**Annual Report of the Trustees** 

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 May 2020.

The charity commenced activities on 1 June 2009.

#### **Objects and Aims**

The objects of the charity are;

- a) For the benefit of the public to relieve the suffering of animals in need of care and attention, and in particular, to provide and maintain rescue homes or other facilities for the reception, care and treatment of such animals;
- b) To promote humane behaviour towards animals by providing appropriate care, protection, treatment and security for animals which are in need of care and attention by reason of sickness, maltreatment, poor circumstances or ill usage and to educate the public in matters pertaining to animals' welfare in general, and the prevention of cruelty and suffering among animals.

# **Organisational Structure**

Trustees are selected for appointment having regard to the skills, knowledge and experience which they can bring to assist the effective running of the charity, and their demonstrated commitment to the aims and objectives of the charity.

#### **Public Benefit**

#### **Review of Activities of the Year**

Dogs Friends is a small, independent, charity run by about 40 volunteers led by the Chair of Trustees and volunteer Rescue Manager, Rosemary Peacock. Some volunteers help with office and fundraising tasks, others with transport, others with dog walking and in the kennels. More than half look after dogs in their own homes as foster carers while the dogs wait for their forever homes. Some foster carers look after dogs on a long-term basis when, for one reason or another, it is not possible to rehome them. In addition, we have a small number of dedicated employees who help at the kennels.

Over the last year, the team has cared for more than 200 dogs and has rehomed more than 150, mostly in Somerset and the surrounding areas. There was a reduction in the last two months of our financial year (April and May 2020) when the country was put into lockdown. All visits to the kennels and to foster homes were stopped and there was great uncertainty as to what could be done, both from a safety and a legal point of view. Fortunately, the Canine and Feline Sector Group (CFSG) acted promptly and, in consultation with Government, was able promptly to issue guidance on transport and visits, etc. The cautious procedures enabled us to continue to take in dogs that were in need and to rehome them.

Dogs Friends' policy is to take in any dog that needs help, irrespective of medical condition or behavioural problems. Occasionally a dog may be passed to a specialist charity, but the vast majority are cared for by the Dogs Friends. Dogs Friends also has the strictest "no euthanasia" policy, so that no dog is put down except in circumstances that a loving pet owner would consider it kind to do so. The natural consequence of this is that expenses, in particular, veterinary expenses, are high and cannot begin to be covered by the amounts received when dogs are rehomed. The charity survives thanks to the support of generous donors, who cannot all be named here, but including trusts mentioned below. Our gratitude is unbounded.

Dogs helped during the year fell into three main categories: ex puppy farm dogs who were no longer wanted for breeding, dogs from pounds who had been abandoned, and "hand-ins" from people no longer able to care for their dog. On occasions, we also helped people who were temporarily unable to look after their dogs.

Some dogs are a challenge but can be particularly rewarding. A good example is two beautiful collie girls who came to us in May 2019. They were entirely feral, having been living wild in the Brecon Beacons for at least 6 months, repeatedly evading capture before eventually being trapped by a local farmer and taken to the pound. We named them Pilgrim and Minstrel. When they arrived, they cowered in the corner of a large kennel, nobody could touch them, and they would only move to eat. After a couple of weeks, Minstrel made some moves towards one person, and it was realised that she was heavily pregnant; gradually she became more confident, but still with only one person, and in early June gave birth to 8 beautiful black and white collie pups. Initially, Minstrel would

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hide them, so well that on one occasion there were only 5 left and the vet thought she must have eaten the other ones. You can imagine the delight and sheer joy when all eight were suddenly present. The pups thrived and, although still nervous of humans herself, Minstrel allowed the pups to be handled, socialised and played with. She gradually became more friendly herself and has been adopted. The pups all have good homes.

Pilgrim on the other hand remained scared and unwilling to have anything to do with humans. She would sit in her kennel alone, only emerging when the door was left open with a secure "corridor" leading to a field where she could run and explore alone or with other dogs. So it was for more than a year, but patience has been rewarded and after 13 months, she made the first move towards human contact. What a day that was - exhilaration!

We cannot end this general review without thanking our vets, who do so much for us. Axe Valley Vets do most of the work, but we have also benefitted from the help of specialists in particular Langford Small animal referral hospital

#### **Future Plans**

During the year, we applied for planning permission to make certain improvements, in particular to erect 10 new kennels; to erect a new building providing a disabled toilet, kitchen and grooming room; and to improve waste arrangements. Due to lockdown, consideration of the application was delayed, but we hope to press ahead with the improvements in the coming years.

#### Financial Results

The charity received total income in the year of almost £232,000 of which £29,000 from adoption donations, almost £184,000 was from donations and fundraising events / appeals, and around £15,000 was in donations from Charitable Trusts. We raise money for our budget via adopter donations, fundraising from Charitable Trusts, collections, events and appeals. Local people and businesses donate food via collections held in local pubs and shops.

Total expenditure was almost £228,000 the net income for the year of around £4,300 has been taken to the General Fund as Reserves.

Transportation costs include regular journeys to Wales to collect dogs from puppy farms as well as taking dogs from the rescue to foster carer homes in the Bristol and Bath areas every week of the year. This also includes visits to vets and dog groomers.

85% of the income we receive each year is spent on animal welfare costs including people caring for the dogs. This rises to 92% when the costs of heat, light and water supplies for the kennels are taken into account. We benefit from a rent free, 8 acre field adjoining the Rescue to exercise the dogs.

# **Acknowledgements and Thank Yous**

The Charity is very grateful to all its fundraisers, from those who rattle tins at dog shows, to our Volunteers who run raffles and auctions, to the business owners who have collection boxes in their

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shops. We are also extremely grateful to the local people, businesses like the Winford Arms, Pet Shop in Cheddar and PetMania in Worle, who collect and drop off food donations for the dogs.

We were grateful to receive donations in the year from a number of charitable trusts, in particular Jean Sainsbury Animal Welfare Trust and the Kennel Club

# **Reserves Policy**

The Trustees are endeavouring to build up a suitable reserve fund in order to provide a buffer to meet unexpected expenditure. The year-end position for Reserves in our General Fund was £35,806.

#### The Future

Covid 19 and lock downs have presented the charity with particular difficulties, difficulties which have been exacerbated by health problems suffered by the Trustees and members of their families. Nevertheless, we

are determined to continue the work we do. Every dog that finds happiness in a new home is triumph which makes all the hard work worthwhile.

#### 7. Trustees' Remuneration

No Trustees received any remuneration for their work as Trustees.

The Trustees have calculated that the value of the time that the Trustees freely give to the Charity amounts to approximately £90,000 per year.

R Peacock, a Trustee, provides kennelling for the dogs at her own premises in order to reduce the cost to the Charity of using commercial boarding kennels, which can exceed £4,000 per month. In 2013, the Trustees agreed that a fair rent to pay to Rosemary Peacock for this facility would be £2,000 per month, although no payments have actually been made to her. Following advice from the Charity Commission, this has not been included as a cost in the Accounts.

Trustees are reimbursed for expenses they incur on behalf of the Charity.
