have prioritised partnership working over the last 12 months ensuring we have connected with all relevant agencies across Warrington and St Helens.

We strive to communicate with all primary and secondary schools across Warrington. This has been very successful and has generated many referrals.

Footsteps became part of a new programme M-PACT (Moving Parents and Children Together).

M-PACT is a whole family, multi-family, structured brief intervention. Its psychosocial, educational, and systematic approach aims to improve the well-being of children and families affected by parental substance misuse. The programme supports families to address areas such as communication and coping strategies as well as educating family members on what addiction is and the impact it has. It is now one of the longest standing interventions for parental substance misuse in the UK and continues to be a unique and innovative programme, which puts children at its heart.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The financial statements are prepared in Sterling £ and rounded to the nearest £.

The charitable company has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

- the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows;
- the requirement of paragraph 3.17(d);
- the requirements of paragraphs 11.42, 11.44, 11.45, 11.47, 11.48(a)(iii), 11.48(a)(iv), 11.48(b) and 11.48(c);

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charitycharity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
