Aims and Purposes

4 The Youth is a Charitable Company Limited by Guarantee set up by local professionals in 2012 to provide a practical framework to run local youth projects for local young people that would have otherwise closed as the statutory youth services have been forced to focus their resources elsewhere.

4 The Youth believe in working with others in both voluntary and statutory sector to maintain and improve provision for young people based on their needs.

Objectives and Activities

4 The Youth aims to provide young people living in Horsham and surrounding areas with access to youth work provision that meets their needs. 4 The Youth works for the benefit for the local community, specifically young people through their organisation of activities that support their growth, develop skills, capacity and capability to empower them to participate independently in society. Our provision for young people is provided in a number of ways including:-

- Providing youth clubs that provide a safe, fun informal learning environment for young people from age 8 19 including those with additional needs.
- Volunteering opportunities that enable young people to develop their own skills while supporting their peers.
- Residential trip opportunities that allow young people to independently experience new challenges with their peers.
- Training opportunities and project work which enable young people to develop skills and gain qualifications which increase self-confidence and employability.

Achievements and Performance

Forest Youth Wing Clubs

4 The Youth continues to work in close partnership with the Forest School who provide building, utility and maintenance free of charge at Forest Youth Wing. Services continue to attract young people from across the community including both Forest Boys, Millais girls and students from Tanbridge House schools among others.

At Forest School we continue to run the Year 7 Club on a Friday evening (average 150 young people per night); Year 8 Club on a Monday evening (average 80 young people per night) and year 9 club on a Wednesday evening (average 20 young people per night) at the youth wing.

We continue to provide a Year 5 & 6 transition club for young people making the transition from Primary to Senior School which has been supported by the Forest School.

Our popular Woodland Project sessions continue to be a success providing Forest Schools and Bushcraft activities to young people aged 8 - 12.

In addition to the above sessions we have started offering a weekend mountain biking club which has proved to be very popular with young people aged 10 - 14. We take 10 young people out for a 4 hour off road cycling session in the local area and our mountain bike mechanic is able to advise and teach the young people how to maintain and service their own bikes.

In addition to the regular youth wing sessions members have continued to enjoy regular trips ranging from Chessington and Alton Towers to local walks and trips to the Isle of Wight. These activities continue to provide enrichment to young people, some of whom may not otherwise have such opportunities.

With the generous donations from parents, nightly subs and income from the tuck shop 4 the Youth are pleased to have been able to run this club on a self-sustaining basis with the in-kind support from the school.

Holbrook Youth Club

4 The Youth work in partnership with the Holbrook Community Centre to provide a popular Junior club (approx. 80 young people per night) to young people in the local area including those attending the local primary school. The Junior club has a strong team of senior members who have benefited from taking part in training through 4 The Youth.

Cowfold Youth Club

With fundraising and lobbying support from parents and support from the local co-op, 4 The Youth was pleased to be able to start a Youth Club for the young people of Cowfold in March 2018 which attracts an average of 30 members a week.

Broadbridge Heath, Toasties Youth Club

From April 2019 4 The Youth started working with Broadbridge Heath Parish Council to take on the responsibility of running and supporting the Toasties Youth Club in the Village. The club had previously been run by Horsham Matters who decided they did not want to renew the contract. 4 The Youth was pleased to transfer existing staff and continue to support its volunteers whilst keeping the continuity of the club for young people.

Slinfold Youth Club

From April 2019 4 The Youth started working with Slinfold Parish Council to take on the responsibility of running and supporting the Slinfold Youth Club. The club had previously been run by Horsham Matters who decided they did not want to renew the contract. 4 The Youth was pleased to transfer existing staff and continue to support its volunteers whilst keeping the continuity of the club for young people.

Horsham Neighborhood Projects

With the support of Horsham District Council and the local neighbourhood councillors, 4 The Youth has taken over a contract to provide neighbourhood youth services in the town centre wards. This includes some increases to existing provision, as well as additional services including:-

- One to one support for young people identified by schools or other key workers
- Group work for young people at risk of abuse, knife crime or county lines drugs gangs abuse.
- 'Snack wagon' outreach work in the town centre for all young people, with a particular focus on those in at risk categories or causing anti-social behaviour.

As part of these projects, our team work closely with local community partners including the council and police to identify needs and are continuing to look to expand provision.

Covid 19 Pandemic

Between March 2019 and July 2019 we were unable to provide our services as normal due to the Covid 19 Pandemic. We offered online youth club sessions with interactive games and quizzes for young people aged 8 - 16. We had on average 50 young people engage with this service during the pandemic and was able to offer support and guidance regarding Covid and other issues affecting the young people. As well as online clubs we were offering a Chrome Book loan scheme where we would deliver a Chrome Book to a young person who needed one for online learning we had 30 young people use this service. Once allowed and restrictions started to lift we offered small group work at The Forest Youth Wing for young people who needed some wellbeing support.

All of our sessions were affected during this period and as restrictions were lifted we were only able to offer 30 spaces for our generic youth club sessions, this was done using a booking system.

Senior Members and Volunteers

Across all the clubs, 4 The Youth is grateful to the voluntary work of senior members and volunteers who often take the lead in running activities with young people. Unfortunately during the pandemic we were unable to offer any sessions to our volunteers due to the restrictions on our numbers.

Reserves Policy

It is our policy to maintain a balance of unrestricted funds that allows 4 The Youth to meet its fixed liabilities for a minimum period of 6 months without income to cover any unexpected event or significantly lower than expected financial performance.

Volunteers

We would like to thank all the volunteers who work hard to make the clubs run successfully. Volunteers work tirelessly within our clubs supporting a small team of paid youth work staff and are pivotal to keeping the organisation running.

Structure, governance and management

4 The Youth is a charitable company limited by Guarantee with a board of directors. All members that attend our clubs are encouraged to be involved with the decision making process by joining our young people's steering group. Appointment of additional directors is encouraged and on election by the board as set out in the Articles of Association.

The full board met 4 times during the year, in addition working groups met and communicated on a regular basis with each director responsible for different areas of the organisation and reporting back to the board at full meetings.

Administrative Information

- 4 The Youth was based at Horsham Youth Centre, Hurst Road until July 2012 at which point the the building was taken over by West Sussex County Council. Since July 2012 4 The Youth has been based at Forest Youth Wing, The Forest School, Comptons Lane, RH13 5NT with office space as well as the youth wing facilities in the evening. The space is provided free of charge and clubs run in partnership with the school.
- 4 The Youth is registered in England and Wales with the charity commission (1144413) and as a company limited by guarantee with Companies House (07699716).

Financial Review

4 The Youth made a surplus of income over expenditure of £24,798 during the year (2019: £15,596).

1. General information

The charity is a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is Forest Youth Wing, The Forest School, Comptons Lane, Horsham, West Sussex RH13 5NW.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities Act 2011.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Significant judgements

The judgements (apart from those involving estimations) that management has made in the process of applying the entity's accounting policies and that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements are as follows:

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes. Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal.

Incoming resources

Income

All income is included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income, any performance related conditions attached have been met or are fully within the control of the charity, the income is considered probable and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

• Investment income is included when receivable.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Tangible assets

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost and are subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation. Any fixed assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the market value at the balance sheet date.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Equipment

- 25% reducing balance

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Debt instruments are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

4. Limited by guarantee

The Charity is a company limited by guarantee. All of the Trustees are Members of the company and guarantee to contribute £1 in the event of a winding up.
