# TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 5 APRIL 2021

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of the charity for the 6 April 2020 to 5 April 2021.

#### **Objectives and Activities**

#### a. Policies and objectives

To advance in life and help young people through the provision of scholarships to improve their conditions of life and develop their skills, capacities and capabilities to enable them to participate in society as mature and responsible individuals.

To promote such exclusively charitable purposes as determined by the trustees by providing financial support to charities or organisations undertaking charitable purposes;

To advance education of individual recipients and/or their children by providing grants to help meet the expenses of their education;

To relieve poverty by making grants to individual recipients in straitened circumstances

#### b. Activities for achieving objectives

The Archie Lloyd Charitable Foundation, known as 'teamArchie' aims to award scholarships targeted at those who have not had the opportunities afforded to them through their education and personal circumstances. These young people will be mentored and assisted through a programme of further education, for example through coaching qualifications and travel.

teamArchie are primarily supporting scholarships which are being set up initially in association with charities which have the practical processes in place to help identify worthy recipients and set up the opportunities that the Trustees feel would benefit them.

We are aiming to build multiple opportunities in sport, music, drama, art and design, education and business. Both the financial assistance and the mentoring might swing the pendulum of opportunity in favour of boys and girls who deserve a helping hand in part because they want to be the best that they can be and in part because there is nowhere for them to get the support that they need to make it happen.

#### Achievements and performance

#### a. Review of activities

Whilst the last 18 months has been like none other, with many charities struggling from the Covid pandemic, teamArchie is pleased to report that while our fundraising activities have been affected through this period, we have been very active with our partner charities developing new multi-year programmes to identify individuals that can be inspired and motivated to make the most of their talents through a combination of coaching and mentoring – please see a selection below of some of the activity with our partner charities, the projects we have established, and the growing impact by teamArchie over the last 12 months.

**Snow Camp** - With Archie's love of skiing it was only natural that teamArchie found a charity to work with in snow sports - motivating young people to fully engage is often the key to successful youth work and Snow Camp have found that snow sports are incredibly attractive to inner-city young people, despite being out-of-reach for many. The opportunity to participate in snow sports acts as the tool with which we can effectively engage young people and maintain a positive involvement with them. This is achieved through their Programme Journey, which takes place at indoor snow sports centres in London, the North West, the Midlands and Scotland.

In 2019/20 teamArchie agreed its first programme with the charity to support five young people to complete their three stage Snow Camp course – which culminates in a level one snow sports qualification.

Due to Covid restrictions Snow camp have not been able to complete their 2019/20 programme and this will now be done in spring 2022. TeamArchie has also agreed a three year rolling programme with Snow Camp for 2022-24 and five further candidates will benefit from the three stage programme in the 2021/22 winter season.

**Bradford City FC Community Foundation** - supporting Bradford City Girls Football - Through our 2017 Youth Sport Trust football programme, Qasim Aktar was supported by the charity to further his football coaching qualifications. Qasim now works as head of women and girls football development at Bradford City FC. In 2020 team teamArchie were proud sponsors of all the girls teams at Bradford City FC, providing playing kit and the opportunity for seven players to undertake their FA Level 1 Coaching Qualification, with a further seven players taking a refereeing qualification.

Seenaryo, Jordan - In 2020 teamArchie committed to supporting the Children's Theatre programmes with Seenaryo in Jordan, for a period of three years. The grant expects Seenaryo to deliver six theatre projects each year via: four Seenaryo Cycles (12-week weekly sessions), and two/three Seenaryo Showbuilds (1-week intensives), each culminating in a final performance, as well as delivering three trainings to new and existing facilitators.

After three years of working with Seenaryo, the teamArchie supported Showbuilds and Children's Theatre cycles, where many of the participants who started as children, now teenagers, are now developing their sense of responsibility, their leadership skills, as well as refining their acting talents and passion for performance.

Whilst Covid had an impact on the projects a good number of the projects could continue to be delivered live with careful Covid restrictions in place, other courses were delivered more intensely to work around lockdowns.

In numbers our projects with Seenaryo in the last 12 months have delivered:

- 114 children participating, devising and performing
- 7 original performances created from scratch
- 3 new facilitators employed by Seenaryo for the first time
- 13 employment opportunities outside of facilitating (e.g. partner coordination, photography, providing transport)
- 33 facilitators trained through Seenaryo's 'training of the trainer' workshops
- 13 employment opportunities for facilitators trained by Seenaryo

ACE, Rio de Janeiro - ACE is a charity based in Brazil, set up by George Crawley and Dylan Brown, helping provide education, sport and opportunity for children out of the poorest Favelas in Rio. We are excited to report that in early 2020 we were able to launch a teamArchie girls football academy project within their organisation with a commitment for funding the next three years. The football academy, Playlife is based in Vidigal running 3 football classes a week and two tennis classes, with a total number of 110 students coming through the projects. Our second project in Mandela is running 4 hours of football every week to 60 girls.

In February 2021, ACE Projects held the first women's football tournament in the Vidigal community. They brought together the Playlife team and Mandela team - in all, they had 26 girls participating in the tournament. The tournament had plenty of fun and impactful moments. There were 4 matches, divided into 2 teams by age. Events like this, show the size of the impact that ACE projects, supported by teamArchie are generating for local social projects and for leaders. Many girls from the Mandela community had never visited the south side of the city or even seen the beach before. This shows how we are committed to creating opportunities for children from the poorest favelas in Brazil.

First Story - Following the success of Summer 2019 residential creative writing week with First Story, and due to Covid restrictions a residential course was not possible in Summer 2020 or 2021, however, the charity adapted to the 'world of zoom' and ran a virtual creative writing week supported by teamArchie. The week long online workshop was coordinated by inspirational teachers and writers culminating in a live Zoom performance of the written work during the week on the final afternoon. These weeks both physical and virtual have proved an enormous success - please see some of the reaction below from staff and participants:

There were many highlights of the week. Masterclass sessions featured activities both joyous and poignant; the one- to-one mentoring sessions were crammed with insights; and the small group sessions were focused and intimate. There was the final day's virtual showcase, attended by various encouraging family members, writers, teachers, First Story's team, and teamArchie's own Claire and James. Each in little boxes on the zoom screen, listening attentively as each young writer stepped bravely into the virtual spotlight to share their new work.

A couple of quotes from young writers who attended the week provide an insight into the workshop's impact and some of the lessons learnt:

"Write as if you're talking to you're friends, it helps convey your storyline further and not hidden behind formal language."

"How to just go for it. Don't be hooked on what others might think just express your thoughts without creating barriers."

Greenhouse Sports – teamArchie continues to sponsor their Primary Committed Table Tennis Programme at Greenhouse and are delighted to announce a three year programme 2021-23, The youth table tennis development programme supports children from 8-17 years to play table tennis up to five days a week after school. The professional team at Greenhouse provide so much more than an introduction and coaching of this unique sport, but the table tennis centre is a place to go and be safe, a place to be fed and to get advice and mentorship.

Added to this some real talent is emerging from the programme with many in the country's top 10 for their age group and one of our star performer is currently U11 national champion and in 2020 was Young Westminster's Sports Personality of the Year, awarded live on Sky Sports. In the summer of 2021 TeamArchie sponsored a tournament at the Greenhouse HQ in Marylebone where kids battled it out to become under 13, 15, 19 Girls/Boys champion - The competition provided a fantastic environment in the three different age groups, a great way to end the season. They hadn't played a competition in over a year before this tournament due to Covid and the atmosphere was electric at the Greenhouse centre.

As Daniel, a Greenhouse TT Coach described the event – 'They managed to put all the skills they learnt off the table, such as preparing by warming up or just headphones on and getting in the zone, as well as showing the skills they have learnt on the table by putting on some high quality matches for all parents/coaches and teamArchie to watch.'

New Adventures - teamArchie continues to work with Sir Matthew Bourne's charity after delivering a bursary to two talented dancers to work with and train alongside the New Adventures Dance Company and a number of 'show builds' (15 minute dance show) for around 20 children to perform in front of a packed Sadler's Wells – most recently in January 2020 before a performance of The Red Shoes - these children were drawn from state schools in Islington and were provided with coaching and mentoring from Sir Matthew Bourne's leading choreographer to deliver a stunning performance. Sadly the performances planned for January 2021 were cancelled due to covid-19.

We are however, excited to announce a new three year partnership with New Adventures to provide a Bursary apprenticeship with the Company and mentoring for a highly talented young and emerging dancer.

The inaugural Emerging Artist Apprenticeship with New Adventures, supported by teamArchie has been taken up by Enrique Ngbokota. Enrique's two year apprenticeship started in 2020 with a year's training in New Adventures talent development programmes alongside completing their final year at Elmhurst Ballet School. Enrique now has 12 months with the New Adventures dance company as part of the apprenticeship and will be making their professional debut with the Company in Sir Matthew Bourne's Nutcracker which will tour the UK through to April 2022.

Sir Matthew Bourne first identified Enrique back in 2014, performing as part of the Lord of the Flies young cast at Birmingham Hippodrome. Enrique worked with New Adventures again in 2019 as part of their acclaimed Romeo and Juliet. Enrique started dancing at just three and by eight had joined the Royal Ballet Junior Associates. Enrique went on to train at Elmhurst Ballet School at eleven and was there until they graduated in the summer of 2021. Enrique has previously won Young Modern Dancer of the Year at The All England Finals, is a talented musician and passionate choreographer.

teamArchie are proud to be supporting Enrique's Apprenticeship and providing additional mentoring alongside the newly developed programme.

Fundraising Activity – the charity continues to be supported by family and friends taking on personal challenges, generous grant-making charities and a range of events to raise money. In the last two years fundraising events have been almost non-existent with the on-set of Covid, however we are hoping 2022 will allow us to once again to host some exciting events for the charity. One exception was the teamArchie keepy-uppey challenge where some wonderful and imaginative videos were submitted to raise funds for teamArchie as part of the Big Give Campaign – thank you to all those who took part.

In spite of Covid a number of personal challenges were completed in support of the charity and we are very grateful to all those who have raised funds for teamArchie. These have included a number of virtual events — marathon's; half-marathons; wreath making classes tutored by our Trustee Claire and also a very competitive on-line Bridge League that proved a great success over the winter lockdowns.

Thank you to everyone who has been involved with teamArchie in whatever capacity through 2020 and 2021 and we look forward to our exciting projects developing through 2022 and once again having the opportunity to watch fundraisers complete their personal challenges and meet face to face with our supporters, partners and beneficiaries.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 5 APRIL 2021

#### 1. Accounting Policies

#### 1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared to give a 'true and fair' view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair' view. This departure has involved following the Charities SORP (FRS 102) published on 16 July 2014 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has since been withdrawn.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant notes to these accounts. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and Charities Act 2011.

The Archie Lloyd Charitable Foundation constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

#### 1.2 Income

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

#### 1.3 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Charitable activities and Governance costs are costs incurred on the charity's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.

Grants payable are charged in the year when the offer is made except in those cases where the offer is conditional, such grants being recognised as expenditure when the conditions attaching are fulfilled. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end are noted as a commitment, but not accrued as expenditure.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 5 APRIL 2021

#### 1. Accounting Policies (continued)

#### 1.4 Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

#### 1.5 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

#### 1.6 Cash at Bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

#### 1.7 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the charity anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised within interest payable and similar charges.

#### 1.8 Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

#### 1.9 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.
