Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2020

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2020. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and Aims

The company's objects are to carry out any charitable purpose according to the laws of England and wales in such ways and in such parts of the united kingdom or the world as the directors from time to time may think fit for the benefit of the public ("the objects") and in particular, but not exclusively:

1. The relief of people who are in need by the provision of debt counselling and a debt management service.

2. The advancement of public education amongst young persons by the provision of facilities for safe and satisfying play, and such out of school activities as will inculcate good citizenship, at large with the object of improving their condition of life.

3. In the interests of social welfare, the provision of facilities for recreation and other leisure time activities for the public at large with the object of improving their conditions of life.

4. For the benefit of the public, the prevention of crime and the relief of persons who are the victims of crime, by co-operating with the police, local authorities, victim support and like statutory and voluntary agencies.

5. The relief of unemployment by the provision of training or retraining and in co-operation with the statutory agencies, the provision of work experience for young people.

Significant activities

Public benefit

The trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the aims and objectives and in planning the future activities. In particular the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives that have been set out in the sections above.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable Activities

Summary of the main activities undertaken for the public benefit. During the period 2019-2020 the following activities and events have been organised:-

MiY Vision - We create a platform for transformational conversations that positively impact our communities and society.

The goal is to build relationships with community members using personal development and holistic coaching as the initial point of contact. Through building relationships we are able to sign post individuals to other providers that help them make progress in life.

Whilst EC (Everyday Champions) & MiY have distinct purposes, they are designed to allow people to move between the two entities should they wish. For instance we wanted a clear pathway for those attending EC to outwork a desire to impact their community. At the same time we wanted people we engage with through MiY to have access to people who can help them explore the Christian faith should they desire.

We want people to experience the following outcomes when they engage with MiY.

MiY Outcomes - Increased ..

Self-Awareness, Resilience, Confidence, Motivation, Accountability, Social Competence

General development

MiY moved into its own facilities in the heart of Greenwich to best serve the objectives it is set up to obtain. During the year we implemented the strategy to set up a coaching centre which would house a co-lab working space, offices and media rooms.

We appointed a centre manager and began to commence new initiatives and partnerships to help impact the community of Greenwich. During the year we hosted free coffee sessions to members of the public on weekends and this allowed us to advertise free coaching sessions which were delivered for free by Gareth Morgan. We trialled advertising through the coffee sessions, online social media and eventbrite events website.

We ran MiY coaching evenings on the following subjects:

My relationship with fear My relationship with money My relationship with goals

EC volunteers have opportunities to impact their communities through MiY and here is a flavour of how in 2019-20:

IMPACT entered its sixteenth and final year!

The weekly drop in session continued on Mondays in the Baptist Church Hall in the centre of Newark town centre. This provides a safe space for clients where they can access a hot meal, friendship, advice and direction for their lives. Practical help is available, food, sleeping bags, tents, shower and washing facilities etc.

IMPACT works with seven different rehabilitation centres throughout the country. Various clients have accessed them, with varying degrees of success. It is encouraging that some of our former clients now hold positions of authority in rehabilitation centres and are able to reach out to others with understanding and empathy.

Most social problems in the town of Newark have their roots in alcohol or drug addiction.

Womens Aid Newark

 \pounds 1200 was raised in the Newark community to purchase Asda vouchers for Womens Aid in Newark, which is a shelter for women and their children who have fled from abusive situations. They are usually supported from the food bank and other charities, however the Asda vouchers allow the women to buy fresh food and groceries, emergency clothing and other items that help meet basic needs.

Grace Boxes

We continue to serve our local hospital in the wellingborough area by providing Grace boxes to those families that have had children in the Special care baby unit. We have had a thank you from a mum who had received a Grace box at the hospital.

Just a note to say thank you very much for our grace box that we got today at Kettering general hospital in scbu. Such a lovely gesture to us parents going through a difficult time it definitely made me cry! Baby Arlie will enjoy his gifts. 25th March 2020

The hospital will contact us when they have run out and we do our best to deliver these. The decision is made by the hospital midwives as to who receives a box.

A typical box includes:

A handmade quilt (donated by local quilters - Connection Janie Rowthorn) Toiletries for mum - Travel size A journal A Photo Frame A comforter - for baby A Book for careers to read to baby.

All packaged in a white magnetic box. Inside a sticker is stuck on the lid, with the logo and a brief description, for parents, letting them know they are not alone. That we are thinking of them at this difficult time and my email address if needed.

EC Essentials

EC essentials was started to help people in the church family with basic food provisions throughout the first lockdown period. Food that was donated was mostly delivered to vulnerable/elderly people within the church. One family in particular had no food in their fridge to feed two children and no money to buy any was supported via EC Essentials. All that was left over towards the end of lockdown was collected by a local charity. EC Essentials has now restarted and is being advertised in a local school.

House Move

A family within the church was moving into a very run down house and they did not have the finance or manpower to get the house in a liveable condition. Many members of Everyday Champions contributed financially and with their time to renovate the house and help this family move in.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

MIY in the year to 31 March 2020 had a net deficit of $\pounds 3,965$ (2019 net deficit of $\pounds 6,793$). Therefore the charity's negative reserves position has increased to $\pounds 24,280$ from $\pounds 20,315$. This position is supported by its partner charity the Everyday Champions Centre and is discussed further in the Reserves Policy and Going Concern sections below.

Reserves policy

Our policy is to have 25% of the charities annual running costs in reserve. We have not yet achieved this although we are intentionally pursuing opportunities to increase income and build up reserves. We are still reliant on our partner charity Everyday Champions Centre, to support the work of MIY, and so have entered into talks with EC Directors about the future plans and opportunities to resource the work of MiY and build up reserves, through partnership and social enterprise that will outwork our objectives.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees believe that the charitable company will continue to receive the support of its partner charity, Everyday Champions Centre, for the foreseeable future. The trustees have considered the level of funds held and the expected level of income and expenditure for 12 months from authorising these financial statements. The budgeted income and expenditure is sufficient with the level of reserves for the charity to be able to continue as a going concern.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

We are looking at changing the structure of our charity to be more formally linked with Everyday Champions, as we partner so heavily.

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and registered charity. It is operated under the rules of its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 3 June 2009 and most recently amended 26 September 2010. It has no share capital and the liability of each member in the event of winding-up is limited to $\pounds 1$.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

MIY is a charitable company limited by guarantee in England. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity. The address of the registered office is given in the charity information page of these financial statements. The nature of the charity's operations and principal activities are detailed in the trustees report.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property-2% on costComputer equipment-33% on cost

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost (or deemed cost) or valuation less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. Cost includes costs directly attributable to making the asset capable of operating as intended.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.
