Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2021

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the period 1 April 2020 to 31 March 2021. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The objects of the charity are for the public benefit generally and in particular, but not exclusively, in the area of Dorset:

- 1. To relieve the trauma, whether psychological, emotional or physical of persons and their families who have experienced or otherwise suffered as a result of rape, other sexual assault, sexual/domestic abuse or sexual exploitation of any kind by providing support, help or assistance of any kind; and
- 2. To advance the education of the public in the subject of rape, sexual/domestic abuse or sexual exploitation and/or its psychological and social impact on women, men and children by such means as the trustees deem fit.

Our aim is to provide survivors and those close to them, with the necessary specialist support to assist the survivor to regain a measure of control over their lives, as and when they are able to do so.

In furtherance of this aim, we host a range of services listed below:

- A Confidential Telephone Helpline
- Face-to-face therapeutic counselling
- An Independent Sexual Violence Advisor Service (ISVA)
- A Children and Young Persons' Independent Sexual Violence Advisor Service (CYPISVA)
- A Children and Young Persons' Counselling Service
- Workshop for schools on Consent
- Well Being Workshops
- Monthly Well Being "drop-in" for Staff and students at Bournemouth University, Arts Bournemouth University and the Chiropractic AECC University College.
- Training for Volunteers and other professionals

Public benefit

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake and for the public benefit. The activities undertaken for the public benefit include: a confidential telephone support line; Live Chat facility via our website; consent activities to local schools, colleges and universities; wellbeing workshops to clients; training provider and raising awareness in the public. Direct support is also provided to survivors through the Charity's: Adult Independent Sexual Violence Advisor (ISVA) service; Children and Young People (CYP) ISVA service; short-term counselling programme; pre-trial counselling and long-term counselling for adults and children. All of the services were moved online due to the Pandemic and everyone moved to working and volunteering remotely. The Trustees met weekly and then fortnightly to monitor and adapt to the changing situation as it arose during the course of 2020.

The trustees confirm that they have complied with the requirements of section 4 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission for England and Wales.

Volunteers

Whilst there is a paid staff team in the organisation, volunteers are central to the provision of support to the public. During 2020-2021, there were on average 80 active volunteers. Volunteers receive support and supervision and follow policy and guidance. The Trustees are proud that the charity has achieved the Investing in Volunteers Quality Standard. We trained and inducted 30 new volunteers (20 Placement counsellors and 10 Supportline Listeners) redesigning our induction training programme to be delivered online.

STRATEGIC REPORT

Achievement and performance

Charitable activities

The year 2020-21 included adapting all services to maintain provision whilst working to government guidance re the pandemic. We secured additional funding so that we were able to appoint to the roles of CEO and Operations Manager to help the charity sustain the increased demand for our services. The Trustees are proud that we secured the public procurement bid for our ISVA service provision for a further 7 years. After some initial work in Dorchester we opened our second centre to clients from September 2021. We have expanded our specialist counselling service for victims of Domestic Abuse and we have developed a new partnership with NuWaves to deliver the Children and Young People's Recovery Toolkit programme to those who have experienced Domestic Abuse. We were also successful in achieving LimeCulture Accreditation for our Adult ISVA service and Adult counselling service for support with male clients.

Financial review

Financial position

The charity has received income of £936,640 for the period from 1 April 2020 to 31 March 2021. The charity had expenditure of £714,957 which gives a surplus of the year for £221,683.

At 31 March 2021 the charity had £324,500 reserves, of this £100,586 is restricted funds that are due to be spent in the next financial year.

The charity ended the financial year in a robust position.

Reserves policy

The reserves are maintained at a level which ensures that core activities could continue during a period of unforeseen difficulty. The trustees aim to have a minimum reserve amounting to three months running costs for the organisation as a whole. In the event of reserves dipping below this amount, the organisation will aim to restore the reserves at the first possible opportunity.

The charitable company has free reserves of £176,472 as at 31 March 2021 (2020 - £60,948). The Trustees consider this level of reserves to be sufficient to deliver charitable objectives for the next twelve months. Free reserves are calculated by deducting fixed assets from the unrestricted reserves held at the year-end.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its constitution and constitutes a Charitable Incorporated Organisation.

The charity employs a CEO who works under the authority of the Trustees. The CEO is assisted by a Clinical Lead, a Counselling Supervisor, a Lead ISVA, a Volunteer Co-ordinator and a Finance and HR Officer.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Trustees are recruited from amongst the membership and elected by the members at an AGM having been proposed by one member and seconded by another. The Board also has the discretion to co-opt up to four external trustees.

Induction and training of new trustees

All Trustees must attend the STARS in-house induction course and are provided with all essential documents including those which brief them on their legal obligations under charity law.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error. A risk register is maintained and assessed regularly. Risk is also managed and overseen at each meeting of Trustees.

1. LEGAL FORM

STARS is a charitable incorporated organisation (CIO) for the public benefit and registered with the Charity Commission in England and Wales. The registered office is noted on page 3.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

No significant judgements have had to be made in preparing these financial statements.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Fixtures and fittings

- over the useful life of the asset.

Computer equipment

- over the useful life of the asset.

The cost of acquiring fixed assets is charged to the SOFA in the year of acquisition if the cost is less £1,000 or the useful economic life is less than three years.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Because of its current activities the charity is not registered for VAT and therefore cannot recover VAT on its expenses.

Debtors & Creditors

Basic financial assets, which include trade and other receivables and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs.

Basic financial liabilities, including trade and other payables are initially recognised at transaction price.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

- The Dorset Police and Crime Commissioner CSA funding is to cover the cost of CSA funding.
- The Dorset Police and Crime Commissioner Marginalised Communities ISVA funding is to enable STARS to deliver their service specifically to victims within marginalised communities.
