Structure, governance and management

Description of the charity's trusts

Angels Of Hope For Women runs an outreach service for women and girls who have experienced domestic, sexual and other forms of abuse. The majority of these women are asylum seekers and refugees living in and around Manchester. Angels of Hope For Women seeks to empower these women to become independent and self-reliant by conducting workshops, courses, charitable activities and events aimed at raising their self-esteem.

The Charity was registered with The Charities Commission on 17 January 2019 and is governed by its constitution adopted on 21 June 2014 (as amended on 10 January 2019). Its registration details are reflected on page 1 of this report.

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

The Charity is run by its board of Trustees. All trustees give their time voluntarily and receive no benefits from the charity

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees is in line with the constitution and with the consent of the trustees. Suitable candidates are those who are sensitive to the needs and demands of the organisation and have relevant skills and experience.

In order to bring a range of skills and cover the broad reach of the charity, the trustees are from backgrounds that reflect the diversity of the people that the charity works with.

Trustees induction and training

New trustees are briefed by the existing trustees on the objects and operations of the charity and are referred to the guidance for new trustees published by the Charity Commission.

In addition, all new trustees are encouraged to read the constitution and discuss any queries arising from this with existing trustees.

All trustees are expected to be familiar with the work of the charity and get involved in events and services regularly. The charity places emphasis on volunteer development and trustees are also offered training seen as beneficial to the charity. All trustees are encouraged, and most have been through internal training or induction for a better understanding of the ethos of the charity and the statement of beliefs.

Trustees also discuss the future plans of the charity in relation to the objectives of the charity and ways to secure and strengthen its financial position. Plans for the charity are also put to the AGM at least once a year in which the ordinary members all have a chance to speak and vote.

Additional governance issues

The charity is funded by grants and donations from form institutions and organisations that share the charities objectives.

Though all trustees give their time voluntarily, the charity recognises that trustees may incur expenses such as travel to meetings, conferences and other events. Trustees may from time to time, finances allowing, be reimbursed for expenses directly incurred in fulfilling their duties.

The charity reserves the right to recognise and adequately remunerate trustees who bring specialist

skills and knowledge to the service of the charity where this is applicable.

The major operational risk faced by the Charity is that it carries no reserves as most of its funding is specific to an activity, its continued existence is dependent on continued support from its funders.

The current Covid-19 pandemic is also expected to throw up its own challenges in the operations and finances of the charity as more and more users of the charity's services, usually individuals with no access to public funds, seek help from the charity.

The Trustees have implemented procedures to manage this risk including ensuring they have sufficient training, skills and expertise to effectively manage the affairs of the charity and do not commit to programmes until funding is secured for the programme.

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to its operations and finances, and are satisfied that systems are in place to manage their exposure.

The charity has no employees.

Organisational structure, affiliations and day to day operations

Leah Chikamba, Chief Executive Officer, oversees the day to day running of the charity assisted by the Chairperson, trustees and volunteers.

Objectives and activities

Registered objects

The basic aims, objectives and principles as set out in the constitution are:

- To preserve and protect the good health of women and girls who have experienced domestic and sexual abuse and other forms of abuse
- To educate and raising awareness through training and workshops in local community
- To support women and girls and connect them to appropriate agencies providing support facilities for such people

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements during the year

The year was a very challenging year due to the Covid pandemic. Most of the women who use the Charity's services struggled to feed their children and provide home learning equipment for their children. However, with the help of various funders, the Charity was able to support the women and their families by working with a local caterer to provide weekly hot meals to around 35 families. The families were also supported with children's educational resources, IT equipment, clothes, presents, home essentials, electricity and Gas.

The Charity also run peer support groups and monthly meetings where women were able to support each other.

Financial performance

The charity received grants and donations during the year amounting to £45,724. The charity paid £44,741 for charitable activities and events resulting a net surplus of £983. The charitable expenditure was made in line with the stated objects of the charity.

The charity has governance costs that comprise professional fees and other administration costs. This is in addition to the support costs of the charity as disclosed in the notes to the accounts.

There were no material fundraising costs during the year.

Financial review

Reserves policy

The charity carries no reserves to protect the organisation from changing financial circumstances, such as an unexpected reduction in income or increase in costs.

The policy is therefore to keep the administration costs down and not to commit to any long-term programmes or financial commitments unless and until funding is secured for that particular program.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees
