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# Barking and Dagenham Youth Dance Limited (BDYD) Trustees' Report For the year ended 31 July 2021

The Trustees, who are also Directors of Barking and Dagenham Youth Dance Limited (BDYD), present their report and the independently examined financial statements of the charitable Company for the year ended 31 July 2021. The statutory information is shown on page 1.

#### Status

The Company, number 05521243 is limited by guarantee and has charitable status. The Charity registration number is 1113618. It has a Memorandum and Articles of Association as its governing document.

# Aims and Objects

- The principal objects of the charity are:
- To maintain, improve and advance the education of the public in the arts generally and in particular, by the
  promotion and production of educational dance/drama and other aesthetic arts especially those activities
  which seek to make the arts relevant to the community.
- To provide performance opportunities for underprivileged young people irrespective of their colour, sex, religion, creed etc. thus enabling them to seek and obtain useful skills and occupation in later life.
- In the interest of social welfare, to provide or assist in the provision of facilities for recreation or other
  leisure time occupation with the object of improving the condition of life of the persons for whom such
  facilities are primarily intended by reason of their youth, age, infirmity, poverty or social and economic
  circumstances.

# We deliver our aims in the following ways:

BDYD's services directly benefit the local community, including children, young people, adults and the elderly. We work with a diverse group of people including women, black and ethnically diverse communities, those tackling obesity, people with disabilities, those at risk of teenage pregnancy, young offenders, those at risk of substance and alcohol misuse, the underachieving, those who are NEET and those who find mainstream education challenging.

We promote equal opportunities and celebrate diversity by making our activities fully accessible and inclusive that welcomes and respects its participants, frontline staff and volunteers.

Our key aim is to tackle unfair discrimination and break down barriers for people in particular groups such as black and ethnically diverse communities, disabled people, gay men/lesbians/bisexuals, transgender people and people from different religious and faith backgrounds.

# We deliver this in the following ways:

- Our dance technique classes promote a thorough understanding of movement skills, which challenge the mind of people and help to develop habits that can be applied to personal fitness.
- Our choreographic workshops encourage participants to think creatively and culturally, make positive
  decisions, and create intelligent work suitable for public performances; including Borough events through
  our annual achievement showcase, targeted particularly at the local community. This leads to celebrating
  individual and group diversity, encouraging audience/community participation, and widen the opportunities
  for the attendees.
- We offer our participants an equal platform to succeed in life, promote better education and learning for all, make sure that they feel valued, and are able to contribute to society, rather than being isolated. We provide a service that leads to the ability and self-belief to achieve success and ultimately understand the user's capabilities, with the aim to promote community cohesion.
- Our workshops and showcase are created from skill-building activities and hands-on tasks, ensuring our
  users access effective and affirmative experiences. We produce a showcase that celebrates our users'
  achievements, as well as engage them in a project that celebrates their achievements.

 We embrace and celebrate different cultures, as our intentions are to enlighten, empower and release learning potential, highlighting the importance of education and eventually employment that can lead to regenerating the local community.

#### Activities:

The principal activities of the charity are as follows:

- BDYD run Saturday dance workshops for children, young people, and adults aged 5+. We currently work with 170 local people each Saturday.
- BDYD run a youth action programme called Bar-Ham Leaders. This is a youth led project encouraging
  young people to build on the skills and qualities enabling them to develop leadership skills and use these
  skills to make positive change, as individuals, for the good of our organisation and for the wider community.
  We recognise that these are the community leaders of the future. Our aim with Bar-Ham Leaders is to
  support young people to create positive change to their lives and communities on issues that matter to them.
- BDYD run a Youth Dance Instructors Course for young people aged 15-19. This course offers weekly training for teenagers to learn the skills to teach a dance class for grassroots organisations.
- BDYD provides advice to our local authority through The Cultural Partnership Board (CP), Cultural
  Educational Partnership and B&D Collective bridging the gap between the social sector and the council.
  BDYD appear in the LBBD Culture Strategy 2017-2022 page 45 as well as the borough's Cultural
  Educational Partnership Strategic Plan 2018-2022, on page 22, in the mission to increase the borough's
  cultural youth offer, 'Every young person will have the opportunity to work with a cultural organisation'.


# **Public Benefit:**

In planning our activities for the year, we kept in mind the Charity Commission's guideline on public benefit at our trustees' meetings by researching the local community service gaps in Barking and Dagenham paying particular attention to youth services and opportunities in the arts.

BDYD Ltd provides dance and arts projects, events and activities for children, young people and adults. We offer performance opportunities, training in dance career development and leadership programmes. Although we encourage our beneficiaries to opt for a donation of £3, during their weekly dance activity, those unable to pay are not turned away and there are no restrictions to our services.

#### Our Impact:

Throughout 2020 / 2021 we engaged with 2000 local people by providing them with educational dance and fitness sessions that promoted learning for all.



In 2020 / 2021 96% successfully gained over eight GCSEs leading to the attainment of college/sixth form places. 97% gained A levels leading to places at a variety of universities.

# Summary of the main achievements during the period:

Despite a very challenging year with funding cuts to local government and the impact of social economic factors affecting local families and young people, BDYD provided arts, dance, culture workshops, events and activities for children, young people, young adults and adults aged from 5 years to 70+. We targeted the hard to reach and those socially excluded due to their financial and domestic circumstances and promoted mental and physical wellbeing.

BDYD collaborated in a number of partnership work through 2020 / 2021:

- BDYD continued working with the London Borough of Barking and Dagenham's programme called New Town Culture and the Serpentine Galleries exploring themes around the Radio Ballads.
- · BDYD continued to award young people through our on-going Jack Petchey Achievement Award Scheme.
- BDYD delivered over 20 online workshops with Industry specialists increasing the awareness around employment and volunteering.
- BDYD worked in partnership with the council to deliver a series of free dance classes for local people exploring and celebrating our black community: https://youtu.be/4Xb3FmDlwoE
- BDYD worked on a research project with former BDYDers looking at the impact BDYD had on their lives as part of our Impact Report: https://youtu.be/2KGt3s0AZlk
- BDYD worked in partnership the Urdang Academy's Official African Caribbean Society in a series of free
  practical workshops and sessions to explore positive pathways into further education.
- BDYD worked with the Youth Sport Trust on a Leadership programme called Unified Action.
- BDYD launched Snack Chat. A safe space for young people to chat, enjoy a free snack and share.
- Bar-Ham Leaders worked with London Borough of Barking and Dagenham Events Team and fed into the borough's steering group for the development of local festivals and activities.
- BDYD received sponsorship from Tila Commercial.
- BDYD were commissioned by LBBD as part of the Becontree Centenary Celebrations 2021 marking 100
  years since the largest housing estate was built.
- BDYD partner with Thamesward Community Project funded by London Sport to deliver a series of youth led dance fitness sessions.
- BDYD work in partnership with Frenford Youth Club, Lifeline, Muslim Sports Association and Shpresa Programme to design a Youth Social Action Programme with Rocket Science and the GLA called My London.

#### **Future Plans:**

In the next two years we intend to build on the infrastructure and capacity build the organisation to ensure that the organisation has financial stability. This includes focusing on securing funding for more than one year, and to seek out funding opportunities that fund a particular post. We wish to fund and appoint an Artistic Director/CEO who will lead the organisation into the next phase by focusing on increasing staffing and build capacity.

BDYD will continue working in partnership with local groups to ensure our residents continue receiving high quality user led provision.

BDYD is part of a small group consortium that has secured the use of a building to promote community activism and participation. This will provide a base for the future development and capacity building of BDYD.

#### Financial Review:

The Charity had total income for the year was £86,417 and total expenditure was £56,933. The net Income was £29,484.

# Risk Assessment and Reserves Policy

The trustees have reviewed the risks faced by the charity and have put in place systems to mitigate those risks. The main risk is with continued funding's and the charity is actively making applications for funding for its projects. The trustees have reviewed the needs of the charity and as there are no staffs or property to deal with on a cessation the reserves are to be set at a level which would allow for the continuation of the sessions for which they are committed. This amounts to just under £17,320 and the trustees aim to increase funds to this level.

# 1. Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

# 1a. Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) as amended by Update Bulletin 1 issued in February 2016, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

Barking and Dagenham Youth Dance Limited meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

# 1b. Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

Barking and Dagenham Youth Dance Limited has reported a Net Income of £29,484 for the year. The trustees are of the view that the immediate future of the Trust for the next 12 to 18 months is secure and that on this basis the charity is a going concern.

The uncertain economic outlook and willingness of

the trust to donate is a significant area of uncertainty which the trustees have mitigated by reviewing how the activities of the charity could be offered should funds reduce. The trustees remain in regular contact with funders and the local authory to secure their on-going support.

#### 1c. Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred. Income received in advance of a specified service is deferred until the criteria for income recognition are met.

#### 1d. Funds

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of the charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose. Restricted funds are donations or grants which the donor has specified are to be used solely for particular purposes/areas of the charity's work or for specific projects undertaken by the charity.

# 1e. Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

#### 1f.Taxation

The charitable company is exempt from taxation under sections 466 to 493 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010.

# 1g. Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments held in a bank current account.

# 1h. Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any discounts due.

# 1i. Fixed Assets Policy

All assets costing more than £150 are capitalised and valued at historical cost. Depreciation is charged from the year of acquisition on furniture and equipment on 25% straight-line basis over their estimated useful life.
