STRUCTURE GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Church in Wales is governed by its Constitution, set up under section 13(1) of the Welsh Church Acts 1914, as amended from time to time by its Governing Body. The MAC is not a body corporate. Its composition, procedures and powers are regulated by the Constitution, which provides that before assuming office, every member must sign a declaration that he or she will be bound by the Constitution.

The Constitution provides that the members of the MAC shall be: The Incumbent, Vicars and Assistant Curates; two Church Wardens, one appointed by the Incumbent and one elected at the Annual Vestry Meeting (AVM); two Sub-warden for each Church where there is more than one Church in the Mission Area, one appointed by the Incumbent and one elected at the AVM; Up to 25 lay members elected at the AVM; co-opted Secretary and Treasurer (if not already ex-officio or elected); and up to 7 further co-opted members. Lay, communicant persons over the age of 16 may be entered on an Electoral Roll (subject to certain conditions) and all such persons, so entered, are entitled to vote and to stand for election.

OBJECTIVES, ACTIVITIES AND PUBLIC BENEFIT

As required by the Charities Act 2011, the MAC has given due regard to guidance published by the Charity Commission in respect of the operation of the public benefit requirement. The activities undertaken to fulfil the MAC's purposes for the public benefit are described and detailed hereunder. The Church in Wales is a Province within the Anglican Communion and seeks to advance the Christian religion through world-wide mission. It is the responsibility of the MAC and the Incumbent to work together and co-operate in all matters of concern and importance to the Mission Area for the promotion of the mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical in the Mission Area. The MAC is responsible, inter-alia, for the parochial budget and all expenditure thereunder, the care and maintenance of Church fabric and of the Churchyards, and for any action or other matter referred to it in accordance with the Constitution, and is the normal channel of communication between parishioners and the Diocesan Bishop.

The MAC provides a benefit to the public by:

- a) The provision of regular public worship
- b) The provision of sacred space for personal prayer and contemplation.
- c) Pastoral work, including visiting the sick and the bereaved.
- d) Teaching of Christianity through sermons and small groups
- e) Taking of Assemblies in local schools
- f) Promotion of Christianity through staging of events and services, and the distribution of literature
- g) Promoting the whole mission of the Church in Wales in aiding community cohesion through provision of activities for older people, mothers and toddlers and other specific groups.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

During the year to the end of December 2019 we have achieved some major organisational steps forward including finally setting up a Mission Area Bank Account. We have operated for the year with sub-committees including an Executive and two sub committees: The Buildings Sub Committee and the Finance Sub Committee. Our Shared Ministry team has been set up and includes commissioned lay people. We have nominated representatives to both the Diocesan Conference and the Standing Committee and received reports back to the Mission Area Conference which has met quarterly throughout the year.

During this year there have been two Interregnums with Reverend Lorraine Badger-Watts leaving in early January and Reverend Lara Stroud leaving in August. It has been encouraging during this time to be able to facilitate the congregations to work together and to develop lay ministry whilst receiving support from the Mission Area.

During the year the Mission Area Office has worked out of the Vicarage at Bagillt and for a small number of weeks from the office at St. Peters before the completion of the purpose-built Mission Area Office at Holy Trinity Greenfield. We were able to move into this highly functional space in September. It has been challenging having multiple moves, setting up phones and internet and functioning within different spaces but the end result has been worth it.

The Safeguarding Officer has, with the Mission Area Administrator administered a central collection system for DBS applications and we now have a tried and tested central data base for the Mission Area.

Although we have only had our Mission Area Administrator for 6 hours a week during this year she has become a central reference point for procedure processes required by the Diocese. Her contribution is invaluable and is materially helping us to move forward with the requirements of our legal status as a Charity registered with the Charity Commission.

The Growth Report for this year was focussed around the 'Leading your Church into Growth' (LyCiG) headings of Prayer, Presence, Proclamation and Persuasion. The aspirational report was agreed and to date almost all of the goals have been achieved. It has been specifically encouraging that Worship Leaders have been taking services, Pastoral Assistants have been delivering home communions and a group of ten Pastoral Assistants have been planning the set up of a Bereavement Café to be held at St. Michaels Brynford. We acknowledge that as a Mission Area we were involved in many mission focussed initiatives covering the key issues of: poverty, community building, social isolation and encouraging human flourishing.

A new monthly contemporary reflective service titled 'Mosaic' was started this year for people across the Mission Area and the other monthly service (Y Ffordd) which attracts people who are not regular church attendees has grown over the year seeing a maximum of 50 people one very cold and dark night!

One of the priorities agreed at the 'Leading your Church into Growth' course last year was the development of lay ministries within the mission area. To this end we trained twenty-three Worship Leaders and eleven Pastoral Assistants. The Worship Leaders have continued to deliver half of the Sunday services in six churches and various midweek services in additional areas. During the interregnums, having six churches without an incumbent, their ministry has been crucial. To support the people involved, a weekly Bible Study group looking at the week's lectionary readings has been delivered during the year.

We have a Theology for Life group within the Mission Area with most of the attendees drawn from Estuary and Mountain Mission Area and the small group experimenting with Christian spiritual practice and looking at what we believe about God, renamed by the group as 'Encounters with God', has been meeting all year and now has a full membership. A new group has also flourished this year.

In addition, a small number of people within the Mission Area have been receiving personal Spiritual Direction which has been obviously helpful to individuals.

In October we had a Mission Area Day. It was facilitated by a Rector from Northern Ireland and his wife who is a qualified counsellor and they took a group of about thirty people from the Mission Area through selected Psalms. It was a highly participative day and one of the individuals is still positively referring to it.

To sum up: we have completed our third year as a Mission Area. We have more than survived, we have certainly flourished in terms of lay involvement and commitment to both our current ministry and mission and also seen some significant new developments both planned and completed. We have been in a position to take steps forward on the organisational front and be able to direct more of our energies to the more interesting and fundamental purposes of our existence, to be focused on our mission to bring in the Kingdom of God in all its beauty and generosity.

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's constitution, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The charity's presentational currency is pounds sterling and all amounts stated within the financial statements are rounded to the nearest pound.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the members have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the members continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the members in furtherance of their charitable objectives unless the funds have been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise funds which have been set aside at the discretion of the members for specific purposes. The purposes and uses of the designated funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

Grant income is recognised on receipt unless income is received in advance at the year-end and the performance criteria relate to a future accounting period.

1.5 Fixed asset investments

Fixed asset investments are initially measured at transaction price excluding transaction costs and are subsequently measured at fair value at each reporting date. Changes in fair value are recognised in net income/(expenditure) for the year. Transaction costs are expensed as incurred.

1.6 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.7 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the members are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
