Report of the Trustees

For the year ended 31 March 2021

The Trustees present their report and the audited financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2021. The Trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (FRS 102) in preparing the annual report and financial statements of the charity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in notes to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland published in October 2019.

Objectives, activities and achievements

The Kentown Wizard Foundation was established for general charitable purposes and focuses on benefitting children and young adults with serious, life-limiting conditions and disabilities.

Our mission is to have a positive impact on the lives of such children and we achieve this mission by making grants to UK registered charities whose aims and values are closely aligned with ours. Our overriding objective is to give grants where they are most needed and where they will have the greatest impact.

Our Founder is Ken Townsley, a highly successful businessman and philanthropist. Ken's story is remarkable; it is the story of a man from humble beginnings whose life-long love of travel took him, over a forty-year period, from an apprentice at Blackpool Airport to the owner of Gold Medal Travel Group plc. Achievements in the year

This year we have continued to build on existing relationships with our charity partners to deliver projects in line with our objectives. In the year to 31 March 2021 we made 11 grants to 11 organisations amounting to £1.95m.

The year under review has been a year like no other. COVID 19 changed the world, possibly forever, and impacted on all our lives but nowhere was the impact felt more severely than among the children we seek to help.

Our foundation exists solely to help to improve the lives of children and young adults with serious, life-limiting conditions and disabilities. Even before the pandemic, these children often feel isolated and vulnerable because of their conditions but during 2020 it is hard to imagine the level of isolation and vulnerability experienced by these children and their families.

Our response to the pandemic was to offer support to our charity partners to help them to continue their work despite the inevitable fall in income experienced across the whole sector as fundraising events were cancelled.

We have been impressed by the way our charity partners rose to the challenge, adapted to the new normal and found innovative ways of continuing to offer much needed support and joy.

One such charity is **Over The Wall**, one of our long term partners, who prior to the pandemic offered residential camps to children living with the challenges of serious illness or disability. As the pandemic struck, all camps were cancelled and instead the charity developed an online presence to reach out to families. We were so impressed by their work that we awarded a grant of £800,000 to enable the charity to further develop a virtual outreach programme which will exist alongside physical camps and which will provide ongoing support to children and their families.

Immediately prior to March 2020 we had agreed to fund 100% of the Disneyland Paris wishes granted by **Make A Wish UK** to seriously ill children living in the UK. This ambitious four-year plan was derailed by COVID but in order to support the charity and to ensure that wishes could still be granted, we allowed Make A Wish to repurpose our first-year grant of £800,000. This repurposed grant enabled the charity to fulfil 360 non-Disney wishes to bring happiness to children despite the pandemic.

Towards the end of the year, Make A Wish came to us with a proposal to fund a unique project. With no prospect of being able to send children to Disneyland Paris in the near future, the proposal was to transform a hotel in Hampshire into an Enchanted Manor to provide a magical Disney experience for 150 families whose Disneyland Paris wishes were on hold. This event took place in September 2021 and was a huge success. We were proud to provide a grant of £446,000 to make it possible.

Dreams Come True have impressed us during 2020. Their Hidden Communities project (funded by our foundation) was brought to a halt by the pandemic but through determination and innovation they nevertheless succeeded in using our funds to grant 72 dreams. The Hidden Communities project aims to deliver dreams to children and young people with serious life-limiting conditions living in some of the most deprived and hard-to-reach communities in the UK. We were so impressed by their performance that we made an additional grant of £200,000 to accelerate their progress out of the pandemic.

Our foundation does not accept unsolicited applications for grants and we spend a great deal of time seeking out new potential partners. Before making grants to new charities we want to be confident that their values are aligned with ours and that they will use our funds wisely. This year we made our first grant of £250,000 to **Whizz Kidz**, a charity which provides specialist mobility equipment to disabled children. Our grant will provide such equipment to an estimated 40 children living north of Birmingham.

Other grants we made during the year all centred on support during the pandemic:

- £100,000 to Rainbow Trust to assist with the provision of frontline services
- £16,000 to Candlelighters to fund the salaries of frontline staff
- £15,000 to Stick n Step to assist with resuming services in September 2020
- £6,000 to Blackpool Tiggers towards increased costs during the pandemic
- £5,000 to Play Inclusion Project towards increased costs
- £5,000 to Unique Kidz and Co towards the increased costs of frontline service delivery
- £4,091 to Brian House to sponsor a virtual event

In addition to the new grants awarded in the year we continued to work closely with all the charities with whom we have multi year funding arrangements. Our ambitious plans in Malawi, undertaken in partnership with **Operation Smile** and **Feet First Worldwide**, were temporarily halted by the pandemic but both these charities have continued to use our funds wisely to keep children healthy and well-nourished while they wait for surgical procedures to resume and also to build for the future through education and training programmes.

Prior to the onset of COVID-19, our three-year grant to **Children's Adventure Farm** was enabling the charity to increase capacity and provide essential respite to more children with serious illnesses and disabilities. This progress was hindered by COVID-19, however the charity continued to make progress with delivering services and we were impressed with how charity operations were adapted in light of COVID-19 restrictions.

We are fortunate to have significant reserves. At the year-end our investment portfolio stood at £83m. The Trustees mitigate financial risk by engaging professional fund managers to manage our investments on a discretionary basis and at the date of this report we remain in a strong position.

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the requirement in section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to public benefit in determining the activities undertaken by the charity.

Plans for future periods

The Trustees intend to continue to actively seek out charities with whom they wish to collaborate and where possible to form long term relationships with those charities.

Financial review

During the period under review the charity received income totalling £904,165 (2020: £1,142,766). This income comprised dividends and interest in respect of the investment portfolio.

Expenditure on charitable activities amounted to £2,021,614 (2020: £1,301,803) in addition to expenditure on raising funds of £337,654 (2020: £289,934).

The investment portfolio performed well during the year. Net gains on investments amounted to £18,576,765. This represents a gain of 28% on the value of investments held at the beginning of the year. We recognise that this last year has been a good one for global stock market returns.

Reserves Policy

Our investment policy aims to maintain, over the long term, the real value of the £55.8m endowed by our Founder in 2015. As a minimum, the Trustees aim to make grants which equal our income for each year. However, the overriding aim of our foundation is to give grants where they are most needed and if we identify an area of great need where we can make a real difference, we will erode our reserves in order to provide support.

At the year end the charity was holding free reserves of £8 lm.

The Trustees acknowledge that year-end reserves were high compared to our policy. However, this is in large part due to the investment portfolio gains of £18,576,765 in this last year and the Trustees consider that such gains may prove to be temporary. Also, we have some ambitious projects which will erode reserves.

Investment Policy

The Trustees have appointed Barclays Bank plc and Castlefield Investment Partners LLP to manage the investment portfolio on a discretionary basis. The investment objective is to maintain the real value of the investments over the long term.

Fundraising standards information

The foundation does not engage in fundraising activities.

Trustees of the charity

The Trustees who have served during the year and since the year end are as listed on page 3.

Structure, governance and management

The Kentown Wizard Foundation was established as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation on 23 September 2015 and is governed by its Constitution. If the CIO is wound up, the members of the CIO have no liability to contribute to its assets and no personal responsibility for settling its debts and liabilities.

The charity's Constitution provides for a minimum of 3 Trustees. There is no upper limit. Trustees are appointed by resolution and are not required to retire by rotation. In selecting individuals, the Trustees give due regard to the skills, knowledge and experience needed for the effective administration of the charity. New Trustees are provided with background information including the history of the charity, its objectives and activities, a copy of the Constitution, and financial reports. They are also briefed on their obligations under charity law. The Trustees give their time freely and no Trustee receives any remuneration or other benefit.

The Trustees are responsible for the overall management and strategic direction of the charity and meet on a quarterly basis. A Chief Executive is appointed by the Trustees to manage the day to day operations of the charity. Key management personnel are paid on merit, having due regard to their professional skills, competencies and experience.

The Trustees confirm that appropriate controls are in place to mitigate and manage the major risks faced by the charity.

Trustees' responsibilities

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England & Wales requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the charity for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- · select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP 2019 (FRS 102);
- · make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the provisions of the trust deed. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The Trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the charity and financial information included on the charity's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of The Kentown Wizard Foundation (the 'charity) for the year ended 31 March 2021 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet, the Cash Flow Statement and notes to the financial statements, including significant accounting policies. Notes to the Financial Statements

For the year ended 31 March 2021

I Summary of significant accounting policies

General information and basis of preparation

The Kentown Wizard Foundation is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation in England. The address of the registered office is given in the charity information on page 3 of these financial statements. The nature of the charity's operations and principal activities are detailed in the Trustees' report on page 4.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued in October 2019, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011 and UK Generally Accepted Practice.

The financial statements have been prepared to give a 'true and fair' view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair view'. This departure has involved following the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued in October 2019 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has since been withdrawn.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest \pounds .

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

Funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Income recognition

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the charity is legally entitled to the income after any performance conditions have been met, the amount can be measured reliably and it is probable that the income will be received.

For donations to be recognised the charity will have been notified of the amounts and the settlement date in writing. If there are conditions attached to the donation and this requires a level of performance before entitlement can be obtained then income is deferred until those conditions are fully met or the fulfilment of those conditions is within the control of the charity and it is probable that they will be fulfilled.

Investment income is earned through holding assets for investment purposes such as shares and property. It includes dividends, interest and rent. Where it is not practicable to identify investment management costs incurred within a scheme with reasonable accuracy the investment income is reported net of these costs. It is included when the amount can be measured reliably. Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method and dividend and rent income is recognised as the charity's right to receive payment is established.

I Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

Expenditure recognition

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Expenditure is recognised where there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payments to third parties, it is probable that the settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. It is categorised under the following headings:

- Costs of raising funds includes investment management costs incurred; and
- Expenditure on charitable activities includes grants awarded and associated costs of running the charity.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as an expense against the activity for which expenditure arose.

Grants payable to third parties are within the charitable objectives. Where unconditional grants are offered, this is accrued as soon as the recipient is notified of the grant, as this gives rise to a reasonable expectation that the recipient will receive the grants. Where grants are conditional relating to performance then the grant is only accrued when any unfulfilled conditions are outside of the control of the charity.

Support costs allocation

Support costs are those that assist the work of the charity but do not directly represent charitable activities and include office costs, governance costs, administrative payroll costs. They are incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity. Where support costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to cost of raising funds and expenditure on charitable activities on a basis consistent with use of the resources.

The analysis of these costs is included in note 5.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost (or deemed cost) or valuation less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. Cost includes costs directly attributable to making the asset capable of operating as intended.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets, at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset on a systematic basis over its expected useful life as follows:

Fixtures and fittings

33.33% straight line

Investment properties

Investment properties for which fair value can be measured reliably without undue cost or effort are measured at fair value at each reporting date with changes in fair value recognised in 'net gains/(losses) on investments' in the SoFA.

Investments

Investments are recognised initially at fair value which is normally the transaction price excluding transaction costs. Subsequently, they are measured at fair value with changes recognised in 'net gains/(losses) on investments' in the SoFA if the shares are publicly traded or their fair value can otherwise be measured reliably. Other investments are measured at cost less impairment.

Debtors and creditors receivable/payable within one year

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in expenditure.

I Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

Foreign currency

Foreign currency transactions are initially recognised by applying to the foreign currency amount the spot exchange rate between the functional currency and the foreign currency at the date of the transaction.

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in a foreign currency at the balance sheet date are translated using the closing rate.

Employee benefits

When employees have rendered service to the charity, short-term employee benefits to which the employees are entitled are recognised at the undiscounted amount expected to be paid in exchange for that service.

Pension Costs

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme for employees. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charity. The annual contributions payable are charged to the SoFA.

Tax

The charity is an exempt charity within the meaning of schedule 3 of the Charities Act 2011 and is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the Trustees believe that no material uncertainties exist. The Trustees have considered the level of funds held and the expected level of income and expenditure for 12 months from authorising these financial statements. The budgeted income and expenditure is sufficient with the level of reserves for the charity to be able to continue as a going concern.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

There have been no significant judgements (apart from those involving estimates) made in the process of preparing the financial statements.

There have been no key assumptions made concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.

Unrestricted capital funds

Assets were gifted to the charity in the accounting period to 31 March 2017 by its Founder. These were an investment property with a value of £2,000,000, an investment portfolio with a value of £42,804,612 and cash at bank of £11,035,191. The Trustees are permitted to use the original capital to fund grants awarded. During the previous year the investment property was sold.
