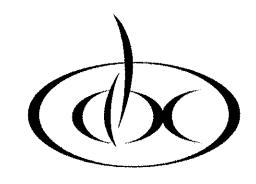

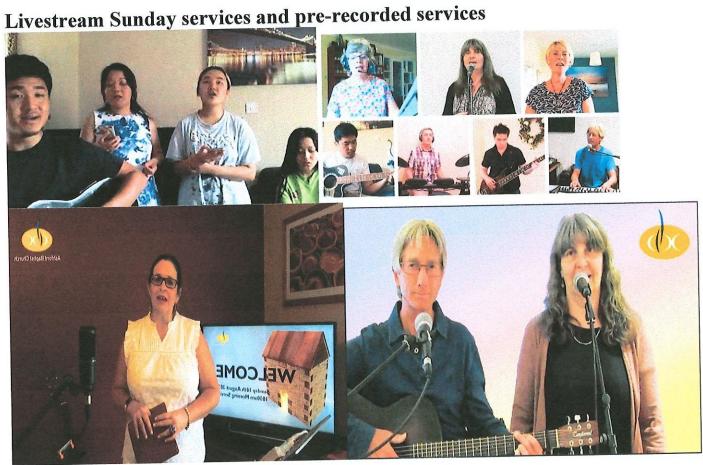

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# Christmas Windows of light and verse for the year from Joshua 24;15



Well, 2020 was a year like none of us have ever seen, although many have lived through other emergencies - but none viral-based. We began the year with the verse given to the people of God, as they settled in the promised land asked to choose this day who they will serve, they said "As for me and my household we will serve the Lord". We had a preaching series about the various households in our church, large, small, extended and temporary, seeking to build on who God has given to ABC in the makeup of his church....we begun plans for a community breakfast on a Sunday morning in the town centre, some went on a local retreat at St Mary's week of accompanied prayer, Rob and Lorna went on holiday and came home early as it became clear a national emergency was

We thank God for the team who enabled this to happen, including Lynda Rand's bookmark of the verse of the year, again delivered to those not online. There was much care and support throughout the year for our community with small groups and meetings outdoors or walks and gardens, as well as meeting in The Coffee Pot in town. We all rediscovered what it is to be outdoor people, where it is much safer to meet at this time of coronavirus.

We thank God for our leaders during this difficult year - our deacons, church secretary and treasurer. We celebrated Easter and Christmas all online and were able to join together with Churches Together in Ashford for the Christmas Windows of Light and the life of the church continued in a virtual way through phones, WhatsApp, Facebook and Zoom!

We said goodbye to Natalie our Administrator and youth worker who remained in Spain with her family due to the coronavirus, we miss her!

These are just a few of the everyday things we remember about 2020, but most of all how we appreciated being in community, looked out for one another in the household of God, serving one another and to God our Father for God's continue overflowing love.

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# Church Secretary's Annual Report - 2020

Joshua 24:15 - ..."then choose for yourselves this day whom you will serve. But as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord".

2020 has been an interesting year for all of us, especially for myself taking up the role of Church Secretary for the first time. I was certainly not expecting a lockdown! This year has not been a "typical year" in the life of the church, as we saw the doors close at the end of March 2020 due to Covid. However, God continued to work amongst us in our weekly services via Youtube, lifegroups and prayer meetings on Zoom. We were still able to continue to have fellowship, for which we give thanks. We give thanks to those who arranged Sunday School, Youth and BB Zooms to stay in touch with our children and youth. We say thank you to Rob and Lorna, our PA team and others who assisted with helping the church to livestream services so quickly.

At the start of the year, we saw Sola and Dayo step down as deacons. We welcomed Keith as a new deacon and Anssi as Treasurer. Deacons' meetings after March, continued on Zoom.

We were pleased to celebrate Greta's 90<sup>th</sup> birthday with cake after a service in February, along with Stephen's 60<sup>th</sup>. Although we saw 3 babies born during 2020, we were only able to have one dedication service.

Refurbishment plans for the church sanctuary progressed slower than had been expected.

From March onwards, no activities were held in the church due to Covid. Opportunities were therefore taken to undertake various outstanding maintenance. It soon became apparent that the lockdown would go on for some months and though it had been planned to re-open in December this did not happen.

In July, Natalie our administrator returned from Spain for a short visit to enable us to say farewell.

We continued to receive regular news from our missionaries:- The Frizelles in Guatemala, The Wilsons in Turkey, and our BMS Link Missionaries Annie Tanner in Nepal and Daniel and Regiane Clark in Peru, who also experienced lockdowns due to Covid.

A risk assessment team was convened and we give thanks to Quentin for his help and support in assisting with producing our risk assessment documentation.

We know many of our seniors missed meeting together for coffee mornings and luncheon club, who found being at home very difficult.

A "Meals on Wheels" ministry was formed to meet the needs of those who needed a helping hand following times of illness or having a baby. The church was encouraged to give to the Food Bank to help with those struggling, due to loss of jobs and income.

A games evening and a Tearfund quiz evening via zoom provided an opportunity for some fun, during the lockdown in October and November.

However, at the beginning of Covid we heard from Lynn Green, General Secretary for the BU, who asked us to think about Isaiah 43.



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"'forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. See I am doing a new thing!

Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the desert and streams in the wasteland'.

We were challenged to use this time to pray and listen to God, to see what God was saying to us as a church and individuals during this time of lockdown.

2020 will also be remembered for "The Blessing", a song which was recorded by many church communities across the country, around the world and even in Ashford; asking God to bless us and keep us. An uplifting song during this time.

I pray that as we look back on 2020 you will be able to recall how God has blessed you, during a year when many of our hopes and expectations were not met, and many were unable to see their families for many months.

I especially give thanks for all those who have enabled us to stay in touch with one another over this past year. Thank you to everyone who has supported me during this past year.

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## **SAFEGUARDING REPORT for 2020**

On 29th February Lorna and Rob Sylvester, Helen Wilson and I attended a Safeguarding training day at Abingdon Baptist Church on a subject not yet covered in SEBA Safeguarding training about Spiritual Abuse. Entitled Abuse of Power, it covered behaviour within teams: adult to adult. We heard about how to guard against bullying and to build respect.

Then our church life changed to comply with the Covid Safety restrictions and our leaders needed to apply their Safeguarding knowledge when organising Zoom sessions for our children and young people. We are very grateful to these leaders for what they have been doing throughout this time.

SEBA's new Safeguarding Officer was appointed around this time: Wendy Mann. I have found her extremely helpful and very thorough. Her work seeks to ensure consistency across Baptist churches.

In October we also got to know the national BB Safeguarding Officer via a BB Audit. It was helpful to learn about the BB expectations around recruitment that need to go in tandem with our church requirements. This was timely as Nikki Wong was just getting to grips with the DBS administration.

Following the reading of the Safeguarding Policy at the Annual Meeting on 25 October 2020 it was suggested that the list of Safeguarding responsibilities on display on the notice board near the crèche should include the Verifier for the DBS checks. So Nikki Wong has been added following her appointment to the role, replacing Lynda Povey.

Two issues arose during 2020 which were a new challenge. The learning from the Abuse of Power course needed to be applied to a sensitive situation on Face Book. It is so important that all of us speak on social media only those words that we would not mind being displayed on a prominent advertising hoarding. This is a lesson for adults as well as teenagers.

Secondly, as widely reported, the elderly have been vulnerable to more scams and financial exploitation during the past year. It is not in the nature of our senior folk to be suspicious of people who sound friendly on the telephone. It would be helpful if we all help to keep our seniors safe from financial loss just as we would with our own elderly family members. Financial abuse of vulnerable adults can also happen within families and acquaintances. One phrase in the BU guidance, "Safe to Belong", happens more frequently than we would like to think: "the abuse of influence, power or friendship to persuade a person to make gifts . . . ." Let's resolve to guard our vulnerable adults as valued and loved members of our community.

Thanks to all involved in caring for our young people and adults during this past challenging year. Going in to the future it will help us to apply Safeguarding principles as we begin to welcome people in to the church building again.

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## **BOUGHTON REPORT FOR 2020**

The year began as usual with weekly afternoon services and monthly lunch club, coffee break and prayer meeting. We were grateful for the usual friends leading the services. As for other churches the last service or meeting was on  $22^{nd}$  March.

Since that time the old toilet has been replaced thanks to the generosity of one of our members. It is a great improvement, looks bright and new but remains to be brought into use. In addition frequent visits have been made to keep the front looking tidy, removing weeds and clearing the stones and soil that is kicked up by passing traffic. As the road provides a cut through from Canterbury Road to Junction 9 of the M20 or other places on that side of the town it is extremely busy and the majority of vehicles seem to be in a hurry, hence the amount of stones and soil deposited in front of the steps at the front. Weeds also grow readily on the carpark and so are dealt with as well.

Several of the chapel congregation have been able to follow the online services from ABC and we are very grateful to Tracy Smith who has delivered hard copies to those who have not had access to the online versions.

As the congregation is quite small it has been possible to keep in touch by phone on a regular basis and on the whole it has been an uneventful year.

# Financial Report and Accounts for the year ending 31st December 2020

#### ABC's Aims and Organisation

Ashford Baptist Church has as its primary aim 'To propagate the gospel and teaching of Jesus Christ, and to express that teaching in practical action'.

The church operates in the Borough of Ashford, Kent, and is based at St. John's Lane/Station Road and in the mission church of Boughton Aluph. In 2020 it employed joint Ministers, Revds Lorna and Rob Sylvester, and also a Ministry Assistant who helps co-ordinate the life of the church as well as working part-time as Administrator in the church office. These were supported by 5 Deacons, including a Church Secretary and Treasurer.

#### **Review of Financial Activities**

The church is financially dependent on the voluntary support of its members. Gross voluntary income for the year (for all purposes), plus other receipts (including legacies) amounted to £173,845. This is a decrease of £44,459 over the previous year, due mainly to the closure of the building from mid-March to December 2020 (and therefore the suspension of all in-person worship services and other activities), following the outbreak of Covid-19 and as required by UK government legislation.

Total expenditure for the year was £177,781, a reduction over the previous year of £20,162. Again, this was mainly due to the lack of activities for 9 months of the year. Nevertheless, regular donations were sent to BMS World Mission (£7,970) and Baptist Home Mission (£7,970), part of a total of £40,903 given to these and other causes. We also spent £18,213 on phase 1 of the refurbishment of the church.

The net financial position of the church at  $31^{st}$  December 2020 therefore showed a deficit of £5,694 (this includes writing off a small historic debtor of £1,758). This compares to a surplus of £20,361 in the previous year, the difference being explained in the comments above.

All the church's assets are employed directly in pursuing its charitable objectives.

#### **Investment Powers and Bank/Fund Balances**

The church constitution authorizes the trustees to make and hold investments using the general funds. At the end of the year there was a current account at HSBC with a balance of £7,608 and an instant savings account with £136,985. There was also a current account at Lloyds bank containing £32,411. In addition, the Baptist Union Corporation holds a fund in trust on behalf of the church following the sale of Brook chapel in 2018. This is only to be used for refurbishment and building work at Station Road. At the end of the year the balance was £229,613. Adding in balances held by groups with their own bank accounts of £9,813 (e.g. Boughton Chapel, BB and GB) total funds amounted to £416,430.

#### Payment to/in respect of Trustees

No expenses were paid to trustees during the year, but they were reimbursed for materials and postage.

#### **Summary and Thanks**

2020 will be remembered as the year the Covid-19 pandemic dramatically affected the world, and its impact was felt by church communities in many significant ways. Despite all the challenges, however, the finances of ABC held up well thanks to the ongoing generosity of its members and friends, as well as prudent budgeting and



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financial management. We were also able to make use of the time the church stood empty to begin work on the redecoration and refurbishment of the whole premises.

In all this, we remain thankful for the gracious provision of God, not only in financial terms, but also through the many acts of selfless giving and service rendered by His people at Ashford Baptist Church for the glory of His name.

#### **ACCOUNTING POLICIES** 1)

# Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared to give a true and fair view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair 'view. This departure has involved following the Charities SORP (FRS102) published on 16 July 2014 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has since been withdrawn.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant notes to these accounts. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and Charities Act 2011.

Ashford Baptist Church constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS102.

#### **Fund Accounting**

General Funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

#### Income

Non-covenanted donations and other income are brought into income in the year during which they are received, with the exception of donations given for a specific purpose which are carried forward as deferred income and matched with the relevant expenditure. Legacies are credited to the income and expenditure account in the year in which they are received.

#### Expenditure

Specific items of expenditure that relate to either direct charitable expenditure or other expenditure are attributed to the appropriate category.

All expenditure is inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

#### Depreciation

Depreciation is provided to write off the cost of the asset over its estimated useful economic life.

Assets are depreciated at the following rates:

Fixtures, fittings and equipment at

15 % on Written Down Value

**Motor Vehicles** 

20 % on Cost

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its useful life. Items of equipment are capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £750.

The Trustees own the following freehold properties: premises at Station Road/St John's Lane, Ashford; the Manse at 23 Magazine Road, Ashford; and leasehold land and buildings at Boughton Aluph Chapel. The original value of the buildings and the costs of improvements to them until 2020 have not been included in the Balance Sheet because, in the opinion of the Trustees, the cost of professionally valuing these assets to include a value in the accounts outwelghs the benefits to the users of the accounts. They are insured for £4,276,689 (2019: £4,120,656) which is an estimate of their replacement cost.
