The trustees, who are also Directors for the purposes of the Companies Act, have pleasure in presenting their report and the unaudited financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2021

Structure, Governance and Management of the Farming Life Centre

The Farming Life Centre (hereinafter referred to as FLC), was incorporated as a Company Limited by Guarantee and Registered Charity and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association adopted on 8th October 2008.

Directors meet on a quarterly basis where they receive full financial reports from the Treasurer, a full project report from the Charity Manager and where they consider all other strategic issues relating to the Charity.

FLC Volunteers are recruited via our friends and contacts, statutory partners and via our social media accounts. We have worked with the Derbyshire Dales Council for Voluntary Service and other stakeholders to promote our request for volunteers, especially the need for new Trustees. Our hard copy publicity materials, new media and press releases include volunteer recruitment.

Our charity is open to everyone living in rural communities including farmers- we accept self-referrals as well as referrals from social care and health professionals- therefore anyone who lives in rural communities can seek support from the centre. Moreover, FLC is involved with rural enterprises/businesses and health so there is scope to support hard to reach individuals in a holistic way.

Our activities are charitable and projects aim to benefit those most in need. We aim to tackle wider determinants of health and impact on our rural/farming communities who are affected by distance decay. The FLC Board understands its obligations to manage resources wisely. Throughout the year, regular reviews of contingency and emergency funds have been carried out to ensure fully compliant. Given the challenges the Board actively seeks to manage risk to ensure continuation of the charity to reach increasing numbers of beneficiaries.

Risk Management

Major risks to which FLC might be exposed have been identified by the Board based on information provided by the Charity Manager and Treasurer. Where significant risks are identified, a strategy for mitigating those risks will be developed and presented to the Board of Trustees for approval.

Objectives and Activities of the Farming Life Centre and Public Benefit

The objects of The Farming Life Centre, as stated in its governing document;

'The relief of sickness, promotion of health and relief of financial hardship among the farming community in the area defined by the current boundaries of the Peak District National Park'

- Developing joint projects and collaborative working with other organisations.
- Representing FLC at strategic level by attending Derbyshire Dales Place Alliance and the Health and Well-being Partnership, by acting as a Board Member on the 'Peak LEADER' Board and 'South West Peak Land Partnership' Board and by being involved in various forums relating to themes such as older people, health and the environment.

Achievements and performance

During the year, FLC has made achievements in the following areas of work.

Projects and other notable pieces of work

Social Connectedness Project:

With funding from the Derbyshire Dales a small team made up of Farming Life Centre and the Derbyshire Rural Chaplaincy representatives and volunteers visit different 'on farm' locations and provide breakfast and the opportunity to chat with their peers. This project was put on hold due to Covid-19 and will restart in July 2021.

Farm Your Future:

We secured funding from the Princes Countryside Fund and the Derbyshire County Council Locality Fund to be able to facilitate practical business support including:

- · Basic bookkeeping information
- Grant application trouble shooting
- Guidance on livestock record keeping
- Support when preparing for audits
- Targeted workshops and forums
- Signposting to support agencies

Rural Reconnections:

National Lottery Local Connections Fund helped FLC to re-connect with all its beneficiaries and help to reduce loneliness. Garden vouchers and a personal letter was sent.

Macmillan Rural Health Outreach Project - Macmillan Cancer Support

The Macmillan Rural Health Outreach Project is a 4-year project (2018-2022) funded by Macmillan and hosted by the FLC.

The service is designed to support people living in rural communities across the Peak District who are:

- Rurally /socially isolated
- Have little or no/family friend support networks available to them
- Are or have been directly affected by cancer and /or other life limiting health conditions
- Are or have been a recent carer for or close to someone with cancer or another life limiting condition where they need some support or signposting assistance.

The project is led by an Outreach Coordinator who reports to a multi-agency Steering Group. The Steering Group meets quarterly and provides strategic and operational support and oversight to the Coordinator.

Rural Social Groups:

Our rural social groups continue to grow. They are lively meetings of retired and semi retired farmers and family members who meet for tea and a chat with meals out and occasional speakers. The social groups 2020/21 were based in:

Ashford-in-the-Water, which met weekly at the War Memorial Institute

Hartington a monthly meeting at the Village Hall

Boylestone just south of Ashbourne based at primitive Methodist Church met monthly on a Thursday.

Due to Covid restrictions our meetings have been online via zoom.

Five Ways to Wellbeing

We used this grant to offer Chair Based Pilates for the over 65's.

Aims:

- To reach out and support local people in the community who are isolated, lonely or want to reconnect with local networks
- To improve the quality of life of rural residents who are lonely or isolated
- · To improve people's mental health and wellbeing
- · To improve/maintain physical wellbeing

Objectives:

To provide a regular physical activity for the over 65s

- To improve physical fitness
- To improve confidence and self-esteem
- To increase the social/support network for individual members
- To enable people to be connected/maintain connections with the community

The project brings members of the community together encouraging people to begin to reconnect. Some members of the community will not have not been out of their homes for a number of months. It is important to help them develop their physical strength in order for them to be able to keep mobile and well.

South West Peak Landscape Partnership (SWPL)

By working together in the South West Peak, we will shape a better future for our communities, landscape, wildlife and heritage where trust and understanding thrive. With support from the National Lottery Heritage Fund the SWPL is working to deliver a number of projects to benefit people, communities, natural and cultural heritage in the South Western part of the Peak District National Park.

Peak Land Lives (Book Project) - What we are doing:

- Telling personal stories of farmers throughout the South West Peak
- Examining the challenges faced by farmers and their families
- Preserving the legacy of farmers in a full-colour book and an archive of oral histories
- Discussing the importance of farming in the living landscape of the South West Peak
- Interpreting farming and its meaning to those outside the farming community

'The Land That Made Us' was published in September 2019. The book is being sold in a numbers of bookshops, Tourist information Centres, online as well as at agricultural events and livestock market gatherings.

Walking for Health — Monthly Farmers walks

Led by trained walk leaders the short "easy" walks starting from different locations each month and followed good paths with plenty of points of farming interest. Walks took place on a Thursday afternoon starting at 1.30pm. The walks generally aim to do a circular route, which takes about one hour at a steady, easy pace. The walks have been well attended with an average attendance of 20.

Responsibilities of the Board of Trustees

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves

As advised by the Charity Commission The Farming Life Centre's reserves policy seeks to provide sufficient monies to enable the organisation to properly finance its own termination. The Board has agreed to provide (wherever possible) an amount which equates to three months overheads. At 31 March 2021 the charity had unrestricted reserves of £27,435 which is over three months overheads.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2021

1. Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

Company information

The Farming Life Centre is a company limited by guarantee not having a share capital. The company's registered office is at the Agricultural Business Centre, Agricultural Way, Bakewell, DE45 1AH. At the end of the year there were 7 Trustees, each of whom, under the terms of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, had undertaken to contribute the sum not exceeding £1 in the event of a winding up of the company.

1.1 Accounting convention

These accounts have been prepared in accordance with FRS 102, "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102"), "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities applying FRS 102, the Companies Act 2006 and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice as it apples from 1 January 2016. The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The accounts are prepared in Sterling which is the functional currency of the company Monetary amounts in these financial statements to the nearest £.

The accounts have been prepared on historical cost convention apart from fixed asset investments which are carried at market value. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the accounts, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the accounts.

1.3 Charitable Funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal.

1.4 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the SOFA when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. Gifts in kind have been included at market value of gifts received and in assets acquired. No amounts are included in the financial statements for services donated by volunteers.

1.5 Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs relating to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with use of the resources. Fund-raising costs are those incurred in seeking voluntary contributions and do not include the costs of disseminating information in the support of the charitable activities.

1.6 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discounts offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

1.7 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.8 Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

1.9 Financial instruments

The charity has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the company's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.10 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the company is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

1.11 Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on income and gains falling with section 505 of the Taxes Act 1988 or section 252 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that these are applied to its charitable objects.

2. Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the directors are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2021

South West Peak (SWP) Peak Land Lives – A research and oral history project which aims to tell the story of the agricultural heritage of the South West Peak from 1945 to present. The project and published book are designed to give recognition to the agricultural history and communities, to provide them with a sense of pride and help draw together the farming community.

South West Peak (SWP) Uplands Academy- part funded by SWP, a business focused programme with participants following a varied plan helping to raise the awareness of the importance of good business planning in upland farming and developing an innovative farming business model.

The National Lottery Community Fund was spent on activity costs

Macmillan Rural Health Outreach Project – The project provides consistent, simple practical help and support to people affected by cancer (or other life limiting health conditions) through all stages of the cancer pathway from diagnosis, through treatment, to end of life. If appropriate the service will continue to support those left behind after a bereavement. The project will target the farming and rural communities of the Peak District (PDNP Boundary). The service includes the provision of information, signposting and one to one emotional and social support.

The Co-Op money was spent on salaries

Open Gate Trust money was spent on salaries

Rural Social Groups Funding -FLC used this money to run the rural social groups.

Prince's Countryside Fund - was spent on project management and salaries

Derbyshire Dales Council for Voluntary Service Social Connected – is to be spent on equipment and volunteer expenses.

Derbyshire Dales Council for Voluntary Service 5 Ways to Wellbeing - was spent on exercise classes

The Police and Crime Commission and the Derbyshire Dales Council Social Connected money were to be spent in 2021/22.
