The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2021. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives:

The principal object of the charity is to relieve the needs of children and young people, adults and families who have suffered from and/or are likely to suffer from violence in their homes or elsewhere particularly by the provision of support services and advice calculated to relieve those needs.

Our Mission Statement:

We support children, young people and families affected by domestic violence and abuse. We aim to help survivors to recognise their own strengths and skills, putting the power of their recovery in their hands. Together, we stand tall.

Our Aims:

We will safeguard and promote the safety, welfare and rights of children, young people and their families who have suffered from violence and abuse within their home. We aim to:

- Improve the physical and mental health and well-being of families who have been impacted by domestic abuse;
- Increase their personal resources by building self-esteem, confidence and assertiveness;
- Empower them to increase their self-efficacy and live safely and independently;
- Connect them to like-minded peers and reduce isolation, improving personal support networks and reducing the need for intensive intervention in the future.

Significant activities:

Acorns has been providing much valued services to victims and survivors of domestic violence aged four to 18 and their family members in the heart of North Tyneside for 20 years, and we have been delivering services in Northumberland since 2018. Acorns specialises in play therapy and one-to-one trauma informed counselling services, as well as offering parent and carer support, group work, prevention and healthy relationships work in schools and colleges, and one-to-one outreach support both at school and in the community.

Public benefit:

Acorns works with survivors of domestic abuse of all ages towards achieving positive outcomes. Specialist services have been developed to tackle the incidence and impact of domestic violence and abuse by improving safety, improving mental and physical health, increasing self-esteem and confidence and thereby increasing individual and family life chances. Information is effectively promoted to partner agencies and within the community to ensure services reach those in the greatest need and with a particular focus on safeguarding children, young people and adults at risk of harm.

The trustees consider that they comply with their duty in Section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to public benefit.

Volunteers:

Acorns holds volunteers in high regard for their contributions at all levels of the organisation. This includes trustee duties, fundraising and individual and group peer support, as well as our highly valued adult counselling team. All volunteers receive induction and ongoing supervision and training.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE 2020/2021

Context and background:

We support families who have experienced or are experiencing domestic violence to heal, recover and grow, in North Tyneside and Northumberland.

We offer a range of services under our priorities 'Prevent, Cope and Recover' including counselling and play, music and art therapy, and practical and well-being support and outreach services which include 1-1 emotional and practical support, group educational programmes, an open access drop-in and a crisis service, for children and young people aged 4-25, their non-abusing carers and other family members.

We are a trauma informed organisation and all our services are designed around the needs of the individual and/or the family unit. We provide our services free, both at our two premises in North Shields, and out in the community and within schools, colleges and children's centres. We have lots of experience of delivering domestic abuse services – 20 years - and of developing and maintaining our services to meet the ongoing needs of the families we work with.

Entry into the service is through children's referrals. If a child has been accepted for one of our children's services, this opens up access to additional services for the rest of the family, including a variety of supplementary activities and groups. This holistic, service user led approach aims to strengthen the family unit, focussing on resilience while improving attachment, trust and familial bonds.

One Door - Many Rooms:

We provide a three-tier service, and families work with us to put together a bespoke care plan, based on their individual needs:

Tier 1 - Prevent

Advice & guidance and signposting for the whole family

- Text helpline for young people
- Prevention programmes 4Real (healthy relationships)
- Psychoeducational workshops for parents
- Drop in and flexible support services

Tier 2 - Cope

- Crisis support First Response Service for children aged 11+ risk & safety planning
- Group programmes Roots (age 8-12 wellbeing and coping strategies) and Healing Together®
- Emotional and practical support for carers (Family Support Service)
- Advocacy for adults and children
- Ad hoc interim support while awaiting counselling

Tier 3 - Recovery

- Counselling and music, art and play therapy for children and young people
- One to one outreach case work in schools and the community
- Parent/carer counselling service

The impact of our work

Domestic abuse is a complex form of trauma, which presents in complex ways. Survivors may experience a wide range of effects such as: high levels of anxiety; self-blame; low self-esteem and self-worth; exhaustion; fear; anxiety; depression; loss of self-efficacy; social isolation; loss of trust; traumatic bonding; diminished perceptions of alternatives; hyper-arousal; hyper-vigilance; and impaired decision-making and problem-solving abilities.

Our work aims to:

- Improve the physical, mental health and well-being of service users who have been impacted by trauma;
- Increase their personal resources by building self-esteem, confidence and assertiveness;
- Empower them to increase their self-efficacy and live safely and independently.

The key elements of the TIME (trauma informed model of empowerment) model we use are:

- Place and retain the survivor at the centre of practice;
- Continuous assessment of need through review and reflection;
- Accessible: enable survivors to benefit from support;
- Responsive: meet survivors' needs;
- Adaptable: to respond to the needs of survivors at each point of contact;
- Safe environment: supporting survivors to reconnect with a sense of self and control;
- Relational connection to build relationships: facilitated though trust, compassion and empathy;
- Empowerment: Identify and promote strengths;
- Effective interventions meet survivors needs: reduce the impacts of trauma.

Our range of services can be put together as a holistic package for a family, ensuring their needs are met. This approach involves the whole family in decision making, and families work with us to develop their own support plans. We only work with families.

We also provide access to family therapies and attachment work, and access to supplementary whole family activities, to help strengthen the family bonds and rebuild trust.

We work with children, young people and adults, and with more than one family member at a time. The vast majority of adults who use our services are women - around 94%, however we do work with non-abusing male carers and we are seeing an increase in the number of men who are accessing our services.

Services:

The families who access our services say:

"A massive thank you to my worker for helping me, she did not see the broken person in front of her but the old me and the passion I have to help others. She has helped me build back up my resilience to my situation and point me in the right direction of turning my negatives into positives"

"Just like when people talk about being in a protective bubble, this is how I feel about Acorns. It's a hard shell that finally gives children the safe haven they have wanted. Instead of feeling like just one person lost in this big old world, Acorns helps put the world in your hands. Improving the lives of the people that use our services

A total of 2,111 sessions was offered to children and young people this year. Despite a high number of cancellations related to COVID, the team still managed to deliver 1,670 sessions in total, during a year where we had to halt all face to face services for 5 months. This is testament to the determination of the team, who freely and enthusiastically adapted to new ways of working, and implemented new technologies to ensure we could still provide support.

Other work in the period includes:

- Our Family Support Workers supported 45 parents/carers;
- Our First Response team supported 71 CYP's;
- Our Adult Counselling Team supported 55 parents/carers.

Volunteers

We have had some fantastic feedback from the volunteer team:

In addition we are pleased to welcome to Acorns two of our ex-service users, who will lead participation for parents and carers, and youth participation respectively. This is a huge step for Acorns and we are really excited about this.

Partnership Working

The pandemic brought out the best in our community, and during this period we have made some excellent partnerships with local organisations, which will strengthen our offer moving forward.

- We continue to work with Harbour to support children and young people in North Shields refuge;
- We have developed a partnership with the national music therapy charity, Nordoff Robbins, and have a qualified music therapist, working within our Recovery Team to deliver one-to-one work and therapeutic music groups to adults and children. This complements our existing offer of art therapy and play therapy, meaning we can offer still more choice to families;
- We are working with SportWorks to provide a weekly family activity session for our families, Active
 Acorns. As part of this work, we provided a nutritious evening meal for families after the sessions,
 in partnership with the Second Bite Academy, a local CIC based in Whitley Bay.
- We were successful in our application for funding to run a project in partnership with Tyneside and Northumberland MIND, to provide therapeutic support to children who have been affected by violent crime. The results of this pilot programme will be given to the OPCC to inform future commissioning priorities,

• We are currently involved in the design and development of a dedicated community hub in Wallsend Forum shopping centre, in partnership with North Tyneside Art Studio, a local mental health charity who's goals align very much with ours. This space will be available for use by ourselves and by other local community groups, to deliver art therapy and peer support groups, with lots of opportunities for cross referrals, and with an overarching aim of reducing social isolation. We are very excited about this project.

Independent Evaluation

As part of the reporting requirements of the National Lottery Community Fund, we commissioned an independent evaluation of our service. Cullagh Warnock, who had previously undertaken a strengths review for Acorns at the beginning of the 4-year grant, which initiated a number of changes within the organisation, kindly returned to carry out this work. Highlights included:

- ✓ All of the recommendations in the strengths review have been implemented and completed;
- ✓ Our new policy of 'opening up' our service and work, in order to integrate with the communities where we work, and de-mystify our services, was commended;
- ✓ Our proactive and comprehensive response to the COVID-19 pandemic was highlighted;
- ✓ Greater involvement of our service users was noted;
- ✓ The evaluation overall is very positive, and highlights the improvements made across all of our services and processes.

Financial Stability

In this period, we successfully managed all contracts and grants reaching targets and milestones as required.

Along with our ongoing contract with NTC, we also received funding from:

Networking and Information Sharing

Our website is regularly updated, and we connect with service users, the public and professionals through our Facebook page. We registered for Google my Business in November 2020, and have registered over 4,000 searches since then.

The pandemic meant that our usual programme of events couldn't go ahead, however we still managed to connect with people in a number of ways:

- Some of the team and two anonymised stories from service users featured on Look North in July 2020, explaining the urgent need for domestic abuse services;
- One worker was interviewed for BBC Newcastle, and featured on there during Children in Need week;
- We won an award for our innovative approach to working in rural areas, from the Scottish Power Foundation;
- We held a public branding consultation and an in-person focus group with 6 families;
- We carried out a COVID-19 Survey with the families we were working with during the first lock down, and produced a full report on our work done during this time;
- Remote events for International Women's Day, including Yoga, an 'online' facial, with products being delivered before the session, and an online music therapy for mindfulness session;
- The CEO gave a talk to the North Tyneside Women's Labour Group at their regional conference for International Women's Day.

We work closely with the local authority domestic abuse teams, children's services and with Harbour, and local schools and colleges to support men, women and children affected by domestic abuse. We feed into MARAC and are members of the North Tyneside Domestic Abuse Partnership, and are involved with the Domestic Abuse Champions scheme. The Manager attends the Northumbria PCC Domestic Abuse Scrutiny Panel and delivers domestic abuse awareness training in partnership with the LSCB Training Board. The Outreach team delivers various group sessions throughout the area.

Strengthening the organisation

Training

Staff have undertaken various training opportunities throughout the year, including child protection, first aid, data protection, equality and diversity and health & safety training, as well as undertaking continuous professional development opportunities appropriate to their roles.

Organisational Development

This year, we have:

- Continued to improve our case management and reporting systems;
- Improved communications with the addition of new remote working capabilities, and investment in IT hardware and software;
- Increased staff resources across all of our teams including implementing a second level of line management, which improves support for staff;
- Expanded all of our services in response to the increased demand caused by the pandemic;

- Carried out a staff survey with very positive results;
- Refined monitoring systems and started seeing trends emerge in data;
- Consolidated our new financial management processes;
- Written a three-year strategic plan, to be launched in July 2021, along with our new branding and logo.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

We aim to maintain a level of free reserves sufficient to meet the charity's working capital requirements in the event of a significant drop in funding. We have established a policy whereby the free reserves that we hold should be equivalent to at least 6-months of annual expenditure. The reserves are needed to meet the working capital requirements of the charity in order to maintain the charity's current activities. The present level of reserves available to the charity of £147,000 – equivalent to 5-months of annual expenditure does not meet this target level.

Financial position

Incoming resources in the period were £368,705 (2020: £288,110). Of this amount £294,813 (2020: £160,031) related to restricted project activities. There was a surplus of £9,889 (2020: £720) in the period. At 31 March 2021 total reserves were £154,231 (2020: £144,342) of which restricted funds were £7,231 (2020: £27,442) and £147,000 (2020: £116,900) of unrestricted.

Acorns could not carry out the work that it does without the generous support of its funders. We are grateful to National Lottery Community Fund; National Lottery Awards for All; Children in Need; North Tyneside Council, North Tyneside CCG small grants programme; The Scottish Power Foundation; Northumberland County Council; Northumbria Police and Crime Commissioner; St James Place Foundation; Community Foundation; The Lloyds Bank Foundation; The Angus Lawson Memorial Trust and MIND for their valued support.

Going concern statement

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the trustees have reviewed and considered financial information and revised forecasts to take into account measures that they can take with the current financial resources available to mitigate the impact of the current adverse conditions. The trustees are of the view that the immediate future of the charity for the next 12 months is secure and that on this basis the charity is a going concern.

FUTURE PLANS

We continue to seek to sustain our funding in order to maintain our current level of delivery while demand is so high.

We plan to offer family therapy to improve parental/child attachment and trust, a parent coffee morning once a week as part of a plan to create a peer support network, and workshops for parents that use psychodynamic education to explain the effects of trauma on families and how this can be mitigated, to dispel any worries they may have.

The pandemic has delayed our plans to develop our Youth Panel, however this work has now resumed, and is service-user led. This will ensure that all children and young people who access Acorns have a voice and a say in how we run our services.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Acorns (North Tyneside) is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 9th January 2014 and registered as a charity on 16th May 2014. The company was established under Articles of Association establishing the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

There are a minimum of three trustees with no maximum, the age eligibility is 16 years or over, all of whom must support the objects of the charity. The trustees are elected on a rolling basis at Board Meetings.

Organisational structure

The charity and its property is administered and managed by the trustees in accordance with the Memorandum, the Articles and the Companies and Charities Acts.

Induction and training of new trustees

New Trustees meet with the Chief Officer and the Board who provide them with a comprehensive introduction to the workings and ethos of Acorns. They receive the charitable status handbook, a copy of the Articles and the last published Financial Statements and are offered training in areas where they perceive they may have weaknesses.

Working Relationships

We work closely with the local authority domestic abuse teams, children's services and with Harbour, Victims First and local schools and colleges to support families affected by domestic abuse. We feed into MARAC and are members of the North Tyneside Domestic Abuse Partnership, and are involved with the Domestic Abuse Champions scheme. The Manager attends the Northumbria OPCC Domestic Abuse Scrutiny Panel.

Trustees responsibilities in relation to the financial statement

The charity trustees are responsible for preparing a trustees' annual report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the charity trustees to prepare financial statements for each year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and the group and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable group for that period. In preparing the financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

1 Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

2 Basis of accounting

2.1 Basis of preparation

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) — Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

Acorns (North Trynside) meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

2.2 Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis. In making their assessment the trustees have reviewed and considered relevant information, including their annual budget and future cash flows. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the trustees have revised their forecasts to take into account measures that they can take with the current resources available to mitigate the impact of the current adverse conditions. The trustees are of the view that the immediate future of the charity for the next 12 months is secure and that on this basis the charity is a going concern.

3 Income

3.1 Recognition of income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the resources, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is more likely than not that the resources will be received and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability

3.2 Offsetting

There has been no offsetting of assets and liabilities, or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by FRS102 SORP or FRS102.

3.3 Grants and donations

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Income received in advance of the provision of a specified service is deferred until the criteria of income recognition are met

3.4 Donated goods and services

Donated goods are measured at fair value (the amount for which the asset could be exchanged) unless impractical to do so.

Donated services and facilities are included in the SoFA when received at the value of the gift to the charity provided that the value of the gift can be measured reliably. Donated services and facilities that are consumed immediately are recognised as income with the equivalent amount recognised as an expense under the appropriate heading in the SoFA.

3.5 Volunteer help

The value of volunteer help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

3.6 Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

3.7 Income from membership subscriptions

Membership subscriptions received in the nature of a gift are recognised in donations and legacies.

Membership subscriptions which gives a member the right to buy services or other benefits are recognised as income earned from the provision of goods and services as income from charitable activities.

3.8 Investment gains and losses

This includes any realised or unrealised gains or losses on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

3.9 Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of the charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose. Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

4 Expenditure and liabilities

4.1 Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised when it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

4.2 Charitable activities

All expenditure is accounted for on an accrual baisis. Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of services to families and other activities undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs

4.3 Governance and support costs

Support costs have been allocated between governance cost and other support. Governance costs comprise all costs involving public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice.

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

4.4 Irrecoverable VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

4.5 Creditors

The charity has creditors which are measured at settlement amounts less any trade discounts.

4.6 Provisions for liabilities

A liability is measured on recognition at its historical cost and then subsequently measured at the best estimate of the amount required to settle the obligation at the reporting date.

4.6 Pensions

The pension costs charged in the financial statements represent the contribution payable by the charity during the year.

5 Assets

5.1 Tangible fixed assets for use by the charity

Individual fixed assets costing £1,000 or more are capitalised at cost and are depreciated over their estimated useful economic lives on a reducing balance basis:

The Charity currently has no tangible fixed assets.

5.2 Debtors

Debtors are measured at their recoverable amounts, being the amount the charity anticipates it will receive in settlement of the debt.
