Report of the Trustees and Unaudited Financial Statements

For the year ended 31 January 2021

The Trustees, who are also directors for the purposes of company law, have pleasure in presenting their report and the financial statements for the charitable company for the year ended 31 January 2021. The Trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

### Objectives and aims

The principal activity of the company and its charitable objects is the relief of the needs of people with Down's syndrome by the promotion, support and development of research and intervention to improve and enhance the lives of people born with Down's syndrome.

- Increase the understanding of the relationship between the physical effects of Down syndrome and learning development; and to aid the development of beneficial therapies and learning programmes. Help parents obtain the best education and facilities for their children. Support the families in their right to be kept informed about the likely progression of Downs syndrome and more importantly of the outcomes of treatments offered at various stages. Promote exercise and physical endeavours as a beneficial therapy. Aid the development and understanding of the possible benefits of dietary control in persons with Down syndrome and of alternative forms of medicine. Promote and support all activities leading to an improved quality of life. Employ and pay any person or persons to supervise, organise and carry on the work of the Association. Bring together in conference representatives of voluntary organisation, Government Departments, the medical profession, statutory authorities and individuals. Promote and carry out or assist in promoting and carrying out research, surveys and investigations and publish the useful results thereof. Arrange and provide for or join in arranging and providing for the holding of exhibitions, meetings, lectures, classes, seminars and training courses. Collect and disseminate information on all matters affecting the said objects and exchange such information with other bodies having similar objects whether in this country or overseas. Undertake, execute, manage or assist any charitable trusts, which may lawfully be undertaken, executed, managed or assisted by the Association. Cause to be written and printed or otherwise reproduced and circulated, gratuitously or otherwise, such papers, books, periodicals, pamphlets or other documents or films or recorded tapes (whether audio or video or both) as shall further the said objects.
- ii. We aim to greatly improve outcomes for people living with Down syndrome creating social changes raising standards of expectation and true inclusion within society. We feel that we have significantly made progress in all areas we have described enabling people with Down syndrome to become more understood, empowering professionals and people supporting them to be effectively informed and generously working collaboratively with many organisations in order to obtain the maximum effect.
- iii. Our charities grant making policies are to mainly apply for grants to fund projects that give direct benefit to people with Down syndrome, their families and professionals supporting them and a reasonable amount of funding applied for core running costs.
- iv. Any programme related investment activities that are material in the context of charitable activities that are undertaken, will need to have a clear transparent quick return to benefit people with Down syndrome.

Charity trustees ensure that our charity's aims are for the public benefit in accordance with guidance the Charity Commission public benefit guidance. Our organisation's activities at present and in the future will always be to enhance the lives of as many people born with Down syndrome as possible and to insure that they always receive direct benefit.

These sessions have been delivered online.

- o The Co-worker speech and language training (a three-day course) was suspended due to covid but is in the process of being designed as an online course. This will go live between 2021/2022
- Partnerships: We have forged a closer partnership with "Love and Live It", an organisation who specialise in Paediatric Occupational Therapy to increase our children's vital sensory skills learning.
- We have also forged a new partnership with "Bushy Wood Outdoor Centre" to offer regular outdoor activities i.e. foraging, forest trails, camp fires etc.
- We continue to work with the Newhaven & Seaford Sailing Club (NSSC) whose qualified volunteers teach our children the basics of sailing whilst improving their overall water confidence and communication skills.
- Funding: Successfully secured funding and grants to:
- o upgrade IT equipment, cameras and software to deliver high-quality virtual/remote sessions remotely
- o increase our sporting activities & outside learning programme
- o increase our group and 1-2-1 tutoring programme to support more children to increase their learning and achievements
- o Chosen as one of Seaford Co-Op's local charities, working in partnership to secure funding and increase inclusivity and DS understanding in our community.
- Evaluation Surveys: Introduced regular on-line surveys for our families to complete, ensuring our range of programmes and delivery was suitable and effective. We are delighted to report that feedback was 100% positive!
- Other: We were delighted that our Founder & Managing Director, Senay Smallwood, was recognised in February 2021 by PaCC (Parents and Carer's Council) Brighton and Hove and received an award for excellence in delivery of services, for outstanding service to T21 (Down Syndrome) families across Sussex.
- Significant increase in overall skills and learning in all areas i.e. sensory skills, fine and gross motor skills, improving balance, coordination, strength, endurance, core strength plus building fitness and agility.
- Our outdoor activities resulted in improved lung health, muscle tone and Vitamin D intake plus being in the fresh air stimulated happy, "feel-good" feelings and improved mental health; Parents report that our activity sessions resulted in better sleep patterns and improved behaviour.
- Improved health, fitness and well-being, reducing obesity often prevalent in young people with DS. Plus, an increase in sensory regulation, emotional and social skills.
- Our wide range of programmes opened up a diverse range of opportunities and new experiences to our young people. From pet therapy to sailing, these experiences resulted in greatly enhanced life skills, social networks and an empathy of nature, animals and wildlife.
- Significant increases to self-confidence, teamwork and communication skills.
- Essential respite opportunities for parents, carers and their families.
- Support to achieve their best lives, grow independence and lead happy and fulfilled lives.

### Future priorities and our 2021/22 Plans

Demand for our charity's work continues to rise and we now have walting lists for our main programmes, in particular our 1-2-1 Tutoring and Sensory Skills programmes. The success of our virtual programme offer has resulted in geographical restrictions being lifted so we can outreach more extensively to support children and families based outside of Sussex.

Due to the increasing demand for our services, participant numbers and sessions have risen over the last three years and we are now planning our next phase to continue to increase our numbers each year for the next five years. We also plan to implement a major review of our charity systems to ensure we can successfully fulfill our expansion plans. We remain passionate about our work to enhance the lives of young people with DS and are excited by our charity's continued growth and development. Our strategic goal is to continue to grow DSDT's work so we can support more children. From the evaluations received from our service users, we conclude that we continue to provide an effective range of activities and services.

### 1. Accounting Policies

### Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for investments which are included at market value and the revaluation of certain fixed assets and in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charitles: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), and the Companies Act 2006.

Down Syndrome Development Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

### Going concern

The financial statements are prepared, on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention.

#### **Funds**

The accounts distinguish between restricted and unrestricted funds. The former have been raised by the charity for specific purposes or are received from donors and are subject to restrictions on the purposes for which they may be used. Unrestricted funds are those where there are no externally imposed restrictions and are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees for expenditure on its objects or appropriated to reserves for internally designated purposes.

### Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the Charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and that the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Income received in advance of the provision of a specified service is deferred until the criteria for income recognition are met.

### Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as resources expended when there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the Charity to the expenditure.

Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.

Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. However, the cost of overall direction and administration on each activity, comprising the salary and overhead costs of the central function, is apportioned on a basis which is an estimate, based on the proportion of cost of each activity to the total cost of all activities.

### Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets, other than freehold land, are stated at cost or valuation less depreciation and any provision for impairment. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost or valuation of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following basis:

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### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

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The principal activity of the company and its charitable objects is the relief of the needs of people with Down's syndrome by the promotion, support and development of research and intervention to improve and enhance the lives of people born with Down's syndrome.

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### **ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE**

2020 was a challenging year for us and the world with Covid19's restrictions imposing the need to continue our vital work remotely via the Zoom platform. Despite these challenges we continued to offer a seamless programme delivery and, whilst initially we were unsure of how our children would respond to "virtual" activities, the results and feedback proved it to be a highly effective method. This success has resulted in us being able to offer a "blended" delivery of both web-based and group activities - meaning we now have complete flexibility to deliver programmes both face-to-face and virtually.

### **FUNDRAISING**

It has been a challenging year for fundraising, however due to our proactive response to supporting our families with Covid-safe activities, we have been able to obtain emergency funding to keep up with the demand for services.

We have been working hard at finding new ways to make our charity more sustainable. We are very grateful for the increase in donations from parents, which helps to offset the higher cost of additional activities on offer and the increasing demand.

Funding received has been used towards our core costs which enabled us to expand both our work and our resources over the last twelve months as follows:

- Beneficiary numbers: increased by over 20% (75 to 96) and we currently have 96 children, young people and families on our database who access most services we offer.
- Staffing: Increased our staffing resources and recruited 2 additional tutors/teachers who we trained to deliver DS specific groups and 1-2-1 tutoring to support our children with their learning. We also recruited a part-time Administrator to cope with the growing admin workload.
- Programmes: Increased the number of weekly sessions delivered by 50% and introduced new programmes;
- o "Fun & Learning" tutoring programme to offer specialised 1-2-1 teaching to fit each child's learning profile. The sessions are fun, social opportunities benefiting and enhancing learning development. We will continue to provide these online sessions to enable as many children as possible, UK-wide, to be able to access them.
- o Sensory Squad went online to continue to offer sensory support to small groups of children and their families during the lockdown. These were facilitated by The Live & Love It Sensory integration therapy team.
- o "Chat Time" groups to encourage and expand social and spoken interaction for various age groups, particularly for our teenagers as they cope with the transition to adolescence and adulthood.
- o "Sports" We held online multisport, Yoga, Circus skills sessions via zoom for children to attend whilst we were unable to provide LIVE sessions due to lockdown. We plan to run further LIVE sports sessions both indoor and outdoor including multi-sports and basketball at Leisure Centres, multisport in open public parks, forestry activities and sport at Bushywood, Hallsham, Circus Skills, assisted cycling, Kayaking, salling and SUP when the weather improves and Equine Therapy which introduces our children to the joy of being with animals to increase fun, empathy, and communication skills.
- o "Music" We continue to develop and run enrichment classes based around music at break times in schools, and after school sessions. During lockdown, these sessions were held successfully online. We will continue to provide online services as well as incorporating live activities where possible.
- Consultancy to parents and professionals:
- o The consultancy into school is again proving to be highly effective and we are seeing a rise in requests for this service. All being delivered online.
- We continue to provide our EHCP consultancy service to support parents online.
- Training study days and workshops this year:
- o DS "Health Hub" workshops in partnership with Dr Ese Stacey of the Hannah Trust has recorded an introductory session for parents of her nutritional talk which is now live on our website. Parents requiring additional support can contact her and her details are available on our website.
- o We continue to deliver training workshops on school sites around the county and at Brighton University to trainee teachers but have changed our delivery method to bitesize sessions which is proving more beneficial and accessible to the teaching staff. Feedback has shown that these strategies continue to be effective at providing improved education for pupils.

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### Achievements against objectives

From the evaluations received from our service users, we conclude that we continue to provide an effective range of activities and services. We aim to continue to develop new projects and educational support to expand on the opportunities for our children and young people.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

The Trustees report a surplus of £14,731 for the year. The year ended with total reserves of £51,566 of which £26,825 was unrestricted and £24.741 was restricted.

Given the nature and scale of the company's activities and due to there being no assured future funding, the Trustees consider it prudent to hold unrestricted reserves of £3000 to cover basic operational costs for two months. The level of reserves is regularly monitored by the Trustees.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### **Governing document**

DSDT will operate as a charitable company limited by guarantee; it was incorporated on 3rd January 2013 and registered as a charity on 18th February 2014. DSDT will operate as a charitable company limited by guarantee from this date.

DSDT was established under a Memorandum of Association, which describes the objects and powers of the charitable company; it is governed under its Articles of Association (as amended on 22nd January 2014). Under those Articles, the directors are elected by ordinary resolution or by the decision of the directors (now trustees).

The organisational structure of the company is as follows. There are five Directors responsible for steering the organisation's projects. The Managing Director, Senay Smallwood is responsible for the day-to-day management of the company as delegated by the Board of directors/Trustees.

### Recrultment and appointment of trustees

The company is a charity and so has adopted the following policies and procedures for induction and training of trustees. There is an initial application process to include reading trustees responsibilities and the Memorandum and Articles. The applicant may then be approved by all trustees subject to further checks such as appropriate Safeguarding DBS, references from employers or recognised professionals. New trustees will be required to read and adhere to DSDT's child/vulnerable person protection policy and attend a child/vulnerable adult protection training module. They will be required to read and adhere to the health and safety policy, complaints procedure and disciplinary and equal opportunities policy. The Members have guaranteed to contribute a maximum of £1 each in the event of the company being wound up.
