FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2021

The trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 March 2021.

The accounts of Rossendale Rays Special Needs Sports Club have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in role 1 to the accounts and comply with the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities. Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of reland published in October 2019.

Structure, governance and management

The dub is managed by a committee, which aims to meet quarterly

Trustees have been appointed from within the club's membership, based on long and valuable service to the club

The trustees who served during the year were:

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to milicate exposure to the major risks

The Board of Trustees recognises its ultimate responsibility for risk management.

The Trustees consider all substantial risks and where appropriate will implement systems to miligate these risks.

The Charity's expenditure is directly controlled by its Trustees. All payments need to be authorised by one of the trustees.

Objectives and activities

The charity's aim is to provide water-based opportunities for special needs and disabled (SEND) people and their families, to benefit their health and well-being. To also help promote and support SEND family access to other sports.

These aims are achieved by providing

- Weekly family-fun swimming sessions of 2hrs duration on Sunday afternoons at Mari Pits Swimming Pool. Lancachire on 46 weeks per year.
- Weekly cycling sessions on Sunday afternoons at Mari Pits athletic track, Lancashire on approximately 30 weeks per year.

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

Achievements and performance

The club hosts an average of 40-50 members including parents and siblings at each swim session, and 50-80 members at each cycling session. An overall members' database currently runs to some 300 families of over 1000 people.

Both sports' sessions offer a supportive and non-judgemental recreational environment for members of all ages and with all manner of physical and learning disabilities.

Many members have progressed from being non-swimmers to confident swimmers through their connection with the club. Likewise all ages have progressed and learnt each week to ride a blike independently and become competent

Operational Performance

The charity incurs running costs of approximately £25,000-30,000 per year which are funded entirely from donations, grand aid and member subscriptions.

The attached financial statements show that the charity held a surplus of £42,621 for the year compared to the prior year of £40,381.

Reserves Policy

The club aims to maintain a financial reserve equal to 1-2 years annual turn-over, although this is not always possible.

At the year end the charity had £15,333 in the TSB reserve account and £15,224 in the TSB Current account.

CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2021

Chairperson's Report for 2020/21

A significant year from the outset with the start of the Covid 19 pandemic.

National lookdown led to our rapid sourcing of funding and venue space to provide much needed restriction compliant sessions for our Rays' families.

Much work was put into organising resources, voluntsers and staff to commence cycling, snowtubing and swimming sessions whenever restrictions allowed us to.

The committee continues to provide family Snowtubing, Swimming and Cycling sessions for members and their families on Sunday afternoons throughout the year.

Latest - Cycling and Snowtubing Sessions

LCC Lancashire Break Time funding supports our increased number of sessions but is not without its difficulties in meeting criteria and managing booking enquiries from throughout Lancashire. We continue to prioritise Rossendale families whilst also filling available places from further affeld, both consistently and in a fair manner to all.

Membership

Membership continues to grow each year with new members regularly joining us, particularly among infant/junior ages and those with more significant special needs. We continue to charge on a "drop in" basis each week. The nature of many "special needs" continues to show us that weekly attendance can be very difficult for a large number of members. Members tell us this is much better for them.

Fund raising

As in previous years, we have had some very generous local business and individual support. Our resident team of Cycling Volunteers were unable to go ahead with their annual charity bike ride, so this year has been supplemented with the LBT funding from LCC. Hopefully, this generous support will continue in coming years.

Costs to members

We continue to review our charges and at present charge £4 per child/young person per tube or cycle. Swimming charges adapted to a family ticket for £10 for each family group. Carers therefore still attend for free as the committee agree it's fairer to not charge carers who give their time themselves for free. This includes parents of children. We therefore heavily subsidise our members activities but we feel it is very important to encourage all age groups in the local community to work towards a healthier lifestyle and to benefit from more easily accessible sports. We have a "charges and fee waiver policy" should the need arise, to help families who may be in further financial need. This ensures club access for more families.

Equipment and Club insurance

We own various hoists, mechanical changing equipment, swimming aids/equipment that require regular maintenance and service.

We own two containers full of 60+ adapted bikes and trikes.

We have annual public liability and full club insurance via Merkel Insurance. Future Insurance will continue with Markel as their Pt. and club insurance includes all activities & fundraising individuals & costs less than NASCH, our previous insurers. We intend to maintain links with NASCH for any future club training needs.

Awareness

Social media continues well (Twitter & Facebook)

The website: with-day-to-day-office-nurning-costs, and is updated regularly.

Yourger, teenage volunteers continue to attend and are encouraged to complete any Duke of Edinburgh award and/or Rockie Lifeguard and First Aid training if appropriate.

Notable events/purchases throughout the year

Approx £3,000 spent on Snow tubes x 12 at the Ski Slope

Sessions continue each Sunday & Thursday evenings with Mon-Fri mornings during school holidays.

The "New Track Surface Campaign" at Marl Pits - Rays committee agreed to donate £15,000 from reserves to ensure our major stakeholder position in the future - a new surface should be in place by next Summer 2022.

We will continue to purchase volunteers, members and cycless' t-shirts/hoodies to help promote and inform the wider community about our club. This year they will be ordered in time for Christmas.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2021

Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

Rossendale Rays Special Needs Sports Club is a charitable trust constituted in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is given in the charity information at the front of these financial statements. The nature of the charity's operations and principal activities are detailed in the Trustee's Report on pages 1 to 2 of these financial statements.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued in October 2019, the Charities Act 2011 and UK Generally Accepted Practice.

The charity does not include a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is applying FRS 102 Section 1A.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

1.2 Incoming resources

Donations, legacies and other forms of voluntary income are recognised as incoming resources when receivable, except insofar as they are incapable of financial measurement.

Incoming resources from charitable trading activity is recognised equally over the period during which the services are provided.

1.3 Resources expended

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both the direct pay and non-pay costs and support costs relating to those activities.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and administrative office functions.
