OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Summary of the purposes of the charity as set out in its governing document	For the benefit of the public to relieve the suffering of animals, particularly cats, in need of care and attention and, in particular, to provide and maintain rescue homes or other facilities for the reception, care, treatment and rehoming of such animals.
Summary of the main activities in relation to those purposes for the public benefit, in particular the activities, projects or services identified in the accounts	<p>Despite the restrictions placed upon us throughout the first year of the Covid-19 pandemic, we continued to carry out the charity's main activities as outlined below, always with regard to the public benefit.</p> <p>1. Using humane trapping where appropriate, we have provided an ongoing rescue and re-homing operation for lost, stray, injured or unwanted cats and kittens as outlined below:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (a) microchip scanning to reunite lost cats and their owners; (b) safe, secure foster accommodation with associated day-to-day care; (c) standard healthcare (neutering, micro-chipping, vaccinations, flea and worming treatment and, in the case of adult fighting tom cats, testing for FIV (Feline Immunodeficiency Virus) and FeLV (Feline Leukaemia Virus); (d) veterinary treatment for ongoing health conditions; emergency veterinary treatment; euthanasia (if recommended by a veterinary professional); (e) re-homing to a domestic environment by means of our adoption process using our comprehensive Re-homing Policy. <p>2. Helping to prevent over population in the feral and domestic cat populations through neutering as outlined below:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (a) <i>For feral cats</i> - a humane process of TNR (Trap, Neuter, Return or Relocate) including flea and worming treatment and first vaccination. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 'Return' means - to their original location if it is safe and food and shelter can be provided. • 'Relocate' means - sourcing safe haven elsewhere, such as a feral rescue, farm, small-holding or stables where food and shelter can be provided with veterinary treatment as required. • Whenever feasible feral <i>kittens</i> are socialised and rehomed. (b) <i>For domestic cats</i> - education and advice for owners on neutering; assistance with arrangements for, and the cost of, neutering as required.

	<p>3. Helping to prevent and suppress cruelty to, and the promotion of humane behaviour towards, cats and kittens as follows.</p> <p>Education of the general public, raising awareness of all cat welfare issues including day-to-day care and healthcare needs, in particular the need to neuter, micro-chip, vaccinate and provide regular flea and worming treatment.</p>

Contribution made by volunteers	We are extremely grateful to our loyal volunteers who work tirelessly rescuing and transporting our rescue cats and kittens, fostering and socialising them prior to rehoming and fundraising to support the associated activities outlined above.
Other	We are also extremely grateful to our many generous supporters who regularly donate towards the day-to-day and veterinary costs of our rescue cats and kittens and continually contribute to, and take part in, our various appeals and other fundraising activities.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Summary of the main achievements of the charity, identifying the difference the charity's work has made to the circumstances of its beneficiaries and any wider benefits to society as a whole	<p>Our main achievements during the specified period, and in relation to the activities outlined above, are listed below.</p> <p>Cats in need rescued/assisted</p> <p>Rescued - a total of 309 cats and kittens, breakdown as follows:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Rehomed by us - 92, including several cats with FIV • Rescued by us but transferred to other rescues for rehoming - 80 • Trapped, Neutered & Relocated - 100 relocated to the safety of smallholdings, farms and stables with food and shelter provided • Trapped Neutered & Returned - 33 returned to the safe location from which they were rescued with food and shelter provided • Euthanased - 4, on the advice of a veterinary professional when the cats in question were sadly too unwell to be saved. <p>Cat Welfare - raising awareness and education</p> <p>Despite Covid-19 restrictions preventing us from meeting members of the public at events, we were able to continue raising awareness of cat welfare issues through the offer of help and advice to the general public via telephone and social media platforms, e.g. Facebook and Messenger.</p>
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The charity's work has made a difference to the circumstances of our beneficiaries as follows:

- (a) for non feral cats and kittens we have rescued - following humane trapping where appropriate, we have provided safe and secure foster accommodation with associated day-to-day care; standard, emergency and ongoing veterinary treatment; socialisation when required and subsequent re-homing into a family environment;
- (b) for feral cats we have rescued - through humane Trapping, Neutering and Returning/Relocating to a safe environment where they can be assured of food, shelter and veterinary treatment as required; whenever possible feral kittens have been socialised and subsequently rehomed into a family environment;
- (c) for those who have provided food and shelter to our feral rescue cats on their small holdings, farms and stables - assistance from said feral cats in keeping down the rodent population;
- (d) for members of the general public - by enriching their lives through the adoption of our rescued cats and kittens;
- (e) for members of the general public, whose concerns for lost, stray and injured cats and kittens have been allayed by means of our rescue and re-homing process;
- (f) for existing cat owners through education, advice and assistance with regard to cat welfare issues.

The benefits of the charity's work has extended to the wider public and society as follows:

- (a) by reducing the prevalence of lost, stray, injured and unwanted cats and kittens, giving them safe haven and day-to-day care and finding them suitable family homes;
- (b) by means of neutering of cats in order to reduce overpopulation.

Fundraising

Fundraising is a vital activity. Our fundraising achievements and performance serve to support and sustain the charity's main activities as described above. Our fundraising activities are outlined below.

(a) Donations - Regular

Through successfully communicating our charitable work via our Facebook pages and website, we have substantially increased our support base and attracted many more supporters who give regular monetary and/or non-monetary donations to help towards the day-to-day and veterinary costs of caring for our cats and kittens.

(b) Appeals

- We have successfully run several appeals to raise funds to cover the cost of expensive, emergency and often life saving veterinary treatment for our rescue cats and kittens.
- In addition to voluntary donations received, we regularly run successful appeals for food, cat litter, and other items associated with the day-to-day care of our cats and kittens.

	<p>(c) Events As Covid-19 restrictions gave us no opportunities to fundraise at events we have successfully carried out our fundraising activities virtually by holding raffles, auctions and tombolas online using items kindly donated by our supporters and local retailers.</p> <p>(d) Charity of the Year Our final achievement of the year came at the beginning of March 2021 when, having applied to our local Pets at Home Gateshead store to be their forthcoming Charity of the Year, we were honoured to receive confirmation that our application had been successful. Pets at Home's Charity of the Year launches 1 April to 31 December 2021 and it will be an exciting opportunity to work together with Pets at Home Gateshead to raise funds for, and awareness of, the charity, the results of which will be reflected in our next Trustees' Report.</p>



