1. STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

1.1 Governing document

The Charity is a charitable incorporated organisation formed in the year 2015. The Constitution gives effect to and supports its charitable objects. The minimum permitted number of trustees is three and the maximum is six.

1.2 Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Whilst no restriction or qualification is placed upon a trustee, trustees will be sought from those with experience of the voluntary sector, people who have experience of mental health service provision or those with professional skills linked to management.

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1.3 Induction and training of new trustees

Induction is by documented introduction to the structure and operating standards of the organisation supplemented by attendance as observer in meeting. Training is supported by mentoring, in house and on the job training, workshops, conferencing and networking together with professional periodicals, bulletins and newsletter updates. Normally trustees are elected for a period of three years. Trustees can reapply to join the organisation again following their period of office coming to an end. If there is a vacancy during the year, the trustees can co-opt a new trustee, who then has to be re-appointed at the next Annual General Meeting.

1.4 Organisational structure

The trustees meet six to twelve times a year, and decisions are taken by majority vote with the chair having the casting vote. If the Charity, at the meeting at which a trustee retires by rotation, does not fill the vacancy, the retiring trustee may if willing to act, request to be reappointed.

The trustees are responsible for policy and strategic matters, overall control of finance and major spending decisions, employment of staff, fund raising and investment, with the day to day management and running of the Organisation undertaken by a nominated trustee.

1.5 Related parties

The Organisation is an independent body.

1.6 Risk management

The Organisation has established structures and procedures to continue to assess and manage risk.

The major risks which the trustees have identified and to which the 'Organisation is exposed (as highlighted in this Report) have been reviewed and procedures and/or contingent plans have been established so far as it is in the power and control of the trustees to do so to manage those risks. Continued and sustainable funding is seen to be the major issue. However, the Organisation does not employ anyone, although it does engage freelance sessional professionals on an ad hoc basis. Its office is low cost and centrally situated in the East Riding of Yorkshire to be as accessible as possible.

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2 OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

2.1 Objectives and aims

The objects of the CIO are:

- To assist in the treatment and care of persons resident in the East Riding of Yorkshire and surrounding areas, suffering from mental illness of any description and their carers;
- 2. To provide facilities for life skill development including, but not exclusively, training in confidence building, assertiveness training, recognising your own skills, stress management and mental health awareness;
- 3. To provide support in seeking paid employment, undertaking assisted voluntary work and delivering vocational skills training;
- 4. To provide information and signposting to other specialist service providers
- 5. To work with employers in order to improve the sustainability and retention of jobs for employees who are managing mental health problems

3 ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

- 3.1 We have leased a one roomed office in Market Weighton since March 2020. Although our activities, in line with the majority of organisations, have had to be adapted because of the restrictions around the pandemic, an office base was necessary in order to detach the business address from any trustee's home address, as well as being a neutral base to meet clients. We consider that the office has been a welcome addition to our service provision, and remains good value.
- 3.2 Because of the lockdown, we needed to restructure our services very quickly. This was a challenge, in terms of securing funding to pay for the adaptations and equipment, as well as to fund delivery of the service. Fortunately, we were successful in this endeavor and the work of the charity continued.

Our referrals from GP surgeries via the social prescriber link workers placed within them continues to rise, as well as from other charities. Very importantly, many people still self-refer, flowing seeing our posts on the various social media platforms.

3 ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE (continued)

Throughout this testing year, we delivered support to people in group, and in one to one settings. The groups were online using Zoom, and adapting to this new medium did present some challenges in terms of content, timings, presentation style and scheduling.

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Consequently, the time of each session was reduced from three to two hours, as the original time was too long to stare into a screen. The presentation style was adapted to draw all participants in to dialogue too. We have delivered three sets to date

Consultation with our clients on the online sessions has been particularly constructive, as this has been a new development for us. Acting on suggestions has aided us to adjust these sessions to good effect.and feedback from all of them has been highly positive.

As reported last year, we had steadily increased our one to one work for people for whom even small groups are too intimidating. We aimed to support around 10 active service users on this basis at any time.

However, since the onset of the covid-19 pandemic, this number has increased significantly, because of the heightened anxiety people are feeling. We are currently working with an average of 18 people on one to one support.

Following Government guidelines on resuming business after covid, we have begun meeting clients at our office. It is registered with a QR code and strict protocol is followed around booking in, wearing face masks when entering and leaving the building, distancing, sanitisation and general hygiene.

- Another exciting development for us this year has been preparing and recording information and insight videos which have been posted on UTube. We have recorded over 40, with 32 being embedded on our website Films-Second Thoughts East Yorkshire These include numerous subjects such as 'Asking for Help', Mindfulness, 'Managing Anxiety' and many more. Feedback on these has also been highly encouraging.
- Right from the formation or the charity in 2015, our website has been hosted on a free platform provided by BT. Unfortunately, this provision ended in April 2020, so we have created our own domain and website www.secondthoughtseastyorkshire.com This website provision, from Virtual Riders in Hull, has been a great development for us, and we now have our own email addresses (@secondthoughtseastyorkshire.com) which is also much better. We wish to thank Chris Smith for his great work in hosting this, and helping us to prepare for the switchover.

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3 ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE (continued)

We continue to support Clear Minds Withernsea, the self-help group we set up. We also support the Beverley self-help group where possible.

Once again because of the lockdown, the Withernsea group have not met in person during the last year, although we do maintain regular social media contact with group members.

The Beverley self-help group have met a couple of times, outside and respecting social distancing of course.

We hope to resume more normal and regular meetings for both groups at the earliest safe opportunity.

3.7 The charity is in a good position financially as well as operationally, and on behalf of the trustees, I would like to thank Greg Harman for his sterling work in both adapting, and delivering the services of the charity.

4 Public Benefit

In setting our objectives and activities the Trustees have had due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

4 Working with other organisations

We engage with several other charities and NHS mental health services. Our new contacts include 'Talking About Loss' (TAL), another Market Weighton based charity. TAL organised an outdoor event in Melbourne which we attended and received four referrals as a direct result of that.

Other organisations include networking groups including ERVAS, NBF, TRCF and several other local charities and community groups.

We have also presented workshops to national groups including Restless and a mental health network group who prefer to be unnamed. In addition, we have participated in workshops for the National Lottery and The National Emergencies Trust. We have also worked with Emma Hardy MP on mental health issues.

5 Acknowledgements

The Organisation extends thanks to our trustees, Greg Harman, Ian Myers, Peter Robinson, Helen Wilson and Sally Harman.

Once again I would like to thank our second trainer, Julie Hastings, who has been supportive, despite not being able to facilitate group workshops in person again during this reporting period.

I thank Sally Harman who, as well as being a trustee, helps out immensely as a volunteer with delivering online group support, working with the two self-help groups and at networking events.

We welcome Freyr Smithson as a new volunteer, who has joined us this year. Freyr is currently between school and university and she has great passion for working in mental health in the future. Freyr has helped with researching material for the online videos which Greg has recorded, as well as helping with our first real networking event for this year at Melbourne.

We thank our funders. This financial year we have been supported with grants from The National Lottery Community Fund, The Anna Maria Charitable Trust, The Two Ridings Community Foundation, Groundworks (Tesco Bags of Help scheme), The Charles and Elsie Sykes Trust, The Denton Charity and The Betty and Taylors Coronavirus Community Fund,

We also wish to thank the following people for their very generous donations. Councillor Colin Billany (Mayor of Hedon Town Council) who nominated us as his Charity of the Year, Ms Nia Harries (a local poet) who donated a percentage of the sales of her book and the many other people who very kindly made cash donations to us during the year, both online and in person.

We particularly wish to thank the Two Ridings Community Foundation (TRCF) for their understanding and support with our grant for running the minibus. The follow on payment of a further £10,000, from The Anna Maria Charitable Trust (managed by TRCF) was made in January 2020 to run the minibus for another year.

Although we have used the minibus a little, from March 2020 we were unable to use it to its full potential because of covid restrictions. The TRCF continue to be really supportive and accommodating, and they have allowed us to roll this forward once again until the lifting of restrictions allow us to reinstate the project to its full potential.

Once again, and indeed most importantly, we wish to thank every single person who has approached us for support. Taking this step and asking for help takes immense courage and is a major milestone for those who may have been enduring poor quality of life for considerable periods of time.

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6 The Future

I was proud to become the Chair of Trustees in June 2020 supported by Greg Harman, the founder of the charity and first Chair, who has remained with us.

We continue to adapt and carry on our work despite the challenges which the pandemic and subsequent social distancing measures have presented to us, and indeed to everyone.

Mental health problems have always been estimated as affecting one in four people, but given the impact of the pandemic, the illness and mortality rate and the effect of social isolation, this figure will undoubtedly increase.

Along with other charities and community groups, we aim to play our part as best we can.

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Independent Examiner's Report to the Members of Second Thoughts East Yorkshire CIO
