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TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2021

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2021.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's Memorandum of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)".

Objectives and activities

The activities of the charity are for the public benefit according to the objectives as set out in the Memorandum and Articles of Association as accepted on the twenty third day of October 2003. In summary the objectives of the charity are to "advance the Christian faith", "to advance education in accordance with Christian principles" and "to relieve persons who are in conditions of need and hardship".

The trustees' policy is to ensure that the resources available to the company are effectively administered to the fulfilment of the intent of the objectives of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and in accordance with the requirements as prescribed by the Charity Commission. These objectives remain unchanged, and in planning the activities the Charity has taken into consideration the guidance of the Charity Commission in providing public benefit.

Our core activities

Our stated mission to fulfil our legal objectives is simply "to glorify God by making disciples and making a difference: in the city, on campuses, in our communities, and in the nations through church planting." All our core activities are towards this end, and include:

Gathering: Congregation gatherings in three locations: West Kensington, Stratford, and Slough.

Connecting: Community Connect Groups that meet across London.

Growing: The Follow Course, an intentional three-part journey by which we help all who desire to know God and grow in their faith.

Going: To fulfil the mission of the church to make disciples and make a difference.

In addition, we have an active children's, youth, and student ministry, and run programs to strengthen marriages and families. Beyond our local congregations we are actively involved in equipping and supporting other churches across Europe with ministry skills training, resourcing, and leadership development and support.

We are confident that our focus on these core activities is resulting in the strong fulfilment and advancing our mission.

Achievements and performance

The Covid pandemic disrupted many of our plans for 2020, but we were able to quickly and effectively move all our ministry functions online and have seen all aspects of discipleship continue to function and even flourish through the various online platforms we have utilised.

Specifically, this year:

"Unhindered" was a significant word for us during all the challenges that the Covid lockdown brought. While Covid forced unprecedented changes to the way we were able to deliver ministry, we thankfully discovered that our mission was crystal clear, and while our methods changed, the mission remained exactly the same and continued "unhindered".

We pivoted to take all our Sunday services, Follow Courses, Connect Groups etc online, and simply kept "making disciples and making a difference". The fruit and growth during this time has been very encouraging, with an increase over virtually all our key metrics.

During the pandemic we focussed on supporting some key service providers like the Foodbank, as well as families and individuals who were struggling financially during these difficult times.

We continued to invest in the GOEUROPE2040 vision, which is "that by God's grace we will plant a campusreaching church in every European nation by 2040". In partnership with our Europe Every Nation churches, we saw some significant church planting activity, with new works started in Lisbon, Glasgow, Zagreb and Cyprus.

In the West Kensington congregation, we were able to secure a short-term licence to occupy the building at 9 Beaumont Avenue where we had previously been renting space from the Fulham Boys School. This allowed us to start onsite service in a very strong way and has resulted in significant new momentum. We only have a ten-week notice period for this arrangement but are making proposals to extend this through a new lease.

Looking back over this Covid year we are very encouraged by the ability we found to adapt to changing circumstances without losing missional momentum. We have continued to experience growth across many areas, and we are confident that the mission will be able to continue unhindered in the next season, whatever challenges it may hold.

Financial review

The Ministry is entirely dependent on the freewill giving of the members of the congregation. We received some restricted funding specifically for our European ministry from a trust fund and continue to look for further partnerships specifically for this aspect of our ministry.

Gross income remained relatively the same compared to the previous year, and we ended the financial year with £354,772 surplus overall.

During this financial year all our congregations did not need to pay for Sunday venue rental, which reduced these costs significantly. We continued to ensure that we were operating on a tight budget with regards to overheads and ended the year on budget. Across the board expenditure was generally similar to the previous year.

Allocation of income

Our general guidelines for giving allocation from gross church income this year were as follows:

10% of gross church income is set aside for supporting the greater Every Nation vision, half (5%) of which is used for regional European apostolic ministry, and half for the international apostolic ministry, all of which is in alignment with our stated objectives. The Directors confirm that the activities of both the Every Nation European and International ministry that we support with these monies are fully in line with the stated objectives of our charity. Every Nation International is accredited by the Evangelical Council of Financial Accountability in the USA, with the financial statements and activities published for public access and scrutiny at www.ecfa.org. We receive quarterly reports from the International funds to account for income they have received from us. The EN International Apostolic Team receives an annual report which monitors and directs the use of International finances.

Each congregation further contributes 15% of gross income to a central department fund which funds all the activities and ministries which we deem to be more effectively done in synergy, rather than as individual congregations. These specifically include the financial administration, senior oversight, website, database, HR functions, combined events, missions and church planting initiatives.

The remainder of each congregation's funds are used directly towards local congregation ministry costs.

Reserves

We aim to hold a general unrestricted reserve fund (the contingency fund) of £70,000, which is roughly equivalent to three months' worth of operating budget. This is deemed necessary for ensuring uninterrupted continuity of the activities of the company since the regular tithes and offerings are not in any way guaranteed. In the event that this contingency fund drops below this agreed minimum, our policy is to reset this contingency fund to this level at the end of every financial year from unrestricted reserve funds.

In addition to the restricted property funds, we also have an unrestricted fund "Community Presence Fund" (approximately £310,000) which consists of a small percentage of general funds saved in previous years and set aside for initiatives and opportunities that arise for the purchase, lease, rent or refurbishment of property by which we are able to more effectively establish a Kingdom presence in the heart of the community.

The European Churches Fund was in positive 30 June 2021, as shown in note 14.

At the end of the year, the charity had total reserves of £881,354, of which £122,949 were restricted, £379,088 were designated and £379,317 were general unrestricted funds.

Grant making policy

Every Nation supports new church plants in Europe which are being planted by Every Nation churches in Europe. The amounts and lengths of support are decided by the trustees based on information provided by the churches. We do this because of our conviction that planting new churches is one of the most effective ways of advancing the objectives of our charity in the greater European context.

Risk management

The directors together with the Finance Board actively consider the risks that the company faces on an ongoing basis and implement procedures and controls through the staff to manage and mitigate those risks as they are identified.

Safeguarding risks: The Health and Safety, Child Protection, and Data Protection functions are set and monitored by appointed officers.

Financial risks: In the light of the consistency of our income levels over the past few years, and our reserve funds held, we do not currently foresee any factors that are likely to put the charity's financial performance at risk.

Future plans

We believe that our core activities are delivering strongly in fulfilling our mission, and therefore our main focus is to continue concentrating on running these well. Areas in which we will be seeking to advance and add in this financial year and going forward include:

- 1.In our West Kensington congregation we will be actively seeking to secure a longer-term lease on the whole or part of the building at no 9 Beaumont Avenue, in order to establish an active local community centre there. We already have several local clubs, including the local Scouts and boxing club, using our venue weekly. Our reserve funds are held for this purpose and we continue to save for this purpose as we are able, recognising that this will require a vast sum in London where we believe we are called to be present as a church.
- 2. We will be actively involved through leadership, finances, and missions in supporting a number of new church plants in Europe, including the Netherlands, Glasgow, Romania, and Portugal.
- 3. In summer 2022 we will be sending our Slough congregation leaders to lead a new church plant in Cardiff.

Budget for 2021/22

The budget set for the next financial year 2021/22 was largely unchanged from the previous year, except for inflationary increases to salaries, and the increased costs for the property lease of Beaumont Avenue.

The board and eldership are confident that the new budget reflects the ministry priorities for the next year.

Structure, governance and management

The charity is controlled by its governing document, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

The Board of Directors appoints new directors for renewable terms of three years. We use resources produced by Stewardship Services to induct new trustees and for ongoing trustee training.

The Trustees of Every Nation London consist of a selection of members of the Eldership and Finance Board. Our church Eldership oversees the overall spiritual leadership direction of the church, and our Finance Board oversees and monitors the finance management and reporting.

Staff and volunteers

Both the Eldership and Finance Board delegate executive functions to the senior pastors and congregation pastors (Andrew Holmes & Greg Albrecht), who lead the staff and volunteers to fulfil the mission. The Finance Board and congregation pastors comprise the key management personnel of the church.

Most of the work of the charity is done by many committed volunteers and we employ a number of staff in full-time and part-time positions for a variety of pastoral, missional and administrative functions.

Remuneration

All salaries, remuneration and benefits decisions are made by the Finance Board. Pay grades of various employment levels have been set by comparisons with various churches remuneration reports, and comparative jobs in the wider market. Salary reviews take place as part of the annual budget setting exercise, and all increases are based on performance reports from staff reviews. Any decisions relating to the senior pastors or their relatives, is made by the Board in their absence.

Wider network

Every Nation London is part of the world-wide family of Every Nation Churches and Ministries, whose stated "ends" is that "we exist to honour God by establishing Christ-centered, Spirit-empowered, socially responsible churches and campus ministries in every nation." There are currently Every Nation churches in over 80 nations of the world. We partner with the Every Nation family for the fulfilment of our mission, church planting, resources, equipping, etc. Every Nation London commits 10% of its gross income towards this wider work, with half of this being directly managed from our London accounts, and the other half being managed by and reported by the Every Nation International office in Nashville, US. Our senior pastor sits on the International board that oversees the use of these funds towards the fulfilment of the mission. We are also members of the Evangelical Alliance UK since 1995.

Statement of trustees' responsibilities

The trustees, who are also the directors of Every Nation London for the purpose of company law, are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company Law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that year.

In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Auditor

In accordance with the company's articles, a resolution proposing that Jacob Cavenagh & Skeet be reappointed as auditor of the company will be put at a General Meeting.

Disclosure of information to auditor

Each of the trustees has confirmed that there is no information of which they are aware which is relevant to the audit, but of which the auditor is unaware. They have further confirmed that they have taken appropriate steps to identify such relevant information and to establish that the auditor is aware of such information.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

TO THE TRUSTEES OF EVERY NATION LONDON

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Every Nation London (the 'charity') for the year ended 30 June 2021 which comprise the statement of financial activities, the balance sheet, the statement of cash flows and the notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

In our opinion, the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the state of the charitable company's affairs as at 30 June 2021 and of its incoming resources and application of resources, for the year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice;

- have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK) (ISAs (UK)) and applicable law. We are independent of the charity in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in the UK, including the FRC's Ethical Standard, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Conclusions relating to going concern

In auditing the financial statements, we have concluded that the trustees' use of the going concern basis of accounting in the preparation of the financial statements is appropriate.

Based on the work we have performed, we have not identified any material uncertainties relating to events or conditions that, individually or collectively, may cast significant doubt on the charity's ability to continue as a going concern for a period of at least twelve months from when the financial statements are authorised for issue.

Other information

The other information comprises the information included in the annual report other than the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. The trustees are responsible for the other information contained within the annual report. Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and, except to the extent otherwise explicitly stated in our report, we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon. Our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the course of the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If we identify such material inconsistencies or apparent material misstatements, we are required to determine whether this gives rise to a material misstatement in the financial statements themselves. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact.

We have nothing to report in this regard.

Opinions on other matters prescribed by the Companies Act 2006

In our opinion, based on the work undertaken in the course of our audit:

Matters on which we are required to report by exception

In the light of the knowledge and understanding of the charity and its environment obtained in the course of the audit, we have not identified material misstatements in the directors' report included within the trustees' report.

We have nothing to report in respect of the following matters in relation to which the Companies Act 2006 requires us to report to you if, in our opinion:

- adequate accounting records have not been kept, or returns adequate for our audit have not been received from branches not visited by us; or
- the financial statements are not in agreement with the accounting records and returns; or
- certain disclosures of trustees' remuneration specified by law are not made; or
- we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit; or
- the trustees were not entitled to prepare the financial statements in accordance with the small companies regime and take advantage of the small companies' exemptions in preparing the trustees' report and from the requirement to prepare a strategic report.

Responsibilities of trustees

As explained more fully in the statement of trustees' responsibilities, the trustees, who are also the directors of the charity for the purpose of company law, are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view, and for such internal control as the trustees determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. In preparing the financial statements, the trustees are responsible for assessing the charity's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the trustees either intend to liquidate the charitable company or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (UK) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

Irregularities, including fraud, are instances of non-compliance with laws and regulations. We design procedures in line with our responsibilities, outlined above, to detect material misstatements in respect of irregularities, including fraud. The extent to which our procedures are capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud, is detailed below.

Based on our understanding of the charity, we identified that the principal risks of non-compliance with laws and regulations related to employment and financial reporting legislation and we considered the extent to which non-compliance might have a material effect on the financial statements. We also considered those laws and regulations that have a direct impact on the preparation of the financial statements such as the Companies Act 2006 and the Charities Act 2011.

We assessed the susceptibility of the charity's financial statements to material misstatement, including obtaining an understanding of how fraud might occur, by making enquiries of management, considering the internal controls in place and discussion amongst the engagement team.

We determined that the principal risks were related to posting inappropriate journal entries to increase revenue or reduce expenditure, management bias in accounting estimates, presentation of separately disclosed items and management override of controls.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT (CONTINUED) TO THE TRUSTEES OF EVERY NATION LONDON

In response to the risks identified we designed procedures which included, but were not limited to:

- · agreeing financial statement disclosures to underlying supporting documentation
- · identifying and testing journal entries
- · reviewing Trustees meeting minutes
- · evaluating the charity's internal controls
- challenging significant accounting estimates

There are inherent limitations in the audit procedures described above. The more removed that laws and regulations are from financial transactions, the less likely it is that we would become aware of non-compliance. Material misstatements that arise due to fraud can be harder to detect than those that arise from error as they may involve deliberate concealment or collusion.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2021

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Every Nation London is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is C/o Fulham Boys School, 9 Beaumont Avenue, London, W14 9LP.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's Memorandum of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)". The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

The charity has relied significantly upon volunteers in carrying out its activities during the year, particularly local church activities. In accordance with paragraph 6.18 of the SORP, the role of volunteers has not been recognised as income from donated services in the accounts.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2021

Accounting policies

(Continued)

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Grants payable are recognised at the earlier of when they are paid or become constructive obligations.

The nature of the work of the church is considered to be so integrated that the core charitable activity costs are considered to be for the one activity. The support costs attributable to the fundraising activity are considered minimal. Nethertheless an allocation has been shown in Note 5 to the accounts.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Plant and equipment

Over 4 years

Fixtures and fittings

Over 4 to 5 years Over 3 years

Computers

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in the statement of financial activities.

Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.9 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.10 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

1.11 Retirement benefits

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
