TRUSTEES' REPORT

The trustees present their report and audited financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2021.

Description of Group

Finchley Children's Music Group ('The Group') is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) governed by a constitution adopted on 22 January 2015 and entered into the Register of Charities on that date with the registered charity number 1160096.

The management of the Group is undertaken by a Board of Trustees consisting of a Chair, Secretary, Treasurer and between one and nine other members. The trustees are elected by and out of the Group's members at the Annual General Meeting.

Objectives and activities

The principal objective of the Group is to promote education in and appreciation of the art and science of music by the presentation of concerts and recitals.

Achievements and performances

The ongoing coronavirus pandemic dominated activities in 2020-21. The choir continued rehearsals throughout but, with the associated restrictions changing frequently, rehearsals necessarily changed from face-to-face to online and back again as permitted. For in-person rehearsals, the group sizes were significantly reduced to allow spacing between singers, with shorter rehearsal times and several groups to accommodate. This reduced the intermixing of singers and meant the usual age mixing was not possible to enable older singers to support younger singers' development, although the smaller groups meant working more closely with the conductors. It was clear that the musicianship tutoring was very helpful at supporting the singers, particularly in the face of greatly reduced music in schools through the year. The older tenors and basses had the chance to work in 1-1 vocal sessions with a professional singer, to learn technique as their voices changed. We were very grateful for the flexibility of the music staff responding to these changes which kept interest levels up and singer numbers healthy throughout the year. Despite the restrictions, each of the Choirs took part in performance activities through the year.

Firstly, all the Choirs produced at-home recording projects at the end of the autumn term which were shared with members for Christmas.

In the spring term, older Senior Choir singers and the Chamber Choir took part in the London Handel Festival's Messiah: Reimagined, where virtual choirs were integrated into a live orchestral performance.

A soprano solo had the opportunity to perform Rachel Portman's Earth for Earth Day at the Coliseum and this was broadcast on Sky TV.

In the summer, a couple of planned projects were unable to go ahead again, but the choirs had the chance to finish off the term in style with an outdoor performance with over 100 singers performing through the afternoon. After all the insecurity of planning through the year, to hold Summer School back as a residential with concert and fully staged show was a huge achievement from all involved.

At the end of the year, we bid farewell to Janie and Raymond Mack, conductor and accompanist, respectively, for Beginner Choir, after 15 years with the Group. We are very grateful to their contributions and wish them all the very best for the future.

Future Plans

The autumn term saw the return to in-house concerts and external projects again: younger Seniors provided the soundtrack for the Aldi Christmas advert, the Senior Choir performed Britten St Nicolas with North London Chorus, and 3 trebles had the chance to perform this again at the Barbican Centre with the BBC Symphony Orchestra and Chorus. The term rounded off with an All Choirs Christmas concert. The spring was busy again with recording of Havergal Brian works and the return of the Bach Choir performance of the St Matthew Passion where the Senior Choir was part of the Ripieno chorus, also the long-awaited world premiere performance of a composition from Patrick Hawes with VOCES8 for the Proms at St Jude's.

Financial Review

The Group incurred a deficit on the General Fund of £28,115 (2020: surplus £6,474) and a surplus of £11,032 (2020: surplus £2,991) on the Restricted Fund which includes expenditure of £1,841 (2020: £714) on bursaries for membership and for the residential Summer School.

The trustees aim to maintain reserves at a level which provides for foreseeable expenditure and any significant fluctuations in receipts. Reserves were previously built up in anticipation of the 50th anniversary celebrations and were subsequently drawn down; similarly, the trustees took steps to increase reserves to allow for projects, in particular recordings and commissions, to mark the Group's 60th anniversary.

At 31st August 2021, the level of free reserves was £43,603 (2020: £71,718).

Public benefit

The Group believes that singing and musical education is of benefit to all children and should not be denied to those with low income. Funds are provided by donation and by fundraising specifically for the purpose as well as from the Group's funds. During the year the Group enabled seven children to be members of the choirs through bursaries ranging from 80% bursary to a third reduced fees and supported three places at 33% cost or more for the residential Summer School.

We also report to you if, in our opinion, the Group has not kept proper accounting records, if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit, or if information specified by law is not disclosed.

We read the Trustees' Report and consider the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements within it. We report to you whether in our opinion the information given in the Trustees' Report is consistent with the financial statements.

Basis of opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland) issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2021

1 Accounting policies

- 1.1 The accounts have been prepared on the historic cost basis, in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities - Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP); applicable accounting standards and the Charities Act 2011. The following paragraphs describe the main accounting policies.
- 1.2 Income represents choir members' subscriptions and surpluses from performances, the Group's Summer School and other workshops. These incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the Group becomes entitled to the income, the trustees are virtually certain they will receive the income; and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.
- 1.3 Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is legal or constructive obligation committing the Group to pay out resources.
- 1.4 Depreciation has been provided on tangible fixed assets at a rate calculated to write off the cost of these assets, less any estimated residual value, over their estimated useful lives.
- 1.5 Stocks are valued at the lower of cost or market value, after making due allowance for slow moving items.
- 1.6 Unrestricted funds represent funds which are expendable at the discretion of the trustees for the furtherance of the objects of the Group. Such funds may be held for the purposes of meeting the administration and operational costs of the Group. Designated funds represent unrestricted funds that the trustees have set aside for a particular purpose. Restricted funds represent grants which are allocated by the donor for specific purposes. Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the expenditure heading for which it was incurred.
