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#### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2021

The Trustees, who are also Directors of the charity for the purposes of Company Law, present their annual report together with the accounts for the year ended 31st March 2021. They are prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1st January 2019).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objects and activity

The charity's objects are:

- the relief of unemployment for the public benefit in such ways as may be thought fit including assistance to find employment.
- the relief of poverty through the provision of advice, information and legal representation.

The beneficiaries of these objects are all adults who live in the Unitary Authority of Luton and the surrounding area within Bedfordshire.

The Trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing their aims and objectives and in planning future activities. In particular, the Trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

#### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Luton Rights is a registered charity working in Luton which aims to provide local residents, especially those who are vulnerable, with access to high quality and free advice. Luton Rights also provides a family mediation service, community outreach advice, employment support and continues to work in partnership with Luton Borough Council, Citizens Advice Luton, Luton Law Centre and Luton Irish Forum, as part of Luton Access.

The Luton Access partnership continued to be supported with funding from the Community Investment Fund administered by Bedfordshire and Luton Community Foundation. Although the funding was reduced compared to previous years due to the pandemic, it enabled Luton Rights in continuing to provide core services to residents.

The government's furlough scheme allowed Luton Rights to retain all staff throughout the financial year and beyond and with additional funding from the Big Lottery and Community Justice Fund the organisation was able to recruit additional resources to provide advice and casework to those who were being disproportionally impacted by the pandemic.

At the end of the financial year 2020-2021 Luton Rights made a surplus and will be utilised in 2021-2022 as the charity is envisaging further cuts to core funding so that resources and services continue to be maintained.

Throughout 2020-2021 primarily services have been provided remotely, which has been challenging for both staff and service users, we would like to express our thanks to our staff for their continued hard work in supporting our service users during this difficult time. We would also convey our thanks to our service users in their understanding and co-operation.

In April 2021, a key member of staff – John Horan who has been with the organisation for over 10 years decided to retire. Our thanks to John for his years of service and wish him a happy retirement.

We would like to thank our partners and funders for their continued support.

During the year Luton Rights has provided:-

Specialist Welfare Benefits advice including appeals and representation at tribunals for clients;

**Community outreach advice** at the Centre for Youth and Community Development, focussed on increasing access to advice for the most vulnerable and disadvantaged;

Family mediation service for Luton residents who are separating or facing divorce;

Employment Support to unemployed and economically inactive individuals to gain employment, accredited training or move closer to the job market.

During the year (April 2020 to March 2021) Luton Rights worked with 1,144 unique clients providing almost wholly welfare benefits advice.

As a result of Covid-19 the Luton Access Centre and Unite the Union, the 2 main town centres bases for our advice were closed to the public. Luton Rights developed and promoted a telephone advice service with Zoom video service and community outreach. 85% of clients were dealt with through these digital channels with 15% of clients seen face to face at Community Outreach.

Luton Rights provided a community outreach advice service with face to face advice at the Centre for Youth & Community Development.

The **SEMLEP funded Stepping into Care project** which supported unemployed adults explore a career in the care sector worked with 26 people with 1 gaining employment and 8 moving into accredited learning after the course.

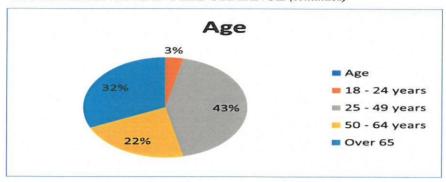

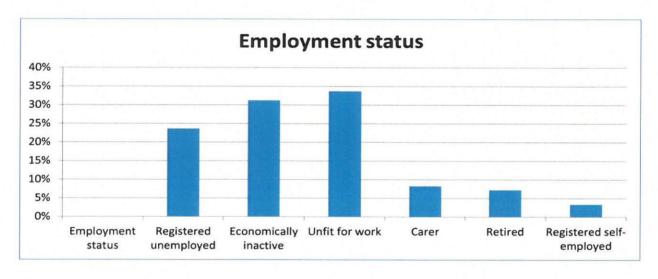

Luton Rights supported 332 clients with a disability and 142 with work-limiting illness and 359 clients who were not fit for work.



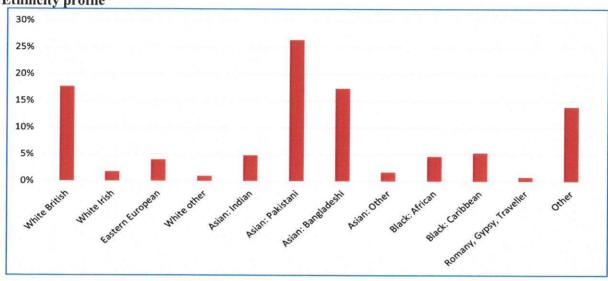
97% of clients seen for advice were either unemployed, economically inactive, unfit for work or a carer.

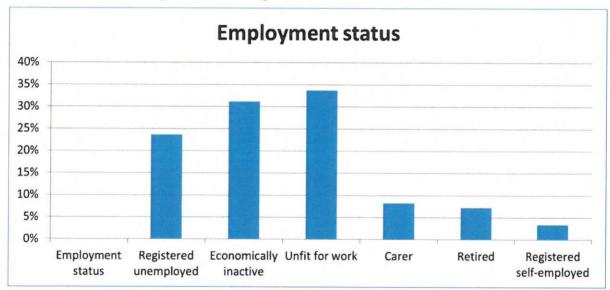

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

The results of the charity for the year are set out in the Statement of Financial Activities on page 10.

Overall the charity had a surplus for the year of £38,990 (2020 - deficit £7,530). This was largely due to the Covid-19 support grants from local and national government.

#### Investment powers and policy

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the charity has the power to invest in any way the trustees wish

#### Reserves policy

#### Restricted

The following are classified as restricted, as the donor has imposed restrictions on the use of funds, which are legally binding.

#### The National Lottery Community Fund

This programme is referred to as National Lottery COVID-19 Fund - Over £10,000. This funding was given as emergency funds in order to support the charity through ther impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on its services it provided.

#### **Unrestricted funds**

In accordance with guidelines issued by the Charity Commissioners, the Trustees have adopted a policy regarding reserves to ensure that sufficient finance is available to adequately respond to the potential for a curtailment or cessation of operations in the event of a significant variation in funding.

The level of reserves is considered and reviewed at regular intervals by the Trustees.

#### PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

#### Specialist Welfare Benefits advice

Luton Rights will continue to work as part of Luton Access, working particularly with Citizens Advice Luton, to support clients who are referred after initial assessment or gateway with specialist welfare benefits advice, and particularly, for those clients who are vulnerable. This will continue to be provided remotely until such time when face to face services can be resumed.

#### Telephone advice service (Welfare Benefits)

Prior to the national lockdown the plan was to provide telephone advice as Luton Rights had identified a significant number of clients find accessing the welfare benefits advice through Community House problematic either because of their mobility issues or the inaccessibility of attending Community House when it is open. However due to the pandemic all services were provided primarily over the telephone and the plan is when face to face services do resume the offer of telephone advice will remain as an option.

#### **Family Mediation**

Luton Rights will continue providing family mediation and has trained a member of staff towards accreditation as a mediator. During the pandemic mediation has been provided remotely via telephone and Zoom

#### **Community Outreach Advice**

Due to national Lockdown face to face services ceased and advice and casework was being provided over the telephone. Prior to face to face services resuming a feasibility in continuing this provision will be carried out.

#### **Employment Support**

Luton Rights was successful in obtaining project funding in 2021-2022 and will be seeking further funding for the continuation of this service in 2022-2023.

#### **Immigration Advice**

Luton Rights made an application to OISC for Level 1 accreditation and due to the pandemic this is on hold, however as services resume a viability of running an immigration service will need to be conducted.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### **Governing document**

The charity was formed in March 2003 as an unincorporated charity which was registered with the Charity Commission. It was incorporated on 24th May 2006 as a company limited by guarantee, and was re-registered with the Charity Commission on 22nd March 2012.

The governing instruments currently in force are the Memorandum and Articles of Association.

There are currently 4 members (2020 - 4), each of whom agrees to contribute £10 in the event of the charity winding up.

#### Appointment of trustees

Trustees are appointed by the members at the Annual General Meeting, which is normally held in December.

#### Organisation

The names of the Trustees who served during the year are set out on page 8.

The Trustees meet on a regular basis and the day to day management of the charity is delegated to the Centre Manager.

#### Management committee

The Luton Rights Management Committee is a committee of the Board of Trustees and as such is answerable to it. The committee is established for an annual term every year. Should the Board not be able to place confidence in the work of the management committee during the year, an Extraordinary General Meeting (EGM) must be called for the committee to be disbanded. As part of the renewal process, the Board must assess the work done by the management committee against the requirements of the Board.

#### Purpose of management committee

- To provide Luton Rights Board of Trustees with the views, opinions and knowledge of the
  wider community in Luton to ensure the work of Luton Rights remains representative of and
  reflects the needs of the wider community. The management committee will provide an
  advisory service to the Board of Trustees.
- To provide the role of "critical friend" through receiving reports and making comments on the plans, delivery and impact of Luton Rights work, making recommendations and raising concerns where necessary to the Board of Trustees.

#### Risk management

The Trustees carry out an annual review of the risks which the charity may face, have established systems and procedures to mitigate any risks identified and minimise any potential impact should any identified risks materialise.

#### NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2021

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### (a) Basis of preparation

- (i) The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention.
- (ii) The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1st January 2019) and the Companies Act 2006.
- (iii) The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102.
- (iv) The presentation currency of the accounts is in Pounds Sterling (£), which is the functional currency of the charity.

#### (b) Company status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the charity are the trustees named on page 7. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £10 per member of the charity.

#### (c) Fund accounting

- (i) The charity's unrestricted general fund consists of funds which the charity may use for its purposes at its discretion. The designated funds are set aside from unrestricted general funds for specific future purposes.
- (ii) The charity's restricted funds are those where the donor has imposed restrictions on the use of the funds which are legally binding.

#### (d) Income recognition

All income is accounted for when the charity has entitlement, there is certainty of receipt and the amount is measurable. Income is accounted for on a receivable basis, except where donors specify that donations and grants given to the charity must be used in future accounting periods, then the income is deferred until those periods.

#### (e) Expenditure recognition

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

#### (f) Fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is charged on the reducing balance basis over the expected useful lives of the assets at the following rates:

Computer equipment - 33.33%

#### (g) Pension costs and other post - retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension held in a separately administered fund. Contributions payable to the pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

#### (h) Government grants

Government grants are recognised when it is reasonable to expect that the grants will be received and that all related conditions will be met, usually on submission of a valid claim for payment. Grants of a revenue nature are credited to income so as to match them with the expenditure to which they relate.
