## Objectives and activities

The objects of the ClO are to establish and run a village hall and to promote for the benefit of the Inhabitants of the Parish of Corfe Castle without distinction of sex, sexual orientation, age, disability, nationality, race or political, religious or other opinions the provision of facilities for recreation or other leisure time occupation of individuals who have need of such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disablement, financial hardship or social and economic circumstances or for the public at large in the interests of social welfare and with the object of improving the conditions of life of the said inhabitants.

The Trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit.

Inhabitants of Corfe Castle continue to benefit from physical and mental activity (e.g. badminton and Purbeck Crafts), social, moral and intellectual development (e.g. Aquarius) and recreation and artistic expression (e.g. bingo, Double Act drama group, Artsreach events etc.). The presence of the Village Hall enhances the quality of life of the inhabitants of the parish.

## Achievements and performance

Like the previous year, 2021 community life was adversely affected by Covid-19; the hall was closed for the first few months to all users except Alcoholics Anonymous. Trustees are again very grateful for the financial support provided by the Government through Dorset Council to help us through this time. Whilst use of the hall by occasional users was again down due to Covid, most regular users were operating again by the Autumn. Purbeck Crafts has taken over from Wool Workshop, and there have also been several new regular users: Moo Music, Childrens' Acrobatics, Purbeck Chess and the Parish Council.

In spite of the Covid-19 issue, Trustees were able to move forward on the third of the four "Completing the Job" Development targets identified in October 2019. A generous grant from Corfe Castle Charity and fund-raising by David Kemp enabled us to start work on boarding out the first floor of the extension. We hope to have completed this target during 2022. This will leave one remaining target - forming a chair store and enlarging the kitchen.

Villagers were entertained by Artsreach music from Flats \& Sharps and a performance by Ball \& Socket, but sadly Covid-19 struck the village again towards the end of the year, forcing the postponement of the Double Act show "Wizard of $\mathrm{Oz}^{\text {" }}$.

Perhaps the most significant "occasional" booking of the hall this year was the public meeting to help Parish Councillors form an opinion on the Community Land Trust planning application.

Routine maintenance included repairs to the front doors and the fitting of door restrictors on the doors from the hall onto the patio.

## Brief statement of the charity's policy on reserves

During the year the assets of the charity rose from $£ 18128.02$ to $£ 24068.40$, an increase of $£ 5940.38$. These assets are shared between a Cambridge and Counties notice savings account, a Nationwide instant access savings account and our Santander current account.

Covid 19 closures had a significant effect. Regular users contributed nearly 4500 to hall funds; with adult exercise activities again playing the major part. Occasional users generated nearly $£ 1200$, and commercial users over $£ 1500$ (the increase being due to commercial training courses).. Our own coffee mornings raised over £2000 and the 100 club income continues to grow, raising over $£ 600$ last year. Apart from coffee mornings, only one fund-raising event was run by the charity (linking with Artsreach) and this raised about $£ 400$. Rental of the library building to DCC continues to be a very significant source of income, over $£ 1700$ per annum. Interest on savings was around $£ 100$. We received significant financial support provided by the Government through Dorset Council. Our Developments fund benefitted from grants from Corfe Castle Charity and donations by David Kemp and other villagers.

Expenditure on utilities, cleaning and insurance dropped to under $£ 7000$, whilst other routine maintenance costs also dropped again to just over $£ 1600$. All these were necessary in order to carry out the charity's objectives. The further costs incurred in the fitting out phase of the developments project amounted to just over $£ 24000$. This too is already assisting the charity in carrying out its objectives.
