#### Structure, Governance and Management

#### **Governing Document**

East Riding Voluntary Action Services (ERVAS) Limited is a registered charity and a company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association adopted on 02 August 2006 and amended on 10 September 2007 and 30 January 2013.

Every member of the Charity undertakes to contribute a maximum of £10 in the event of the charity winding up.

## Recruitment and appointment of Trustees

The Trustees form the Executive Committee of the charity. The members of the Executive Committee are elected at the Annual General Meeting by the members of the Charity, and usually serve for a three year term. At the end of this term they can stand for re-election. All members are circulated with invitations to nominate Trustees in advance of the AGM. There is a provision for the co-option of additional Trustees if required.

The Articles of Association states that the number of Trustees must not be less than three but shall not be subject to any maximum.

### Trustee Induction and Training

New Trustees undergo Induction training, provided by the Chief Executive. The induction includes a discussion about the role and responsibilities of Trustees, the activities, aims and objectives of the Charity, the structure of the organisation, Board of Trustees, general procedures of the organisation. New Trustees are Introduced to members of staff and other Trustees, and are provided with the Charity Commissions 'Roles and Responsibilities of Trustees', the Articles and Memorandum of Association, the business plan, the latest statutory financial statements, Annual Report, and financial reports provided to the Board of Trustees. Any additional training required by new Trustees will be identified during induction, and may be requested at any point by new and existing Trustees, where it is considered useful to their role as Trustee. Trustees are also invited to attend staff events and activities in order to develop a better all round understanding of the organisation.

#### Organisational Structure

The Board of Trustees manages the Charity, and aims to consider only strategic decisions at its meetings. Trustees are aware that any conflicts of interest are declared and minuted. The Board meets bi-monthly. Separate committees comprising of board members and senior employees have been set up for HR, Finance and Marketing. These committees present information to the full board for decisions. The Chief Executive is appointed by the Trustees to manage the day to day operations of the Charity, and also has authority to delegate as appropriate to other staff members. Ad-hoc committees are set up when the need arises.

## Risk Management

The major risks to which the Company is exposed, as identified by the Trustees, have been reviewed and systems have been established to mitigate those risks. The climate within the Voluntary and Community Sector is such, that risks include a dependence on a mixture of income sources including earned income, Service Level Agreements, contracts and grants — a percentage of which covers the core costs of the organisation.

It is the aim of the Trustees to retain within designated reserves sufficient reserves to cover the expenditure of the budgeted core functions for at least six months if funding became unavailable.

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### **Objectives and Activities**

As set out in the Memorandum of Association, the Charity's objects are to promote any charitable purpose for the benefit of the community within but not exclusive to the East Riding of Yorkshire in particular the advancement of education, the development of financial awareness, the promotion of health and the relief of poverty, distress and sickness. To promote for the benefit of the promotion and provision of voluntary and community services for the wider community.

This means that the main objects of the charity are promoting, developing and supporting voluntary activity within the community. The principal activities, carried out to achieve these objectives, are the provision of services to the voluntary/community sector, liaison with statutory, national and major voluntary organisations, representation of local views about service provision; and the development of new services.

#### Main objectives for the following year:

In developing the main objectives for the following year the Trustees have given regard to the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit.

The Board of Trustees remains committed to investigating ways of diversifying income to ensure the sustainability of the organisation. This currently includes an expansion of income generating services in terms of both external contract delivery for a variety of partner organisations and sub-regional/National agencies, together with the further development of business services for delivery to the Voluntary and Community Sector.

ERVAS is committed to developing and nurturing strong local partnerships. The organisation has been at the forefront of creating effective partnerships that respond to the needs of our beneficiaries, both East Riding wide and in the locality areas.

The organisation has an ethos of continuous improvement. Service delivery is monitored, evaluated and developed to achieve high levels of service satisfaction and impact against need. Internal management systems, policies and procedures are also reviewed. Recognisable quality marks have been gained; for example the National Council for Voluntary Organisations (NCVO) Volunteering Centre Quality Accreditation (VCQA) and the PQASSO system. This evidences to funders and stakeholders that the organisation is committed to achieving high standards of internal and external practice.

During the year there was a global pandemic of Coronavirus, Covid-19. ERVAS maintained strong delivery over this period and developed significant new areas of work. This highlights the ongoing adaptability of the organisation to enable continued support to the VCSE and communities within the East Riding.

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### **Objectives and Activities (Continued)**

It is anticipated that we will continue to deliver the following services in the next accounting period:

- Community Development
- Funding Support
- Local Links networks and online directory
- Volunteer Centre
- Community Accountancy and Payroll Service (this is now delivered through a separate subsidiary company Phoenix Accountancy and Business Consultancy Limited, which is fully owned by the Charity)
- Volunteen Activities
- Youth Coalitions Support Service
- Grant making and administration Roos Wind Farm Community Benefit Fund, Dynamix Friends
- Boost Training Services
- Scams awareness raising and support
- Youth Outreach
- Provision of support to foodbanks through the East Riding Food Poverty Alliance
- Two Rivers Community Pantry, Goole

We are still working on the development of Bridlington Community Hub which has recently been awarded funding for 5 years from the National Lottery Community Fund. There were delays in decision making regarding funding due to Covid-19. This will become operational in the next accounting period taking into account Government guidance in relation to social distancing and activities within indoor venues.

We are still looking to develop other localised hubs and have submitted a proposal to East Riding of Yorkshire Council regarding a property in Goole.

There are a number of elements of service delivery that the organisation is developing and intends to secure funding to deliver. Despite ongoing difficulties caused by Covid-19, ERVAS has maintained strong delivery supporting the VCSE with the challenges that they faced, including HR, Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme claims, accessing funding, cashflow forecasting, providing advice, support and a shoulder to cry on where needed.

In addition, working with the local food banks we have developed the East Riding Food Poverty Alliance, a partnership of organisations providing a lifeline for people facing issues around food insecurity. We also partnered with the Voluntary and Community Sector Emergencies Partnership and British Red Cross to ensure VCSE organisations and individuals were supported with the ongoing issues around Covid-19.

All of these elements will expand on the range of services the organisation is able to offer to the VCSE and local communities across the East Riding.

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#### **Objectives and Activities (Continued)**

Strategies for and significant activities that contribute to achieving stated objectives

The organisation continually seeks to explore all appropriate funding opportunities and income streams which help achieve the Charity's stated objectives.

#### Statement of grant making policy

Grants are only made by the organisation within the criteria laid down by the funding bodies providing the grant money. The grants are administered by an independent grant review panel which comprises of representatives from East Riding Voluntary Action Services (ERVAS) Limited, East Riding of Yorkshire Council and other appropriate Voluntary and Community Sector organisations and individuals where appropriate.

During the year ERVAS administered funds for the Youth Action Board, Dynamix Friends, Phoenix/Community Accountancy and various partnership grants.

The Youth Action Board funding was provided by the Dewhirst Charitable Trust for distribution to voluntary sector/not for profit organisations which have agreed to act as an accountable body for projects devised and delivered by groups of young people.

## Contribution of Volunteers

During the year, East Riding Voluntary Action Services (ERVAS) Ltd had volunteers providing additional capacity to the organisations activities. The Trustees and staff would like to thank all volunteers for their contribution to the organisation during the year. These volunteers give their time freely to provide additional support and are a much needed resource.

During the year we were approached by the volunteers of Two Rivers Community Pantry, a food bank based in Cowick Village Hall, who were operating under SCRVSG Ltd as they were looking at closing the food bank element of their work. It was agreed that this project would be transferred to ERVAS to enable the continuation of this service. This is entirely staffed by volunteers.

In addition, we have supported many volunteers via the Volunteer Centre and the Volunteen Project to volunteer within VCSE organisations and their local communities.

### Review of Activities 2020-21

The East Riding Voluntary Action Services (ERVAS) Limited Board of Trustees is satisfied that in our 14th year of independent operation, 2020-2021:

- Our work reflected our aims.
- Our resources were well managed.
- Members were satisfied with the service they received.
- A balance was achieved between core service provision and new developments.

ERVAS continues to maintain its aim of being a one stop shop for VCSE organisations, as well as being able to continue to support communities and individuals. During the year we have received continued support from our members, the community and developed new/additional funding streams which have supported ERVAS to remain sustainable and to grow our service offer for VCSE organisations, communities and individuals. Considering the precarious position we found ourselves in three years ago, we are extremely proud of our achievements and the way the organisation has developed and have plans to continue this development into the future. This could not have been done without our dedicated staff, volunteers and Trustees, the support from the community, our members and our funders.

During the year there was a global pandemic of Coronavirus (Covid-19) which led to both national and local lockdowns to limit the spread of the virus. ERVAS proved itself to be an adaptable and forward thinking organisation and changed delivery methods to enable us to continue supporting organisations and groups within the VCSE sector, communities, as well as our wider individual beneficiaries. This ensured continued delivery of the majority of our services albeit in a different way utilising additional technologies where appropriate as well as the development of new activities in relation to needs identified within our communities. Our funders were extremely supportive and allowed us to adapt our services in line with the unprecedented situation that we found ourselves in.

#### **Covid Response**

In relation to the pandemic of Covid-19 we provided the following activities and support to the VCSE and local communities.

Additional funding was made available from the National Lottery Community Fund which was due to finish in September 2020 to extend the project to November 2020, then further funding was made available from the Big Night In Fund matched with funding from the Government Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) to extend the project to March 2021.

ERFPA was developed in response to the Covid-19 pandemic and is an alliance of VCSE organisations supporting individuals who have or are at risk of food insecurity across the East Riding. The partners of ERFPA are East Riding Food Bank (East Riding wide), Beverley Cherry Tree Centre (Beverley), The Hinge (Bridlington), Hedon Food Bank, Hessle and Anlaby Food Bank, Love Driffield, Mission Trinity (Goole), The Peoples Pantry (Market Weighton, Pocklington and Holme-on-Spalding Moor), Two Rivers Food Bank (Goole and West) and South Holderness Resource Centre (SHoRes) (Withernsea). ERVAS was appointed the Locally Trusted Organisation (LTO) for ERFPA and has provided a range of support services including accessing funding and collaborative bidding to ensure that individuals in need can be supported.

Funding was provided to ERVAS from East Riding of Yorkshire Council to support in the initial development stages of the alliance and to provide support to the food banks to access emergency food provision due to increasing demands caused by the Covid-19 pandemic.

A collaborative bid was submitted to the National Lottery Community Foundation to support in the development of the alliance which included the appointment of a Food Bank Development Worker as well as the provision of food and appropriate PPE to food bank members of the alliance.

#### Two Rivers Community Pantry

During the year we were approached by a group of volunteers from Two Rivers Food Bank based in Cowick Village Hall who were part of SCRVSG Limited and had been created as part of the initial crisis response for Covid-19. SCRVSG Limited were looking at closing down the food bank as they never intended for it to be a long term project. Due to the escalating need in relation to food insecurity, it was agreed that this project and its volunteers would be transferred to ERVAS to enable the continuation of this service and it was renamed Two Rivers Community Pantry.

Two Rivers Community Pantry received funding from East Riding of Yorkshire Council to provide emergency food and supplies to people in need in the Goole and surrounding areas during the Covid-19 pandemic.

## • Two Rivers Community Pantry (continued)

Two Rivers Community Pantry have a relationship with Fareshare and His Church who provide surplus food for distribution and have also received support from many local businesses including Drax Power, Morrisons, Tesco, Siemens, Green Core Foods, Traffic Assist Limited and Ceepak during the year.

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Towards the end of the year, Goole Wind Farm administered by East Riding of Yorkshire Council awarded a grant to develop a Social Supermarket. This will be developed in the next accounting period therefore the funds have been deferred.

#### Beyond Our Four Walls

We were the lead partner working with the HEY Smile Foundation to provide the Beyond Our Four Walls project. This was funded by the National Lottery Community Fund and provided much needed resource to support the following activities:

- Individual tailored support for VCSE organisations to ensure they are supported to increase their resilience during this time, ensuring appropriate technologies are utilised to ensure social distancing is adhered to and to support them with future planning and developments.
- 2) Support in the development and ongoing administration of thematic hubs to ensure that individuals and organisations have the information available to them.
- Development of shared resources that can be utilised now, but also in the future.
- 4) The bringing together of individuals from the private, public and voluntary sector to develop solutions to local problems.
- 5) Further development of online training.
- 6) Development of an open door system with effective referral mechanisms to ensure that the VCSE organisations get the support that they need at the right time from the right partners to ensure effective support can be provided.
- 7) Provide support to give capacity for the partnership development of greater BAME resources within the communities of East Riding of Yorkshire.
- 8) Development of the Beecan system to enable for it to be effectively used as a partnership portal taking into account the needs of the individual partners involved which will enable:
  - a. Each partner to offer services through Beecan
  - Referrals to be directed to the relevant organisation or associate from the list of agreed specialist skills provided

#### VCS Emergencies Partnership

ERVAS was appointed as a Local Liaison Lead on the Voluntary and Community Sector Emergencies Partnership (VCSEP) which is a partnership of local and national voluntary and community sector organisations, formed in response to learnings from several national crises in 2017. Funding was received from the Government Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport through NAVCA as part of a partnership bid to support the work of the VCSEP during the Covid-19 pandemic. It was recognised that a more co-ordinated response amongst the voluntary and community sector was needed when responding to an emergency and the VCSEP supported the sector to make this a reality.

The VCSEP provided space and opportunity for 230 local and national voluntary and community organisations to come together and build connections ensuring support reached those in need more effectively. This was done through the sharing of data insights, identification of unmet need and the provision of local support and brokerage with National Charities including NAVCA, NCVO, ACRE, British Red Cross, Fareshare, Re:Act, Rotary, St Johns Ambulance, Business in the Community, UK Community Foundations, National Emergencies Trust, Volunteering Matters, Muslim Charities Forum, the Salvation Army and Victim Support.

#### HR and Furlough Support

ERVAS in partnership with our subsidiary Phoenix Accountancy and Business Consultancy Limited provided support to VCSE organisations and individuals in receipt of direct payments and personal budgets with advice and practical support around furloughing staff including the completion of claims to the HMRC Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme. During the period April 2020 to 31 March 2021 203 furlough claims were submitted recouping £400,550 for VCSE organisations.

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During this period funding was received from the HEY Smile Foundation, Tesco Bags of Help administered by Groundwork (UK) and from the National Lottery Community Fund – Beyond Our Four Walls Project to support this work.

## Arts Packs for Children and young People

ERVAS in partnership with Beverley Cherry Tree Community Centre provided arts packs to children from low income families living in Beverley who were having to isolate due to the Covid-19 pandemic. This was funded by the Eden Charitable Trust.

#### Tackling Inequalities

ERVAS provided support to children and young people to engage in active lifestyles during the Covid-19 pandemic. This was funded by Sport England administered by Active Humber.

In addition, we were able to increase staff capacity through funding received from the Charities Aid Foundation and the National Emergencies Trust administered by Two Ridings Community Foundation and purchase additional equipment required due to the Covid-19 pandemic to enable people to work from home more effectively from the Clothworkers Foundation.

#### **ERVAS General Activities**

In addition to the activities tailored specifically towards the Covid-19 response ERVAS delivered successful projects in the following areas:

#### Funding

ERVAS provided general funding advice and support, this is provided through online information, events and one to one support to voluntary sector organisations.

ERVAS acted as fund manager for the Roos Wind Farm Community Benefit Fund (all activities of the Roos Farm Community Benefit Fund are accounted for separately through Roos and District CIC, company no: 09196906), administered the Youth Action Board funds, the Dynamix Friends Fund which was created from the residual assets of the charity Dynamix which dissolved during the year. ERVAS also administered various partnership funds and provided charitable donations. In addition, we provided representation on the Routh Wind Farm Community Fund, the East Coast Community Fund, Advantage Coast Community Led Local Development and the Humber Local Enterprise Partnership European Social Investment Fund (Humber LEP ESIF Committee).

We were a partner on the Winter Warmth Scheme funded by Two Ridings Community Foundation providing items such as gloves, coats, hats and small heating appliances for people in need.

We were also a referral partner for the British Red Cross Emergency Fund working with East Riding Food Poverty Alliance members to support individuals in need to access prepaid funding cards.

## Asset Based Community Development and Governance

ERVAS provided asset based community development and governance support through online information, events and one to one support to VCSE organisations. As part of this work we also supported VCSE organisations to close down in the most appropriate way at the end of their life.

ERVAS was successful in accessing European Regional Development Funding through the Community Led Local Development Scheme (CLLD) Active Coast in Bridlington with a project to support Social Businesses providing 12 hours of development support as required by the social business.

Asset Based Community Development and Governance (continued)
 ERVAS also started the provision of a project supporting VCSE organisations with succession planning and governance in partnership with Two Ridings Community Foundation procured by East Riding of Yorkshire Council as part of the Future Communities Initiative (energy funds).

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#### • East Riding Volunteer Centre

ERVAS provided a brokerage service to volunteers and supports VCSE organisations to enable them to effectively recruit and manage volunteers within their organisations. The Volunteer Centre holds the Volunteer Centre Quality Accreditation (VCQA), which is the quality mark for Volunteer Centres and is central to NCVO's strategy for volunteering.

#### Local-Links

ERVAS continued to administer the Local-Links community website and database of Voluntary and Community Sector organisations which provides information and promotes voluntary sector activity.

In addition, we held the Local Links networks, due to the Covid-19 pandemic these were held using an online platform (zoom) during the year. This was funded through a donation from Stamp Jackson and Proctor (SJP) Solicitors.

#### Safeguarding

ERVAS have continued to provide representation on the Safeguarding Adults Board and Safeguarding Children's Board and provide Disclosure and Barring Service checks and provide ad-hoc advice as required.

#### Youth Coalitions Support Service

ERVAS received a grant from Humberside Police and Crime Commission through East Riding Community Safety Partnership administered through East Riding of Yorkshire Council to support in the development and facilitation of Youth Coalitions across the East Riding. These youth coalitions cover Bridlington, Driffield, Beverley, Withernsea, Wolds and Dale, Cottingham and East Riding wide. The Youth Coalitions also encourage partnership working between members.

#### **Achievements and Performance**

#### Volunteen

The Volunteen Project provides Inclusive volunteering opportunities for young people aged 11 to 25 in the East Riding including the Volunteering for young people in East Riding (VYPER) scheme. This improves their prospects of future employability, as well as increasing other outcomes such as self-esteem, confidence, skills, knowledge, accreditations and the chance to try new things and make new friends. There were several different funding streams each providing various levels of support as outlined below:

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- Volunteen Plus received funding from the Reaching Communities strand of the National Lottery Community Fund for three years starting in September 2017 to September 2020 to provide targeted support to vulnerable young people between the ages of 11 25 years old living in the North of East Riding covering Bridlington, Driffield and Beverley, to participate in volunteering/social action activities of interest. Due to the Covid-19 pandemic a proposal was submitted to change the project to provide online service delivery supporting children and young people across the East Riding. Additional information in relation to this is included under our response to the Covid-19 pandemic.
- O Humberside Police and Crime Commission provided a grant through East Riding Community Safety Partnership administered through East Riding of Yorkshire Council to support young people across the East Riding to plan, develop and partake in Social Action projects. Due to the Covid-19 pandemic a proposal was submitted to change the project to provide online service delivery supporting children and young people across the East Riding. Additional information in relation to this is included under our response to the Covid-19 pandemic.
- Volunteen Arts, funding was received from East Riding of Yorkshire Council to provide arts volunteering opportunities. Working in partnership with R-Evolution young volunteers painted a mural on storage containers used for storing donated bicycles.
- Green Influencers, funding was provided from the Ernest Cook Trust to support young people to engage in environmental volunteering and social action projects.

#### Youth Outreach

 Bridlington Youth Outreach is a detached youth work scheme operating in Bridlington. This received funding from the East Coast Community Fund administered by Grantscape. During the Covid-19 pandemic this was delivered mainly online, however during periods when lockdown was lifted face to face activities were delivered.

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 Beverley Youth Outreach is a detached youth work scheme operating in Beverley. This received funding from the Crime Reduction Fund, which is funding from the Police and Crime Commissioner through the East Riding Community Safety Partnership administered by Two Ridings Community Foundation.

### BOOST (Buddying Opens Opportunities, Skills and Training)

ERVAS provide a training and accreditation service which includes the delivery of accredited and non-accredited training and development activities. These activities included:

- The VYPER scheme a service bought in by schools (VYPER Schools) and community organisations (VYPER Communities) through a series of membership options which recognises and accredits the volunteering of young people within their community.
- The Crime Reduction Fund which is funding from the Police and Crime Commissioner through the East Riding Community Safety Partnership administered by Two Ridings Community Foundation provided funding to provide training, events and awareness raising around scams and fraud across East Riding.
- Safer Hull provided funding from the Police and Crime Commissioner to provide training, events and awareness raising around scams and fraud across Hull.
- The National Lottery Community Fund Awards for All scheme provided funding to develop and deliver training to the VCSE. Due to Covid-19, some changes were made to the original programme due to the need for social distancing. Therefore, this programme was developed to include the provision of online learning opportunities.
- ERVAS developed a partnership with the Skills Network to provide a range of online learning content including CPD accredited courses, AAT Essentials Modules, AAT level 2 to 4 training and a range of other qualifications ranging from level 1 to 3. In addition, we also promote access to the Adult Education Budget funded courses at level 1 and 2.

## BOOST (Buddying Opens Opportunities, Skills and Training) (continued)

 ERVAS have continued to work with the First Aid Box to provide a range of First Aid and Health and Safety related courses.

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- ERVAS have also generated a whole range of non-accredited online webinars and training courses to support VCSE organisation including an introduction to youth work, governance, funding, social media, cyber security and data protection.
- East Riding of Yorkshire Council Public Health Team funded a webinar with Josh Connelly covering mental health, wellbeing and childhood experiences of mental health and addiction.
- ERVAS facilitated access to training offered by external organisations including the East Riding Safeguarding Adults Board and the East Riding Safeguarding Children's Partnership.
- Some funds received in the prior year which were planned to be used in the current year for example Roos and District CIC who provided funding to deliver Scams Awareness Sessions and Health and Safety training to residents in the area of benefit and Sir James Reckltt Charity who provided funds to provide skillswise training were put on hold due to Covid-19. This work will be picked up again in the future.

#### Bridlington Hub

ERVAS continued working with Bridlington Town Council, due to Covid-19 our application to the National Lottery Community Fund could not go to the originally intended funding panel for a decision in April 2020. Once the national lockdown was lifted the application was taken to panel and we were successful and were awarded five years funding for Bridlington Community Hub. Due to the ongoing uncertainty and the requirement to recruit, Bridlington Hub opened its doors to the community at the start of the next financial year.

#### • East Riding Food Poverty Alliance

In addition to the activities outlined under Covid-19 response, ERVAS as the locally trusted organisation (LTO) of the East Riding Food Poverty Alliance was successful in a collaborative bid to East Riding of Yorkshire Council for the holiday activity and food scheme (HAF) to provide food hampers and activity packs over Easter 2021, this was funded by the Department for Education (DfE).

These funds were received in the current year and the majority of the preparation, development of the click and collect system and purchase of food was undertaken during this year, however the project finished early in the next financial year.

### East Riding Food Poverty Alliance (continued)

Towards the end of the year, East Riding of Yorkshire Council awarded a grant for the development of a White Goods Scheme (kettles, toasters and Microwaves). This will be developed in the next accounting period therefore the funds have been deferred.

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Special thanks to East Riding of Yorkshire Council officers Claire Watts and Laura Hutchinson who provided immense support to the ERFPA network during the Covid-19 pandemic and continue to do so.

### Representation/advocacy

ERVAS continues to represent/provide advocacy for the VCSE and its interests at strategic level, both locally and nationally, we provide strategic representation across a range of partnership boards locally including the Community Safety Partnership, Bridlington Community Led Local Development, Bridlington Partnership Board, European Social Investment Funds Board, Rural Partnership Board, Voluntary Sector Network, anti-bullying network, Local Resilience Forum, VCS partnership of the Local Resilience Forum, East Riding Safeguarding Adults Board (ERSAB), East Riding Safeguarding Children Partnership (ERSCP), East Riding Children's Trust Board, which is now the East Riding Children and Families Partnership, East Riding Youth Board/Youth Justice Board, East Riding Vulnerable Children and Young People's Group. We are also members on several funding panels across the area. Nationally, we also work with NAVCA, NCVO, Youth Work Unit, Charities Finance Group, VCS Emergencies Partnership, Funding Advice Workers Network and have been involved in many consultations and shaping policy and strategies both locally and nationally including the Civil Society Strategy, Charity Commission consultations and Safeguarding.

## **Phoenix Accountancy and Business Consultancy Limited**

ERVAS subsidiary company, Phoenix Accountancy and Business Consultancy Limited (Company No: 11994941) has continued to thrive and provided much needed support over the last year. Due to the size of the charity we have not consolidated the accounts of Phoenix into our own accounts, however the subsidiary company is very much a part of the ERVAS offer to VCSE organisations.

### **Phoenix Accountancy and Business Consultancy Limited (Continued)**

Phoenix Accountancy and Business Consultancy Services are registered with the Chartered Institute of Management Accountants (CIMA) who provide the practicing certificate for the individual Director. They also provide the supervision for anti-money laundering purposes. It is also registered with the Association of Accounting Technicians and the Chartered Institute of Professional Development through the staff working within.

There has been new challenges due to the Covid-19 pandemic including getting to grips with the Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme to ensure VCSE organisations have been supported and helped to understand their requirements. Services have expanded and now cover the following:

#### Accountancy services

Phoenix provided support around governance, bookkeeping, management accountancy and year end accounts including Independent Examinations and tax returns for VCSE organisations.

During the year we also started offering an Internal Audit/Review service for Academy Schools.

The partnership with Intuit Quickbooks continues which allows ERVAS to provide Quickbooks Cloud Accounting Software to organisations at a discounted price.

#### Payroll services

Phoenix provided payroll services for VCSE organisations as well as for individuals in receipt of Direct Payments, a benefit provided to people with disabilities to enable them to employ their own personal assistants/carers.

We continued to provide managed accounts – these are separate bank accounts for each client which are administered by ERVAS. The client income and expenditure in the managed accounts are not accounted for in the ERVAS accounts as this income and expenditure is owned by the client.

#### HR services

Phoenix provide HR Services for VCSE organisations around all aspects of recruitment, HR, Redundancy and employment issues. Mostly during this year, enquiries related to the requirements regarding furloughing staff and advice around redundancies.

### IT support and website design and development

Phoenix provided general IT support and advice, as well as designing and developing websites working in partnership with Virtual Riders to provide the web hosting.

Phoenix provided bid writing services to support VCSE organisations to access additional funds.

#### Evaluation services

Phoenix provided an evaluation service, supporting VCSE organisations to develop monitoring systems, understand Social Value and provided evaluation reports on funded activities.

### Specialist consultancy support

Phoenix continued to provide tailored specialist consultancy support as required.

## **Partnership Working**

In addition to general partnership working across the Food Poverty Alliance, Youth Coalitions and Local Links Networks with our Statutory Partners and VCSE organisations we also undertook specific pieces of work with the following organisations:

#### Great Yorkshire Radio

Partnership developed to enhance our marketing and profile across the East Riding.

### • HEY Smile Foundation

We were the lead partner working with the HEY Smile to provide the Beyond Our Four Walls project.

#### Market Weighton Youth Action Group

On behalf of Market Weighton Youth Action Group we employed their Detached Youth Workers as at that time they didn't have the policies and procedures in place to manage this effectively.

#### • Two Ridings Community Foundation

We were the lead partner working with the Two Ridings Community Foundation to provide Succession Planning and Governance project funded by the Future Communities Initiative (Energy Funds) administered by East Riding of Yorkshire Council.

#### Hull & East Riding Fraud Forums

We have recently taken on the management of the Hull and East Riding Fraud Forums to enable them to continue, the forums are made up of partners including Humberside Police, Trading Standards, Hull City Council, East Riding of Yorkshire Council, Age UK, Victim Support and Citizens Advice to name a few and the forums aim to:

- o To promote fraud awareness throughout the Hull and East Riding area
- To create an anti-fraud culture across the city by encouraging and developing anti-fraud strategies for people to utilise
- To promote the awareness of the signs that someone is vulnerable to becoming a victim of fraud and/or is the victim of a fraud
- Ensure that the residents of Hull and East Riding area are aware of the risk posed by fraud
- To raise awareness of the reporting procedure if a person believes they have been the victim of a fraud or an attempted fraud
- To support a wider Humber and regional response to fraud

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#### **Financial Review**

#### Reserves Policy

The Executive Committee regularly review the Reserves policy of the charity to ensure it meets the needs of the Charity. A minimum requirement of the reserves policy is that at least six months' core running costs and the value of any core redundancy is retained in the unrestricted designated fund to ensure a sufficient buffer to enable effective financial decision-making, rather than short term decisions and to ensure effective financial stewardship of the Charity. Additional funds may be maintained as part of this reserve to support projects where funding is received in arrears or is decided to be financially prudent by the Executive Committee.

General funds are to be retained and reinvested in accordance with the Company's Memorandum of Association and the Charity's objects contained therein.

### Designated Fund - Core Functions

The costs in respect of the core functions in the year under review were £90,938.

#### Treasury policy

The Company's main banking facilities continue to be with Charity Aid Foundation Bank who make investments into the Social Enterprise & Voluntary sector to produce an acceptable rate of return that is consistent with the Company's stated charitable objects and ethical standpoint. The Barclays Accounts are running alongside this although they are now not the main provider of banking services.

During the year, the Company continued to maintain a Dynamic Cash Management Service with Gale and Phillipson Investment Services Ltd, which manages some of the reserves of the Company, by regularly reviewing the bank accounts to ensure that the funds are held within accounts paying the highest level of interest, this enables a higher level of interest to be received whilst safeguarding the monetary assets of the Company.

The Company is required to have its funds readily accessible and so will retain its bank account deposits in risk free instant access deposit accounts.

#### **Principal Funding Sources**

See note 15 of the notes to the accounts for a detailed explanation of the Company's restricted funds. The main income source to the 'core' unrestricted funds was through grants, contracts, charged for services and recharges from restricted funds. During the year all expenditure has been concentrated on the key objectives of the charity.

### 1.1. Accounting convention

### 1.6. Fund accounting

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors. Restricted funds are accounted for separately to each other and to the core funding of the Company.

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in the furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the directors for particular purposes. The sim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of all activities undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs.

### 1.8. Allocation of support costs

### 1.10. Operating leases

Rentals applicable to operating leases are charged to the SOFA over the period in which the cost is incurred.

### 1.11. Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

### 1.12. Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

### 1.13. Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

### Income and Expenditure Account

The Company is a registered charity and so achievements cannot be measured by normal commercial criteria. Accordingly, the Directors consider that it would be the Companies Act 2006. ### 21. Going Concern
